Where's Waldo?

Apparently, there is a massive shortage of empathy in students these days. According to sociology researchers at the University of Michigan, young people are approximately 40 percent less empathetic than they were ten years ago. Dr. William Axinn, the Director of the Population Study Centre, says that this most concerning result has prompted us to ask why kids, who are more connected than ever, find it so difficult to feel compassion toward one another.

While I don't know the answer to this (although I have my suspicions) the good news is that I do know that empathy is alive and well at Southridge.

Last February we conducted our usual set of Kindergarten observation days. They are lots of fun, but let's be clear, finding great kids in a sea of wonderful four year old's is like looking at the cereal box and trying to locate Waldo. Despite his funny hat and striped shirt he doesn't always stand out that well.

Anyhow, on this particular day, we were just heading to the gym with our last group of little ones when I heard someone call my name. I turned around to see one of our Grade 7 boys running after me, with a treasure in hand - let's call him "Waldo" for the purposes of this story.

"Excuse me, Ms. Lepp." said Waldo breathlessly. "My class had a party today and we ended up with a lot of extra treats, so I was just wondering if you might like to have these to give to the Kindies who are visiting us?" He proceeded to hand me two large boxes of Tim-bits and continued, "I still remember the first time I came to Southridge for my test. I was really nervous because I didn't know anyone – so I thought, maybe a Tim-bit might be good if someone was feeling scared like I did." I assured him that it would and thanked him for his kindness.

I tell you this story to underscore that we hope all of our kids will develop their "inner Waldo" during their time at Southridge. Waldo is a leader. Not because he has a charismatic personality, gets straight A's, wins the speech contest, or is selected captain of the soccer team. Waldo is a leader because he has developed the "empathy gene" - the ability to stand in another's shoes, even someone he doesn't know. I am absolutely



confident this character trait will make him successful in ways that a degree and money will not. I am also sure that this trait is developed first in a home that models and highly values it.

I've thought about Waldo many times since that day. They say we are the average of the five people we spend the most time with. Waldo is the type of person I want in my five. Waldo is the type of person you should want for a friend, a son-in-law or an employee. I hope that as we head into Open House season you will invite a "Waldo" you know to come and consider joining us... I'm always on the look-out for one more.

Changeover to Winter Uniform is Coming

The last day for students to wear Summer Uniform is Friday, October 6th. All students begin wearing Winter Uniform on Tuesday, October 10th. Winter Uniform consists of the following clothing options:

Regulation Winter Dress: worn daily and at all formal school occasions beginning on the Tuesday after Thanksgiving through to Good Friday (or the Friday before April Break if Easter falls during Spring Break), as follows:

Choice of:

- Green vest
- Green cardigan
- Pullover green sweater
- Navy blazer

Choice of:

- Grey dress pants with grey socks (black belt optional)
- Tunic (K-Gr. 3) or kilt (Gr. 4-7) hemmed no higher than 8 cm above the knee with black knee socks or black tights

White button-down dress shirt with school tie

All black, polishable <u>leather</u> shoe with black molded outer sole and no obtrusive logo (heel no higher than 5 cm including sole).

Hair accessories should be in uniform colors.

Medication at School

Please be advised that we do not administer non-prescription medications to students during the school day, unless they have been provided to the JS Receptionist by a parent for a specific reason (e.g. allergies). Medications should be placed inside a clear, Ziploc bag with specific dosage instructions, along with any information about previous dosages (e.g. the dosage your child had before school). If your child needs non-prescription medication (e.g. Advil or Tylenol) to feel better during the school day, then it's likely that they should be at home. Junior School students should not come to the Reception Desk asking for medication without verbal or written consent given to Ms. Orellana directly from a parent.


Junior School House Captain Theme Day Friday, October 6th

Jaden Sanghe takes his inspirational message to ISABC School Leaders

Last Tuesday morning, I was attending a meeting of Academic heads from the Independent Schools Association of British Columbia (ISABC) at Collingwood School when, to my surprise, I saw a familiar face in a Southridge uniform. Jaden had been contacted by Brooke Sherwood, a Senior Manager from the Canadian Cancer Society, and asked to give a presentation on the significant contributions that Independent Schools have made, and can be inspired to make, in supporting the cause of Cancer research and cancer prevention.



Jaden was a composed, eloquent, and passionate speaker as he addressed a room full of academic heads and assistant heads of schools throughout the lower mainland. He noted the outstanding contribution that Southridge has made through the "Relay for Life" initiative that has been a feature of our charitable outreach programs over the past few years.

It was Serena Bonneville, our former Head Girl, herself a cancer survivor, who had first worked with the head boy of St Georges to get our student body involved in this event. Her dedicated and inspirational story was given a further amazing chapter when Justin Sanghe (Jaden's elder brother) led a student driven and student organized event in 2016, and again

in 2017, that raised over \$50, 000 in 2016 and edged over \$100,000 last year in a staggering display of collective capacity, student involvement, and extraordinary leadership. As I sat and listened to Jaden speak of his desire to continue the work of his brother, and noted how impressed the audience were with his manner and message, I was very proud of him and our whole school community.

Jaden's purpose at our meeting, was to draw attention to the good work that Independent Schools are doing with regards to cancer research; to allow the representative from the Canadian Cancer Society an opportunity to offer her sincere thanks for the significant contributions already made, and to motivate other schools to take up the challenge of



funding research. I just wanted to highlight this moment, as Jaden was a wonderful ambassador and spokesperson for our school with its ethos of service and contribution. Thank you, Jaden, for your commitment, the powerful message you delivered, and for your confident, clear and inspiring delivery.

Best Practices in Assessment and The First Term Interim Report card

Summer is now officially behind us and the vibrant energy and enthusiasm of all our students, staff and faculty once again permeates our hallways and classrooms. The school's current strategic plan has placed the emphasis squarely on helping our students grow and flourish within the Southridge school environment and, to this end, we are aligning our assessment practice and protocols to ensure that we are adopting best pedagogical practices.

The importance of "formative assessment", which allows teachers to monitor student learning and provide ongoing feedback without the imposition of a percentage or grade, is a key element in helping students to improve their learning and allows faculty to more closely target their instruction and support for students. The aim of this kind of instructional feedback is to help students identify their strengths and weaknesses and focus on areas that need attention, while helping faculty recognize and address problems immediately. This is the rationale behind our diagnostic assessment of all Grade 8s in mathematics. Our aim has been to place them in classes that will facilitate their growth in confidence and intellectual capacity by targeting our instruction to their needs. The provision of more feedback and formative assessment does not mean that we are eliminating, or rejecting, the value of summative assessments, simply that we want to provide our students with time and more than one opportunity to improve their learning before a final "test" of mastery of skills or content.

Many of the assignments in the opening five weeks of school are formative and diagnostic in nature as teachers focus, not only on evaluating their skills, but also on getting to know their students. The value of establishing strong, respectful and authentic relationships between student and teacher has long been recognized as a central element in fostering student success. The Leadership Experience Week (LEW) builds on those relationships and on nurturing those between our students. LEW also provides leadership opportunities, tests resourcefulness and resilience, and promotes cooperation, collaboration, and communication. These are among the 'core' competencies that the BC Ministry, in its new approach to curriculum, is emphasizing. The Southridge Senior School Education Program (SSEP) has similarly articulated and endorsed these essential capacities and skills.

Our first interim report represents the first summative report of student progress, but it is very limited in its scope and in its assessment of a student's potential ability, coming as it does so soon in the school year after just over four weeks of classes and the Leadership Experience Week in early October. Parents are encouraged to contact individual faculty if they are concerned about a student's progress and similarly advisors and subject



teachers will call or email parents if specific problems or concerns arise. Our Parent/Teacher interviews are scheduled for **Wednesday**, **November 8**th, in order to provide a much earlier opportunity for dialogue between teachers and parents.

In the first interim report, Grade 8 students and all students new to Southridge will receive a comment, letter grade and attitude and effort mark from each of their teachers. Any student who falls below a C- or receives a '2' for effort will also receive a comment indicating the areas for improvement. All remaining students will receive letter and effort grades only. The BC Ministry of Education letter grades and descriptors are outlined below.

It's my hope that the opening weeks of school have been positive ones for your son or daughter and that we can continue to work to provide a stimulating, safe and productive environment for all.

BC Provincial Letter Grades

- A = The student demonstrates excellent or outstanding performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- B = The student demonstrates very good performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- C+ = The student demonstrates good performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- C = The student demonstrates satisfactory performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- C- = The student demonstrates minimally acceptable performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
