Ministry of Education Evaluation Visit

Earlier this year, Southridge welcomed three representatives from the Office of the Inspector of Independent Schools from the Ministry of Education for a three-day visit. The purpose of the visit was to conduct an evaluation of the regulatory requirements Southridge is required to follow as an independent school in our province. Major Ministry of Education evaluations of this type happen once every six years with monitoring visits from the Inspector taking place every two years in between. Combined with other school assessments, these evaluations form part of a comprehensive appraisal process that Southridge considers important to its continued whole-school growth. The other appraisals that Southridge welcomes are overseen by the Canadian Accredited Independent Schools (every 7 years) and the International Baccalaureate Organization (every 5 years).

All independent schools that receive funding from the provincial government must undergo cyclical regulatory evaluations. In a nutshell, the evaluations determine whether or not an independent school is operating in compliance with the Independent School Act. The process is fairly straightforward: Southridge completes a very comprehensive selfassessment catalogue in the months before the visit, the External Evaluation Committee (EEC) scrutinizes the accuracy of the catalogue based on evidence observed and investigated while onsite, and the Inspector of Independent Schools follows up with an External Evaluation Report that describes whether or not the school is in compliance with the regulatory requirements of the Independent School Act. The Inspector's report also lists commendations, policy matters that need attention and any statutory obligations that are either incomplete or missing.

I am very happy to report to you that Southridge had a very successful EEC visit and an excellent External Evaluation Report from the Inspector. Our school is meeting all the regulatory requirements of the Independent School Act and there are no outstanding statutory obligations that are in need of action. As a matter of fact, there were only a few policy amendments that were necessary, and all of them were easily managed within a matter of days after receiving the report two weeks ago.

I would also like to share the following commendations made by the EEC that were echoed by the Inspector in his External Evaluation Report. I unabashedly note that the



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Inspector's commendations are typically limited to four, yet Southridge was recognized with the following six.

New BC Education Plan

The Junior School Leadership Team and faculty are commended on acquiring depth of knowledge of the new BC Education Plan, and of the new curriculum, as the school works to closely align the IB PYP and MYP with the Ministry of Education's requirements.

Senior School Educational Program

The EEC commends the Senior School Leadership Team and faculty for the implementation of the Senior School Educational Program, the outcome of their search to create an educational program driven by the Mission and Vision of the school, serving the student community as a whole, and ensuring that the school motto "Let Every Spirit Soar" resonates in the life of each student.

Service

The EEC commends the School for its purposeful development of a spirit of service to others, which impacts communities and individuals both locally and abroad.

The Students

The students of the school are commended for their willingness to take risks, and to embrace the opportunities open to them in all aspects of the values driven Southridge education with openness and confidence, acceptance of and respect for others, and enthusiasm for and a joy in learning.

Emergency Preparedness

The school is commended for having a well-developed Emergency Response plan in place, having appointed two Safe School Coordinators, and having two teachers trained to the Level 2 and planning further training in the Advanced Violent Threat Risk Assessment in the Spring of 2017.

School Administration

The school is commended on its exemplary compendium of, and communication of, school policies, the creative and thorough approach to the management of facilities, and the effectiveness of the office administration as a whole.

I would like to thank our teachers and staff for the work they did in preparing for the evaluation, and for their tireless efforts in accommodating the EEC while the evaluation took place. I would also like to especially thank Senior School teacher, Upper Division Coordinator and Adjunct University Counsellor, Ms. Brenda Becker, for the incredible work she did in preparing the school's evaluation catalogue. The EEC had never seen



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such a well written and thoughtfully development catalogue before. Well done, Ms. Becker and well done, Southridge!

Don't Stumble Over Something Behind You

Mounted above the dresser in my bedroom at home is a framed print with the quote, "Don't stumble over something behind you." My wife bought it for me after a particularly rough patch I went through a few years ago, and I find great comfort in those words that I read most mornings as I get ready to head off to work. In this life we will have trouble. That is a guarantee that none of us can avoid. I'm a firm believer that it is how we respond to those troubles that shapes our character and transforms us into the best possible versions of ourselves. Allowing themselves to make mistakes and move on from them as stronger individuals is something I hope all of our students can learn to do.

Human beings have a new thought approximately every 1.2 seconds which amounts to about 50,000 thoughts per day. This constant voice in our heads is referred to by Buddhists as The Monkey Brain and can be a never-ending cacophony of half-truths, humorous thoughts and harshly negative vitriol that only seeks to harm. Do you ever listen to the voice in your head? The voice that says things like, "I can't do this job - I'm not smart enough;" or, "I'm no good at math;" "I'll never be as thin as her;" "I'm not going to get into university;" or even harsh self-put-downs like, "you're such an idiot!" If you know what I'm talking about, you've experienced The Monkey Brain - that voice in our heads that tells us what to think about ourselves and others in virtually every single situation we encounter.

Recent studies in neuroplasticity suggest that children's brains do not actually fully mature until they are in their early to mid-twenties, and the voice inside their heads is likely much more difficult to cope with than it is for us as adults. Helping kids understand that a "*Growth Mindset*" (developed by Stanford Professor Carol Dweck) - one that refuses to give in to negative self-talk, or Dweck's idea of the "*Fixed Mindset*" that says things like, "I'm not artistic," or "I got a bad mark on my math test - I suck at math," is so much more productive and is essential for kids to overcome the difficulties they will inevitably encounter. A person with a Growth Mindset says: "I didn't do well on that math quiz so I'm going to get extra help and work hard to understand this stuff for the next quiz - it will take work, but I can do this."

Eckhart Tolle, author of "The Power of Now," and named the most spiritually influential person in the world in 2011, said, "the primary cause of unhappiness is never the situation but your thoughts about it." He also writes that "you are not the voice in your head," and the key that many people never realize is to simply listen to the voice in our heads - not



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to try to silence it - but to watch it, and by simply (what Tolle calls) "watching the thinker" we can free ourselves from negative self-talk or a Fixed Mindset, become people with a Growth Mindset, and stop stumbling over the things that are behind us.


