A Glance at the Future through a Hole in the Wall

About a decade ago, educational researcher Sugata Mitra performed a series of experiments in India, South Africa, Cambodia and Italy. He and his colleagues provided poor children in highly disadvantaged neighbourhoods access to technology by way of computers placed in walls. I know it sounds a bit odd to have holes in walls filled by computers but, effectively, Dr. Mitra's objective was to provide these children with unsupervised access to internet-enabled computers and to watch and see what would happen. To that extent, he also strategically mounted cameras in and around the areas where he placed the computers to capture the responses of children, and to get a better understanding of how they used technology to learn.

What Dr. Mitra and his Newcastle University associates discovered was fascinating. Without teachers or adult mentors of any kind, the children (ranging in age from about 6 to 13 or so) taught themselves how to use computers to find information. At first blush, this phenomenon may seem basic. We all know how well our own children can use technology to quickly and easily find out more about things they are interested in. As one of Dr. Mitra's experiments demonstrated, Tamil-speaking 12 year-old children taught themselves about biotechnology . . . in English.

Pat Basset, former President of the National Association of Independent School, put it this way, "When poor children in the barrios, favelas, slums and ghettos around the world, who have never been to school, can use 'hole in the wall' computers to teach themselves biotechnology and other subjects, it is clear that a learning revolution is at hand. This essential new power shifts ownership of knowledge from the elites to the masses, from the educated aristocracy to *all* citizens."

What exactly this fundamental yet powerful shift ultimately means is unclear. But what *is* clear is that the conceptual paradigm of education is changing. Not only is technology a social equalizer in terms of accessing knowledge but it is also a social mobilizer in terms of connecting and networking the world in ways we could never have dreamed possible just two short decades ago. If education is truly about preparing children to lead productive lives then it, too, must change along with the shifts brought about the ubiquitous presence of the Internet and the inexpensive mobile devices used to access it.



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The famous saying, "If not us, then who? If not now, then when?" seems particularly appropriate when considering the changing landscape of education. For those of you who were able to attend our strategic plan feedback session last week, I am grateful for your parent perspectives about how Southridge is responding to important shifts in education – from knowing to doing, from teacher-centred to student-centred, from the individual to the team and from consumption of information to the making of meaning. Change takes time and the process can be taxing, but the educational program at Southridge is most certainly pointed in the right direction. All of you – our community – support the context for our learning environment to flourish in a way that is supportive of every student's holistic development.

Fidget Toys - Not for Classroom Use

Many students have been bringing *fidget toys* to school recently. Please be aware that these toys, are just that and that there is no evidence to support their efficacy in helping students focus in the classroom. In fact, they most often do quite the opposite as they are very distracting to the person using the toy as well as to those observing the user "fidget". If students chose to bring fidget toys to school, they are not permitted to use them in the classroom; however, they are welcome to take them outside for play during recess and lunch breaks. Should you feel your child would benefit from sensory-motor stimulation as way to help them focus during learning, please make an appointment with your child's teacher or one of our learning strategies teachers, to discuss how this might be best accomplished.

Class Placements for 2017-18

At this time of year, some parents may be reflecting on the current school year and thinking about the coming school year. At Southridge, we strive to create the best educational groupings possible by considering the individual needs of each child within the wider grade-level context. In doing so, we consider a multitude of factors, including but not limited to: learning diversity and needs, gender balance, relationship and social dynamics, personality combinations, and athletic well-roundedness. While we do our best to ensure each child has at least one close friend in their class, there are only two class options to chose from, which can sometimes pose challenges when creating groupings. There is a considerable amount of deliberation and care inherent in our placement process:

- Current homeroom teachers create the initial lists, assigning students to Class A or Class B (NOTE: no homeroom teachers are not assigned at this point)
- Specialist teachers and the PYP and MYP Division leaders and coordinators review the lists and make further suggestions
- Once the lists are approved they are signed-off on by all the teachers and submitted to the Head of Junior School for a final review



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• The Head of Junior School reviews and finalizes the lists, assigns new students to each class and determines the homeroom teacher

Given the extremely delicate nature and extensive work that goes into determining class placements, it is our policy not to entertain parental requests for certain teachers or peer groupings. We strive to have parallel programming in all our classes with the teachers working collaboratively in their planning and assessment, and we truly believe that our students will thrive in any classroom setting. We thank you for your confidence in our faculty as we endeavor to consider a wide variety of needs as we determine class placements for the 2017-18 school year.

Safe, Inclusive and Welcoming

Last week in assembly, our Head Girl Georgie Adams and Head Boy Will Lauzon presented a short film called *Handsome and Majestic*. The 12 minute award-winning film offers a portrait of teenaged Milan, who bravely faces bullies at school after coming out as transgendered. The film shows a family's support for a son who doesn't conform to conventions of their small community. Milan articulates his comfort with his situation remarkably well. Milan's understanding of his sexuality and his experiences offer valuable



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insights that can help kids of all walks of life find love and self-acceptance. Our continued hope is to ensure that Southridge School is a safe, respectful and accepting place for all students regardless of race, culture, religion, gender, or sexual orientation. Will and Georgie then went on to discuss Southridge's new non-gender specific uniform guidelines that the school has developed. The uniform guidelines will allow students to choose from option A or option B and there will no longer be uniform requirements based on gender. The new uniform guidelines will be reflected in student and family handbooks that will be published shortly. In addition, this coming fall, the school will be creating individual, non-gender specific washrooms for student use.

In September we will be having staff and student workshops put on by Out in Schools, an organization that promotes the belief that all students deserve a school that is safe, inclusive and welcoming. Out in Schools is a program that recognizes that media is a powerful tool for social change, as well as a marvelous teaching aid. They use film and video with facilitated group discussion to engage students across BC on issues of homophobia, transphobia and bullying. As an educational outreach initiative, Out in Schools seeks to raise awareness and advance the safety of learning environments for all youth. We look forward to welcoming Out in Schools to Southridge early in the new school year as we continue to strive to make Southridge a safe, inclusive and welcoming place for all.

An Local Early Harvest for the Surrey Urban Mission

In the past weeks, if you've wandered out to watch our boys play rugby, you may have noticed some raised garden beds, an arbour, and some perennial shrubs and trees to the North of the field. This is a new project, first proposed by Simrat Dial (Grad 2016) and Sanya Grover (Grade 11) last school year. With the help of several parent volunteers and



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teachers this Spring, we built six substantial raised yellow cedar beds. The area was mulched and veggies planted. Mr. Swan and Ms. Kooner from the Junior School organized some 'green thumbed' students to help. Many teachers from the Senior School pitched in, as did a dozen or more students, from Grades 8 to 12.

This past Friday, we were able to use some of our home-grown produce to increase the nutrient count in the soup and sandwiches for our Senior School weekly trip to the Surrey Urban Mission. Each week, students from one advisory arrive at school early Friday morning to make soup and assemble sandwiches. Junior School students also supply sandwiches. In this week's soup went our own kale, pak choi, spinach, and parsley; in the sandwiches, we added two different lettuces. All of the above were organic goodness... planted, watered and harvested by our own students; how great is that!

Math 8 And 9 Changes for September 2017

In our ongoing desire to help all learners achieve their maximum potential and deepen their understanding and confidence with mathematics, and in line with the spirit of the new Ministry of Education curriculum, the Mathematics Department has decided to make some changes in Mathematics 8. Starting this September, all students entering Grade 8 in the Senior School will write a 60-minute Math Placement Test on the first day of school. The results of this test, along with the students' Grade 7 Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) and Math 7 teacher marks, will be used to assess where individual students are at in terms of their overall math learning. This information will be used to determine the make-up of our five Math 8 classes which will be constructed as follows:

- One class of students who have demonstrated ability and readiness to be accelerated in their mathematics learning (will complete Math 8 and 9 in Grade 8 and Math 10 in Grade 9).
- One class of students who have demonstrated ability and readiness to complete Math 8 at a somewhat faster than normal pace, with extra time available for enrichment and problem solving.
- Three classes of students who will work through Math 8 at a regular pace where the goal will be striving for mastery of core concepts and competencies to strengthen the success of these students in mathematics in future years.

Once the Math 8 classes have been formed after the first few days of school, there may be an opportunity for a few students to move between classes during the first few months of the course based on demonstrated performance in class. Please note that the first day Math Placement Test is NOT one which students can or should prepare for. Students



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should simply be equipped with a pencil, eraser, straightedge and basic calculator on their first day of school.

Another change beginning in September is that Coding 9, a new Ministry of Education requirement, will be delivered "together" in one block with Math 9. This means that during a given block, students will spend ³/₄ of the year doing Math 9 and ¹/₄ of the year doing Coding 9. Every nine weeks, the four "classes" of Grade 9 students will rotate to a different section of Math 9 (three 9 week sections) or Coding 9 (one 9 week session). Below is an example of what this might look like.

This rotation of students to different "quarters" will mean that students will have two to three different teachers during their Grade 9 year for their Coding 9 and Math 9 instruction. Book Return Process for Senior Library

Library Books

Textbooks

EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:

Students

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director.
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

Faculty

- 1) Exam invigilators must take attendance at the beginning of the morning and afternoon examinations and bring it promptly to senior reception.
- 2) Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

ENTRY:

Students

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

Faculty

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

DISMISSAL:

Students

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected.
- 3) No student is dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 4) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.

Faculty

1) A table is placed at the back of the gym and labelled by grade, class section and teacher for ease of exam collection.
