Reunification Drill Missing One Vital Ingredient

As you are all aware, Southridge held its first full school reunification drill on Friday, May 18th. The Ministry of Education has recently made planning and practicing these drills mandatory for all schools in the province, and, as you would expect, we want to make sure that we are well prepared for responding to emergency situations. As such, Southridge is keen to ensure that our practices are effective and efficient.

In April 2017, the Junior School ran our inaugural drill, which took an extraordinary amount of planning. Following this first drill there were opportunities identified to help improve the way we organized ourselves and accounted for all of our students. To be sure, emergency preparedness drills (fire, earthquake, lockdown and reunification) are taken very seriously as "all hands on deck" events at Southridge because they are valuable learning experiences for all of us in responding to critical situations. Admittedly, *real* emergency situations will not unfold in a manner exactly like a drill, but drills give us an important chance to make sure our foundational response systems are reliable. Perhaps even more importantly, however, they also help our students know what to expect in the event of a real emergency.

Two weeks ago, we expanded our reunification exercises to include Senior School students – an undertaking that effectively doubled our efforts and added another degree of complexity to the system we developed for the Junior School last year. Following the May 18th drill, we received excellent constructive feedback from our faculty and staff, and we are also looking forward to reactions and comments from our parents (we distributed our <u>Reunification Drill parent survey</u> on Monday, May 28 to all parents). Once we've had a chance to assess and review all feedback, we will redesign aspects of the reunification process that need our attention.

In the spirit of offering feedback for improvement, I would like to add some of my own. The reason behind running these kinds of emergency preparedness exercises is to ensure students are kept safe. We do not implement and practice emergency response exercises for the sake of compliance with Ministry expectations alone; rather, we look at them as important opportunities for us to react to critical incident examples in a controlled environment for the safety our students and their families.

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As such, **it is imperative that students are actually at school when these exercises take place**. It was disappointing to witness the number of students signing out and/or getting picked-up by parents before the drill even began, or simply not attending school at all that day. In fact, there were well over 150 students absent for the drill, which proved to be a significant impediment to confirming attendance in a timely manner. Students leaving early had a negative impact on the important goals we were trying to accomplish – ensuring that our response measures to critical situations are properly practiced and that our routines are well-understood by our entire community. Furthermore, we know that stress and anxiety during critical incidents are heightened during times of uncertainty, and if our students have not had the opportunity to practice drills properly, they will be unprepared during a real situation and may put themselves <u>and others</u> at unnecessary levels of risk.

Please, in the spirit of safety for all of our students, do not sign your children out of school before any emergency preparedness drill. Your children may try to convince you that their presence is unnecessary, but I can assure you that that is not the case. Students need to be here. I can also assure you that their presence is necessary for the safety others – students, teachers and staff alike. Trust me, the school would not waste valuable time and resources on trivialities.

End-of-Year Events: Planning Guide for June 2018

As May is soon upon us, we wish to ensure that all Junior School families are aware well in advance of our year-end special events, celebrations, and ceremonies so that you can ensure that your child is prepared, and so that families can plan accordingly to can join us. Class Placements for 2018-2019

At Southridge, we are committed to creating class groupings that consider each child's emotional, academic, and social needs within the wider grade-level context. There is a considerable amount of deliberation and care inherent in our class placement process:

- Current homeroom teachers create the initial lists, assigning students to Class A or Class B (NOTE: homeroom teachers are not assigned at this point)
- Specialist teachers, and PYP and MYP Division leaders and coordinators review the lists and make further suggestions.
- Once the lists are completed they are signed-off on by all the teachers and submitted to the Head of Junior School for a final review.
- The Head of Junior School reviews and finalizes the lists, assigns new students to each class, and determines the homeroom teacher.

Given the sensitivity and confidentiality that must be adhered to when determining bestfit class placements, it is our policy <u>not</u> to entertain parental requests for certain teachers or peer groupings as we simply cannot guarantee that these types of requests can be honoured. While we strive to ensure that each child has at least one close friend in their class, there are only two class options to choose from, which can sometimes pose challenges when creating groupings that balance the needs and dynamics of all children in the cohort. We thank you in advance for your trust and confidence in our faculty as we consider a wide variety of needs in determining class placements for the 2018-2019 school year.

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Allergy Aware Reminder

At this time of the year, lots of wonderful appreciation and celebration treats trickle into the Junior School staff room and classrooms. As an allergy aware school, we all need to do our part to minimize the risk of exposure to life-threatening allergens for our students who are anaphylactic. EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:

Students

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director, Ms. J. Holt <u>jholt@southridge.bc.ca</u>
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

Faculty

Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

ENTRY:	

Students

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

Faculty

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director, Assistant Head or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

DISMISSAL:

Students

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected. No student will be dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 3) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.

Faculty

1) A table is placed at the back of the gym and labelled by grade, class section and teacher for ease of exam collection.
