Screenagers

Last Thursday the school presented a screening of the documentary film, *Screenagers*. *Screenagers* emerged from the personal struggles that Dr. Delaney Ruston was having parenting two teenaged children who were increasingly spending their time with screen based activities, both at home and at school. While watching her own children become consumed with their screens, she began to make connections to her work as a physician and wondered about the impact that all this screen time is having on children's development. In the film, a startling statistic was shared - the average teenager spends 6.5 hours in front of some sort of screen during their after school hours. This includes on computers, gaming systems, television, and personal devices, such as smart phones. (This is on top of any screen time they may have at school.) In her role as both a mother and research-driven physician, Ruston pursued three questions related to screen time:

1. What does science teach us about teaching self-control?
2. How can we best encourage young people to find their own ways to achieve balance?
3. What limits and rules are reasonable, and how do we implement them?

Towards the end of the film, after telling her own story as well as the stories of several other families and their struggles with screens, the focus shifted to the role that adults play in guiding and modeling healthy screen habits for young people. I must admit, this part of the film made me feel uncomfortable. Since watching it, I've had a heightened awareness of my own use of technology. I've been wondering why I use it the way I do, and have also been noticing that the constant presence of my own devices impacts my connections with other people, and not necessarily in positive ways. It's one thing to connect with others on line; however, when those connections come at the expense of the very people that are right in front of us, a boundary needs to be re-established and a little more self-control needs to be practiced. Even as adults, we struggle with the dominance of screen time in our lives, all the while our children are watching and taking cues.

In the film, author Peggy Ornstein is quoted as saying, "*Our kids need us. They need us to set boundaries. They need know we care about all aspects of their lives through our influence. We have to think about everywhere that kids are in the real world and how we*

can educate them in those spaces. We can't just say it's on the school, it's on the parents. We have to do this as a community." This particular statement is quite a powerful one, and what stands out for me is that two of our Southridge guiding principles are mentioned in her statement - influence and community.

Screens and technology are very much a part of our world; however, it is up to the people within a community to choose how screens will influence behaviours and relationships. Technology does not control us; we control how we engage with and use of technology.

As a school, we are exploring many of the issues raised in the film, and we know you as parents are too. As our guiding principle of influence challenges us - "*we act knowing our children are watching. Our behaviour influences all; every member is a role model for everyone in the school community and society.*" The best way forward is to work together in community so that the influence that we have as the role models in our children's lives is one that is positive and powerful.

Reflections On A Career Experience 2017!

On Tuesday, October 3rd, the Grade 11s were given a special opportunity to spend a day exploring a career of interest. Arrangements were made for groups of students to go to a workplace. This year's nine placements were exceptionally wonderful and provided rich learning opportunities. We are very grateful to all of our hosts companies and organizations:

1. Surrey Provincial Law Courts for careers in legal services and law
2. Safe Software for careers in business/technology/marketing/human resources
3. Dialog Design for careers in Architecture design and engineering and interior design
4. Fraser Animal Hospital for careers in veterinary medicine
5. City of Vancouver – Landfill Operations for careers in environmental engineering
6. The Djavad Mowafaghian Centre for Brain Health for careers in medicine
7. CBC Vancouver Studios for careers in journalism and media
8. Cascade Aerospace Engineering for careers in aerospace and mechanical engineering
9. Coast Capital, Grandview Corners for careers in finance and banking

A key part of getting the most out of the day's experience for each student was the research they did prior to the visit using on-line resources given to them in Career Education classes i.e. Naviance and Career Cruising. On the day, they were challenged to ask questions and reflect on what they learned about the work site they visited.

“Career day on Monday and Tuesday helped me realize what I want to pursue as a career, and that would be media. Besides media, I learned many things, from how to start a business, to the different types of interior designers there were. All of this helped me confirm my goals of working in film. The speaker that really impacted this decision was Leah Bolton from JoyTV. She brought in some of her equipment and we got to use it and film an interview. Leah also showed us some of her interviews and videos that she’s done. It was all so cool and I hope I can do that one day. I took the CBC tour as a media class field trip last year, and did the same tour this year for career day. It was so inspirational to go back to the studio and see it again.”

“During our visit we got to observe many things in the Veterinarian Hospital. We watched a cat and dog get prepared for surgery by the veterinarian technicians; they were given an IV drip, heart monitor and were sedated before the surgery. We then watched Dr. Mitchel remove lumps from a golden retriever and spay a cat from the shelter. We also observed other small things, like x-rays, dentals, and swabs. While we were waiting for Dr. Mitchel, we also got to play with the vet technicians’ dogs, which was an added bonus”

“The entire tour was very good and allowed me to understand the inner workings within the brain. Everyone that we met was very friendly and passionate about what they do. One thing that I especially liked during the tour was the rat brain studies area. It allowed me to understand the complexity of even a rat’s brain as it is very similar to a human’s

brain. Furthermore, it was interesting that a rat can weigh the risk and rewards of gambling for treats and how some may have better odds, but less rewards."

"During this visit, we saw 3 different locations in the Centre for Brain Research; the pathology lab where samples of DNA are kept for future tests, the area where MRI scans of brains affected by MS are studied and interpreted, and, finally, an area where PHD students were conducting research on rats, testing to see if they were prone to gambling addiction like humans are. Then, we had a tour of the artwork of Cajal, a 19th century scientist who created amazingly accurate drawings of the inner systems of the human body, such as neuron synapses, using the microscopes of the time. Finally, I went for a tour of UBC which I thoroughly enjoyed."

"I loved the trip! I love science, research, and art so the day was perfect in my eyes. In terms of it being the experience day for medicine, yes we weren't in a hospital or clinical setting (for obvious reasons) but I liked seeing the university side of medicine since that is what lies closer for me."

"I visited the DNA Bank in the Brain Research Centre. A large number of DNA samples are stored there, which they keep chilled to -80 in large refrigerators. I learned that these DNA samples are extremely precious, and how many other universities and organizations occasionally borrow some samples. Secondly, we visited the offices of the MS research team, where we learned all about MRI's, CT scans, as well as the symptoms and causes of MS. An interesting fact is that individuals who are from the Northern countries (Canada, Russia, etc) are more likely to obtain this disease, where your immune system gets corrupted, and starts attacking the insulating membranes that protect the vital parts of the brain. Without the "insulation", the brain starts gradually losing functions, such as sight, memory, and/or movement. Finally, we visited the Belkin Art Gallery, which currently had a temporary exhibition featuring the works of a Spanish neuro-biology artist, who drew extremely accurate drawings of the internal workings of his brain, which were way ahead and advanced for his time period (mid 1800's)."

Surrey Provincial Court

"We went to Surrey Court to watch trials, which...ended up being highly rewarding. We got to talk to a lawyer and the head of the surrey gang police unit which was great. We also got to go court watching which was my favorite part because we had the chance to see some very intense trials. I met a crown prosecutor who talked about the Surrey Six and how he was able to work on the case."

“I got to meet a variety of people working in the fields relating to architecture including an amazing interior designer, senior architect, intern architect, and an urban planner. They sat us down in the main open area of their office and gave us a short mini presentation on what their job looks like day to day. After we had mini discussions and asked questions. Each person had something unique to share and provided us with valuable information. They gave us an inside scoop on projects through blueprints, computerized designs and hand-drawings. We even got see a 3-D printer and the techniques involved when using it in the work place.”

“I absolutely loved how I got to meet and talk to a variety of people in the field of architecture and get a deeper look at what a daily routine looks like for someone in this field. Before going into the visit, I was uneasy and unsure on what specific field relating to architecture I wanted to go into to. After my visit, I got a pretty clear idea on which fields I like and don't like. “

“It was a very eye-opening and meaningful trip. I had the chance to visit this essential part of the city. With the development of economy and industrial technology, environmental protection becomes an important topic where everyone pays close attention to. The visit made me appreciate more those who put dedication into making our city “greener”. “

“... my visit to Vancouver landfill enriched my knowledge and prompted me to reflect deeply on my future careers. I believe when people are considering their paths in the future, often times they would crowd on those “popular” and well-known jobs thus unfortunately neglecting many other opportunities that would probably provide more benefit to the society. If in the future I am an entrepreneur and starting my own ventures, I will definitely put an emphasis on Corporate Social Responsibility. The business is the most meaningful if it serves the general public well and has a beneficial impact on environment and society.”

“We toured the bank branch and saw many things I personally haven’t seen before such as the vaults, the back of the ATMs, cash machines, and the offices. We also found out a lot about what each person does there, what their job entails on a daily basis, etc. We also learned a lot of the extra training you go through, education requirements and protocols if a robbery occurs.”

“The employees explained what their financial institution does, which is lending out mortgages, doing investments and keeping money. We learned about how investment funds work on a fundamental level, and the difference between a credit union and a bank.”

“Getting to see the hangar was really cool, and the entire explanation of the facility and work they do was good as well. I learnt a lot about their lifestyles, wages, and work they do, as well what they have to do to get to their positions. We had a tour of the facility in Abbotsford, all while our guide taught us about the process in which the company’s employees fix aircraft that the government and business commission them to repair. She took us to the office spaces and showed us the engineering workspaces, and we also got to tour the main hangar where the mechanics physically repair the planes. We also got to tour the inside of a C-150 Military plane, so that was good.”

BC Ministry of Education: Rethinking and Re-assessing what students need from schools.



For the past few years, educators in both the public and private sectors have been working on fundamental changes to our approaches to learning and to the tenets that underpin our understanding of what a “good” education is. The growth in our

knowledge of how the brain functions, our increasing awareness of the variety of ways in which we learn and develop, and the sweeping changes brought by the advances in technology over the past decade since 2007, when the first iPhone came onto the market, have made change both desirable and inevitable.



The BC Ministry of Education, responding to the need for educational change and the development of children's divergent aptitudes and abilities, have made substantive changes to the curriculum and to assessment, laying a foundation that emphasizes the need for 'deep' understanding and 'big' ideas over rote learning and memorization. They have also introduced core competencies, which, combined with numeracy and literacy, are central to the redesigned curriculum. These competencies are: communication, creative thinking, critical thinking, personal and cultural identity, personal awareness and responsibility, and social responsibility.

Our own Southridge School Education Program (SSEP) is clearly aligned with the development of these competencies, and we have embraced measured and meaningful change, providing our students with the tools to grow and prosper in a complex, diverse, and technologically rich world. To comply with the Ministry's new directives, students are being asked to reflect and report on their own development. Our students will be required to do this at the end of this first term. This calls for critical self-reflection and we will be working with our students to make these competencies visible and understandable; to help students learn how they can better identify their strengths and skills and to meet challenges and struggles with a positive 'growth mindset'.

"Core competencies are sets of intellectual, personal, social and emotional proficiencies that all students need to develop in order to engage in deep learning and life-long learning". (BC Ministry website)

I think we can all agree that we want an education for our children that seeks to develop the whole individual for, as parents and guardians, we know how much more our children are than the sum of their test scores and report cards.
