Stinky Lesson

When I was in Grade 8, one of the boys in my class thought it would be funny to let off stink bombs in different parts of the school. Over the course of two weeks our hallways, classrooms, closets and washrooms were subjected to awful sulphur-based smoky messes that lingered for hours. It wasn't long until we were all tired of it, but no one knew who was causing the problem.

Before long, our Assistant Head, Mr. Javornick, approached me and said that he had heard that I was the culprit. I was stunned and horrified. I was also terrified. Mr. Javornick was a big, imposing and stern man, and I was certain that he wouldn't listen to my explanations and pleas of innocence. As our brief conversation came to an end, I could see that he was extremely frustrated, but I also noticed a very slight inclination in his mannerisms that made me feel he wanted to believe me. That's when I made my move.

Without much thought, I blurted out that I had a plan. He looked interested. I told him to leave it to me; that I would get to the bottom of it. Naively, I explained that I would find out who was behind the stink bombs, talk to them and ask them to stop. Mr. Javornick smiled and raised his eyebrows – probably to conceal his disbelief, but maybe as a genuine expression of appreciation for the innocence of youth – and said he would give me two days. Before I could grab the words back as the exited my mouth, I sealed the deal on one condition – I would not disclose the names of whoever was behind the problem.

To make a long story short, my plan worked. The stink stopped and Mr. Javornick was both relieved and happy. Best of all, I was a free kid – no longer going about my day under his suspicious gaze. Years and years later, I was at an alumni reunion and ended up in a conversation with Mr. Javornick. As the conversation progressed, I was shocked when he brought up the stink bomb caper. Why on earth did he remember that incident all these years later, having dealt with likely hundreds of similar type minor disciplinary incidents as a school administrator?

To be certain, I knew how the situation impacted me – I felt trusted, capable of handling a difficult situation and confident enough to face imposing obstacles. On the other hand,



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Mr. Javornick said that he remembered the circumstances because he learned how impactful it can be to include students, to hear their voices, to understand their points of view and to trust them.

At Southridge, we often talk about the importance of trust in building a sense of safety in our school community. We also know that it's important for students to feel that they have a trusted adult in the school to whom they can turn when faced with adversity, challenges or hardship. The stink bomb story, though, helps me remember that trust is a two-way street, and that just as students need a trusted adult, so too do adults need trusted students to whom they can turn for insight, perspective, and, yes, the occasional investigative caper cracking venture.

Honouring the Learner through the PYP Exhibition

Last Wednesday and Thursday, our Grade 4 students presented their PYP Exhibition of Learning. The PYP Exhibition is one of the most rigorous and challenging assessments of the IB programs, as it requires that young learners apply not just some, but <u>all</u> of the knowledge, concepts, skills, attributes and attitudes that they have been striving to develop across the PYP continuum as they engage in an in-depth, inquiry based, collaborative group project and action. Students must choose a relevant issue, conduct in-depth research into the issue by using primary and secondary sources, decide how best to share their individual and collective understanding, and take meaningful action. This is no simple task, and when you also consider that our school stages the PYP Exhibition at Grade 4, when most other PYP schools around the world do it at the end of Grade 5, 6 or 7, it is quite an impressive accomplishment. Really, just pause and think about that for a moment.

One of the greatest challenges of staging the PYP Exhibition is minimizing adult involvement so that how students deepen and share their understanding is authentic and meaningful for them. Each group is assigned a teacher mentor who coaches them as they decide on tasks, determine next steps, share responsibility, and reflect on their process. It is dangerously easy for the mentor to micro-manage the process and drive what the product "should" look like. Just as the Exhibition is the most challenging part of the PYP for learners, it is also the most challenging for the teacher mentors, as letting go of control is never easy, but in this context it is entirely necessary if we are also gauging our own effectiveness in our delivery of the philosophy and framework of the program. The PYP Exhibition serves as a summative assessment of the entire program not only for learners, but also for every member of our PYP teaching and leadership team. I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to our PYP Coordinator, Mrs. Murchie, for her outstanding vision and leadership, our Grade 4 teachers, Ms. Reid and Mr. Smith for their commitment to honouring and celebrating every learner, Ms. Gardecki for gathering resources and organizing wonderful field learning experiences, Mrs. Winterburn and Ms. Redies for their arts support, and all of the amazing teacher mentors (Ms. McArthur, Mrs. Raber, Ms. Kooner, Ms. Jiwa, Mrs. Khangura and Ms. Kapetanovic) for making a very determined and intentional effort to ensure our PYP Exhibition was truly learner-centered and learnerdriven. The results were simply incredible - as evidenced in the students' sense of accomplishment and confidence in sharing their learning process and knowledge products, and in the positive and relaxed feel amongst the teachers and mentors throughout the process. Not only did our Grade 4 students share their knowledge,



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understanding and action related to a host of complex issues, they also shared their creativity, ingenuity and passion. The inventions, visual art work, and raps enabled them to consolidate and share their learning in fun and engaging ways, truly highlighting the transdisciplinary strength of the PYP. Thank you parents for supporting the process and for being positive and encouraging audience members. Finally, congratulations, Grade 4s - you did yourselves and our community so proud with the thoughtful, creative, and inspiring ways you expressed your learning and understanding and took action to share the planet!

Fidget Toys - Not for Classroom Use

Many students have been bringing *fidget toys* to school recently. Please be aware that these toys, are just that and that there is no evidence to support their efficacy in helping students focus in the classroom. In fact, they most often do quite the opposite as they are very distracting to the person using the toy as well as to those observing the user "fidget". If students chose to bring fidget toys to school, they are not permitted to use them in the classroom; however, they are welcome to take them outside for play during recess and lunch breaks. Should you feel your child would benefit from sensory-motor stimulation as way to help them focus during learning, please make an appointment with your child's teacher or one of our learning strategies teachers, to discuss how this might be best accomplished.

Class Placements for 2017-18

At this time of year, some parents may be reflecting on the current school year and thinking about the coming school year. At Southridge, we strive to create the best educational groupings possible by considering the individual needs of each child within the wider grade-level context. In doing so, we consider a multitude of factors, including but not limited to: learning diversity and needs, gender balance, relationship and social dynamics, personality combinations, and athletic well-roundedness. While we do our best to ensure each child has at least one close friend in their class, there are only two class options to chose from, which can sometimes pose challenges when creating groupings. There is a considerable amount of deliberation and care inherent in our placement process:



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- Current homeroom teachers create the initial lists, assigning students to Class A or Class B (NOTE: no homeroom teachers are not assigned at this point)
- Specialist teachers and the PYP and MYP Division leaders and coordinators review the lists and make further suggestions
- Once the lists are approved they are signed-off on by all the teachers and submitted to the Head of Junior School for a final review
- The Head of Junior School reviews and finalizes the lists, assigns new students to each class and determines the homeroom teacher

Given the extremely delicate nature and extensive work that goes into determining class placements, it is our policy not to entertain parental requests for certain teachers or peer groupings. We strive to have parallel programming in all our classes with the teachers working collaboratively in their planning and assessment, and we truly believe that our students will thrive in any classroom setting. We thank you for your confidence in our faculty as we endeavor to consider a wide variety of needs as we determine class placements for the 2017-18 school year.

Library Books and Inventory

All library books must be returned to the Junior School Library no later than Friday, June 9. The Junior School Library will be closed for inventory the week of June 12th - 16th. The library will re-open the week of June 20th so that students can sign out books for summer reading.

Grade 6-7 Girls Soccer Dominant at the ISEA Championships

The grade 6/7 A girls soccer team was ranked 2nd going into the championships with a season record of 2-1-1. They first played Collingwood in the semi-finals and defeated them in a shootout. In the finals, they played a strong WPGA but once again defeated them in shootout to take the ISEA Championships. A big thank you goes out to Mr. Rob Reed with his help coaching the girls all season.

The grade 6/7 B girls soccer team was ranked 1st going into the championships with a season record of 3-1-0. They had a bye in the first round and a trip straight to the semi-finals. In their first game they defeated Brockton school by a score of 3-2 sending them to the finals against Collingwood. It was a tight game in the finals with a 0-0 draw in regular



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time. In overtime, Collingwood went up 1-0 but with 2 minutes left in the 2nd OT Southridge scored sending it to a shootout. Southridge scored the one and only goal in the shootout giving them the gold medal.

This was the first time in Southridge Junior School history that one sport won both the A and B divisions. Congratulations girls!!!!

Safer Schools Together

Last week I attended a two-day workshop put on by **Safer Schools Together** (SST), an organization started by South Surrey's own Theresa Campbell in 2008 to provide opportunities for extensive professional development in the areas of safe and caring schools and violence prevention (see: <u>www.saferschoolstogether.com</u>). SST has authored the Safe & Caring School Tool to measure the climate and culture of a school, to also ensure best practices are followed and to meet the BC Ministry of Education mandates regarding school/student safety. Theresa now works throughout North America with police forces and inner city school districts implementing safe, caring and connected school programs and anti-gang strategies. We are fortunate to have her in our community working with school leaders.

The workshop I attended was part of the ERASE Bullying Program with the goal of ensuring that every child in BC feels safe, accepted and respected regardless of their race, gender, culture, religion or sexual orientation. As Head of the Senior School it is my job to ensure that every Southridge student feels safe, accepted and respected. We like to say that every student at Southridge has a trusted adult who values the student and knows them well - someone the student feels safe talking to. If you feel your son or your daughter is not well-connected to a caring adult at the school, whether it be an advisor, teacher, coach, counsellor or any other staff member at Southridge, please do not hesitate to let me know.

ERASE Bullying is much more than a program that deals with issues of bullying at school, in fact, Theresa Campbell suggested that many youth are tired of schools addressing bullying so much and would rather focus on mental and physical wellness, and how to cope with depression and anxiety. The goals of ERASE Bullying include helping school leaders assess potential risk and threats in school, understanding different levels of risk, how to manage a school-wide crisis such as death or suicide of a student or staff member, promoting wellness, recognizing and responding to worrisome behaviour, and managing social media and technology to name a few. If bullying *is* suspected, however, *Safer Schools Together* has developed a software program called *PSST World* where students can report incidences of bullying. Copies of the report go to administrators and counsellors in the school who can quickly intervene. All student laptops at Southridge come with a desktop link to PSST World.



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Advisory is such a critical part of what we do in the Senior School. Each advisor is connected to a small group of 12 to 13 students that meet at the beginning of each day and for long advisory of 30 minutes on Thursdays. This is where important connections are made. If the advisor notices that a certain individual is not acting as they usually do, or recognizes a decline in behaviour or demeanor over time, they serve as the front-line person in that student's life who can reach out and determine if further interventions are necessary, perhaps with the school-based counsellor or outside support services. At Southridge, we want to ensure that your child feels safe and is well-connected when at school and is given every opportunity to thrive in a caring and respectful environment.

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Math 8 And 9 Changes for September 2017

In our ongoing desire to help all learners achieve their maximum potential and deepen their understanding and confidence with mathematics, and in line with the spirit of the new Ministry of Education curriculum, the Mathematics Department has decided to make some changes in Mathematics 8. Starting this September, all students entering Grade 8 in the Senior School will write a 60-minute Math Placement Test on the first day of school. The results of this test, along with the students' Grade 7 Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) and Math 7 teacher marks, will be used to assess where individual students are at in terms of their overall math learning. This information will be used to determine the make-up of our five Math 8 classes which will be constructed as follows:

- One class of students who have demonstrated ability and readiness to be accelerated in their mathematics learning (will complete Math 8 and 9 in Grade 8 and Math 10 in Grade 9).
- One class of students who have demonstrated ability and readiness to complete Math 8 at a somewhat faster than normal pace, with extra time available for enrichment and problem solving.
- Three classes of students who will work through Math 8 at a regular pace where the goal will be striving for mastery of core concepts and competencies to strengthen the success of these students in mathematics in future years.

Once the Math 8 classes have been formed after the first few days of school, there may be an opportunity for a few students to move between classes during the first few months of the course based on demonstrated performance in class. Please note that the first day Math Placement Test is NOT one which students can or should prepare for. Students should simply be equipped with a pencil, eraser, straightedge and basic calculator on their first day of school.

Another change beginning in September is that Coding 9, a new Ministry of Education requirement, will be delivered "together" in one block with Math 9. This means that during a given block, students will spend ³/₄ of the year doing Math 9 and ¹/₄ of the year doing Coding 9. Every nine weeks, the four "classes" of Grade 9 students will rotate to a different section of Math 9 (three 9 week sections) or Coding 9 (one 9 week session). Below is an example of what this might look like.

EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:

Students

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director.
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

Faculty

- 1) Exam invigilators must take attendance at the beginning of the morning and afternoon examinations and bring it promptly to senior reception.
- 2) Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

ENTRY:

Students

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

Faculty

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

DISMISSAL:

Students

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected.
- 3) No student is dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 4) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.

Faculty

1) A table is placed at the back of the gym and labelled by grade, class section and teacher for ease of exam collection.
