### The Changing Face of Academic Rigor

When you think of a rigorous academic environment, what's the first thing that comes to mind? I would imagine descriptors such as high expectations, challenging course material, attention to detail, a demanding workload and exacting standards are foundational for many people. There is, of course, an element of accuracy to that line of thinking; however, truth be told, there is no clear definition of academic rigor, or even consensus among educators about what it is. On the other hand, there are plenty examples of good intentions gone wrong – even at Southridge.

It should come as no surprise that there are many stereotypes associated with independent schools, especially independent schools that strive to develop an academic environment that prepares students for a post-secondary education. To be sure, “university prep” schools are often considered the most highly rigorous of all independent schools, and for good reason. After all, if the perceived value of a school is to enable its students to gain entrance into reputable post-secondary programs and institutions, it stands to reason that its academic program better be rigorous.

What's interesting to observe, however, is how academic rigor is demonstrated both programmatically and culturally within schools. At Southridge, for example, academic rigor was once demonstrated programmatically by our students sitting two full sets of five examinations (in December and June) every year – beginning in Grade 4. Being a “university prep” school, it was reasoned, the sooner we begin replicating the assessment practices that universities use, the better the chances of success for our students. Culturally, we also believed it was good practice to demonstrate academic rigor by posting student class rankings publicly – beginning, again, in Grade 4.

It didn't take us long to realize that the genesis of our demonstrations of academic rigor had very little to do with what is best for student learning. In fact, the assessment practices we were replicating from universities were based on economics – money and efficiencies. Universities gave very little, if any, consideration to what is best for learners. And those public class rankings? A dangerously erroneous way to motivate.

Admittedly, there remain elements of our practices at Southridge that are based on the commonly held fundamental perceptions of academic rigor. For example, academic prizes and awards based on percentage grades alone that recognize academic achievement as the sole arbitrator of ability may seem rigorous, but I wonder how the

vast majority of our students feel about their own growth and development when they receive the clear public message that they didn't do well enough? Do awards and prizes send the right message?

As with so many ethical dilemmas about what's right (and wrong), the paradigm that underscores our actions and decisions needs careful consideration. Southridge is no less rigorous for having varied assessment practices that no longer require 9-year-old children to write two sets of five exams in an examination hall, or to see their names publicly displayed on a list of who's "smart" and who isn't. To be sure, Southridge is even more rigorous today than it was back in the day.

On a daily basis, we have high expectations for our students to be more demonstrably engaged in their own learning as they actively construct knowledge; our teachers and the design of their courses challenge our students to think more critically, more creatively and more conceptually than ever before; we pay even more attention to the details surrounding the kinds of higher level analytical questions we ask our students to grapple with and discuss; our students are faced with the demand of work that calls on them to form their own opinions and support them with intelligent evidence; and there is an even more overt demonstration of learning as it relates to the implementation of standards based assessment practices.

Certainly, there is a critical paradigm shift in the demonstration of academic rigor – high expectations, the sense of challenge, attention to detail, demanding work and exacting standards. Thankfully, the changing face of academic rigor at Southridge will continue to evolve, and our learning environment will be all the better for it.

## **Summer Session Math Opportunity: Foundations of Math & Pre-Calculus 10**

A number of students have expressed interest in attending a summer session to complete the requirements for FMP 10, which would, if successful, allow them to move into Pre-Calculus 11 in the 2018-19 school year. Students who are contemplating this degree of acceleration are advised that they should have an “A” in their current Math program or have the recommendation of their teacher. The course would also be open to students who have completed FMP 10 but who might wish to improve their understanding of the course content and potentially upgrade their marks.

This course will be delivered through a combination of at home preparation, video lessons, on-line tutorials and on-campus classes. Students can expect to complete 10-12 hours of work at home per week. Students must be available to be in full attendance each day of the course and any student with more than two absences might be required to withdraw.

If you are interested in this opportunity we would need the registration form, together with the authorization to charge your account for the full cost of the program, by Monday, March 12<sup>th</sup>. The course will need a minimum of 9 students in order to run.
