Reunification Drill - Important Information for All Southridge Families

During the afternoon of Friday May 18th, both the Junior and Senior Schools will be conducting a Reunification Drill (a simulation of procedures the school would undertake to reunite students with families/caregivers in the event of an emergency situation that warrants evacuating and/or closing our school). The Ministry of Education requires all schools to run reunification drills to ensure appropriate plans are in place in the event of a catastrophic emergency. Our reunification drill will require that all students be picked up from the school by a parent or designated adult on the afternoon of May 18th. Senior School students who have prior permission will be permitted to walk or drive off campus as per their permission. Please note that in a real emergency the school may decide that it is safer that all students remain on campus until their parents/guardians are able to pick them up. Please be aware that older siblings in the Senior School who may have permission to walk or drive home as part of the Grade 8-12 release process during the drill will not be able to sign out a Junior School sibling, as we cannot place the burden of care on another child, such as an older sibling in this context. If you are unable to participate in the drill and your child does not have prior permission to walk or drive home in the event of an emergency, they will be instructed to return to class at 2:30 PM. Both Junior and Senior Schools will be dismissed at 3:00 PM.

The instructions below are also in Chinese in the attached file.

Please familiarize yourself with the details below, so that your family can help us to execute this drill in an efficient manner:

- Our drill will begin at 12:30 PM with a mock earthquake, followed by a full evacuation of both the Junior and Senior School.
- □ The drill will involve all students from K-12
- Once attendance procedures have been completed and Senior School students who have prior permission to leave campus have exited the premises, all parents will receive an email and/or text message from the school instructing you to come pick your child. At that time, the person picking up the child should make their

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way to campus. If your child has prior permission to leave campus, please ignore this message.

- Please wait until you hear from the school before driving or walking to pick up your child(ren). Please do not arrive early; entry onto campus from 12:30 until the commencement of child release and pick-up will not be permitted.
- □ One designated adult or family member will need to come onto campus to collect the children once the drill is enacted and the text or email is received
- Please walk through the South Gate located at the traffic lights closest to the student parking lot. Faculty and signage will also help direct you to the right locations.
- Older siblings in the Senior School who have permission to walk or drive home as part of the Grade 8-12 release process during the drill will not be able to sign out a Junior School sibling, as we cannot put the burden of care on another child, such as an older sibling in this context.
- Senior School students who do not have prior permission will not be permitted to leave campus without a parent or designated adult. We are not set up to accept emails, texts and phone calls during this time requesting that we release students. Released students must provide the school with their intended destination and contact number.
- Please do not text message or phone your child during the drill.
- The campus will be closed to all vehicular traffic -- there will only be pedestrian access to campus during the drill. Parents or caregivers picking up students will need to park off-campus and walk in.
- Parents are permitted to park in the North East corner of the Walmart parking lot at 24th and 160th street. Please do not park in any designated no parking zones on 160th street or other neighbouring streets. If you choose to park at Morgan Crossing or Grandview Corners, please be aware that many of our parents received warnings and tickets last year at these locations.

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- □ If you are within walking distance of the school, please consider leaving your vehicle at home and walking to the school to get your child(ren).
- Each child in a family has been provided with a password that MUST be given by the parent or designated caregiver when they arrive at the school to take a child off campus. If someone other than a parent is picking a child up (e.g. grandparent, care giver, etc.), they too will need to know the password for each child. Only share your child's password with the person picking up your child.
- Senior School passwords have been sent home via the "Reunification Senior School Parent Notice." Advisors will also be emailing passwords to parents and guardians prior to the drill.
- □ Junior School passwords can be found on the sticker located on the inside cover of your child's prep book.
- Please memorize and/or write down the password, or take a photo and store it in your device for each of your children, so that you have it ready when you arrive to pick up your child(ren). Junior School passwords will consist of the name of the student's house and their ID number (e.g. Orcas 3333) Senior School passwords will consist of the name of the student's advisory and their ID number (e.g. Thunder 13333).
- In order to collect your child(ren) you will go through the "double gate" release process. The first gate is the REQUEST GATE (located at the WEST side of the turf field by the crosswalk). Here you will be asked to fill in a *Student Request Form*. You will need to provide some basic information regarding your child and your password. Once this is done, a runner will collect your child and bring them to the second gate, called the REUNIFICATION GATE (located at the north entry to the turf field by the cross walk), where you will meet them and sign-off for their release.
- □ After signing out at the Reunification Gate, parents are to leave campus immediately via the North Gate or exit closest to the Junior School.
- □ Students will be outdoors for up to two hours during the drill. It will be a casual day in both Junior and Senior Schools. Students should dress for



the weather! Please check the weather forecast and plan accordingly. Students will have all their belongings with them when they evacuate the school.

- All students, K-7 will eat their lunch in their classrooms. There will be no cafe service. All students (with the exception of Senior School participants who have permission to walk or drive off campus) should come to school with a bagged lunch.
- Please talk to your child in advance about who will be picking them up.
- We hope to have maximum participation in the drill; however, if you are unable to participate all remaining Junior School students will return to their classroom at 2:30 and all remaining Senior School students will be supervised in the Junior School Great Hall at the same time. Dismissal for both schools will occur at 3:00 PM

Primary Year Programme Exhibition

At Southridge, Grade 4 is the final year of the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (PYP). As such, our young learners are required to participate in the PYP Exhibition, a culminating experience that enables them to take responsibility for their own learning, and to synthesize and apply their knowledge from previous years. The Exhibition is a unit of celebration and is intended to be shared with the whole school community and beyond. Focus is directed at having learners reflect on their growth in the approaches to learning, knowledge, conceptual understanding and attitudes throughout the Exhibition process. Students are encouraged to take action as a result of their learning in an

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innovative and meaningful way. They are given opportunities to present ideas through a variety of mediums that may include written, oral, visual, musical & dramatic components.

Our Exhibition unit this year is focused on the transdisciplinary theme of **Sharing the planet**. The students began investigating a wide range of real-life problems and issues that interested them. Then they each created proposals and interviewed with the Mrs. de Hoog and Mrs. Murchie to share their passions. Students were then grouped according to their interests and assigned to a faculty mentor. This year, Grade 4 students will be exploring issues related to:

- How innovation and discovery impact human lives
- Balancing human and animal wellbeing
- The impact of human decisions on pollution
- The impact of pollution on our oceans
- Protecting and preserving wildlife

To date, the students have been actively researching print sources and websites, and have gone on related field trips to places such as Nightshift, Burns Bog and the Vancouver Aquarium. They have also worked with people from the Red Cross, the RCMP and the Surrey Fire Fighters, for example. Through hands-on experiences, guest speakers and research, these learners are quickly gaining knowledge and awareness.

Over the next 3 weeks they will dive into the arts to express their view points and design projects to offer solutions to complex problems. We all look forward to listening to how their thinking has changed, to seeing what they will create and to how they will choose to stage their Exhibition to share their learning with the greater Southridge community.

You are invited to attend one of two sessions held on Wednesday, May 16th from 1:30 to 3:00 pm and Thursday, May 17th from 5:30 to 7:00 pm, beginning in the Junior School Great Hall. See you there!

Career Education Activities

Exploring career pathways in medical research

In mid-April, two of our Grade 11s, Rhett Cunningham and Kylie Ren attended an open house at BC Childrens' Hospital to find out about careers in health and medical science research. Below is Kylie's reflection on the event:

"The Research Open House event at Children's hospital is a popular event held annually. Recrutly, I had the honour to participate in this exciting half day event among 190 other students. Although seemingly short, the amount of activities we did was truly a surprise. In just merely 3 hours, the event led the students through presentations, games, and gave us all a chance to participate in research at the hospital. The presentations included ones on concussions and behaviour science, with Q&A sessions following each. Afterwards, the students were split into smaller groups with 10 people each so we could have our individual questions answered. The first activity we participated in was a jeopardy game on orthopaedic research/surgery, competing against 3 other teams. Let's just say we had no way of knowing all the answers, but our team performed well and received the grand final prize of chocolate bars. However, the best part was yet to begin. That was participating in a research project at the hospital. For the nine of us in the group, we went to two PhD students who were doing research on turning bacteria into toxins. We were given the chance for one of us to inject plasma DNA into a small sample of E. Coli, then heat the sample up in this cool looking machine. Then, another student injected bacteria broth into the sample I had put together. After all this, each one of the students got to grow their own colonies of E. Coli by spreading the sample on petri dishes. It was a very fun experience, and all the time the two PhD students were answering various questions we were asking. This event was amazing, and for those who are interested in the STEM and medical field, this is something you must check out. Don't underestimate the 3 hours you're there; you'll see what I mean."

Ivey Business Case Competition

On Saturday, April 28th, six Grade 11 students (Tony Hu, Michael Chu, Irena Yan, Angelina Zhao, Eshana Bhangu and Nancy Weng) participated in the Ivey Business Case Competition, sponsored by Western's Ivey School of Business and held at West Point Grey Academy. We also had two Grade 12 students (Linda Otamendi and Jack Bowie) who participated last year and were asked to return as mentors/leaders for the day. After



the students were divided in 10 teams of 5, they were given a business case to analyze, discuss, create solution(s). After three hours of deliberation with a leader's help, they then presented to a team of judges made up of alumni from Ivey's School of Business. The case was intriguing and challenging as the students were required to come up with strategies for Porsche Canada to harness social media to help Canadian drivers understand that winter driving was not impossible and they did not have to garage their vehicles from October to April. For example, in Germany and Finland, Porsches are driven year-round. Listening to the inventive and imaginative ideas that each team came up with reminded me that the "training" and practice that Southridge provides by teaching around a Harkness table in a collaborative approach, prepares our students well for this exercise as well as exposing them to this teaching model used in university business programs. Both Jack and Linda's teams did well in their pool with Linda's team (that included Irena) moving on to the final where they were awarded 1st place. Well done!

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<u>Reunification Drill -- Important Information for All Southridge Families</u> 重要通知:全校學生 - 家長/監護人緊急事件重聚演習

五月十八日, 週五下午, 我們學校將舉行一個包括小學和中學的全校學生-家長/監護人緊急 事件重聚演習。這是一個模擬演習, 是 BC 省教育局規定的。目地是確保萬一有突發事件 而需要全體緊急疏散或學校關門, 各方面都有完善的計劃。

這次的演習在5月18日當天下午,所有的學生必需有家長或指定的成年人接離學校。中學生如果 在開學時家長已經簽署孩子步行或自己開車離校的同意書,可以按指定的時間自己離校。但是請 注意,在真正不可推測的緊急事件發生時,以保學生的安全,學校可能按當時情況要求所有學生逗 留在校直到有家長/監護人或指定的成年人到校把該學生接走為止。另外中學生如果有弟弟、妹 妹在小學部,在這種非常情況之下,儘管是演習,他們也不可以照常把小學的弟弟、妹妹接離學校。 因為學校不可以把照顧小孩的責任放在另一個作為哥哥或姐姐但本身還是孩子的身上。如果有部 份家庭實在不可以趕到學校接孩子,該孩子將於2:30召集回課室,然後下午三時照常放學回家. 演習當天,全校都是下午三點下課。

請大家詳閱熟記以下的條文細節:

- □ 演習將於5月18日當天下午12:30以模擬地震形式開始, 一旦穩定後,全體撤離學校校 舍。
- □ K-12 全體學生參與演習。
- 當一切點名程序完成後,任何中學生曾有簽署家長允許自行離校,步行或自駕的,可以離開 校園。然後學校立即發電子郵件併或短訊給各位家長,通知各位接孩子們的步驟。收到 郵件或信息後,請大家才開始移玉步或安排其他成員,趕來學校接孩子。如果您知道您的 孩子是有自己可以離校的允許,請不需理會這些短訊或電子郵件。
- □ 請大家緊密合作,不要提前來到學校。請接到郵件或短訊後才開始步行或開車來學校。當 天下 12:30 後直至接到通知之前,不允許非學生 進入校園。
- □ 一旦收到可以接學生的通知,每個家庭請派一位代表來校接孩子。
- □ 演習當天,請大家用學校的南閘門進入校園。也就是靠近 160 和 26 街交界的紅綠燈入口, 到時候有老師職工並清楚的路標指引大家往不同區域接您的孩子(們)。
- □ 以上已經解釋過:家中在中學的哥哥姐姐,演習當天不能把弟弟妹妹們帶離學校。

- 所有中學生,如果開學時沒有曾經檢署過家長同意書,學生們必須有家長/監護人或一位指定成人代表陪伴之下才可以離校。目前學校並沒有這個系統,可以在當天接納家長或監護人的短訊、郵件或電話允許或要求學校把學生放走。
- □ 所有被接離、自行開車或步行離校的學生必需填寫他們離校後的目的地和聯絡電話。
- □ 請大家在當天演習的時候不要跟您的孩子有任何電話或短訊的聯絡。
- □ 演習當時,整個校園禁止所有車輛出入-只許行人。家長/監護人,褓母或指定成人代表需要把車子停在校園外,然後徒步到校接孩子。
- 大家可以把車子停放在 24 和 160 街 東北角的 Walmart 停車場。 請家長們遵守停車標誌, 不要違例停放車輛。 如果您打算把車子停放在 Morgan Crossing 或 Grandview Corner, 請大家謹慎。 去年有家長在這些地區接到罰單和警告。 如果您住在學校附近,請考慮把 車子留在家裡,步行來校接孩子。
- □ 每一個孩子都有收到自己獨特的暗語。接孩子的家長、祖父母、朋友或褓母一定要把暗語 正確地說出,才可以把孩子接走。請記得如果家長自己不可以接孩子,請把暗語傳給接孩 子的人,不要告訴其他人。
- □ 中學生的暗語已經跟緊急事件重聚演習通知書一同郵寄到府上。另外學生們的小組老師 (Advisors) 也會在演習之前把暗語以電子郵件形式發給各位家長和監護人.
- □ 小學生的暗語將會黏貼在每個孩子的學校日記簿的封面內頁。
- □ 請用各種方法把暗語記錄或熟背,也可以用您的隨身手機拍張照片。孩子的暗語是他們的 House 或 Advisory 和學生號碼的組合。(例如: Orcas 3333 或 Thunder 13333)。
- □ 您接孩子的時候,將需要先過兩關。第一關是在 REQUEST GATE (請求閘口)那裡填表。 此 REQUEST GATE 座落於人造草地球場西面的行人斑馬線旁邊。請在此處填一份要求接 學生的表格。表格上需要填寫您接的孩子的基本個人資訊和接孩子的暗語。一切確認後, 您的孩子就會有學校老師或助理把該孩子帶到第二個閘口 - REUNIFICATION GATE (重聚 閘口)。此第二關位於學校人造草地球場入口,斑馬線通往校舍的位置。介時請移玉步到 第二閘口,簽名併接孩子。
- □ 在第二閘口簽名後,該孩子和接孩子的必須一起立即步行離開校園。當天出校園的閘門請 用校園北閘,也就是離小學最近的出口。
- □ 學生們將於當天下午在戶外大約兩個小時。當天學校定為便裝日。請按氣象預告穿著適合 的衣服。當撤離校舍的時候,學生們穿戴妥當併需要攜帶他們所有的書包等必需品。

- □ 演習當天沒有餐廳服務。所有小學學生在他們的課室享用自備的午餐。中學生也需要自備午餐。部份曾得到家長簽名許可 可以自行離校的中學生,當天可以在適當的時候出外選購外賣午餐帶回學校。
- □ 請預先跟您的孩子安排當天接孩子的人選,讓孩子有心理準備。
- 學校希望每個家庭積極地參與此次演習,以達到最高的效率和實況演習。如果您實在是沒 有辦法參與,留下來的小學生將於 2:30 召集回課室。中學生將在同時間聚集在小學大堂。 然後請您下午三時照常放學後接孩子回家。

EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:

Students

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director, Ms. J. Holt <u>jholt@southridge.bc.ca</u>
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

Faculty

Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

ENTRY:	

Students

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

Faculty

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director, Assistant Head or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

DISMISSAL:

Students

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected. No student will be dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 3) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.
