Reflecting on Our Campus Security

In consideration of the horrific stabbing incident that took place in Abbotsford last week, this article summarizes the key measures Southridge has in place to manage our campus security. I think it is worth saying to begin with, though, that the new door locking measures the Abbotsford School District has immediately put into action have been in place at Southridge for a number of years. Ensuring that all campus access doors are locked with the exception of one (the Abbotsford School District's new measure) is controlled at Southridge through a restricted access system.

In addition to the ongoing implementation and monitoring of the regulatory requirements defined for schools by the Ministry of Education, all of which were scrutinized and regarded as exemplary by inspectors during our recent Ministry of Education Evaluation, here is a list of 20 extra security measures we currently have in place to deal with visitor access, emergencies and critical incidents at Southridge.

- Campus is completely fenced
- Access gates are centrally controlled
- Cameras continuously monitor key areas of our property
- Stored and real time digital camera footage is accessible to facilities personnel 24/7
- Facilities staff are on-site daily from 6:30 am to 10:00 pm when classes are in session
- Afterhours campus security is monitored by a reputable provider
- Building access is controlled by a restricted access system
- Restriction access is monitored digitally
- · Access to restricted campus areas is limited

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- Historical restriction access data is readily available to school personnel
- All school guests must sign-in at reception
- Trades personnel must wear a visitor's name tag when on campus
- Receptionists are trained in th4reat assessment
- Silent alarm allows receptionists to alert school leadership of threats or concerns
- Critical Incident Response Team is available 24/7 to respond to incidents
- Risk management is a standing agenda item at all Senior Management Team meetings
- Risk Management Committee meets and reports to the Board of Governors monthly
- Emergency procedure measures (including lockdowns) are practiced regularly
- Emergency measures are refined based on practical feedback and best practices
- Digital emergency and critical incident communication system is in place
- Key communication is pre-set and immediately available for instantaneous distribution
- Multi-channel emergency and critical incident communication plan (text, phone, email) is in place

Student safety and campus security are extremely important to us at Southridge and we recognize the responsibility we have as a school community to constantly assess and evaluate our practices. With that in mind, we support and attend risk management seminars and conferences hosted by our independent school associations, we welcome external inspections with respect to policies and practices and we improve our knowledge and skills by visiting other schools, reading relevant literature and attending training and workshop sessions.

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All of this to say that while the terrible incident of last week causes us to reflect on our own security measures at Southridge, our hearts are with the students, staff and families at Abbotsford Secondary as we remain shaken form the stabbing that took place so close to home.

Who We Are...

Last Thursday we held our annual Southridge Open House. What a tremendous showcase of our school it was! Many hands and hours went into preparing for the event. and it is truly a testament to the strength of our entire community. Sharing our school with prospective families and our wider community provides the opportunity to see who we are through a stranger's eyes. The feedback we received from families throughout the evening was a positive reminder of just how highly regarded our school is in our community and province. This is no accident! There was much interest in what we offer learners as they strive to reach their potential through not only our excellent academic programs, but more importantly through the development of character through goodness, strong morals and values. Our student volunteers helped to make the night memorable and personable. Our Grade 7 leaders did an outstanding job taking guests on tours, supporting quest registration and assisting in classrooms. This year, for the first time, two Grade 7 students had the opportunity to share anecdotes and insights about their Junior School experience to the audience. Nathan Reinheimer (7SM) and Aerin Brown (7CB) represented their classmates, each inspiring the audience with a look at the Southridge Junior School experience through their eyes. Both spoke confidently, clearly and honestly to the multitude of visitors that more than filled our Great Hall. This was no small ask, and they rose beyond the challenge as risk-takers and communicators. With their permission, here are some excerpts from their speeches about what being a student at Southridge means to them. Each presents a unique snapshot that speaks to the diversity of our four pillars (academics, arts, athletics and service) and their impact on lives of our students.

"I have been exposed to many amazing academic opportunities both in and out of the classroom, from learning about robotics to participating in the Kid's Literature Quiz. There have also been many athletic opportunities available to me, including volleyball, swim club and track and field. This year, I have learned to play the flute in band and I have gotten to explore new styles and mediums in art class, like wood burning and dark room photography. I have given back to my School community by caring for science lab animals, cleaning up the art room and collecting the recycling. In addition, I have been given the chance to give back to the greater community by helping to coordinate Food Friday, an initiative where we collect food to donate to the Food Bank...Along with great opportunities, Southridge has given me many personal connections with friends and teachers and great memories and experiences...My personal favorite memory is exhibition, a huge service project at the end of grade four where we split into groups,

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choose an issue, research it, act to improve the world and present our ideas and research. I loved all stages of exhibition...It was amazing finally presenting the research we worked so hard on, and sharing our ideas for change. It was a fantastic feeling; one I haven't gotten from much else. I will remember that day for the rest of my life." Aerin Brown, Grade 7

"I came to Southridge in Grade 1... I am now in Grade 7 and I am getting very excited about going to the Senior School and getting a different schedule than everyone else and my ability to try out the Harkness program, and also just to have a change in scenery. Around the school I am involved in the ever busy photo team -taking photos around the school and having very productive lunch meetings. In grade 6 I was a science monitor taking care of all our animals. We have a guinea pig, a bearded dragon, a newt and lots of fish...Before I came to Southridge I never thought I would be able to build a robot. In grade 6 we get to build robots and for me that was the highlight of the year. Just getting to create your own little robot that can do whatever you want...Believe it or not the hardest task was to get the robot to go forward, stop 5cm from a wall, and make a sound... I choose to make a difference every day at school by being a respectful listener and by working to face challenges in a positive and creative way. I like to observe first to figure things out and then I join in or try something. But I also do the small things such as holding open the door for someone, or when someone drops their pencil case in the hallway I'll stop and grab it. Why Harkness?

Many adults wonder how a discussion-based, student-centred approach to education where students sit at an oval-shaped table with their teachers who guide discussions can effectively replace the more traditional "stand and deliver" model most of us grew up with. When I attended high school and university, the goal seemed consistent: listen to what my teachers said, study my hopefully accurate and complete notes along with the textbooks I lugged around, and parrot back what I thought they wanted me to learn - in most cases to be forgotten as soon as I left the examination room. Education is changing, and today, the goals of education are significantly different with the Ministry of Education's new curriculum model that emphasizes a concept-based curriculum that asks students questions surrounding big ideas, and core competencies that focus on Communication, Creative and Critical Thinking, a Positive Personal and Cultural Identity, Personal Awareness and Social Responsibility.

Since Google provides us with "facts," the memorization of facts is no longer as important as it once was. Of course, no one is disputing that having knowledge of significant historical, scientific or mathematical concepts, and being able to intelligently discuss them is important; however, understanding the *why* and the *how* of these concepts and big ideas is what has become exceedingly more important as education progresses. The best way for students to come to these conclusions may not be the way we were taught: sitting in classrooms with rows of individual desks, listening to the so-called expert at the front of the room telling us what we needed to know. This outdated model of education with it's roots in the Industrial Revolution arose out of a need to children for working in factories, but has not evolved much in 200 years - until now.

As I have observed classes using the Harkness Method of teaching both at Southridge and at Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire, my eyes have been opened to the power of discussion. One Grade 12 student at Exeter explained it this way: "I came from Texas to Exeter thinking that I was pretty smart - maybe the smartest - but now, when I come to a Harkness Table, I realize that everyone around the table has insights that I may have never thought of. Their perspective helps me to formulate my opinions and understanding of a chapter, or an article, or how to solve an equation. I don't always agree with everyone in my class, but their ideas challenge me to shape mine."

In a Harkness classroom, students hone valuable skills in communication: the ability to express their ideas, to listen to others, to discuss intelligently, to formulate their own



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understanding. The development of skills in thinking critically and creatively, and the ability to formulate an argument and defend it at a table with people who may disagree with you are skills that all students will need as they move beyond formal education and into careers in a dynamic and changing job market - one that is exponentially different from the world of work I first entered over 25 years ago. As students learn to listen to others they grow intellectually - the Harkness table allows students to become better listeners, better speakers, and better thinkers.
