# The Liberal Arts: Their Rightful and Relevant Place in Education

At Southridge we move well beyond developing productive workers, and we don't limit ourselves to preparing children for specific careers pathways or post-secondary programs. We are focused on cultivating engaged citizens who make a difference in the world by exposing our students to multiple thinking frameworks across a spectrum of academic/artistic disciplines that teach them how to adapt confidently, reason intelligently, argue effectively, judge fairly and communicate clearly.

On a daily basis, we have high expectations for our students to be noticeably engaged in their own learning as they actively construct knowledge. All of our teachers strive to design their courses and learning experiences to challenge our students in the ways they think. To be clear, we do not believe thinking simply involves the memorization of facts, or the ability to plug new data into familiar algorithms and/or recognizable formulas. Formulaic thinking has its place and it may provide comfort for leaners, but in our dynamic and ever-changing world it's prescribed approach and mechanical nature simply will not serve people who strive to make a difference. Indeed, methodic and systemic thinking is more prone to have the *exact opposite* effect because it tends to be uninspired and commonplace.

Not so at Southridge where we strive to present relevant and frequent opportunities for our students to think more critically, more creatively and more conceptually than ever before. To do so, we pay close attention to the details surrounding the kinds of higher level analytical questions we ask our students to grapple with and discuss. While we certainly expect our students to recall facts and explain ideas or concepts, we also expect them to use information in new situations, draw connections among ideas, justify a position or decision and produce original work.

To be sure, our students are faced with the demand of work that calls on them to draw connections from different perspectives or dissimilar ways of looking at the world. To do so through a single lens of experience by virtue of concentration in a certain subject discipline is limiting, and that is why Southridge embraces a Kindergarten to Grade 12 liberal arts education inclusive of required courses beyond Ministry of Education requirements in the humanities, the arts, the sciences and math.




While our school recognizes the need to prepare our students for specific post-secondary programs, we are, in reality, even more driven by the mission we have as a community. To educate people who make a difference in the world requires expectations that press against the inherent limitations of preparing children for specific careers pathways or post-secondary programs that often have narrow sets of required courses for entry.

When we rise above the focus on becoming a "fill-in-career-choice-here" and recognize how a liberal arts education helps our children learn how to reason intelligently, argue effectively, judge fairly and communicate clearly it becomes evident how they — and the world — will be the better for it.

## **Junior School News**

#### **Summer Dress Now in Effect**

Summer Dress will be in effect through to Friday, October 5<sup>th</sup>. Please note that white tights are not a part of Summer uniform options. On chilly spring days, students wishing to wear tights should wear black tights with their kilt or tunic. Please ensure that all of your child's uniform items are clearly labelled with their first and last name. Please see the chart below for permitted Summer uniform options.

**Regulation Summer Dress:** worn daily beginning on the Tuesday following Easter Monday through to the Friday before Thanksgiving, as follows:

#### Choice of:

- Green vest
- Green cardigan
- Pullover green sweater
- Navy blazer

#### Choice of:

- Grey dress pants with grey socks (black belt optional)
- Tunic (K- Gr. 3) or kilt (Gr. 4-7) hemmed no higher than 8 cm above the knee with black knee socks or black tights
- Black walking shorts with plain, white, logo-free knee or ankle socks
- Black skort with plain, white, logo-free knee or ankle socks (no lace or frills please)

#### Choice of:

- White, button-down dress shirt
- White, Southridge-crested golf shirt

Please note: The summer shirt may be untucked if the hem is no longer than 8 cm below the waist.

All black, polishable <u>leather</u> shoe with black molded outer sole and no obtrusive logo (heel no higher than 5 cm including sole).

On years such as this, where Spring Break and Easter break are combined, there is a scheduled April Break long weekend. This year, April Break is on Monday, April 23<sup>rd</sup>. #### **Grade 8 Students Visit the University Counselling Centre**

During April and May, Grade 8 Career Ed classes visit the University Counselling Centre, tour through the room to gain an understanding of the services provided and answer a quiz. The intention is not to cause any concern or anxiety over university admissions at this stage, it is all about familiarization with information available and to welcome them to ask questions anytime...there may even be candy for those who venture in to look at the viewbooks, pennants and maps showing where Southridge Alumni have been accepted and where they are studying.

#### **Grade 9 Students: Reminder of University Counselling Services**

One of the tools we use at Southridge to assist students as they research careers and post-secondary programs, is a web-based assessment and information resource called "myBlueprint". Over the past few weeks, Grade 9s have been creating their personal accounts and will be shown the variety of sources and information available on this Canadian-based web site to look at careers and university and college programs. Students will be shown how to invite parents to share in the information. If your student



does not remember this, we will send reminders to families at the start of Grade 10 Career Education in September.

#### **Grade 10 Class Visits & Resume Workshop**

A number of visits have been made by Mrs. Holt and Ms. Livingston over the past 3 months to answer questions about university program admissions requirements and course selections for Grade 11. We also encourage students to plan their Grade 12 year at the same time using a number of resources available to them at the school as well remembering to access the course planning tool on "myBlueprint" to research admissions information for their programs of interest. Ms. Livingston along with other administrators have been sitting in on the Career Presentations for each Grade 10 and will be using the information to plan for Career Info Day and Career Experience Day during LEW 2018.

#### **Grade 11 Career Ed Classes**

The remaining classes for the 2018/19 year concentrate on two important preparations for starting Grade 12 year in a confident and organized manner and ready to respond to application deadlines with the documentation students need to provide the universities. Many universities require supplemental essays, personal profiles, statements, letters of intent and resumes. We have spent the past two cycles helping students with the task of preparing the additional information as it takes practice and polish to get it right. They have had the opportunity to receive feedback from both Mrs. Becker and Ms. Livingston as well as English 11 teachers on this style of essay writing. We have also started Resume Writing Workshops and these are being taught with the same approach to professional resume presentation that is expected for University Co-operative Education Programs. Students are encouraged to research university programs that offer diverse and exciting work-study options through Co-op Programs!

Career Ed classes continue to be divided, with those who are focussing on US colleges meeting once per cycle with Mrs. Becker. All other students have classes with Ms. Livingston.

**Save The Date** - Please note that Grade 11 students and parents are invited to a "Rising Grade 12 Information Night" on Wednesday, June 6<sup>th</sup> in the evening. This will be held in the Great Hall and Ms. Livingston and Mrs. Becker will present on timelines, deadlines and preparation tips for Grade 12 and university and college applications.

#### **Grade 12 Update**

Grads are reminded that although the main timeframe for Canadian university offers occurs mid-March to mid-May, there may continue to be offers up until July. A number of our students have been receiving offers but we have experienced longer decision times from universities such as — Calgary, Waterloo, York and Toronto. Grads are reminded that this is not a personal judgement if a university has not responded yet. Each institution



has its own business model for admissions that has many facets, algorithms and evaluation timelines attached to the decision-making process. Any Grads that are concerned about not having heard from a university are encouraged to speak with Ms. Livingston or Mrs. Becker as we can investigate the status of applications.

In Career Ed classes we are completing the final components of the Graduation Transitions Program (GTP) which is worth 4 credits and is required for graduation. The capstone activity is the Grad Transitions Interview where each Grad is interviewed to discuss their time at Southridge, their accomplishments and achievements and plans for life after high school. The interview is intended to be good practice for a formal interview style and Grads are asked to bring their polished and professional resumes for evaluation. Interviews will take place after AP exams are completed on during the week of May 22<sup>nd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup>. Each year, community representatives as well as Junior School parents from a variety of backgrounds and professions participate as interviewers.

#### **Us University Admissions Update**

We have now reached the conclusion of our American university application process, and we are proud to say it has been a very successful one! This year, we set records, as we had nearly a quarter of the graduating class applying to an American university! The results have been very impressive: our students were offered admission to a number of schools that suit them very well. These include the small but highly regarded Pomona College in California, several offers to the beautiful University of Washington just across the border, opportunities to explore science, technology and engineering at Georgia Tech, Johns Hopkins and Carnegie Mellon, and athletic scholarships to the University of Arizona and James Madison University.

At the same time, our Grade 11s (or Juniors, in American speak) are well into their planning process. Since December, they have been attending separate Planning classes if they indicated interest in attending university down south, and they have been focussing their budgeting, essay writing, and above all, their university searching, on US schools. Now, they are each meeting with Mrs. Becker one-on-one to focus their specific plans, including the wrap-up to their SAT or ACT testing and refining their college list. Many are planning on using the summer for visits or further research in the latter area. We look forward to another successful year with these candidates in 2019.

#### Plans for Next Year - Save The Dates!

Activities for Leadership Experience Week are well underway and once again, Grade 11s and 12s will participate in a Careers and Post-Secondary Information Day on **Monday**, **October 1**st. We will be hosting a variety of professionals to talk about careers. The following day, **Tuesday**, **October 2**nd, all Grade 11s will go to work spend a day exploring their career of interest at a job site.



The US University/College Fair is scheduled for **Thursday, October 13**<sup>th</sup> from noon to 3:00 pm at West Point Grey Academy. We will be transporting interested Grade 10s, 11s and 12s to this event where they will meet with over 100 representatives from US colleges and universities.

In addition to the large fairs, Southridge will be inviting university and college representatives to run admissions workshops and information sessions. These individual visits occur between October 1<sup>st</sup> and November 30<sup>th</sup> and are scheduled at lunch or 3:00 pm.

The safety of students and staff is always a priority and we need to be responsive to our everchanging local community.

You may have noticed a security presence on our campus for a few weeks before spring break. In recognition of the changing surrounding community and the increased busyness of our campus itself, the school instituted a trial with our security company to provide an after-school presence on campus. Southridge will be continuing with having Alphacore Security on our campus from 2:30 to 6:30 pm daily. The primary areas of coverage will be in our parking lots and in the Senior School after 4:00 pm when the senior reception desk closes and the school is open for parent pick up from the After School Clubs program.

We have also taken the opportunity to update the hours that our front gates are open in the evening. The middle exit gate and the Junior School entrance gate will be closing at 6:00 pm. Exit is still available from the middle gate for a right turn northbound on 160<sup>th</sup> by triggering the sensor with your vehicle. The south main entrance/exit gate will remain open until 8:00 pm every evening. This should be ample time for parents to pick up students at the end of the day from various activities. Coaches or staff may set up times when gates are open longer to provide access for events or athletic teams.


