# **Student Progress Reporting**

Since September, the Junior School faculty has been exploring the question, "How might we implement a balanced K-7 feedback and reporting system that supports enhanced academics, a culture of learning, and personalized growth while also providing accurate, meaningful, and specific feedback, marks, and grades that are based on developmentally appropriate learning standards and expectations?" In October, our Learning Communication Committee began meeting on a monthly basis to guide our work and process. Our committee consists of twelve members of the Junior School faculty and leadership team, which represents a cross-section of grades, subjects, and roles. Our work also aligns with our strategic plan's first goal of Equipping Each Student for their Path Ahead by authentically knowing and actively supporting all of our students through learner-centered reporting and assessment measures. As we wind down the 2018-19 school year, we would like to share a summary of some of the highlights of our work to date, as well as next steps.

Over the fall, members of the committee met to explore how we could gather data from our community members. In early January we hosted internationally-renowned assessment and grading expert, Ken O'Connor. Ken spent the day working with our entire faculty and committee members, and gave a presentation to parents. In late January, a survey was sent out to all Junior School families; a teacher survey was sent out in early April. Of the seventy-five responses we received to the parent survey, twenty-one families volunteered to participate in face-to-face empathy interviews that were conducted by the members of our committee over March and April. In late April, our committee spent an entire day together reviewing data, drafting purpose statements for the components of our learning communication system, and also began to draft report card prototypes. Some themes and data that emerged from analysis of the parent and teacher surveys and empathy interviews include:

- Meet the Teacher Night in September could be used to provide more specific information about expectations and learning content at each grade level.
- The feedback given through report cards and parent teacher interviews is highly valued.
- More specific feedback can be given about grade-level expectations for each subject area, each child's strengths, areas for improvement, and how best to support next-steps from home.
- Teachers spend approximately 30 hours/term writing and preparing report cards.
- The first parent-teacher interview happens too early in the year and could be a little later.
- While 3 report cards are helpful, the second report card could be abbreviated if accompanied by a second parent-teacher learning conference.

- A second parent-teacher learning conference in later second term/early third term would help parents to know how best to support their child in reaching grade-level expectations and personal goals before the end of the year.
- It can be challenging to understand the difference between a 4 and a 5 on our interim K 7 Performance Scale
- Behaviour and social-emotional skills should be separated from academic achievement grades.
- A standards-based report card will enable us to provide more meaningful and individualized feedback about each child's entire learning profile, including social and emotional growth, learning skills and competencies, and academic achievement.
- Overall, the Junior School can further clarify and communicate the purposes of the different components of our learning communication system.

The committee is currently working towards finalizing a prototype for a standards-based report card and achievement scale. The prototypes will be shared with Junior School Faculty later in June and will then be further revised over the summer months. A second round of empathy interviews will be conducted to gather feedback in the late fall. We will then make final revisions and begin the process of developing the report card for implementation in the 2019-20 school year. Our current Junior School report card and interim K-7 Performance Scale will remain in effect for the 2018-19 school year; however, it will be available in an online format.

The committee would like to thank all parents and teachers who took the time to complete the survey and attend empathy interviews. Gaining a deeper understanding of the different perspectives in our community has helped to inform our process and next steps. We look forward to sharing more with the Junior School community later in the fall and across next year as we prepare to launch our updated Junior School learning communication system in September 2019.

# **End-of-Year Events: Planning Guide for June 2018**

As May is soon upon us, we wish to ensure that all Junior School families are aware well in advance of our year-end special events, celebrations, and ceremonies so that you can ensure that your child is prepared, and so that families can plan accordingly to can join us. Below, you will find a chart showing these important dates in June to help you with end of the year planning.

## Class Placements for 2018-2019

At Southridge, we are committed to creating class groupings that consider each child's emotional, academic, and social needs within the wider grade-level context. There is a considerable amount of deliberation and care inherent in our class placement process:

- Current homeroom teachers create the initial lists, assigning students to Class A or Class B (NOTE: homeroom teachers are not assigned at this point)
- Specialist teachers, and PYP and MYP Division leaders and coordinators review the lists and make further suggestions.
- Once the lists are completed they are signed-off on by all the teachers and submitted to the Head of Junior School for a final review.
- The Head of Junior School reviews and finalizes the lists, assigns new students to each class, and determines the homeroom teacher.

Given the sensitivity and confidentiality that must be adhered to when determining best-fit class placements, it is our policy <u>not</u> to entertain parental requests for certain teachers or peer groupings as we simply cannot guarantee that these types of requests can be honoured. While we strive to ensure that each child has at least one close friend in their class, there are only two class options to choose from, which can sometimes pose challenges when creating groupings that balance the needs and dynamics of all children in the cohort. We thank you in advance for your trust and confidence in our faculty as we consider a wide variety of needs in determining class placements for the 2018-2019 school year.



## **Allergy Aware Reminder**

At this time of the year, lots of wonderful appreciation and celebration treats trickle into the Junior School staff room and classrooms. As an allergy aware school, we all need to do our part to minimize the risk of exposure to life-threatening allergens for our students who are anaphylactic. If you are dropping off treats for students or teachers, please ensure that they don't contain nuts or nut products, as we have many students who are severely allergic to these allergens. Please also be considerate of other life-threatening allergens that may be unique to your child's classmates. Thank you for helping to keep all spaces in our Junior School allergen aware.

## **Grade 6 Singing-Song Writing Success**

Last Thursday, the grade six students had the chance to work with a professional singersongwriter as part of our song writing unit. The students started learning the ukulele in September, and they have learned many chords and songs throughout the year. They are now putting their understanding into action as they write a song inspired by a piece of public artwork in metro Vancouver.

The students had already selected their piece of art and chosen a theme inspired by that artwork as the basis of their songs. We had discussed chord progressions and lyric writing strategies in class, and the grade sixes had been doing some great preliminary work in their Arts Process Journals. Thursday was the opportunity to then take these drafts to the next level in a song writing workshop with Ben Parker. Ben has been coming to Southridge to work with our students for the past several years, and he is a wonderful mentor to our students. Currently, a song that Ben collaborated on is the number one 'new play' on Canadian country radio stations. He inspired many of the students as he performed for them, discussed his song writing process, and worked with our grade six song writers on polishing their compositions.

The students all commented what a positive experience it was to work with a professional singer-song writer like Ben. They are now practicing their songs as they prepare to perform for their classmates later this week.

We are grateful for Ben's mentorship--and very proud of our Southridge song writers!

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## Senior School - Laptop Returns

# Campaign Feasibility Study Update and Next Steps

As you know, in December, we partnered with <u>Compton Fundraising Consultants</u> to assess the feasibility of Phase One of the Campus Master Plan, which included a new \$20 million 'Centre Building' and extensive renovations in the Senior School. Through January-March, Compton met with approximately 30 current and alumni families from our community to assess the feasibility of these projects.

At our Board meeting in April, the Board of Governors received the final report from Compton. The feedback and insight we received through the report has provided us with important information that will help guide our decision making going forward.



We are very excited about future campus development, including modernizing and improving learning spaces for all our students from Kindergarten to Grade 12. Input from our community in this regard has been most helpful and will be taken into consideration as we create the proper facilities to shape the future of Southridge.

As we continue to evaluation the long-term opportunities for campus development, we will also proceed with the annex to address some of our immediate space needs in the Senior School – space that will be used to directly benefit our students.

#### Dear parents and guardians:

As you are likely aware, British Columbia continues to experience an unprecedented illegal drug overdose crisis. Since January 2016, more than 2,500 people in B.C. have lost their lives; including 37 youth aged 10 to 18. While youth in this age bracket are not considered high risk for an overdose death, school-aged youth are not untouched by tragedy, either directly or through family, friends, and media attention to this emergency.

All illegal drug overdose deaths are preventable. We hope that with your help, the youth in your life will receive the information needed to remain safe during year-end celebrations and throughout the summer months.

#### What you need to know to keep your kids safe

I strongly encourage you to talk about substance use with the youth in your lives. Non-judgmental and supportive conversations about substance use and overdose risks can save lives. Obviously the best way to stay safe is to avoid drugs altogether, but we know that many of our youth will experiment and so it is important to share that:

- The greatest risk for overdose death is using drugs alone because no one is there to call 9-1-1 or provide emergency first aid support if there is an overdose.
- Opioids are a type of medication that includes heroin, morphine, fentanyl, methadone and codeine. Fentanyl is around 50 to 100 times more toxic than morphine, which makes the risk of accidental overdose from illegal fentanyl very high. Other opioid compounds that are even more toxic, such as carfentanil, have also been identified in the illegal drug supply. Over 80% of people who died from a suspected drug overdose in BC had fentanyl and other substances like it in their system at the time of death
- A very high percentage of illegal, street opioid drugs like heroin and fake OxyContin contain fentanyl *but you also should know* that fentanyl is sometimes found in other street drugs that are not sold as opioids, including cocaine. Other street drugs such as ecstasy (MDMA) and methamphetamines may also contain unknown substances. In some instances, these drugs do not contain the drug they are being sold as; the dealer may not know what is in them.
- Anyone who does not regularly use opioid substances is at very high-risk for overdose if substances like fentanyl contaminate their drugs, because they have no tolerance built up for opioids. People who have used drugs containing opioids regularly and then stopped for a time are also at risk of overdose for this reason.
- Contrary to some reports, fentanyl has not been found in marijuana (cannabis).

You can talk to your older children about making safe decisions in settings where drugs
may be available – encourage them to call 9-1-1 if someone overdoses, assure them that
due to the Good Samaritan Act, they or others at the party (including the person
overdosing) will not face criminal consequences for simple possession by calling for
help due to an overdose event.

Talking to teens and young adults about drugs can be challenging, but help and resources are available. Reach out and start the conversation. You are the most important source of information for youth in your lives. Be non-judgmental, respectful, and ask teens what they know. Please take some time to go online and learn more about how to speak honestly with your kids about this important topic.

#### What you can do to help save a life

If you have a youth or adult in your life who uses illegal drugs regularly or occasionally – *or you use illegal drugs yourself* – here are some important actions to take:

- Carry a naloxone kit and learn how to recognize and respond to an overdose. Visit <a href="https://www.stopoverdoseBC.ca">www.stopoverdoseBC.ca</a> to find out where you can get a kit and training.
- Be prepared to give rescue breaths in case someone overdoses; giving rescue breaths before help arrives can save a life and prevent brain damage.
- Anyone using drugs should do a small test amount first. Do not mix drugs (including with alcohol).
- Anyone using drugs should do so with someone present who can check on them and call 9-1-1 in case of overdose, or use an overdose prevention site if there is one in the area.
- Call 9-1-1 in a health emergency to help save a life the Good Samaritan law protects people from charges of simple possession in the case of an overdose.
- If you think someone you love may be using, or at risk, begin a **non-judgemental conversation** about how to stay safe. Know that addiction is a chronic health condition and relapses happen.

Each of us can make a difference by starting a dialogue with the youth in our lives. Together we can begin to turn the tide on this crisis happening in our communities.

#### **EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director, Ms. J. Holt <a href="mailto:jholt@southridge.bc.ca">jholt@southridge.bc.ca</a>
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

#### **Faculty**

Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

#### **ENTRY:**

#### **Students**

- Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

#### **Faculty**

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director, Assistant Head or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

#### **DISMISSAL:**

#### **Students**

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected. No student will be dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 3) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.
