The Death of Lecture

Three weeks ago I traveled to Winnipeg for the annual conference for Heads of School and Board Chairs facilitated by the Canadian Accredited Independent Schools (CAIS). There were many excellent sessions spanning topics related to educational innovation, leadership succession planning, generational and demographic trends, financial sustainability and the changing landscape of teaching and learning – to name a few.

One of the panel discussions at the conference included a post-secondary perspective offered by Ken Steele, who is a well know and reputable voice across numerous college and university campuses throughout North America. Dr. Steele is a reliable source of information on social trends, student attitudes and perceptions, institutional branding, enrolment management and innovations in teaching and learning.

As a school with a strong orientation toward preparing students for post-secondary education, I have often heard concerns expressed by Southridge parents over the years as our school has continued to evolve as a leader in teaching and learning. This has been the case ever since we first embarked on the pathway of continuous whole school improvement 15 years ago – from the implementation of the International Baccalaureate in the Junior School, to the development of our educational program and implementation of the Harkness philosophy in the Senior School, to the way we assess and report student learning throughout our entire school. An underlying fear many parents share is that the changes we make at Southridge will negatively impact their children's chances of gaining entrance to university.

Fortunately for all of us, post-secondary places of learning are changing. Of particular interest is the perspective that Ken Steele offers in his video called "The Death of Lecture" (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=yW_3asg92zM&feature=youtu.be&list=PLodJ8ParJmYUtit18fzPY0N_gj3UEJ-8N). I hope you are able to take ten minutes to watch the video, but in case you don't have the time, let me ask you this question, "Would you allow a health care provider to attend to your child if the provider, despite research to the contrary, continues to use centuries-old techniques and procedures that are known to be both harmful and toxic?"

At Southridge, even though we are preparing our students to reach their full potential now and in the future, if we define the future as a post-secondary environment, which, by the way, is governed by economic forces that drive the need for 300-plus-student

undergraduate lectures and related efficiencies in assessment practices (i.e. multiple choice exams and the like) then we are doing a huge disservice to your children.

Southridge is charting its pathway forward strategically based on research and current relevant educational experience. We are purposeful in our forward-think approach to school development and excited to be in a school environment that has in its DNA a thirst for constant and relentless improvement.

Winter Weather and Our Parking Lot

As the weather gets colder and the rain (and snow) begins to fall with consistency, the summer-like driving conditions we've enjoyed for so long this year have come to an end. As such, please be aware that when you come onto campus you will need to be extra vigilant in the coming months. Please drive more slowly than you may otherwise drive in a parking lot, look even more carefully for students who may not be immediately visible and plan to arrive a few minutes earlier than usual so that you do not feel the need to rush. Thank you for your cooperation and your extra care when negotiating the winter driving conditions in our parking lot.

Remembrance Day Assembly on Friday November 10

Our full school Remembrance Day Assembly for Grades 3 through 12 will take place on Friday morning at 10:15 am. Remembrance Day is an important subject for Canadians because it marks the anniversary of the official end of World War I – November 11, 1918. At Southridge, we are proud of our tradition of gathering as a school community to pay tribute to the many Canadians who have served our country in armed conflicts and peace keeping missions.

I would like to invite parents and grandparents to join us at Southridge for our Remembrance Day Ceremony. Our program will include student readings and performances (concert band, brass ensemble, choirs, bagpipes and trumpet), and our school community will pause during our assembly for 2 minutes of silence at about 11:00 o'clock, in keeping with the traditional practice of thoughtful remembrance.

We hope you will be able to join us in the Senior School gymnasium on Friday morning. I would like to remind you that our students will be entering the gym in silence as they assemble. Please also keep in mind that we will not applaud or recognize our performers and speakers during the program.

Junior School News

Remembrance Day Ceremonies, Friday, November 10th

On Friday, November 10th our community will take pause to remember and honour those who have and continue to pave the path of freedom in our country and world. Grade 3-7 students will attend the full school Remembrance Day assembly in our Senior School gym from 10:15-11:15 a.m. K-2 students will have their own age-appropriate ceremony in the Junior School Great Hall from 10:45 a.m. -11:15 a.m.

Remembrance Day Observance- Monday, November 13th

In lieu of the Remembrance Day Statutory Observance on Saturday, November 11th, the school will be closed on Monday, November 13th. School will resume on Tuesday, November 14th at 8:00 a.m. (no late start).

Changing Weather - Be Prepared

The fall chill is increasingly becoming consistent as is unpredictable weather, such as rain and wind. Please ensure that your child has weather appropriate outerwear for cooler and wetter weather at school. At minimum, all students in Kindergarten through Grade 7 should have a coat that will keep them warm and dry. Children need fresh air in their day and should be prepared for outdoor play every day, even in inclement weather.

Student Absences

If your child will be missing school for any reason, please ensure that you email the school at attendance@southridge.bc.ca (and cc your child's home room teachers). This helps to save a lot of time in the morning trying to locate students that are not accounted for when attendance is taken.

If your child will be absent for unexcused reasons (e.g. extended family travel or special events) please be reminded that an email must also be sent specifically to Mrs. de Hoog (tdehoog@southridge.bc.ca) indicating the dates and reason for the absence. Please also note that teachers are not expected to provide missed work for students who are absent for unexcused reasons as many aspects of our program cannot be replicated outside of the classroom. For more information please see Section 3.1-3.3 (p. 15) in the Family Handbook.

Parking Lot Safety for Pedestrians and Drivers

Please be reminded that all adults, whether walking or driving, must put the safety of children first when in the parking lot at drop off and pick up times. This means that pedestrians need to use designated crosswalks to cross the drive way and that drivers must be vigilant about watching for pedestrians.

With increasing darkness and wetness, visibility of pedestrians does become more of a concern. If adults are modeling cross at the cross walks, this will help to ensure that drivers are able to see parents and children crossing. When adults model unsafe behaviours (such as crossing into traffic at random spots), children come to believe that those behaviours are actually safe, and this puts them at risk. Please slow down and be aware.

Grade 7 Girls Volleyball Team Take Bronze at ISEA Championships



The Grade 7 girls volleyball team travelled to Crofton House on Friday, Nov. 3rd to play in the ISEA Volleyball Championships. The team finished the regular season with a 4-2 record ranking them 4th coming into the tournament. In the first game, Southridge faced #5 Collingwood and swept them 2 straight games and with the victory put us up against #1 ranked WPGA. It was a battle from start to finish with Southridge winning in the 3rd game 15-12 to advance to the semi-finals. We then played a strong York House and were defeated 2-0. The tournament was a double knockout so with the loss we had to once

again face WPGA to play for gold. We played hard but in the end lost to the eventual champions WPGA and took the bronze medal. Great season girls!!!

Grade 3's Realize Where There's a Wheel, There's a Way

At any age, the idea of perspective can be a challenging one. How can you truly understand what someone is going through unless you have the opportunity to try it?

Fortunately, the Grade 3's were able to do just that, wheel a mile in someone else's shoes. The Grade 3's first unit of inquiry was about how your attitude, either positive or negative, can transform the circumstance or challenge you face.

After researching famous people who faced challenges and overcame them to the greatest extent, Terry Fox for example, our students could explain that attitudes can have a great effect on the outcome of a challenge. However, did they truly understand the perspective of someone who faced a challenge? Ms. Fera decided the best opportunity was to invite the Wheelchair Basketball Society to come in and provide an insight into wheelchair athletics.

Tanner and Orion spent the day with the students coaching them on how to use a wheelchair, navigate through a gym and play sports. Afterwards, the students wheeled throughout the Junior School completing an accessibility audit created by the Rick Hansen Foundation.

At first, the students thought it was lots of fun playing handball for two whole periods! This shortly wore off when students realized that they couldn't fit through many doorways, needed assistance to drink water, and couldn't easily move out of the way in the busy halls.

This shifted their understanding to a whole new level, and the students were truly able to gain perspective on the many circumstances that people with disabilities have. This was also the perfect transition into our new unit of inquiry about how innovations, such as the wheelchair, can develop communities. Without the hard work of Tanner, Orion and Ms. Fera, our students might not have truly understood that if there is a wheel, there is a way.

This data has given us considerable insight into the strengths and weaknesses of student writing at each grade level and has provided invaluable professional development for the department. It has also helped to ensure standardized scoring and a collective approach to improving student writing.

This year, the focus will be on the grade 8 cohort alone, in order to further our understanding of the skills, abilities, and needs of this incoming group of students. Our desire is to help all learners maximize their potential and feel supported in their individual development in written expression as they enter the high school environment. As teachers we know how vital foundational writing and reading comprehension skills are to success at the high school and post-secondary level. The intent is to use the data from the student responses to facilitate individual growth and to provide targeted instruction in those areas where students require it.

Therefore, only Grade 8 students will write in their first period class on Wednesday, November 15th and grades 9-12 will attend their regularly scheduled classes.

Accelerated Reader: An Overview

As the deadline for Senior School students to meet their first term Accelerated Reader goals is fast approaching, and those new to the program might have some questions, a brief Q and A is provided below. Hopefully it will help those of you unfamiliar with Accelerated Reader, and will refresh those of you more acquainted with the program.

What is Accelerated Reader?

Accelerated Reader (AR) is a program that determines students' individual reading levels based on their reading comprehension and assigns them a points-based goal (students can view their goal and progress by logging into the AR program). The purpose of the initial test (called the Star Reader test) is purely a gauge to help determine that students are reading at a level with which they are comfortable. Books are evaluated based on their reading level and assigned corresponding points. Once a student has read a particular AR book he or she can take an online comprehension quiz with his or her English teacher in order to be awarded points towards the goal.

Why do Accelerated Reader?

The idea of AR is to foster an ongoing love of reading by encouraging more reluctant readers in addition to challenging those already engaged in regular reading. Students are typically assigned goals that, while manageable, should be slightly challenging in order to develop their literacy skills. There is clear evidence to support the ongoing academic benefits of reading proficiency at all stages of scholastic instruction and this program aims to improve literacy in order to best equip our students for every stage of their education.

How do students find AR books?

Books in the library have an AR sticker on the spine as well as a sticker on the inside cover detailing the reading level and points value of the book. The majority of the fiction and quite a few of the non-fiction titles are designated as AR, so students have a wealth of choice. English classes are also encouraged to engage in book talk presentations in the library. And while in the library, talking to the Teacher-Librarian and looking at some of the genre-specific displays can also help students to choose an AR book they'll love.

Do all students do AR?

In the Senior School, students in grades 8 and 9 work towards their individual point goal, while the grade 10 students read one book per term based on a pre-selected list of AR books.

When are the AR quiz deadlines for Senior School students?

- First term: November 15
- Second term: February 21
- Third term: May 30

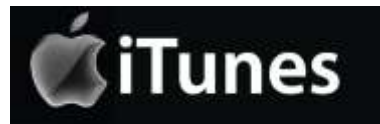
