What do Harvard and Columbia and our Grades 1 & 8 have in Common?

As part of my professional development experience this year, I enrolled in design course at the Harvard Graduate School of Education (HGSE) just before March Break. The course was offered in partnership with the Harvard Graduate School of Design, and it attracted people from all over the world. Surely, eighteen countries were represented in our relatively small cohort of seventy-five people, and my design team of eight people was representative of six different countries – Mexico, Columbia, India, Ireland, the US and Canada. The focus of the course was on designing learning environments for tomorrow.

Two years ago, I attended Teachers College at Columbia University in New York with thirty other heads of independent school from across North America and Europe for an intensive week of discourse, research and a range of theoretical and practical experiences in educational leadership focussing on the future of education. While at Columbia, I was involved with a research team that wrote a white paper focussing on six distinct topics. My topic of investigation was design thinking, and one of the heads of school on my team was Diane Rosenberg from the Nueva School in California.

For a number of years, the Nueva School has worked closely with the Stanford Design School to integrate design thinking into their school's curriculum. My relationship with Ms. Rosenberg eventually led to one of our own teachers, Mrs. Raber, visiting Nueva for one of their highly regarded summer institutes on design thinking. Without much delay upon her return to Southridge, Mrs. Raber joined forces with her Grade 1 teaching partner, Ms. Kooner, to create meaningful ways to bring design thinking into Grade 1 and the rest of the Junior School. The demonstrations of learning from our students based on their design thinking projects was fantastic. However, the Junior School was not alone in its integration of design thinking into our inquiry-oriented, discussion-based curriculum. At the same time, our Senior School was also working on using similar principles in a Grade 8 science project that challenged small groups of students to design creative solutions to everyday problems that would make life



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better. On Tuesday, April 18, our first ever Senior School Invention Convention presented a platform for our Grade 8 students to showcase, present and demonstrate their creations to peers, teachers, parents and, very importantly, our Grades 1 students.

At the HGSE the professors, sessional instructors and workshop facilitators strive to model teaching and learning principles in an effort to immerse education professionals in relevant and exemplary experiences. While I was at the HGSE, there was a distinct and clear focus on design thinking – the very same principles our Grades 1 and 8 students use. What's more, discussion played a significant role in the learning process at the HGSE . . . as did inquiry, mistakes, failures, false starts, dead ends, deep reflection, peer critiques and transparent (public) demonstrations of learning.

From my experiences at Harvard, to my research at Columbia, I can attest to the fact that the educational program at Southridge (from Kindergarten to Grade 1 to 12) is nothing short of exemplary in its thoughtful integration of relevant and engaging age-appropriate principles and perspectives on contemporary educational thought and practice. I can assure you that your children are in very good hands, indeed.

13 Reasons Why

Many students are talking about the Netflix series [13 Reasons Why](#), and it is important for parents to understand that the themes in this series are for very mature audiences and it could have a negative psychological effect on vulnerable youth. Some mental health care workers have reported an increase in cutting and other maladaptive ways of dealing with pain among their clients after watching certain episodes of the series. Many adults who have watched the show have described it as dark, raw, disturbing and the addictive show is creating quite a [buzz in the media](#). Although I am not seeking to create any undue hysteria over this, I feel that parents need to be informed of the effect *13 Reasons Why* can have on youth.

The series revolves around a high school student who commits suicide following a series of demoralizing circumstances brought on by select individuals at her school. A box of cassette tapes she recorded before her suicide details thirteen reasons why she ended her life. The show's depiction of suicide may cause alarm for parents as well as for young people. The series also touches on themes of bullying, destructive use of social media, revenge, disengagement from adults, and risk-taking behaviours, and may elicit strong emotional reactions among young viewers; however, unlike the adult characters in the show who are often portrayed as absent, disinterested or incompetent, we, as parents and educators, are well positioned to respond thoughtfully to these issues. It is thus critical



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for parents to know what their children are watching and to engage them in reflective conversations.

A principal in the Burnaby School District summarized this well in a letter to parents:

“Although various reviews I have read state that this is an important show for parents to watch (Common Sense Media suggests 16 and over), many mental health organizations are highlighting concerns...urging school communities, parents and mental health services to be aware of the dangers and risks associated for children and young people who have been exposed to the series (Australia’s National Youth Mental Health Foundation).

The linked article was created by the [Suicide Awareness Voices for Education Society \(SAVE\)](#) as a guideline for talking to children about the TV series. It explains much of the show’s content, and the reasons why some mental health associations are *urging caution in allowing children/teens to watch the show unsupported.*”

Parents are urged to be aware of what their adolescent children are watching and to have open and honest discussions about how a show like *13 Reasons Why* may be having a negative impact on some youth. We will be assisting and engaging with students, staff and parents with concerns as they arise. Upcoming Outdoor Ed Trip; Galiano Cycle/Kayak: May 11-13
