Breaking the Dead Shells of Yesterdays

John O'Donohue was a philosopher and poet who wrote beautifully on the Celtic spirit. I came across some of his work this past summer and was literally stopped in my tracks by his moving thoughts and imaginative expressions. His poetry in particular is quite thought provoking and, besides being beautifully written, holds simple wisdom that is both striking and uplifting.

In his book called *To Bless this Space between Us*, a poem about welcoming the morning is a great way to remember the tendency we all have to rest in the comfort of the safety and warmth of the shells that we create around us. Alas, these shells are also the source of immobility and, despite their coziness, they often hold us back from growth in all of its fullness embodying intellect, emotion and spirit.

The stanza from the poem that I am referring to is written in a way that resonates well with schools because of its open posture towards the discomfort that is often required to learn something new; discomfort that is particularly "disturbing" when the learning in question challenges sources of comfort and predictability. He writes,

May your mind come alive today
To the invisible geography
That invites you to new frontiers,
To break the dead shell of yesterdays,
To risk being disturbed and changed

If you happened to be around in 1975, you may remember the song "Hide in Your Shell" written and composed by Roger Hodgson of Supertramp (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=TRPi1Dldt5k). I don't think it's coincidental that the song originally appeared on the album *Crime of the Century*, for it certainly would a horrible crime if we didn't break the dead shells that keep us hidden – safe, perhaps, but hidden nevertheless.

Learning is all about change and growth; and it's about being less hidden, isn't it? Southridge strives to create a learning environment that feels safe enough for our students (and all of us, really) to take risks, to try something new, to speak out, to be

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"disturbed", to explore new frontiers and to . . . well . . . come out of our shells to become the most whole people we are called to be.

Run LIKE Terry

Our annual Terry Fox event, held on September 23rd, was a great success, collectively raising approximately \$1,735 for the Canadian Cancer Foundation. Despite the rain and the fall chill in the air, the Junior School made a commitment to not just run FOR Terry, but to also run LIKE Terry. Running LIKE Terry meant that despite the wet and cold, we had to persevere and get a little wet. Terry ran almost 42 km/day for 143 days. He ran in his iconic blue and white Adidas "Onion" sneakers. Those shoes took quite a beating, and by the time Terry's Marathon of Hope came to an end, those shoes were tired, worn and patched together with shoe goo.

Before we headed off on our run, we took a moment to look at an image of Terry's Adidas Onion shoes. While we often see photos of Terry running, how often do we look at his shoes? Shoes that carried him through communities, up and down the open road, in heat, rain and sleet. Shoes that went the distance along with Terry. When we think about Terry's legacy, and how the Marathon of Hope has lived on far beyond Terry ever could have dreamed, it's important to think about how we can run LIKE Terry to keep his dream alive. Running LIKE Terry means we must put ourselves in his shoes, if only for a moment, to be courageous and completely committed to a cause.

Huge thanks go out to Ms. Graham, Mr. Gates and the Grade 7 classes for their organization and leadership leading up to and during the event, and to all of the parents who joined us - your cheers and smiles kept those laps coming. LIKE Terry, we felt the power and support of our community as we ran our laps. Together, we ran a total of 1,668 laps - small in comparison to what Terry ran, but significant when we think about those shoes and how many pairs of shoes since, including our own, have run together to make a difference in the fight against cancer. If those shoes could talk, just imagine the story they would tell us.

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Laptop Backpacks

Dear Parents.

We are trying to ensure that all students use the backpacks provided by the school for transporting laptops to and from the home. These specially designed backpacks have extra padding that protects the laptops from damage, and a protective chamber beneath the laptop storage area that is specifically designed to protect a laptop when the backpack is dropped. Other thin-walled canvas backpacks (such as Vans or Herschel brands) do not provide any protection for laptops. Some students have even been seen carrying their laptops in plastic or paper shopping bags. Please help us as we strive to limit the amount of damage to the laptops students are provided by the school.

The Annual House Picnic - What a day it was!

Our annual Senior School House Picnic took place on Friday, September 23rd. While the plan had been to board 8 school buses and send 361 spirited students down to Crescent Park, a decision was made to change the venue based on a potential external risk that surfaced that morning (Mr. Smith sent out a message to the school community explaining the situation). What followed was inspiring.

The Grade 12 House Captains took charge, and re-worked their plans for the day. A venue change threw many challenges at them, mainly with the logistics of the welcoming ritual for Grade 8s and our new Senior School students. But they worked together, and they worked quickly. The fruits of their efforts were quickly apparent. New students (and teachers) were soon sliding through a mixture or paint and water on the slip-and-slide tarps in the rain. Soon after, the traditional flour fight broke out on the back field. Kids were soaking wet, coated in flour and grass, smiling and laughing.

After the flour fight, teachers and the facilities staff watched in horror as our multicoloured, waterlogged students turned towards the school for their lunches. Despite having teachers at every entrance asking students to clean themselves before entering the building, and despite the students' best efforts to comply, the school quickly began to take on the smell of damp clothing and wet turf. Clumps of grass littered the entranced and spread into the hallways. Inevitably, wet footprints could be seen throughout the school. Wet socks and shoes were strewn about. Though not intentionally, the building was a mess.

As I walked through the hallways assessing the situation, I saw students picking up clumps of grass and putting them in to the garbage. I saw teachers with brooms and dust pans sweeping the hallways, stairwells, and entries. People were still smiling and

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laughing as they warmed up briefly before heading back outside for the Terry Fox run and the House tug-of-war competition.

Back out on the field, the students spent 30 minutes walking/running dutifully, in honour of Terry Fox. While we didn't quite make our fundraising goal, we did raise a total of \$973.25 which is roughly twice the amount we raised at the event last year! Thanks to those who contributed to a wonderful cause. Students persevered through the drizzling rain before regrouping on the back field for the annual House Tug-of-War, where cheers, chants, and furious shouts of, "PULL...PULL..." filled the air. Honestly, I'm not even sure which House won. It seems less important than the fact that people were having fun!

The point of me writing this piece was to let the larger community know that despite massive changes to an already complicated day, it was inspiring to see the collaboration, adaptability, and spirit of our students and staff! Everyone did their part to ensure that the event still went on, and that it was fun, safe, and spirited as planned. Many, many thanks to everyone who helped ensure that the day was a success!

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BC Ministry Curriculum and Provincial Examination Changes for 2016-2017

A Brief Background

As you may know the Ministry of Education in British Columbia has been working on changes to the curriculum since 2011 when the need for changes to the existing graduation program was initially highlighted. The Ministry, in consultation with stakeholders, has been working on modernizing curriculum, assessment and the graduation program since that time.

It is worth noting that Southridge developed its own <u>Senior School Education Program</u> (SSEP) in response to many of the same imperatives for better meeting students' needs in the increasingly diverse, technology rich, collaborative, and globally focused world in which we live and work.

The changes envisaged by the Ministry will be brought in over the next few years after further consultation with post-secondary institutions. In order to allow schools to adjust to the new curriculum and new provincial exams, only modest changes to the graduation credit requirements will be made for now.

The changes to the provincial examination program are effective as of July 1, 2016, which is the legislated start to the school year. Under the new curriculum, the path to graduation is designed to be more flexible. The graduation program still spans Grade 10, 11 and 12, but a student's path to their Dogwood may be more varied than before.

There is a clear emphasis on real-life experiences - community involvement, gaining business knowledge, and hands-on learning. Beginning in the 2017/18 school year, every student will have to take Career Education to graduate with the intent to build closer links between classroom learning and future career goals and pathways.

The emphasis in B.C.'s redesigned curriculum is the core competencies of communication, creative & critical thinking, and social & personal responsibility https://curriculum.gov.bc.ca/competencies,

essential learning, and foundational literacy and math skills. **The current provincial examinations are being discontinued,** and will be replaced with two new exams, which focus on literacy and math skills.

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What This Means for Students

For students entering Grades 10-12 in the 2016/2017 school year:

Grade 10 students will:

- Follow most of the current Graduation Program requirements
- Take a Math 10, a Language Arts 10 and Science 10, with classroom assessments instead of provincial exams
- Meet Social Studies graduation requirements with classroom assessments
- Write a provincial math skills exam and a provincial literacy exam before graduation

· Grade 11 students will:

- Have completed a Math 10, a Language Arts 10 and Science 10 or equivalent and written the provincial exams
- Meet Social Studies graduation requirements with classroom assessments instead of a provincial exam
- Write a provincial literacy exam before graduation
- Not write the new provincial math skills exam

Grade 12 students will:

- Finish all the current Graduation Program requirements
- Have completed a Math 10, a Language Arts 10, Science 10 and Social Studies 11 (or equivalent) and have written provincial exams
- Take Language Arts 12 (or equivalent) and write the associated provincial exam
- Not write the new provincial literacy or provincial math skills exams
- Students who have completed courses associated with discontinued exams by June 30, 2016 will have until June 2017 to write or re-write exams
- Students taking summer school during July and August 2016 will not be



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required to write provincial exams in Math 10, Language Arts 10, Science 10 and Social Studies 11 (or equivalent)

2016 Alumnus Simrat Dial Wins Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers

Simrat Dial who recently graduated from Southridge has been awarded the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers, which recognizes the exceptional volunteer achievements of Canadians from across the country and celebrates a wide range of voluntary contributions. This honour, which was officially created by the Crown, and is given on behalf of the Right Honourable David Johnston, Governor General of Canada, is given to Canadians who have made "a significant, sustained and unpaid contribution to their community, in Canada or abroad."

Simrat, an exemplary student and human being, was the recipient of the Spirit of Southridge award at our commencement ceremony in late June of this year, which attests to the high regard we had for her within our own community. She was at the centre of so many large and small volunteer initiatives; ever present at service club and helping out with fund raising events. She was very much a "hands on "leader, exemplified when at Christmas time she would wrap gifts at the Semiahmoo Mall for the Cancer society, and in her willingness to help others with their projects such as in the Relay for Life and Mini We Day at Southridge. In her grade 12 year she led the group of students who went out to Uganda on our inaugural service trip there, seeing this trip as

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a life changing opportunity and embracing it, as she did all her volunteer work, with her wonderfully fulsome heart.

Simrat is also being recognized for the hundreds of hours which she gave to her community especially with the city of Surrey in working with environmental initiatives and a wide variety of cultural events. One of her great strengths, and her leadership style, was to encourage, support and empower others to make their own unique contributions to service.

I knew her personally from our interactions on the hockey field, but more closely from teaching her throughout her grade 11 year. Our first meeting though was in grade 10 when I drove her home from a service activity and I admired her from the outset. Courteous, smiling, infinitely good—natured, helpful, resilient, principled, fun loving and kind, to me Simrat embodied all the qualities that characterize a person of integrity and compassion.

I think I can speak for all of us at Southridge when I say that I can think of no one more deserving of this prestigious award, and no one who could accept it with such humility and grace. She works for others, helps others, devotes her time to others because it that is what her religious faith, family, and community have nurtured in her and she, and her family, should be justly proud of this distinguished honour, which we are so pleased to acknowledge and celebrate with her. 


