A Graduation Toolkit: Tools for Transitioning to Post-Secondary Life

At a recent commencement ceremony, as I listened intently to the address being given to the newly minted grad class, I was intrigued by the reference to a toolkit that grads were getting ready to implement to help them navigate through the next step in life's journey. Having spent a good part of my career as a career and education guidance counsellor and coach, I have most certainly packed my own tool box full of techniques and theories and made sure that these tools stay current and relevant for the world that high school students are entering.

According to Tama Kieves, a Harvard lawyer turned visionary career coach, typical career and education advice has, in the past, focused on studying the hot fields and companies in the available job market. However, that is no longer the right toolkit for success for today's graduates because "...the world (is no longer) about 'fitting in' to finite opportunities. It's about waking up to new capacities and needs, stirring the pot, and revealing, creating, designing and divining the infinite opportunities available."

Southridge's Career Education and Graduation Transitions Program has evolved over the past 5 years, to ensure that we are staying abreast of how post-secondary programming is being shaped by the demands that have shifted from a resources based economy to one being driven by service industries. In his book "A Whole New Mind", business guru Daniel Pink tells us this service economy has evolved further and moved away from the information age to the conceptual age and that "right-brainers rule". He goes on to explain, "The keys to the kingdom are changing hands. The future belongs to a very different person with a very different kind of mind-creators and empathizers, pattern recognizers, and meaning makers. These people-artists, inventors, designers, story-tellers, caregivers, consolers, big picture thinkers-will now reap society's richest rewards." To thrive in this emerging environment, Pink asserts you need to be intuitive and resilient. There are many ways in which Southridge is laying out a set of tools that will launch our grads confidently and assuredly into the first step of their post-secondary journey. Back in the day, academics was the key to post-secondary admissions and there is no doubt that today, that is still true. However, with the continuing growth in the number of university applicants each year, strong marks alone, are no longer the ticket to getting an offer of admission. It is the personal growth and discovery that takes place in our discussionbased Harkness classrooms alongside our vibrant co-curricular and extra-curricular



programming, that enables the problem-solving and the critical and creative thinking that universities and the economy are looking for.

How do we measure the success of the toolkit as we gather to celebrate the class of 2018? One of the litmus tests beyond the number of university and college offers that our grade 12s receive is our Graduation Transitions Interviews held in the Senior School Library over a 2 day period in May. This is when we invite community members, representing a wide variety of professions and career backgrounds, to interview each grad about their accomplishments, and how their experiences have shaped who they are and where they are going in life. It is a mandatory activity as part of the Graduation Transitions Program and it offers invaluable experience in interviewing techniques as well as professional resume presentation (tools that are vital when transitioning to cooperative education programs at university). Often, our guest interviewers are not only accustomed to conducting interviews and reviewing resumes, they are also parents from our Junior School who are keen to hear what the "finished product" looks like as they begin the K-12 education journey with their own child. In referring back to both Kieves and Pink's assertions about what today's toolkit incorporates, I would like to share some of the comments about the interview process:

"...the students are impressive and it's fantastic to talk to them about their next steps. Over the years I have quite literally interviewed 100s of people from entry level to senior managers and the discussions about their experiences and accomplishments were amazing...(the school is) obviously doing a great job preparing all of them (for the next steps in life)"

"The interviews were really enjoyable and I learned a lot from the students. I wish I were as accomplished as (they are)! Southridge has much to be proud of. I loved the experience and want to be involved (in the career education programming) in years to come"

"You all made me very proud to have my children, a part of Southridge. If you are a glimpse of what they may turn out to be 12 years from now, I'm even more impressed than I am almost daily, as a new parent at the school. Great to meet you all, all the best in the future and I look forward to reading and hearing of your success"

In conclusion what does a Southridge Graduation Toolkit have in it? Each year, we know that our grads are leaving with an educational program that has prepared them well for first year courses. We also know that they have presented who they are, what they have done and how they have learned in their experiences beyond the classroom through interviews, resumes, application essays, and cover letters. That is indeed an impressive toolkit. One that not only gets the attention of admissions officers, but also assures them that once through the doorway of their chosen university, our students have had the

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benefit of a breadth of opportunities in service, visual, media, performing arts, athletics and career exploration to test their resiliency. In today's conceptual age, these are surely all the right tools that will launch our students confidently into their post-secondary program and into an economy that embraces the right-brain thinker. With congratulations and best wishes to the class of 2018!

Locker Dimensions for Students entering Grade 4

Locker dimensions are 32 cm (depth) by 21 cm (width). If you are planning to purchase a backpack or other school bag for your child entering Grade 4, please keep locker dimensions in mind. Bags must be able to fit completely into lockers for safety reasons. It is difficult to find a backpack with wheels that fit into the lockers, so please take a measuring tape with you when shopping. Students in Grades 5 through 7 are expected to use the school laptop bags.

Summer Uniform Purchasing Reminders

For those parents purchasing black uniform shoes over the summer, please be reminded that uniform shoes must have a <u>smooth leather</u> upper and be <u>polishable</u>. Both the upper and the outsole must be completely black. An athletic style shoe is appropriate provided that it is entirely black (upper and outsole), is made of smooth leather, can be polished, and does not have obvious logos or designs on the upper or outsole. Suede, patent leather, nubuck, canvas, or synthetics are not suitable choices for uniform footwear. Textbooks: alleviating replacement fines

With textbook collection nearly complete, there are many students with outstanding books. Unfortunately, this may mean some expensive replacement fines. Inevitably, there are some students who inadvertently trade textbooks during the course of the year, and despite returning a textbook, the one they signed out is in the possession of someone else, leaving them with a fine on their account. Having said this, if parents or students come across any Southridge textbooks in their homes, it would be incredibly helpful to return them to the school - particularly if an overdue notice was never received as this would likely mean the book was signed out to another student.

Please note that charges will be incurred for any library books and textbooks not returned by Wednesday, June 27th at which point replacement orders will be processed.

Taking AP Courses and Examinations at Southridge

Every May many students at Southridge take Advanced Placement examinations in what is the culmination of often rigorous and intensive courses of study. AP courses are recognized around the world and demonstrate a student's ability to think critically, to reason, to analyze and to write effectively. They are the equivalent of first year university



programs and, as such, can be used for credit and acceleration at a wide range of schools in the US, UK and Canada. Currently we provide the following courses:

- AP Calculus (AB)
- AP Calculus (BC)
- AP Microeconomics
- AP Chemistry
- AP Biology
- AP Physics 1
- AP Physics 2
- AP European History
- AP Human Geography
- AP English Language & Composition
- AP English Literature & Composition
- AP French Language & Culture

As we strive to create the best learning opportunities for our students we offer a balanced program of AP courses and intentionally restrict them to students in grades 11 and 12, as the likelihood of achieving excellent grades is much higher at this later stage of maturity. Students who have completed AP courses in high school are very well prepared for university level study and, as the available data confirms, that they do very well in the successful completion of undergraduate degree programs.

However, we are repeatedly advised that what the admissions personnel at postsecondary schools want to see is a rigorous course of study within the school's curriculum offerings. To that end, Southridge will only permit students who have completed Advanced Placement courses at Southridge to take the AP exam at the school in May.

The rationale for this is clear. At Southridge students are guided by caring, committed teachers and our programs are thoughtfully developed and well-supported with appropriate resources such as adequate laboratory time and the provision of tutorial help. We cannot say that of courses taken beyond our classrooms and, for this reason, we are no longer able to support students who have self-studied for an exam or who have enrolled in an outside program. Students are still at liberty to study additional AP courses if they wish, but students will not be able to take those examinations here.

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In summary, I encourage all students seeking the challenge and deeper learning offered by the study of AP courses, to take them here at Southridge and to immerse themselves in a discussion-based classroom where inquiry and questioning are paramount, where course content is thoughtfully and carefully covered, and where experienced faculty can fully support their learning.

Changes in the Senior Library Volunteer Recruitment Process

For many years, volunteering in the Senior Library has been organized internally. We will be capping the number of volunteer positions at 20, and from those, ten will be regularly scheduled positions, with the other ten volunteers on-call.
