## **Senior School Startup**

Welcome to the 2017 school year, everyone! We have had a wonderful start to the year in the Senior School with a fabulous group of Grade 12 leaders who have set the tone for an incredibly smooth school opening. All Grade 12s were here meeting with their Grade 8 buddies and kicking off a fun start to the year with all of our new students.

This past Friday we celebrated our House Picnic and Terry Fox Run where, unlike last year, the weather cooperated and students had a great time running or walking in support of the Terry Fox Foundation, participating in our initiation ritual where new students slid down the slip-and-slides, and capped the day off with the House Tug-of-War and, of course, root beer floats. It's hard to believe that next week is already October and we have our Leadership Experience Week (LEW)!

LEW provides students in the Senior School with experiences in a variety of events and activities that are designed to help them form connections with each other and with staff in different settings. Our Grade 8 and 9 students will travel to Strathcona on Vancouver Island where they will experience life outdoors with a variety of exciting challenges and activities. Camping outdoors under nothing but a strategically placed tarp is an experience few will ever forget. This is an important 5 day trip for students to fully integrate into life at Southridge.

Based on their interests and the research they are doing, students get to spend a day at a job site, touring, asking questions and meeting with professionals from an area of interest. The Grade 12s also take part in Career Information Day on Monday, and then are off to Rockridge Canyon for the Grade 12 Retreat on Tuesday, returning Thursday at lunch.

LEW is an incredibly rich week for all students in the Senior School, laying the groundwork for a successful Senior School experience as well as preparation for life beyond



Southridge. Special thanks to all of the faculty who plan, chaperone, and organize these remarkable and unforgettable experiences for our students!

## **Changeover to Winter Uniform is Coming**

The last day for students to wear Summer Uniform is Friday, October 6<sup>th</sup>. All students begin wearing Winter Uniform on Tuesday, October 10<sup>th</sup>. Winter Uniform consists of the following clothing options:

Regulation Winter Dress: worn daily and at all formal school occasions beginning on the Tuesday after Thanksgiving through to Good Friday (or the Friday before April Break if Easter falls during Spring Break), as follows:

#### Choice of:

- Green vest
- Green cardigan
- Pullover green sweater
- Navy blazer

#### Choice of:

- Grey dress pants with grey socks (black belt optional)
- Tunic (K-Gr. 3) or kilt (Gr. 4-7) hemmed no higher than 8 cm above the knee with black knee socks or black tights

White button-down dress shirt with school tie

All black, polishable <u>leather</u> shoe with black molded outer sole and no obtrusive logo (heel no higher than 5 cm including sole).

Hair accessories should be in uniform colors.

#### **Medication at School**

Please be advised that we do not administer non-prescription medications to students during the school day, unless they have been provided to the JS Receptionist by a parent for a specific reason (e.g. allergies). Medications should be placed inside a clear, Ziploc bag with specific dosage instructions, along with any information about previous dosages (e.g. the dosage your child had before school). If your child needs non-prescription medication (e.g. Advil or Tylenol) to feel better during the school day, then it's likely that they should be at home. Junior School students should not come to the Reception Desk asking for medication without verbal or written consent given to Ms. Orellana directly from a parent.



## Thanksgiving Long Weekend and Late Arrival

Please note that the school will be closed on Monday, October 9<sup>th</sup> for the Thanksgiving holiday. Classes resume with a late start at 10:25 am on Tuesday, October 10<sup>th</sup>. Students need to arrive between 10:10 am and 10:20 am for a start time of 10:25 am. *Please do not bring students any earlier than 10:10 am as all teachers and staff are in meetings and no supervision is provided.* 

#### **FSAs for Grade 4 and 7 Students**

This year, the FSAs (Foundation Skills Assessment) will be written by all Grade 4 and 7 students in the province from October 2<sup>nd</sup> to November 10<sup>th</sup>. Prior to this school year, FSAs were written over January and February. While the FSAs will continue to assess basic literacy and numeracy skills, aspects of the process and testing has been redesigned, as follows:

Students in Gr. 4 and 7 will write their FSA tests in October/November (instead of January/February)

Still Includes online and written components

#### Now includes:

- a 10 minute, non-scored group collaboration activity (to engage students, build connections with prior knowledge and experience and choose a reading theme)
- choice of reading themes
- more variety in question formats (e.g. clicking and dragging, highlighting, drop down menu selection, or entering numerical responses)
- non-scored self-reflection (related to Thinking and Communication Core Competencies)
- reported on a proficiency scale (Emerging, On Track, Extending)

Scoring of tests remains at the local level (Southridge faculty will still engage in collaborative marking with other ISABC schools)

Student summary reports will be released in February 2018 to allow for the data to be used to inform teaching and learning at the individual school level

If your child is in Grades 4 or 7, their teachers will communicate the specific testing schedule with you over the next two weeks. Please don't hesitate to contact Mrs. de Hoog,



# **Best Practices in Assessment and The First Term Interim Report card**

Summer is now officially behind us and the vibrant energy and enthusiasm of all our students, staff and faculty once again permeates our hallways and classrooms. The school's current strategic plan has placed the emphasis squarely on helping our students grow and flourish within the Southridge school environment and, to this end, we are aligning our assessment practice and protocols to ensure that we are adopting best pedagogical practices.

The importance of "formative assessment", which allows teachers to monitor student learning and provide ongoing feedback without the imposition of a percentage or grade, is a key element in helping students to improve their learning and allows faculty to more closely target their instruction and support for students. The aim of this kind of instructional feedback is to help students identify their strengths and weaknesses and focus on areas that need attention, while helping faculty recognize and address problems immediately. This is the rationale behind our diagnostic assessment of all Grade 8s in mathematics. Our aim has been to place them in classes that will facilitate their growth in confidence and intellectual capacity by targeting our instruction to their needs. The provision of more feedback and formative assessment does not mean that we are eliminating, or rejecting, the value of summative assessments, simply that we want to provide our students with time and more than one opportunity to improve their learning before a final "test" of mastery of skills or content.

Many of the assignments in the opening five weeks of school are formative and diagnostic in nature as teachers focus, not only on evaluating their skills, but also on getting to know their students. The value of establishing strong, respectful and authentic relationships between student and teacher has long been recognized as a central element in fostering student success. The Leadership Experience Week (LEW) builds on those relationships and on nurturing those between our students. LEW also provides leadership opportunities, tests resourcefulness and resilience, and promotes cooperation, collaboration, and communication. These are among the 'core' competencies that the BC Ministry, in its new approach to curriculum, is emphasizing. The Southridge Senior School Education Program (SSEP) has similarly articulated and endorsed these essential capacities and skills.

Our first interim report represents the first summative report of student progress, but it is very limited in its scope and in its assessment of a student's potential ability, coming as it does so soon in the school year after just over four weeks of classes and the Leadership Experience Week in early October. Parents are encouraged to contact individual faculty if they are concerned about a student's progress and similarly advisors and subject teachers will call or email parents if specific problems or concerns arise. Our



Parent/Teacher interviews are scheduled for **Wednesday**, **November 8**<sup>th</sup>, in order to provide a much earlier opportunity for dialogue between teachers and parents.

In the first interim report, Grade 8 students and all students new to Southridge will receive a comment, letter grade and attitude and effort mark from each of their teachers. Any student who falls below a C- or receives a '2' for effort will also receive a comment indicating the areas for improvement. All remaining students will receive letter and effort grades only. The BC Ministry of Education letter grades and descriptors are outlined below.

It's my hope that the opening weeks of school have been positive ones for your son or daughter and that we can continue to work to provide a stimulating, safe and productive environment for all.

#### **BC Provincial Letter Grades**

- A = The student demonstrates excellent or outstanding performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- B = The student demonstrates very good performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- C+ = The student demonstrates good performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- C = The student demonstrates satisfactory performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.
- C- = The student demonstrates minimally acceptable performance in relation to expected learning outcomes for the course or subject and grade.

### China Tour – Summer 2018

The Social Studies department has created an opportunity for an academic/cultural trip to China for the summer of 2018. The trip would consist of three main concentrations: Beijing, Nanjing and Hong Kong.

In Beijing the highlights would include visiting Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven, the Summer Palace, and of course, a trip outside the city to walk on the Great Wall and to also visit the Ming Tombs.



In Nanjing, the highlights would include a visit to Purple Mountain, which holds the mausoleum of Sun Yat-sen, and many other spectacular sites. In Nanjing, we will also learn about the history of the city during the Second World War, which will complement their studies in the upper grades of Social Studies.

The final destination will be Hong Kong. Once again, there is a huge connection to the Second World War and the Canadians who fought there, which is taught in Socials 10. In addition, we will visit the harbour, Victoria Peak, Stanley Market, and leave some time to do some final shopping!

The trip will begin on Monday, June 25, 2018 and we will return to Vancouver on July 5, 2018. The dates will not conflict with any final exams or Grad events. The cost of the tour will be around \$4,100 and it covers all transportation, food, lodging, entrance fees, and our guides.

#### STAYING UP-TO-DATE ON UNIVERSITY & COLLEGE ADMISSIONS

Mrs. Becker and Ms. Livingston have recently returned from the National Association for College Admission Counselling conference. This massive event brings together all stakeholders in the world of university, college and career counselling (over 7000 attendees — counsellors, admissions professionals, exhibitors and supporting organizations) offering plentiful opportunities to grow professionally to understand and build awareness of the shifting landscape of post-secondary admissions. The conference offered over 100 educational sessions and workshops as well as one of the biggest college fairs where we met with admissions reps to discuss updates. In between these sessions, we met and networked with colleagues from independent schools to share and work together to build best practices. We have brought back the most up-to-date information that we will share with our students to ensure they are ready and aware of how to determine the right college or university fit for their specific needs.



## LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE WEEK (LEW) & CAREER EXPLORATION FOR GRADES 11 & 12

Monday and Tuesday of LEW is all about career information (for the 11s and 12s) and career experience (for the 11s only). On Monday of LEW, students will be attending a jam-packed Career Information Day where we will have over 30 representatives from a variety of career and professional backgrounds. Students will attend a keynote speaker (a Southridge alum with an inspiring story to share) followed by 5 break-out sessions that they choose according to careers of interest.

## **Head Injury Baseline Testing Update**

Baseline tests are assessments that measure reaction time, memory capacity, speed of mental processing, and executive functioning of the brain and are traditionally taken prior to a sport season when an athlete has not yet had exposure to training and/or competition. Last year, Southridge initiated baseline testing for its athletes with the understanding that



much needed research into the validity and practicalities of such testing would impact our school's future practices.

Based on relevant research in the field of concussions and head injuries, Parachute has concluded that only licenced healthcare professionals should provide medical assessments and give medical clearance to athletes diagnosed with a suspected concussion. For these reasons, Southridge will follow Parachute's recommendations and will no longer be conducting baseline testing on athletes. Athletes who have a suspected concussion will follow the Return to Play protocol and would need medical clearance prior to returning to their sport. That being said, if you as a parent would like to pursue baseline testing for your child(ren) you are, of course, welcome to do so. Southridge suggests that you consider a health care professional with specific training and experience in concussion testing protocols.

Parachute is a national, charitable organization, formed in July 2012, which united the former organizations of Safe Communities Canada, Safe Kids Canada, SMARTRISK, and ThinkFirst Canada into Canada's injury prevention leader.
