A Life Remembered - Matthew Sinitsin, Class of 2010

Matt Sinitsin graduated from Southridge in June 2010 after spending 13 years with us as a student in our community. Very sadly, Matt passed away on February 2nd, at just 24 years of age. It was shocking for those of us who knew Matt to receive the news of his death, and I know it caused many of us to pause and reflect.

Today, I would like to celebrate Matt's life in numbers, and being his math teacher in Grade 7, it kind of makes sense that I do so. Before I get to the numbers, though, I would like to celebrate the kind of person Matt was – both in terms of his character and the way he expressed his spirit. Matt and I came to Southridge in the same year, 1997; he in Kindergarten and I as a Grade 5 teacher. Eventually, I became the Head of the Junior School while Matt finished the first 8 years of his journey at Southridge. I was also the Head of School for the final 4 years of Matt's high school journey. Matt was a lifer at Southridge, and he was, as a matter of fact, a member one of the first true lifer classes having spent the entire first 13 years of his school life with us.

Matt was a quiet soul. There is a lyric from a song called *All My Days* by Alexi Murdoch that says, "I have been quietly standing in the shade, all of my days." That line reminds me of Matt. As a basketball player, Matt was not interested in the rah/rah and the hype, and he didn't need the flash and the fanfare to motivate him. Standing in the shade was what made him so dependable. In tight game situations on the senior boys' team, for example, Mr. Anderson said that the emotion of the moment didn't get to Matt, and he played as though he'd been in the situation before – even when he hadn't. While most of his teammates got caught up in the excitement and let it affect the way they played, Matt was rock steady and gave much needed ballast to his team.

Steady and dependable, Matt could and would simply get the job done. He listened, he did what was asked of him and he always did his best – never once complaining. When he was in Grade 7, Matt played on the Southridge basketball team that competed with schools from across the country at the CAIS independent school national championship tournament for U13 boys. The tournament was held at St. Andrew's College in Aurora, Ontario, just north of Toronto, and was organized in such a way that teams played 3 full games a day.

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Mr. Gallant remembers that Matt was the leader of his team. Alas, he was not feeling well at this tournament – he had a sore throat, a slight fever and was likely exhausted from fighting his sickness and playing 3 games a day for the first two days. Nevertheless, Mr. Gallant needed him to be on the court for all three games on the final day and, when called upon to do so, that is exactly what Matt did; he stayed on the court and, despite his sickness, put his team first and led in the best way he knew how – even with tears in his eyes. Matt demonstrated a character that still resonates with his coaches to this day.

Basketball, of course, was how Matt expressed himself and how his spirit came to the surface for all of us to see. We were lucky to have Matt in our lives at Southridge because he shared his passion with us. You may think that expressing your spirit and pursuing your passion is easy but it isn't. It requires vulnerability. Especially for a quiet person like Matt, it means sharing something deep inside of you, something that you find value in, something that you care deeply about, something that brings you joy (and sorrow), something that causes you to share feelings and sensations that a quiet, private person would be much more comfortable keeping to himself.

That is what made Matt's time at Southridge beautiful; he shared a part of his soul with us through the expression of his passion. We were witness to, and blessed by, his spirit. His passion could have been art, it could have been drama, it could have been debate, it could have been outdoor education, it could have been band, it could have been anything, really. For Matt, it was basketball and being with his friends. The part of Matt's life that I celebrate in this reflection is the beauty of the experience he shared with us. We were part of his intimate sacred journey and we benefitted from it because it moved us

Now to the numbers. Matt's basketball number was 22. Matt took his last breath in his Southridge basketball shorts at 11:11 pm (the sum of the first two digits is 2 as is the sum of the final two digits) (22), and he did so on the second day of the second month (22). It is only fitting, therefore, that on February 22 (today), we remember and celebrate Matt's life.

After all, as Mr. Anderson says, "the kind of character that Matt showed is the kind of person we want at Southridge." Matt's spirit will always be a part of our school community.

Students Take the Lead for Student-Led Conferences, Thursday, February 23rd

Each year we host Student-Led Conferences in the Junior School. Student-Led Conferences are designed to be developmentally appropriate opportunities for learners to take the lead in communicating with you about their learning and reflections, with the

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opportunity to see the attributes of the IB Learner Profile and the Approaches to Learning in action. Student-Led Conferences are not just about WHAT students are learning, but HOW they are learning. In preparing for their conferences, students are gaining insight and understanding into who they are as learners by contextualizing where they've come from, where they are at, and where they need to go. Every child has strengths and areas that they are developing, and it's important to honour where each learner is at in his/her journey at this moment in time. Here are some tips to help empower your child during his/her conference:

- 1. Start with a smile.
- 2. Let your child lead.
- 3. Listen actively and attentively.
- 4. Validate what you see and hear with positive feedback and affirmations.
- 5. Ask open-ended questions that promote a growth mindset, such as:
 - What is the most important thing for me to know about you as a learner right now?
 - What's going really well for you as a learner right now?
 - What's tricky for you as a learner right now?
 - How can I support you?
- 6. Let your child know you are proud of them and that you appreciate all the effort they put into preparing for their conference.

Because Student-Led Conferences are about your child and you, teachers play a minimal role during the conference itself. As such, one of your child's teachers will be present in the room. We hope you will find your child's presentation informative and insightful, and above all, we hope that you will see who your child is as a learner. We look forward to seeing you this Thursday for your child's conference!

The Grade 9's then showed remarkable focus during their amazing clinic with Mr. Brent Taylor. They then headed back to school in time to get home for dinner after a long and musical day!

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Three of our musicians were back in the Bell Center Auditorium for the evening concert. They had been selected to participate in the "Rep" bands at the festival. One or two members from each ensemble attending Envision are chosen to play in either the junior or senior bands. Cassidy Fu and Harry Xie, both playing alto saxophone, represented Southridge in the Junior/Senior Rep Band, and Graeme Lister represented Southridge on Bass in the Junior Rep Band. Project Backpack

It is estimated that on any given night, when we are at home surrounded by the warmth of our home and tucked safely in bed, there are approximately 700 youth in the Vancouver area living on the streets, trying to find a safe place to sleep and survive the night. This is where the Project Backpack campaign comes in. This campaign was started by Cara Sinclair, who delivered backpacks to schools so that students could fill them with items that would be most needed by youth living on the street – in essence, youth helping other youth. Project Backpack has now grown to several schools in the Lower Mainland and to this date, over 2,500 backpacks have been collected.

Southridge will be participating in this campaign once again. The next two long advisories (Feb.22nd and March 2nd) will be dedicated to filling a total of 56 backpacks with items that youth need in their day to day lives – some examples include socks,



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gloves, shampoo, toothbrushes, toiletries, and gift cards to pharmacies, food, and transportation. These backpacks will be dropped off at Directions Youth Services in downtown Vancouver distributed directly to local youth.

We ask that you please bring in your item to your advisory by March 2nd. It is very important for them to know that others care about what happens to them – in particular, that other youth care. By assembling these backpacks, we will be able to make a positive difference in the daily lives of homeless youth.

Only One Week Away: Drug & Fentanyl Presentation – Wednesday, March 1 Calling all parents with children in Grades 7 through 12!

As you will have hopefully read in last week's issue of *The Wednesday*...

One week from today, on Wednesday, March 1 at 6:30 pm, Southridge School is excited to host Nancy Smith, Youth Diversity Liaison Surrey - Safe Schools, for a presentation on, "Drugs & Fentanyl: Understanding the Dangers and What We Can Do". Nancy will be joined by George Passmore, Program Manager of Counselling and Substance Use Services at Sources Community Resources.

The fentanyl crisis has been a leading news story this year. What does it mean for our schools, children and community? How are we better able to prepare children and parents to navigate the risk of drug use? Drug use is not predicated on socio-economic status, family situation, intelligence or where one lives. Understanding drug use, the dangers of fentanyl, what to do when someone is under the influence of drugs, and how to have conversations with our children about these issues will be the focus of this presentation. The new reality of drug use impacts every community, and the presentation will look at how we can keep our children connected to us and provide them with the information that helps in making healthy choices.

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Baseline Concussion Testing

In recent years there has been a heightened awareness surrounding concussions. As a result, it is becoming standard practice for many schools to have their athletes perform baseline tests prior to participation. Parents and students should not be alarmed by the testing, bumps, bruises and occasional injuries are part of sports, but it is helpful to have this baseline information in the unlikely event that it is needed. Southridge School will be conducting baseline concussion testing for student-athletes prior to the start of the Term 3 sports seasons. This will affect Junior school students in Grades 5-7 and Senior school students in Grades 8-12 intending to participate in girls' soccer or boys' rugby. There will be skill sessions prior to the test dates so they can get learn the basic skills and tactics without contact. If they decide not to formally try-out following the skill sessions, they will not have to do the baseline test. These tests will be conducted annually for student-athletes participating in contact sports such as rugby as well for team sports such as volleyball, soccer, and basketball where concussions also occasionally occur.

The tests will be conducted by certified athletic therapists from February 27th to March 2nd. The <u>SCAT3 form</u> will be used for Senior school students and the <u>Children's SCAT3</u> form for Junior school students. The SCAT 3's are the standard sport concussion tools for baseline testing and concussion assessment. The cost for the test is \$10 that students will need to bring for the test. (This is a discounted rate; students who do not complete the baseline test during February 27th - March 2nd

at school will need to make arrangements to do so privately prior to be able to try-out, practice or play for either girls soccer or boys rugby in Term 3).

Students will be assigned a time and location within the school; most testing will be completed during the school day although a few students may have to be tested after school. The test is straightforward and provides a baseline level in terms of cognitive and physical levels (such as balance) and take approximately 15 minutes to complete. In the unlikely event that there was a suspected concussion in the future (whether at the school or in an outside club activity), coaches and medical practitioners would have additional information to aid the diagnosis and treatment plan.

Southridge School has a comprehensive concussion protocol and policy for students to return to learn and return to play that follows certain guidelines and that is ultimately designed to support students academically as they return to full activity. Junior school parents will need to compete the parent portion of the Child-SCAT3 prior to the test and students must bring the form on test day. Further information and exact times will be forthcoming.

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Junior school parents will need to compete the parent portion of the Child-SCAT3 (titled "For Parent/carer to complete") in the 'background' section on page 1 as well as section 4 ('Parent report') prior to the test. Parents can download and print their own copy. Students will also be given a paper copy to take home prior to the test. Students must bring the form on test day.

Strategic Planning Update: Charting our Journey Forward

As you may recall, last November you were invited to provide feedback about your hopes and concerns for the future of Southridge. This undertaking was part of **Phase One** of the School's strategic planning process – **Charting our Journey Forward**. Your feedback was invaluable and will play an important role in informing our next strategic plan, which is set to launch in early 2018. Thank you for taking the time to share your thoughts and ideas! Since November, a significant amount of work has taken place and



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we would like to bring you up-to-speed with where we are in our process, as well as share what you can expect as we continue with the next phases of planning.

Moving into **Phase Two**, all survey responses were compiled and organized, so that the Board of Governors and the School's Leadership Team could identify common opinion trends, as well as consider the more unique ideas that were brought forward. This work was achieved with the support of our external consultant, Susan Wright, who is helping the School navigate the strategic planning process. Susan brings significant experience in strategy, governance and organizational development services for not-for-profit and public sector clients, including many well-known and respected independent schools across Canada. Susan met with the Board of Governors, Senior Management Team, and the Strategic Planning Steering Committee to review all the feedback that was received. This information is now being used to consider and reflect upon potential strategic priorities that could guide Southridge through the next 5+ years. This process includes extensive conversation and careful consideration of everything we heard from our school community. It is challenging work, yet exciting and very inspiring! We will continue in Phase Two until approximately April 2017. After that time, the Strategic Planning Steering Committee will connect back with the community to share the plans for **Phase Three**, which will include further consultation with the School community.

It is not our job to govern - but to ensure proper governance

Did you know that all current Southridge parents are also members of the South Surrey Independent School Society (SSISS)? The SSISS operates Southridge School and is a non-profit society registered under the BC Societies Act. The SSISS is overseen by the School's Board of Governors. Board members are elected to serve based on their commitment to the School and the expertise they bring. All Board members are volunteers who work closely with the School's Senior Leadership team to develop the School's strategic direction, ensure the financial stability of the School, and mitigate any risk and to advance the School's vision and mission. They are also responsible for assessing the performance of the school and implementing volunteer activities.

Working with Senior Management through the annual budgetary process, all revenues and expenditures are approved by the Board.

The Board is also responsible for appointing the Head of School to whom it delegates authority over the day-to-day operations of the School and matters of curriculum and staffing. While the only staff member who reports to the Board is the Head of School, the Board and the School's Senior Management Team work very closely together to ensure they are aligned in advancing the School's strategy (you will see an update about our strategic planning process also in this week's Wednesday.) The Board is extremely grateful to work so closely with our Head of School and his team of faculty & staff who are very dedicated to Southridge.
