What does it mean to be a "University Prep" school?

Don't all schools in BC prepare students for post-secondary? If you walk into virtually any public high school in Canada, you will, without a doubt, see some similarities. You will see students and teachers, tables, chairs, books, whiteboards, TVs; some schools are better equipped than others, some are in more affluent neighbourhoods while others are in areas more susceptible to poverty, but regardless of all that, students from each and every school in BC and in Canada will go on to some form of post-secondary and from there will enter a career. So what makes a school like Southridge different? Why do we so often say we are a "university prep" school? Aren't all schools, to at least some degree, preparing students for university?

Though it's true that students from every type of school in the country will go on to postsecondary institutions, the real question that we need to ask is, is every student *well prepared* for university? What is the "value-added" that makes Southridge students different and better prepared for the rigours of university? Although I believe there are many answers to these questions, I would like to discuss three.

First, I believe that adolescents today are under enormous pressure. In many cases, this pressure is self-imposed; but other sources of pressure include peers, teachers, parents and family. Students as young as grade 4 or 5 have indicated that they are worried about which university they will get into, how they compare to other students, and what they need to do now to "get ahead." Where are they getting this from? What has happened to childhood? We know that if this attitude is allowed to exacerbate into adolescence, the consequences on the social and emotional wellbeing of students can be catastrophic. A 2017 article in the Globe and Mail exposed that students at Canadian universities feel stressed, overwhelmed, lonely and some have considered suicide in the past year. This study suggests that students who do not enter the post-secondary system as healthy young adults are in grave danger. So one thing we place at the pinnacle of everything we do at Southridge is student care and the main way we do this is through our advisory system.

The advisory system at Southridge puts students from different grades in a small group with one or two teacher-advisors and is designed to ensure that everyone at the school is known and has a trusted adult who they can talk to. We just had Mental Health Week in the Senior School last week, and today we had a speaker from Out In Schools talking to our students about wellness and how kids fit in and can be proud of who they are, and



that our differences make us unique and wonderful. Our strategic plan, that will chart our school's course for the next decade, places students at the centre with a focus on healthy living, wellness and a secure sense of belonging to a community that cares about who each individual is. Academic success and deep learning will, as always, continue to be a priority at Southridge, but the education of the whole person will be a priority.

The second way I believe we prepare our students for success in university is through the way we teach. I was recently speaking with our US university counsellor, Ms. Brenda Becker who last week returned from a southwestern tour of multiple universities in Northern and Southern California. One of the most interesting realizations Ms. Becker made while talking with university representatives from prestigious schools like Stanford, USC, UCLA and Caltech, is that what we are doing in the Senior School with a studentcentered, discussion-based Harkness approach to education is rare, and turns a lot of heads among academics. University admissions reps were, guite frankly, blown away at the prospect of welcoming high school graduates to their campuses who had received an education that centered on sharing ideas and constructing their own understanding in discussion-based, student-centred classrooms. The Harkness Table forces students to come to class prepared, to formulate their own opinions and often defend their position. This is something that most students coming from traditional "stand and deliver" models of education that are so prevalent in North American schools simply do not get enough practice at. This is the main difference you would notice by coming into a Southridge classroom: we do school differently and it shows in our graduates.

A third way we prepare students for university is we have expectations that students will be involved in the arts, service and physical education throughout their time at Southridge. Students need to be well-rounded and balanced. University admissions personnel are stating clearly that they do NOT expect students to load up on AP courses at the expense of being involved in things that they enjoy doing like playing basketball or field hockey, acting in the school play or starting a service initiative because they truly care.

In short, the Harkness Tables at Southridge combined with our approach to student connectedness and wellness through our advisory system and co-curricular expectations may in fact be the best preparation for university that a high school graduate can receive. I am so excited to be launching our strategic plan that will set us up over the next decade to better prepare students for life beyond high school as confident, imaginative, healthy young people ready to make a difference in the world.

With Southridge having attended the previous seventeen years of this tournament, the tradition and opportunities available were tremendous.

After arriving and taking in some sights and sounds from downtown Toronto, the boys set off on their first day of competition with a set of three games. The opening day of the tournament sees the teams placed into pools of four teams, to determine who will advance to either the top or bottom eight in a field of sixteen. Summer Session Math Opportunity: Foundations of Math & Pre-Calculus 10

A number of students have expressed interest in attending a summer session to complete the requirements for FMP 10, which would, if successful, allow them to move into Pre-Calculus 11 in the 2018-19 school year. Students who are contemplating this degree of acceleration are advised that they should have an "A" in their current Math program or have the recommendation of their teacher. The course would also be open to students who have completed FMP 10 but who might wish to improve their understanding of the course content and potentially upgrade their marks.

This course will be delivered through a combination of at home preparation, video lessons, on-line tutorials and on-campus classes. Students can expect to complete 10-12 hours of work at home per week. Students must be available to be in full attendance each day of the course and any student with more than two absences might be required to withdraw.

The course will need a minimum of 9 students in order to run.

Course Selections for 2018-2019

In the next few weeks I will be talking to students about their course selection options for the next academic year. There are limited choices for students currently in Grade 8, but an increasing range of elective courses as students move into the senior grades. I will be speaking to the Grade 8 and 9 students during period 1 on Tuesday, January 30th and to the Grade 10s during period 1 the following day, Wednesday, January 31st. Ms. Livingston, Ms. Becker and I will join forces to speak to the Grade 11s during period 1 on Tuesday, February 6th.

Students will also be given course selection sheets in their planning classes to complete prior to entering their selections into Naviance – the data base system that we use to record and manage their choices. The course selection sheets are attached here for your convenience to allow you to discuss the various options with your children. The closing date for students to enter their choices on Naviance is Monday, March 5th.

We will also be holding an information evening on <u>Thursday, February 15th</u> in the Junior School Great Hall from 7:00 – 9:00 pm. The first part of the evening will cover a brief outline of the major changes that the Ministry is introducing to the graduation program and a review of the course options for students entering Grades 9-12 in September 2018 (our current Grade 8-11 students). Ms. Livingston will outline entry requirements and procedures for post-secondary study at Canadian and UK Universities and Ms. Becker will speak to the requirements and procedures for applications to US schools. The Curriculum Guide for 2018-2019 will also be posted on the Southridge website from February 15th and hard copies will be available at the evening information session.

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I would encourage all students to talk to their peers, teachers, parents and counsellors, gaining as much knowledge as they can in order to make informed choices as they move forward with their academic goals. I think it is also important to stress that students should follow those courses in which they have a genuine interest or passion, remembering that excellence usually comes from engagement and commitment.

- ¹ In order to enroll in Chemistry 11 Honours or AP Physics 1 students must achieve 86+% in Math 10 and 86+% in Science 10 and permission from the Curriculum Leader. Chemistry 11 Honours is required for AP Chemistry. AP Physics 1 is required for AP Physics 2. Biology 11 Honours is required for AP Biology.
- ² Students who select Biology 11 Honours or Biology 12 in grade 11 must have 86% in Science 10.
- ³ English 11 (AP) requires 90% in English 10 and recommendation by the instructor.
- ⁴Art Foundations 11 is a prerequisite for Art Foundations 12.
- ⁵ Media Arts 11 is a cross-disciplinary course that meets the requirements for both Arts and Applied Skills. Media Arts 11 is a pre-requisite for Media Arts 12.
- ⁶ Students enrolled in Theatre Company 11 are expected to perform in the major Senior School production
- ⁷ Information Technology 11 is a prerequisite for Information Technology 12 unless previous computer proficiency can be demonstrated to and accepted by the instructor.


