Each of Us is Unique; Together We Weave a Beautiful Tapestry

This year, our Junior School year-long assembly theme has been, "Each of us in unique; together we weave a beautiful tapestry." At the first assembly of each month, we visit this theme as a way to connect as members of the Junior School community and reflect on how we can apply the meaning of this theme in our day-to-day actions and interactions. There is often a story, quote, or video that is used as a provocation to get us thinking.

Over the first term, we focused more on the first part of the statement: "*each of us is unique*". We talked about what makes each person unique, and how it is important to celebrate our uniqueness within the whole of our community "tapestry". We heard two stories, *You be You* by Linda Krantz, and Spoon by Amy Krouse Rosenthal. Both of these stories focus on what it means to be confident in our own unique abilities and qualities instead of focusing on being like everyone else. After all, if we are all identical, our tapestry would be pretty bland.

Over the second term we began to shift our focus to how individuals and groups can support and impact one another as we weave our tapestry. In January, we watched the beautiful animated short. "Soar" bv Alvce Tzue (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=W_O8I4MXbG8) and talked about how each unique person can also impact the spirit of those around them by being open-minded to other perspectives through empathy. Being open-minded helps to us to notice things we might not otherwise notice. In February, we focused on how we could use the Olympic values of excellence, respect, and friendship to set goals that would impact our own growth, as well as the growth of our community. We also heard an amazing talk by Team Canada Olympic medalist, Brent Hayden, which I wrote about for the Weekly Voice in the March 7 issue of The Wednesday. In March, we explored what it means to take a stand against bullying in our community. We talked about the difference between rude, mean, and bullying behaviours, as well as how every student in the school has the right to, as our weekly assembly metta reminds us, "feel safe, connected, and cared for." We watched a video called, "Be an Up stander" (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eegQCyQOCPg) which challenged us to think about how each unique individual in our community can use their voice to collectively prevent and take a stand against bullying.

In term three, our focus is teamwork, as we go deeper with thinking about the second half of the statement: "*together we weave a beautiful tapestry*." During last week's assembly, we watched a fascinating video that showed fire ants working as team to build a living ant bridge (<u>www.youtube.com/watch?v=pa5Unl279Es</u>). When I came across this video as an

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example of teamwork, I was compelled to put my inquirer hat on to better understand how the concept could be illustrated to students in this way. I learned that fire ants will build a bridge to cross a chasm, without a leader or person in charge. They are a species of ant the are driven by connection and being in tune with other ants in the colony (which can have up to 250,000 ants in it!). In order to build a bridge, ants will link together to create a platform that other ants in the colony can then safely use to get across. Those in the bridge are able to sense when "traffic" slows down which cues them that it is time to move on. Fire ants also use a similar approach when they must cross water. Instead of a bridge, they connect to build a raft and take turns rotating between being on the bottom of the raft so that each ant has a turn to breathe while floating across to their destination.

At SOUTHRIDGE our "tapestry" is our community - each of us is a thread that contributes to and influences the beauty of our tapestry. We are woven together, thread by thread, each of us with our own unique identities, strengths, and challenges; each of us with the capacity to influence and contribute to the whole. So let's take a page out of the fire ants' playbook and think about how we can move our community forward by building bridges and rafts to support and lift each other up, achieve our collective and individual goals, and set each unique person's spirit soaring so that, together, we weave a truly beautiful tapestry.

Save the Date – Reunification Drill, Friday, May 18, 2018

On **Friday, May 18**, <u>both</u> the Junior and Senior Schools will be conducting a Reunification Drill (a simulation of the procedures the School would undertake to reunite students with families/care-givers in the event of an emergency situation that warrants evacuating and/or closing our school). Schools are required to run reunification drills by the Ministry of Education, in order to ensure appropriate plans are in place in the event of emergencies.

Our reunification drill will require that Junior School students be picked up from the School by a <u>parent or designated adult</u> on the afternoon of May 18th. Please note that older siblings in the Senior School who may have permission to walk or drive home as a part of the Grade 8-12 release process during the drill will not be able to sign out a Junior School sibling, as we cannot put the burden of care on another child, such as an older sibling in this context. More specific details and instructions will follow in the weeks to come; however, we'd like to have maximum participation in the drill and request that you save the date.

Southridge Entrepreneur Club Achieves Success with The Junior Achievement Company Program! "Rewynd" Profits Donated to The Surrey Urban Mission!

For several years, Mr. Fazackerley has sponsored Entrepreneur Club at Southridge and Senior School students have participated in a number of

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programs that have included investigating and understanding the process of owning and running a company.

This year, Mr. Fazackerley along with Ms. Livingston, met with representative Wafa Balil from Junior Achievement and an agreement was made to offer the "JA Company Program". The intention and mandate of the program is for students to create a company of their own and run a business. Valuable skills of the program include:

- Gaining valuable leadership, networking and public speaking skills
- Learning the frameworks of a business and the skills needed in departments such as: Human Resources, Information Technology, Production, Marketing and Finance

Wafa presented an information session on Career Information Day during Leadership Experience Week in October and from there, a number of Grade 11 and 12 students signed up to participate. The group met every Tuesday 3:20 to 4:30 pm, from October to March.

Executives were voted and assigned departments and the company brainstormed a product that they would research, source, market and sell. At the same time, shares were offered in the company which was named "Rewynd" to promote the ear bud winder that was chosen as their product. After a successful marketing and sales campaign, the final stage of the project was completed when Rohin Sandhu, President presented the profits earned from running the company. The club chose the Surrey Urban Mission as the recipient and Rohin joined Ms. Lai's advisory last Friday to present \$580 to Executive Director, Mike Musgrove.

Here are some of the student comments about the experience:

"I enjoyed the process of turning an idea into a product and then selling that product to raise money for a good cause. I also enjoyed the real-life business experience, such as contacting suppliers and drafting a financial plan."

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"One thing I learned is that a successful business requires the effective cooperation and collaboration of all its members. One thing I enjoyed was the satisfaction received from selling all the...products."

"It (the Company Program) was a very eye-opening and rewarding experience. Starting a company and selling products is a lot harder than it looks and a lot of time and dedication has to be put in (to achieve a successful outcome)."

"My problem solving skills have improved because when we encountered the challenges with finding a supplier, we had to come up alternatives and eventually we managed to solve the problem through guidance and teamwork."

We thank Wafa Balil and Tom Taylor, our Junior Achievement representatives and mentors for their support. We also thank everyone who bought shares and/or purchased a rewinder. Well done to all involved in this program.

Please note the following correction/amendment to the newsletter from last week. This is the correct paragraph for the U.S. universities update:

US University Admissions Update (correction from last week)

The admissions timeline for US universities is quite different from the timeline for Canadian schools. The regular decision US applications were all due in the first week in January; however, whereas Canadian schools send out offers in fits and starts throughout the winter, the US schools make the majority of their offers in the last half of March. We have high hopes that our students will receive offers to their best fit schools, regardless of where they are.

At the same time, our Grade 11s are well into their planning process. Since January, students who are considering applying to US universities have been meeting with Mrs. Becker for Career Ed class. During class, they have been focussing on the differences between Canadian and US schools (recognizing that almost all the students will also apply to Canadian schools), budgeting, and course selection for next year. After Spring Break students will begin making their university application list, create a Common App account and write an application essay.

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If we were to liken this process to a marathon, the Grade 11s are just warming up and the Grade 12s are heading towards the finish line. Both of these are exciting places to be!
