Classic Rock and the Future of Education

Last week I attended a Fleetwood Mac concert at Roger's Arena. I've always liked Fleetwood Mac music, and the fact that the band was at its peak in the late '70s and early '80s resonates really well with me - I like classic things flavoured with a good dose of tradition but modernized in a thoughtful and authentic way. Plus, original band member Christine McVie was reunited with her group after many years, making the experience that much richer for everyone.

There's something special about being at a classic rock concert. When the music plays and the rhythms literally pump through my body, the musical experience is much fuller. Don't get me wrong, I enjoy listening to digital music recordings on my iPhone and online just as much as the next person, but the experience has its limitations despite the conveniences it brings. To be sure, 24/7 access to the riffs of Lindsey Buckingham and the witchy voice of Stevie Nicks whenever it is convenient, and according to my own personal schedule, is awesome; but that kind of online engagement in music is not at all like being at a live concert.

At a concert, the music surrounds me and I am treated to different interpretations of familiar songs. I am also immersed and engaged in the full experience with others, benefitting from the energy of the crowd - something unavailable to me when I listen to my iPhone by myself. What's more, I get to see the musicians interact with and play-off of one another. Not surprisingly, there is a definite human element to concerts that continues to draw people to them by the thousands year after year even though the "same" music is available at a fraction of the cost in a more convenient and highly personalized digital way.

I woke up the day after the Fleetwood Mac concert thinking about education. Is the future of education digital and online, as some "experts" say, without the need for classrooms and bricks and mortar schools? Really? While there is no doubt a place for education in the digital realm - just as there is a place for musical recordings in the digital world - there will always be the need for the full educational experience that happens in the classroom. There is little debate that Southridge is clearly committed to the digital world, and it has embraced the use of educational technology whole-heartedly (all for very good reason); however, our school also recognizes that the class(ic) educational experience modernized in a thoughtful and authentic way is where complete engagement in the learning process happens.

Just as my Fleetwood Mac classic rock concert experience was heightened by the excellent and creative use of digital video, computerized lighting systems and technologically advanced wireless (and POWERFUL) sound systems, so, too, is our students' classroom experience heightened by the use of digital video, computerized learning systems and technologically advanced (and POWERFUL) teaching systems.

In other words, at Southridge the human imperative of the classroom is embellished by the thoughtful and purposeful integration of educational technology. Although our teachers use technology for convenience and personalization to a certain degree, they use it to a greater extent for enrichment and full engagement, allowing the human element of the classroom to become even more pronounced. I guess learning at Southridge is kind of like being at a Fleetwood Mac concert every day - only better.

Senior School News

A Week Away Learning

While I have stated in this very space that I learn a great deal in the role that I have at Southridge, there are times when the pace during the year causes my focus to move away in this regard. That is why I found it so very valuable this past week when I had two wonderful opportunities for intentional, focused learning. I wanted to describe these in a bit more detail.

The first opportunity was through a two-day visit to The Masters School in Dobbs Ferry, New York. Dobbs Ferry is located about 35 minutes north of New York City along the Hudson River. As a trivial note, just north of this location is Sleepy Hollow - as in the "Legend of Sleepy Hollow"! The Masters School is 137 years old and has a wonderful 96 acre campus with impressive facilities. They have also been using a student-centred, discussion-based collaborative learning approach (Harkness) across all disciplines for the past 20 years. I was intrigued to be able to immerse myself into their culture for a few days to learn more about their school. It was a very valuable experience for me as I observed classes and school community meetings and saw many different subject areas being taught. In addition, I spoke with teachers, administrators and students from 'freshman' (Grade 9) to 'seniors' (Grade 12) about their reflections on how this type of learning has impacted them as people and students so positively. I had expected that with my visit the learning would only be one-way - that is that I would gain from the Masters School. However, as I shared many insights I was seeing there and also what we are doing at Southridge, the learning was reciprocated. They found it was helpful to see the school in the words of their Head of Senior School "with a fresh set of eyes."

The second opportunity was a CAIS Senior School Leaders Conference that took place in Toronto from Wednesday evening until Saturday morning. There were a number of excellent speakers presenting on the themes of collaborative leadership, experiential learning and student wellness and this allowed me to learn new insights into these important educational subjects. However, for me personally, the richest learning opportunities came with the ability to dialogue, and share ideas and experiences with close to 60 similar leaders in CAIS Schools across the country. Schools were represented from Halifax to Victoria, boarding or day type and also a wide range with regard to student population size. Finally, the history of each school represented allowed another way to learn how this had impacted their development. As you can probably tell, this made for very engaging conversations and sharing of successes and setbacks in our experiences. In some cases, I renewed old friendships and caught up with how people were doing, but equally important, I forged new networking opportunities through learning from a new colleague.

In both cases, after reflecting on these opportunities, I came away with a renewed appreciation of how powerful learning can be to engage and invigorate oneself. It helps to encourage us to commit to further learning and specifically for me, to ensure that each student is also finding this hopefulness through their own success.

You May Need to Update Your Web Browser to Stay Connected

We just received this notice from Finalsite, the company that provides our website software:

"You may have read about a recent web-based security threat commonly referred to as POODLE. This vulnerability can allow attackers to exploit outdated web browsers that do not use the latest SSL protocols. Although we don't feel that this currently poses a direct risk to the Finalsite platform, we take the security of our services and your data very seriously. So out of an abundance of caution, we have decided to disable the deprecated SSLv3 protocol that some of these older browsers still utilize. This action is scheduled to take place on **Monday**, **December 1, 2014 at 11 am EST**.

You may be concerned about what this means for users of older browsers. Once Finalsite disables the SSLv3 protocol, certain browsers such as Internet Explorer 6 running on Windows XP will no longer support HTTPS requests used for secure transactions like logins or payments. The very small percentage of users impacted by this (around 0.01% by our metrics) are encouraged to upgrade to the latest available version of their browser. In the specific case of IE6 on Windows XP (both of which are no longer even supported by Microsoft), upgrading to IE8 should resolve the issue. In fact, making sure your browser is updated to the latest version is a recommended best practice for everyone."

Please check your website browser to ensure that it is the latest version. You will need the latest version of your web browser to ensure that you can continue to log onto the Partents' Portal.
