The Question Holds the Lantern

On my way to school last month I was struck by the fog that hung so low over the area because it reflected the way I was feeling. Weighing heavily on my mind were the regular work related issues we all tend to face – in my case, the Ministry of Education evaluation, travel related to conferences and school visits, completing reports for various committees, planning for the future of our school, connecting with various Southridge constituent groups, developing relationships, remembering the names of our all our students and their parents, and creating meaningful messages for assemblies and presentations.

As the heavy fog muffled the usual splendor of morning, my thoughts dampened my own spirit. I needed to find something to help me work through the density, and that's when I noticed the inspiration I needed. Streetlamps.

I noticed how that the streetlamps lining the street were providing just enough light to guide me along the roadway. They were certainly muted expressions of their full strength but the ring of hazy light they provided was enough – sufficient to get me through to the next source of light. I made my way, from one streetlamp to the next all the while trying to interpret the lamps' metaphor.

About a dozen streetlamps into my thinking, a phrase from a recent poem surfaced, "the question holds the lantern." That was all I needed. It dawned on me that I didn't need the full glow of the answers to help me; what I needed were a series of questions to keep me moving along the pathway. I realized that rather than trying to understand the answers, I only needed to find the questions.

Isn't it interesting how often the big picture comes into focus with gradual realization? As I drove up the hill toward Southridge and I came out of the low-lying fog I was welcomed onto our campus by a beautiful morning of golden light bathing our fall foliage in warmth. I felt assured knowing that the focus on inquiry at Southridge and the questioning skills we are teaching our students will help provide them with the light they need to find their way when they face the challenges that learning (and life in general) so often presents.

Empowering students for Successful Learning

Empowering students to be successful in all aspects of their learning is something we continually strive for. Our Learning Strategies team aims to work with students, teachers and families to support a diverse range of learning needs in the Junior School. Classroom teachers and Learning Strategies teachers work together to assess and determine needs and avenues of support. Support occurs through both a pull-out and a push-in model.



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When students are pulled out of the classroom, they work directly with a Learning Strategies teacher either individually or in small groups for targeted instruction that meets their specific learning needs. Push-In support happens in K-4 classrooms, where the Learning Strategies teacher works with the classroom teacher and students to meet individual and/or small group needs within the context of the classroom.

Learning support can benefit students needing short-term or long-term support to consolidate concepts and achieve grade-level expectations, with a particular focus on consolidating and strengthening foundational literacy and numeracy skills. This type of support typically happens through a pull-out model.

When a student is participating in learning support, the goal is always for them to work towards independence within the classroom program. Typically, the targeted instruction they receive enables them to achieve the gains needed to succeed in their grade level work.

This year, we have also implemented the opportunity for students in Grade 4 and up to participate in Math Club which runs Wednesdays and Thursdays after school. Math Club aims to provide students with opportunities to engage in hands on and fun activities that reinforce understanding and consolidation of mathematical concepts, skills and facts.

We are fortunate to have two Learning Strategies teachers who work with students in the Junior School: Mrs. Olivia Clayton works primarily with PYP learners and runs Math Club, and Mrs. Jo-Ann Murchie (also our IB PYP Coordinator) works primarily with MYP learners.

So, what did you learn in school today?

Have you ever asked your kids that question? I know I did when my kids were in school and the response was usually, "*nothing*." Of course there is nothing wrong with the question, "*what did you learn today*," but in reality, it is likely a little too broad for your son or daughter to formulate an answer as they settle into the seat of the car for the ride home. In fact, it might actually be an overwhelming question to process as they consider the magnitude of everything they have done throughout the day.



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When I was visiting Phillips Exeter a couple of weeks ago, the other teachers from Southridge and I were given a schedule of classes to visit throughout the day. Something struck me as I was sitting in the fifth class of the day: students today go through an incredible amount of intellectual challenge as they navigate their responsibilities in different courses throughout an average day. While at Exeter, I attended an English, history, and a world religions course in the morning, and then a math and physics class in the afternoon. By the end of the day I was exhausted - my head was spinning - and I didn't even have to complete any homework the night before!

Every day, students are required to come prepared for five different classes and to discuss their research and opinions in reference to readings, texts or equations completed the night before. They write tests, work on group projects, discuss poems, analyze primary historical documents, solve complex equations, create art, and complete science labs or fitness testing all in the same day. Imagine having to complete a variety of tasks like that in your job over a six or seven hour day and having to answer the question, "so, what did you learn today?" on the drive home from work. It's no wonder students might respond to that question with "*nothing*."

Here are few other questions you may want to consider when sparking up a conversation with your child on the way home from school or at the dinner table that take into account the fact that they have spent most of their day at Harkness Tables in student-centred, discussion-based classes:

- "What was one discussion you were involved in today that really interested you?"
- "Did you feel that you were well prepared for your classes today?" "If not, which ones did you not feel prepared for, and what can you do to make sure that doesn't happen again?"
- "How do your teachers manage all of the different ideas and perspectives as students share their thoughts on a subject and guide meaningful discussions?"
- "What kind of feedback do you get on your participation in class?"
- "In which classes are you the most engaged/interested in?"
- "Do you like sharing your ideas in class, or is it a struggle?"
- "What happens when there is disagreement among viewpoints?"
- "Have you ever influenced someone else's opinion on a subject? Has someone else helped you to see things from a different perspective?"



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You might find that focusing your questions more specifically on the fact that students are in a student-centered, discussion-based environment for most of their classes will help generate deeper discussions at home around their learning.

The Annual University Application Bash Is Coming-November 21st 3pm To 6pm In The Southridge Café

Every year, Southridge runs an application bash to help grads with completing on-line applications for universities across the country. Grade 12s are invited to the Southridge Café on Monday, November 21st from 3pm to 6pm. They will need their laptop and a credit card with which to pay the application fee for any universities they are applying to. It is important to remember that applications to universities are separate from the process of sending marks for evaluation. Students need to apply and pay in order for a university to set up a portal or account that will enable them to self-report marks or send transcripts at a designated time (this will vary depending on the university).

This event is intended to assist students with any aspect of completing the application including:



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- 1. Help with understanding application processing centres such as OUAC 105d for Ontario or ApplyAlberta etc.
- 2. Assistance with completing the components of Common App and U Cal applications for U.S.
- 3. Coaching and tips for handling any video submissions (UBC and Toronto)
- 4. Polishing essays that are required at the time of application (UBC specifically). Other universities require essays to be submitted after the application is processed e.g. the AIF for Waterloo or the PSE for Queen's or the "Grades Plus" for Ryerson etc.

Pizza and other goodies and refreshments will be served to help fuel the process for completing applications. All Grade 12s are encouraged to attend and if they have other activities, they can drop-in anytime.



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


