10 Things That Do Not Belong in Schools of the Future

The last article I wrote for The Southridge Wednesday focused on my attendance at the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS) conference in Atlanta, Georgia. In that article, I promised I would write an article as a follow-up about some highlights of the conference. There were many outstanding sessions that Mr. Jones and I attended including a three hour workshop on the art of negotiations that was put on by The Klingenstein Center at New York's Columbia University, but the one I would like to write about here was a session put on by a Head of School and his Assistant Head from Austin, Texas titled 10 things that do not belong in schools of the future. In this article, I will talk about five that I feel are most noteworthy.

- 1. Status Quo or Tradition. Now, I believe that there actually is a place for traditions at a school such as graduation events, things that we do at Southridge like Leadership Experience Week, the House Picnic, or roughing it outside in the rain under a tarp at Strathcona, but there is a danger of continually churning out the same events year after year and allowing things to become stale. Educators and school leaders must always ask whether or not the traditions that a school has established over the years continue to serve the community in the ways they were intended. It may be possible that always doing the same things keeps us from exploring new, fresh ideas that could really enhance our student's experience at Southridge. "We do that because we've always done it that way," can be a safe, comfortable yet dangerously limiting attitude.
- 2. **Recipes**. What the presenters meant by this is essentially this: if you are a teacher, and you give an assignment to your class, and students turn in 20 "projects" that essentially say or do virtually the same thing, then you haven't given an assignment, you've given a recipe. I can think of countless assignments I was given as a student in high school and university that I handed in that looked exactly the same as the projects handed in by other students. We didn't cheat or copy each other, we just followed the very clear expectations of our teachers and did it *their* way. Where is the deep learning in that? Where is the creativity and innovation? How was I challenged to figure things out on my own and create something unlike anything anyone else in the class did? Sadly, as a teacher I often assigned projects in a history or geography class and when students presented their findings, the results often looked unimaginatively similar. Was that the student's fault, or mine? Were they creating and being imaginative or

were they following the project recipe I gave them? As schools of the future focus on collaboration, inquiry-focused learning, discussion-based classes, creativity and innovation, perhaps the skill teachers must develop the most is the art of asking the *right* questions, not giving students a recipe to follow.

- 3. Sacred Spaces. This can be tied to the traditions of a school. Why do people in a library always have to be quiet? Do students actually need lockers and hallways and walls? Do all classrooms have to look the same? Do schools really need computer labs? Can deep learning happen online? Or outside in nature? What if we put power tools in the hands of students and ask them to build something? Does reporting and assessment need to look the way it did when we were kids? Do we need to give out awards for the "best" student in every subject area--how do we really even know who that is? These are just a few questions that can initiate the conversation around what we as a school community hold sacred, and what we might need to consider letting go of or changing.
- 4. Isolation and Department-centrism. Why do we teach? Is it to fill student's minds with the knowledge we feel is important, have them write a test, give them a mark, and pat them on the head and move them along? Or do we teach for deep learning and understanding? To help students make connections across the curriculum? Since the Industrial Revolution, school leaders have organized students in classrooms, teaching them math and then moving them along to history, next to science, and then on to English. How can we connect the learning in art class to social studies to science, mathematics and physical education? In 2020, Finland will be revolutionizing education by removing all subject areas from high schools for students 16 years old and older. Senior students will learn about concepts such as (for example) global warming by incorporating scientific, mathematical, historical, geographic and economic considerations. World Wars would be studied in a similar cross-curricular approach by multiple teachers. This is only one example of how education is evolving, but keep in mind that over the past two decades Finland has boasted one of the top-ranked education systems in the world, yet they are doing a complete overhaul.
- 5. **Fear of Failure**. As I have written in previous articles, students today are anxious about their future--some experts say they are the most anxious generation *ever*. Part of the problem, according to Stanford researcher Carol Dweck, is that students are not given the freedom to fail and to learn from their mistakes. When we talk about failure, we do not necessarily mean big failures, like failing a course or an entire grade at school, we certainly aren't talking about skydiving failures or brake failures on our vehicles, but researchers believe that children need to be given opportunities to make small failures often--and to hopefully learn from those failures. Perfectionism is rampant in schools. Some students



consider a B on a report card the new C- or even D. For some, nothing short of an A or A+ is considered acceptable. My worry is that students with this "fixed mindset" around achievement are setting themselves up for bigger problems related to anxiety, depression and a deficit of true understanding down the road. Schools of the future need to provide daily opportunities for students to explore, to imagine, to experiment, to fail and to try again. This is what builds resilience. And these are five things that I agree do not belong in schools of the future.

Please note that older siblings in the Senior School who may have permission to walk or drive home as a part of the Grade 8-12 release process during the drill will not be able to sign out a Junior School sibling, as we cannot put the burden of care on another child, such as an older sibling in this context. More specific details and instructions will follow in the weeks to come; however, we'd like to have maximum participation in the drill and request that you save the date.


Celebrate Books in April and May

Cuba Jazz Band Trip

I have had the opportunity to go on many international trips with Southridge. I have been to London and Paris, throughout Italy, even through the Amazon rainforest in Ecuador. Despite having experienced so many countries and cultures, Cuba offered something that felt different in ways that I can't quite describe. Besides the obvious things like the temperature sitting at a scorching 30 degrees, there was something about the people and the environment that felt very different from our own. It was especially apparent when listening to music performed live. The one performance most memorable for me was our first, at an arts middle school in Havana. Our own performance went well despite a few glitches with our sound system and the Cuban power supply. Ms. Parker likes to say that in Cuba, all questions can be answered with these three simple answers: "Ask the guide", "I don't know", and "Its Cuba!"

What really stood out to me, however, was when the children from this school started performing for us. Music, for them, isn't just something to be played, it is something they felt and is a key part of both their culture and themselves. I've been to the VSO's symphony a few times and I have always been blown away by the grace and eloquence of their playing. Even the best in Western culture, in many ways, fails to encapsulate the



energy the same way the Cuban children created so effortlessly. They performed several pieces for us and instead of reciting off of sheet music, they changed each piece to make their songs unique. This included a very exuberant rendition of Bruno Mars's "Treasure", much to our delight. Many times the students weren't looking at their music; they knew what to play and how to play it. They *felt* what they should play. Seeing a mass of about 50 students swaying back and forth as though they weren't sitting in chairs but rather dancing with their music as they were performing was truly incredible.

Overall, Cuba is a beautiful and welcoming place that can easily be enjoyed and visited, made even better when we were able to perform and experience what Cuba had to offer in such a unique way with a marvelous group of people. Had I the chance go back in time to change a single thing about the Cuba Jazz trip, the only thing I would change would be to double the SPF on my sunscreen.

University Counselling and Career Education News!

Over the past week, Grade 11 and 12 students had two opportunities to explore career experiences off-campus:

Doors Open to Technology (DOT) http://dot2018.com/

Last week, the DOT gave high school students across the province access to a one-of-a-kind opportunity to go behind the doors of some of B.C.'s coolest tech companies and explore careers in technology through real-world experiences. The intent is to connect high school students with the exciting career opportunities in BC's growing tech sector. Kaj Grant-Mathiasen (Grade 12) attended this two day event and returned to school with some great stories from VR Demos at BC Tech Cube to listening to how the design cycle works at BrainStation to watching interns work on exciting projects in "The Garage" at Microsoft and touring SAP. This is the first time that Southridge has participated in this event and we look forward to taking emerging techies in Grade 11 & 12 for next year's event.

3rd Annual Business Case Competition

On Sunday, Ms. Livingston accompanied a team of four eager Grade 11s who are considering university business programs to the North Surrey Secondary Invitational Business Case Competition. Case studies are an integral part of commerce courses as a training tool for analyzing a real-life business situation. Students are required to analyze the prescribed cases and present their interpretations or solutions, including the benefits and risks, strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats along with a financial review. Angelina Liu, Nancy Weng, Irena Yan and Annie Yeh found themselves dealing with a scenario involving H&M's "Greenwashing" in an environmentally unfriendly fast fashion industry. They had to put forward ideas for how H&M could do a better job to improve their efforts to lessen the impacts of fast, cheap fashion on pollution of fresh water sources and reduce CO2 emissions. They were challenged to come up with a new company mission statement. The students braved a panel of judges from SFU's Beedie School of Business and presented ideas for a social media campaign, raising the price of the clothing and moving



away from reliance on the use of synthetic fibres. Profits would then be turned over to fund stewardship programs. The team did very well and received positive feedback as well as coaching tips for case analysis and presentation skills.

Update on UBC Admissions Evaluations Beginning In 2019

UBC has recently published an update on how they are expanding their holistic review of applications beginning with the admitting class of 2019. In this update, the changes will be addressed, as well as how Southridge is continuing to guide students in the application process for UBC.

It is important to note when reading about the changes, that admission to UBC is, and will continue to be, competitive for all faculties across both campuses (Vancouver and Okanagan). To provide perspective for the Vancouver campus, for 2016, there were 34,329 applicants and 10,702 registered for 1st year seats*. UBC admissions personnel tell us that applications for 2018 have surpassed 40,000.

It is also important to note that the holistic review of applications is not new at UBC. For a number of years, the Personal Profile has been a very important part of UBC's online application. It helps UBC assess students' preparedness for university study based on a broad range of experiences and achievements. Therefore, applicants with high academic standing alone are not guaranteed admission. In meeting the requirements for broad-based admissions, Southridge provides extensive support for students by providing many opportunities for them to be involved in service, fine and performing arts and athletics. We also offer substantial assistance in preparing for the essays and video submissions to UBC.

What will change?

UBC MESSAGE:

Starting in 2019, UBC will no longer calculate a four-course average based on an approved Grade 12 courses list. UBC will expand its holistic approach to academic



assessments and will consider all Grade 11 and Grade 12 courses when evaluating the breadth and competitiveness of a student's application.

SOUTHRIDGE RESPONSE:

The rigour and requirements of the Southridge Senior School Education Program has always meant, and will continue to mean, that our students will be well positioned to be evaluated favourably under this stated holistic approach.

UBC MESSAGE:

The holistic approach will focus primarily on marks in academic courses, but will also consider breadth, rigour, and relevancy of coursework by reviewing to what extent the student has challenged themselves in secondary school, as evidenced by the number and academic rigour of courses completed.

SOUTHRIDGE RESPONSE:

Our students have always been required to register in eight courses in their Grade 11 year and for six courses in their Grade 12 year, encouraging them to engage in course work in a broad range of subjects. We also offer opportunity for students to stretch and challenge themselves by enrolling in Advanced Placement and accelerated course work. This surpasses the UBC recommendation for the minimum number of senior courses for review under the holistic approach.

UBC MESSAGE:

Applications will be reviewed for the courses they have taken in subjects that are relevant to their intended area of study at UBC.

SOUTHRIDGE REPONSE:

From both the academic programming and university counselling perspective, we ensure students exceed the minimum stated requirements for entry to any desired program. We also encourage students to plan their course selections for Grade 11 and 12 based on research for a number of university programs. Therefore our counselling approach will continue to encourage students to not limit or customize their courses to one university.

What won't change?

UBC has provided assurances that the general admission requirements and the degreespecific prerequisites have not, and will not, change. You can find this information on the following webpages:


