What's the New Sign at Southridge?

The short answer is that the new sign is a designation that certain washrooms on our campus are for everyone's use. On the one hand, this seems like an innocuous position to bring forward, but, on the other hand, it is a sign that our school is open to, and accepting of, the multiplicity of ways that people identify with and express their gender. This change, along with the changes we've made to our uniform choices, are recent steps we've taken to support the Board's approval of the school's Sexual Orientation and Gender Identify (SOGI) Policy.

The topics of sexual orientation and gender identity are not simply trends in our society, nor are they politically correct ways to position our school as progressive and *au current* with topical issues and considerations. Rather, they are reflective of our school's

collective and ongoing efforts to create an environment where students feel safe to express their sexual orientation and gender identity in ways that are in alignment with who they are as individuals.

To be sure, "gender identity or expression" are among the protected grounds covered by the BC Human Rights Code, and topics related to gender and self-identity are included in the provincial curriculum for knowledge, as well as to help students understand and respect diversity. What's more, studies show



that having SOGI-specific anti-bullying policies improves the school climate for LGBTQ and heterosexual students alike, reducing discrimination, suicidal ideation and suicide attempts for all students. As a matter of fact, as of December 31, 2016, all BC school districts and independent schools have been required to include specific references to sexual orientation and gender identity in their anti-bullying policies.

In response to the Ministry of Education's expectations, Southridge has amended its existing policies to be in alignment, and, as noted above, our Board of Governors has approved a SOGI-specific policy. I am happy and proud to report that a team of teachers, students, administrators and educational leaders come together as a committee on a regular basis to ensure that our actions as a school are not only in keeping with the sentiment of our SOGI Policy, but are also, more importantly, elevating our community's shared perspective of what it means to be a safe, welcoming and inclusive environment for everyone.

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In all, we will designate 6 washrooms as gender neutral, 2 for staff only and 4 for everyone. In the Junior School, the current male staff washroom by the music room (room 123) and the washroom outside our Grade 4 classroom (room 237) will be for everyone's use. In the Senior School, the two washrooms along the main hallway outside the physics lab will be for staff only, and the two located upstairs across the breezeway by the entrance to the fitness room will be for everyone.

So, what, exactly, is the new sign at Southridge? It's really not a new sign at all; rather, it is a testament to the value of respect that we have always held in such high regard in our community.

I joined Southridge Model UN in Grade 9 as a way for me to learn more about politics and to discuss all kinds of global issues. Being in MUN, my knowledge of the world has



expanded, I was able to meet a lot of talented people outside of school. At ConnectMUN, I was the Chair for DISEC, a committee consisting of 80% first time delegates. That being said, I had to review the Rules of Procedure more carefully, become more approachable, and try harder to create the happy and light hearted environment for those who are new to Model UN. Being a staff at ConnectMUN was an honour and a pleasure. I had the opportunity to work with a talented director who taught me a lot about staffing as well as meeting the Dais of other committees who also helped me to give my committee a good laugh. Grade 12 can be an anxious time for both students and their parents. Ms. Livingston, Ms. Becker and I have been talking to our grade 12 students to advise them of the best procedure for ensuring that their marks are reported in an accurate and timely manner. The criteria and deadlines for applying to different institutions and programs have become much more varied and complex, as institutions vie for the very best students, and we need to help our students advocate for themselves in an appropriate manner. To this end I have clarified what is, and is not, appropriate in discussing marks with their teachers. Students should not approach teachers directly for additional marks, or ask for extra assignments to generate better marks. They can, and should, ask for help in developing their skills and understanding, attend additional tutorials, work with a peer tutor – all of which may lead to the desired improvement in performance.

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I have advised students that if they need to advocate for an increased mark – they are just shy of an average for a competitive program or a major scholarship for example then the correct pathway would be to go directly to Ms. Livingston, Ms. Becker or myself. Similarly, we would ask that parents follow the same procedure and approach the University Counsellors with any specific requests or concerns. We can then discuss the most appropriate course of action and approach the teachers concerned. Please be assured that, though we must maintain our integrity as an academic institution, we will always work for the optimum benefit of all our students.



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
