## The Courage to Ask...

How amazing was the Country Fair?! A considerable amount of effort and energy went into preparing for and executing the fair. Thank you to everyone who volunteered - your commitment to our community is a very deep well and it is truly wonderful to see how our everyone comes together - not only to support our community, but to also open the doors to our wider South Surrey community for such a fun and lighthearted event. The Country Fair most definitely shows how our guiding principles of community, influence and contribution are alive and well!

A couple of weeks ago a petition appeared on my desk with 136 signatures on it, and the names of the three Grade 5 boys who were responsible for it. Curious to learn more, I invited the boys to a meeting with me to hear more about what prompted them to start the petition and to clarify what they were requesting. Last week, I sat down with the boys and listened to them as they confidently and excitedly made a pitch to advocate for a change - instead of 3 single blocks of PE/cycle, could we have 1 double block and 1 single block/cycle. I must say, these boys came prepared to discuss their concerns and ideas, and to compromise - they clearly had thought this through from every angle and presented me with several valid reasons for why the change could be made and how it could be done, given the constraints we have on gym usage. They came with a solutions oriented approach and were ready to hear my perspective, too. I was struck by their courage, commitment, thinking and willingness to take the risk to make the ask.

Too often, when we want something, we talk ourselves out of asking for it and tell ourselves no. My philosophy has always been, you can always ask for whatever you want so long as you are prepared to hear no for an answer. These three boys were very prepared to hear no, even though they were hoping for a yes. In the end, I didn't give them a yes or a no. I was able to tell them that their input and ideas will be carefully considered as we look at building our timetable for the upcoming school year. While I can't promise a double block of PE, I can promise that we will look to address some of the concerns that led them to ask for the double block of PE. I am proud that our students are thinkers who can problem pose and problem solve while considering multiple perspectives. Thank you Tyler, Cooper and Joshua for showing such leadership and confidence - I am listening!

## The Student Code of Ethics: Honesty

At an early age I learned that it did not pay to lie. I also learned that I was a lousy liar and that lying just ended up complicating things. When I was about 7 years old my older sister was getting ready to go out with her friends and was blow-drying her hair in the bathroom. There was a five dollar bill on the counter and I stealthily grabbed it and put it in my pocket (she was 17 and too engrossed in her hair to notice). Five dollars was a lot of money in the early 70's and I was pretty proud of the fact that I had more money in my pocket than I could ever remember having. Realizing that I needed a story about how I came about acquiring the cash, I went into my parents and told them I had miraculously found \$5 on

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the street on the way home from school. Lacking the ability to visualize the future, I did not realize what inevitably lay ahead of me. Naturally, my sister started asking if anyone had seen her five dollars. "Nope," I confidently responded. A few minutes later my dad asked me again where I got the money. "On the street," I said. "Get in the car and show me," he replied. "gulp."

I got into the passenger seat of my dad's maroon Oldsmobile Delta 88 and he told me to show him the exact spot where I had found the money. We drove a couple of blocks and were almost at my school when I pointed to the side of the road and said, "there." He said, "where?" and I pointed again. I looked over at him and saw the stern look on his face and I knew at once that he didn't believe me. I burst into tears. The jig was up. I'll never forget the look of disappointment on my sister's face when we got home. We were very close and I had stolen from her and lied to her. My days of grand theft came to an abrupt end and I think I knew then that a successful life of crime and deception was not in my future - I certainly didn't like the feeling of being caught and the consequences of my actions.

This week as I was editing our Senior School Student Handbook, I came across a section titled "Lying" that instantly took me back to 1973. At Southridge, not having locks on lockers is a symbol of the trust we demand and expect from every student. This dictates that we must place trust and honesty at the center of everything we do. In the student-written Student Code of Ethics, honesty is an integral component of being a Southridge student. Each student signs this code of conduct in advisory in September. We strive to develop student character and honesty as defined in the code of ethics: "accepting the consequences of telling the truth; being able to accept one's own actions; standing up for truth; not cheating or stealing; and being trustworthy." Young people will make mistakes - that is a certainty. It is essential; however, that throughout the process honesty is revered and a strong moral character is allowed to flourish.

## China Tour - Summer 2018 - Info Meeting May 16th

The Social Studies department has created an opportunity for an academic/cultural trip to China for the summer of 2018. The trip would consist of three main concentrations: Beijing, Nanjing and Hong Kong. In Beijing the highlights would include visiting Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven, the Summer Palace, and of course, a trip outside the city to walk on the Great Wall and to also visit the Ming Tombs. In Nanjing, the highlights would include a visit to Purple Mountain, which holds the mausoleum of Sun Yat-sen, and many other spectacular sites. In Nanjing, we will also learn about the history of the city during the Second World War, which will complement their studies in the upper grades of Social Studies. The final destination will be Hong Kong. Once again, there is a huge connection to the Second World War and the Canadians who fought there, which is taught in Socials 10. In addition, we will visit the harbour, Victoria Peak, Stanley Market, and leave some time to do some final shopping!

The trip will begin on Monday June 25<sup>th</sup> and we will return to Vancouver on July 5<sup>th</sup>. The dates will not conflict with any final exams or Grad events. The cost of the tour will be around \$4, 100.00 and it covers all transportation, food, lodging, entrance fees, and our quides.

## **English 12 Provincial Exam - Thursday May 11th (am)**

Failure to do this will result in delays at the start of the exam. In addition, students will require their PEN numbers to access the Ministry website. This number can be found at the top of a student's report card and it will also be needed later to access the website to find out an individual student's result.

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In the event that a student is not satisfied with the result from this examination, there will be another opportunity to write on Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June (am), though it should be noted that this is also the day of Southridge's closing and commencement ceremony.

I am optimistic though that all students will come well rested and well prepared on May 11<sup>th</sup> and that it will be a successful day for all.

#### **Students**

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director.
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

#### **Faculty**

- 1) Exam invigilators must take attendance at the beginning of the morning and afternoon examinations and bring it promptly to senior reception.
- 2) Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

#### **ENTRY:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

#### **Faculty**

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

#### **DISMISSAL:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected.
- 3) No student is dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 4) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.

#### **Faculty**

1) A table is placed at the back of the gym and labelled by grade, class section and teacher for ease of exam collection.

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
