### **Potential Privacy Breach**

Dear Southridge Community,

As you should have read yesterday through direct email communication from Southridge School, we have learned of an email breach that may have resulted in your personal information being accessed without authorization.

I want to take this opportunity to assure our entire school community that we share your concerns regarding this incident, and that we are working diligently to mitigate any risk of future similar situations. Since learning of the breach, the School's administrative team has been working with a third-party forensics organization who specializes in these types of cyber-breaches. They are supporting our efforts to ensure our systems and business processes are secure going forward. This work will be ongoing until such time that we feel we have addressed the vulnerabilities in our systems, and found solutions to possible future exposures of this type.

In the email communication you received yesterday, you would have been provided with a contact name and number for an individual at Southridge who can address any questions you may have. If you feel the need to do so, please take the time to connect with these individuals so they can alleviate any remaining concerns that may not have been addressed in our email yesterday.

The School sincerely regrets this incident and apologizes for the frustration and inconvenience it may have caused you.

### Inquire, Act, Reflect - Making a Difference

"Principled action, as both a strategy and an outcome, represents the IB's commitment to teaching and learning through practical, real-world experience...Action involves learning by doing, enhancing learning about self and others. Action...may involve service learning, advocacy and educating one's self and others." (MYP from Principles into Practice, p. 11)

The MYP Action Cycle consists of 3 phases: **inquiry**, **action** and **reflection**. These phases help to guide learners as they pursue conceptual understanding and knowledge construction. The phases are not linear, as learners revisit inquiry, action and reflection

throughout the learning process as they apply different approaches to learning in the construction of meaning. Action is an important part of the International Baccalaureate philosophy and curricular framework, as it is no longer enough to simply consume knowledge – today's learners must understand that they can do something with their knowledge to impact their own learning, as well as how they engage with others, whether it be within the school community or by reaching out into their local community or wider world. This is the basis for education that makes a difference, and cultivates the growth of international mindedness, the heart of the IB program model.

Last Friday, our Grade 7 students shared the outcomes of their *Making a Difference* projects with our community. The presentations that were shared on Friday were the culmination of sustained inquiry, action and reflection. There were quite a variety of issues explored, ranging from declining bee populations, homelessness, understanding Down's Syndrome, addiction, the Syrian refugee crisis, women's rights, child slavery, littering, waste disposal, weapons, to the opioid drug crisis (and that's just to name a few!) The presentations involved students sharing factual knowledge about their chosen issue, as well as action they took to make a difference (e.g. raising awareness, visiting local organizations to deepen understanding, and in some cases, fundraising for local organizations).

Throughout the process, students reflected on their learning in order to make informed choices about how best to pursue meaningful action. I am always amazed at how young children, in this case, 12 and 13-year old's, can create a plan and follow through with it. Our Grade 7 students did an amazing job synthesizing their learning and paying that forward into age-appropriate action. Having the opportunity to share their learning with an authentic audience of peers and adults is an important aspect of this kind of learning. As I visited different projects and spoke with the students, I was so impressed with their ability to not only share information, but to also articulate their reflections on how their inquiry and action has impacted them. Their passion for their chosen issues was highly evident.

Thank you to Ms. McNeil and Dr. Bespflug for guiding the students along this journey. And to our Grade 7 students – thank you for using your voices to make change in your world. Not only did I feel more knowledgeable after seeing your presentations, I also felt inspired and empowered.

#### After School & Sports Practice Pick-Up – Please, Be on Time!

Leaving your child unattended in the Great Hall after school puts your child's safety in jeopardy and places unfair expectations on faculty and staff who are fulfilling other responsibilities during these times. Siblings of students who are participating on teams MUST be picked up at regular dismissal time (no later than 3:20 pm). It is also important that students who are attending team practices are picked up promptly at the end of their practices. Expecting teachers to wait with your child, sometimes until after 5 pm, is unreasonable and unacceptable. All practices end by 4:15 pm and students need to be picked up on time.

#### **Students and Cell Phones in the Junior School**

While many students come to school with a cell phone, cell phones are not a component of our learning program. If your child is bringing a cell phone to school, please ensure that they are turning the cell phone off before they enter the building. At no point during the school day should a student be using their cell phone. Parents should not be texting or contacting students during the school day, and likewise, students should not be texting or contacting parents using their cell phones. If you need to contact your child, please call the Junior School Reception (604-535-5056) and we will ensure your message is delivered. A phone is also available for student-use should a student need to call a parent during the school day. The only time students are permitted to use their cell phones is once they have left the Junior School building after school. Students who are caught using their cell phones during the school day will have them removed for the remainder of the day. Please help us enforce these expectations by adhering to the School's guidelines.

#### **Nut Aware Reminder**

At this time of the year, lots of wonderful appreciation treats trickle into the Junior School staff room (and they are joyfully received!). As a nut aware school, we also need to keep our staff room free of nuts and nut products. If you are dropping off a treat, please ensure that they don't contain nuts or nut products. #### Junior School Fire Alarm – Friday, May 12

As you may have heard from your son or daughter, the fire alarm sounded in the Junior School at approximately 12:35 pm on Friday, May 12 and it was not a scheduled drill. Students, faculty, staff and parent volunteers did an excellent job evacuating the building and other spaces, and assembled at our safe spot on the Turf Field. Our local Fire Department was on-site in minutes to assess the situation and clear the building for re-

entry. While the incident was minor, it was important to ensure that everything was safe for students before we re-entered the building. It was determined that a Cup of Noodles contained in a Styrofoam cup had been put in the Primary Kitchen microwave for heating. Styrofoam is not supposed to be heated in the microwave, and the resulting smoke tripped our fire alarm. I want to congratulate everyone for their quick response – everyone's safety was first and foremost and students were delighted to return to their afternoon classes.

### The Student Code of Ethics: Integrity

Last week, I referenced the Senior School Student Code of Ethics, written by students that would serve to guide behaviour and highlight the values that students felt were important in forming a strong and positive character. The process, developed in conjunction with the Institute of Global Ethics, involved students discussing the values which they believed an ethical person should have. *Integrity* is one of the terms they added to the code, and I am glad that they did.

The *Merriam-Webster Dictionary* defines *integrity* as 1) firm adherence to a code of especially moral or artistic values; incorruptibility; 2) an unimpaired condition; soundness; 3) the quality or state of being complete or undivided. When someone is incorruptible, unimpaired, and undivided, it means that they will not waver when faced with peer pressure, or with the temptation to steal or to cheat. Southridge students defined this in

the Code of Ethics as being 'true to your word'. I often define integrity as consistently choosing to do the right thing, even when nobody's watching.

University research professor, author and renowned public speaker, Brené Brown, defines integrity this way: "Integrity is choosing courage over comfort; choosing what is right over what is fun, fast, or easy; and choosing to practice our values rather than simply professing them." I really like her definition.

I used to have a problem, as a kid, for taking the fast and easy way out. In Grade 1, my teacher Mrs. Muttitt (who was, by the way, my favourite teacher) told the class that she had a special surprise for the first student to finish reading the story we were assigned (questionable teaching practice there, Mrs. Muttitt). I raced through the story and was the first up at her desk in record time. Suspicious, she asked me a few questions about what I had read and of course, I couldn't answer any of them. Dejected and embarrassed, I went back to my seat – snickers from other students following me – knowing that the special surprise (a pencil that had a big cowboy hat for an eraser) would go to someone else.

Had Mrs. Muttitt given me that pencil, I would not have deserved it – I doubt I would have enjoyed it. When we gain things through dishonest means it never quite feels right. Integrity is that voice inside of us that says, is it worth it? Is that cowboy hat eraser worth my integrity? Tough question for a 7 year-old, perhaps, but students have to face much more serious decisions in high school and university than I did in Grade 1, issues like: "I'm really swamped right now and could save myself a lot of work if I just went online and bought that essay;" or, "If the three of us were to split up these 10 questions and share our answers, we'd only have to do a third of the work;" or, "It's only a short drive home and I only had a few beers. Taxis are way too expensive."

I love that our own students saw the need to include such a powerful word as *integrity* in their Student Code of Ethics. More than straight-A's, athletic championships or admission into the best university programs, it is a quality I hope every Southridge graduate leaves with.

#### **EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director.
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

#### **Faculty**

- 1) Exam invigilators must take attendance at the beginning of the morning and afternoon examinations and bring it promptly to senior reception.
- 2) Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

#### **ENTRY:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

#### **Faculty**

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

#### **DISMISSAL:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected.
- 3) No student is dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 4) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.


