## What is Success?

This was the question I asked the Senior School Faculty in early September at our first meeting prior to the opening of the school year. I asked teachers to consider their definition for true student success from three perspectives: from their own perspective as teachers, from the perspective of Southridge School as an institution, and from the perspective of students.

The common answers that emerged when considering student success from a teacher's perspective, in other words, if we are truly successful at what we do, our graduates will look like this: ideally they will be (as our mission statement declares) people who make a difference in the world, they will be intellectually curious, be individuals who are inspired to be great people and do great things and who will be an inspiration to others. They would be people of character and integrity, who are connected to the staff and faculty and would hopefully maintain strong ties to this community. Graduates would be happy, well-adjusted individuals with a growth mindset.

When the faculty considered how Southridge School as an institution would define success, the discussion focused on our mission statement, the development of character, and that our community be a safe place for all where trust and caring are paramount. Southridge graduates would be young adults who are well-prepared for life beyond Southridge along whatever paths they might choose.

Putting themselves in the shoes of students, the conversation seemed to shift a bit. Certainly, students would be concerned with all of the ideas listed above, but when discussing the top descriptors of success that faculty felt students would come up with, if they were being really honest, a truly successful experience as far as students are concerned would include getting into a good university, achieving high marks, being happy, good peer relationships, life preparation and achieving balance. How close was our faculty? Are teachers hitting the most important aspects of what it means for students to be successful? This might be a good discussion for around the dinner table!

One of the central focuses of the new curriculum recently introduced by the Ministry of Education, is a challenge to educators to help students understand that ultimately student learning and understanding is far more important than grades. As a faculty, we will be looking at ways we can ensure our students are leaving Southridge as graduates with a



deep understanding of curriculum as well as an understanding of crucial life skills such as the ability to think critically and creatively, to solve problems in both familiar and unfamiliar settings, to be socially aware and responsible, to be positive and responsible digital citizens, collaborative, organized and kind with an awareness of self-care and personal wellness.

On Wednesday, November 29 from 7:00 - 8:30 pm we will be welcoming Terry Small to Southridge as he speaks to parents and students about the keys to successful learning. Terry Small has spoken to over a quarter of a million people on the brain and learning, leadership, and health and wellness. Please join us on November 29th at 7:00 p.m. in the Alan Brown Great Hall as Terry Small speaks and helps us gain a better understanding of how the teenage brain works and how true success can be attained.

## Service Update from the Senior School!

In September, our students resumed our weekly lunch services with the Surrey Urban Mission. This is our tenth year in partnership with the soup kitchen. Our students have been making some delicious soups and sandwiches for their weekly visits, including some recipes that have used vegetables from our very own community garden!

This year's Terry Fox run was a huge success in late September. The Senior School raised over \$1200 in casual day donations that were sent to the Terry Fox Foundation.

October has seen some great service activities as well. During Leadership Experience Week, our Grade 10 students spent the week focused on service in the local community. The week started with a wonderful Keynote address from humanitarian hero Ravi Singh, the founder and CEO of Khalsa Aid. Mr. Singh and his organization travel to war torn regions and disaster zones around the world to deliver aid and compassion to those in need. His message to our students was inspirational and motivational, and seemed to keep them focused and committed to the week. During the week of service, we had students volunteering all over the Lower Mainland, including: the South Surrey Bike Park, the Nicomekl Enhancement Society, Semiahmoo House, The Residence at Morgan Heights (senior's home), and at the Orphaned Wildlife Rehabilitation Society, to name a few. The week ended with our students hosting a dance-filled, food-fueled party for our friends from Semiahmoo House, which was a lot of fun for everyone!

This month, our students have turned their attention to raising money and nonperishable donations for the Surrey Food Bank. We have directed October's casual day donations to the food bank, and we have also been collecting food and household items through our 'Halloween for Hunger' house competition. At the time of this writing, Lightning is in the lead in terms of the number of donations made (largely thanks to the trunk-load of diapers and formula that Mr. Knihniski made last week). That said, all houses have boxes overflowing with donations, and when combined with the donations in the Junior School, we'll be able to make an enormous impact at an important time of year.

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# **BC** Ministry of Education: Rethinking and re-assessing what students need from schools



For the past few years, educators in both the public and private sectors have been working on fundamental changes to our approaches to learning and to the tenets that underpin our understanding of what a "good" education is. The growth in our knowledge of how the brain functions, our increasing awareness of the variety of ways in which we learn and develop, and the sweeping changes brought by the advances in technology over the past decade since 2007, when the first iPhone came onto the market, have made change both desirable and inevitable.



The BC Ministry of Education, responding to the need for educational change and the development of children's divergent aptitudes and abilities, have made substantive changes to the curriculum and to assessment, laying a foundation that emphasizes the need for 'deep' understanding and 'big' ideas over rote learning and memorization. They have also introduced core competencies, which, combined with numeracy and literacy, are central to the redesigned curriculum. These competencies are: communication, creative thinking, critical thinking, personal and cultural identity, personal awareness and responsibility, and social responsibility.

Our own Southridge School Education Program (SSEP) is clearly aligned with the development of these competencies, and we have embraced measured and meaningful change, providing our students with the tools to grow and prosper in a complex, diverse, and technologically rich world. To comply with the Ministry's new directives, students are being asked to reflect and report on their own development. Our students will be required to do this at the end of this first term This calls for critical self-reflection and we will be working with our students to make these competencies visible and understandable; to help students learn how they can better identify their strengths and skills and to meet challenges and struggles with a positive 'growth mindset'.

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"Core competencies are sets of intellectual, personal, social and emotional proficiencies that all students need to develop in order to engage in deep learning and life-long learning". (BC Ministry website)

I think we can all agree that we want an education for our children that seeks to develop the whole individual for, as parents and guardians, we know how much more our children are than the sum of their test scores and report cards.
