Parking Lot Pick-Up Routine

Last week we completed our two week trial period of parking lot pick-up routine adjustments. In the spirit of working together, our Senior School parents were asked to delay arriving on campus until 3:15 pm in an effort to control traffic congestion and improve student safety. You may recall some of the specific requests that were made at the beginning of April when we first introduced this call to action.

Here's what we *did not* do. We did not change our Senior School timetable. Classes still finished at 3:00 pm, as usual. We did not restrict Senior School parents from picking-up their children if after school commitments required a three o'clock pick-up. We did not prohibit Senior School students with Junior School siblings from leaving at three o'clock; we simply asked them to walk over to the Junior School so that their parents did not need to make a double loop.

Here's what we *did* do. We did ask Senior School parents not to arrive at 3:00 pm and sit in the parking lot until 3:15 pm. We did ask parents and students to plan carefully, only arriving for a three o'clock pick-up on those days where there was a specific commitment that prevented a 3:15 pm pick-up. We did appeal to everyone to help out with this initiative because we could not confidently recommend any changes or adjustments to our pick-up routine without first getting a clear and accurate understanding with good data to test our ideas.

Here's *how it went*. First of all, the congestion in our parking lot noticeably improved once people understood the changes we were asking them to make and they were able to adjust their own personal schedules and routines. Second, with decreased congestion, the level of perceived student safety improved. Third, Senior School students with Junior School siblings cooperated by walking over to the Junior School to facilitate a one-loop pick-up. Overall, the traffic entering the Senior School lot decreased and the congestion in our driveway where the Senior School and Junior School loops converge diminished significantly.

All in all, the change in pick-up routine helped to alleviate the concerns we have had for some time around traffic congestion on our property. With less congestion, it is rational to conclude that student safety increases for the simple reason that with fewer vehicles

on site children are more easily seen. Less congestion seemed to have some ancillary benefits as well – drivers seemed more patient, cooperation appeared to increase and there was a greater sense of calm.

Thank you for doing your best to help address student safety on our campus, especially as it relates to the parking lot during pick-up. We look forward to taking the information we gathered from this trial period of staggered times and making an informed decision about how we'll move forward in the future. I will keep you posted. Until then, please continue to follow the changes we trialed as they will, undoubtedly, continue to have a positive impact on student safety.

Fair trade is a term used to describe trade in which fair prices are paid to farmers in the developing countries where they farm.

MYP Junior School Term Test

All MYP students write one term test: math on Friday, May 27. Study schedule will run from Thursday, May 19 – Thursday, May 26. No new material that is taught after May 19 will be on the math term test, and no regular homework of any kind will be assigned during this time period. Study guides will be distributed by math teachers by the beginning of study schedule time.

Please note that we are giving a very generous amount of study time for a single term test so that students can create a study schedule that allows for continued participation in their regular extracurricular activities. It is our expectation that students will continue meeting these commitments.

Please see below for answers to frequently asked questions.

What are study guides? Study guides outline the content and skills students are responsible for on the test. They help students identify what they should be studying and may offer suggestions about how to study it.

What will students do at home during the study schedule? Some study blocks will be self-directed with students choosing how to review content and practice skills. Others may be teacher-directed with teachers assigning specific exercises designed to reinforce concepts that will be on the math term test.

What will students do in class during the study schedule? Students will continue to learn new material as they move through their units of study in accordance with the Southridge curriculum.

When and where do students write term tests? Students write the term test in their homeroom during the *first two periods* of class on Friday, May 27 (teachers may also choose to use homeroom time that morning). Please do not schedule any appointments for your child during this time.

How much time do students have to complete their math term test? They have 90 minutes to write their test.

How will term tests affect student learning? The primary goal of term tests is to help students learn how to prepare for tests and exams. Effective study and time management skills become increasingly important when students proceed to the Senior School. Term tests also provide students and teachers with valuable feedback about their learning. Combined with unit tests, quizzes, assignments, projects, and

observation, term tests form one part (between 10-20%) of the student's overall evaluation for Term Three.

What is the real test?

This past Sunday, I was a participant in the Vancouver Half Marathon. It was my fourth half marathon in Vancouver and my sixth that I have run. As the day approached, I couldn't help noticing some similarities that I saw with the Advanced Placement (AP) examinations that our students will be writing over the next two weeks. Both of these are a big event that occur as a test to see how one can perform under "high stakes" circumstances.

They both have a set date that must be met – you are 'ready or not' – because you can't delay it for another day. Many others will be writing or running at the same time and there are results that can allow you to compare your own performance against those that are also participating. And finally, your result is a definite method to decide whether you are "good" as a runner or as a student. While all of the specific points about these two high stakes tests are true, I think they all miss the most important points as to why we should participate. In fact, I think these are often missed or overshadowed with the points I explained above.

To begin, an AP course lasts from the first day of school in September until the exam is written in May. Similarly, if you have trained for a half marathon or a marathon, this usually begins four months away from the race date. And this is assuming you are 10km ready when you begin, much like the AP class will need students to have been successful in courses prior to the beginning of the course.

Now, if the only gauge of success is the end result, then we have missed all of the important learning that has occurred during the course (or training). Students will learn about the material no doubt, but they will also have to gain proficiency in organization, time management and handling a much quicker pace of a regular high school class.

When you need to train for a longer distance race, you need to be able to find time within a busy schedule but also use different types of runs to prepare - hill training,

intervals, race pace runs and long slow runs to train your body to understand how this will feel come race day. Regardless of how the actual exam or race goes, this learning is valuable and incredibly rewarding on its own.

When one takes this mindset with these classes, one can also learn a great deal about oneself as a learner. How can I best prepare for a particular evaluation? What is the best method to review material prior to a class? When I take notes, what way can I synthesize my understanding with the most clarity? Additionally, how can I overcome challenges I face when I struggle with understanding a concept or an evaluation that I am disappointed with?

When training, similar question can be asked – what clothing or shoes are the best for me as a person to succeed? How can I prepare for a training run in terms of fluids, energy snacks, rest and recovery? What techniques can I learn to improve my pace, stamina or long term health so that I can continue to train effectively? All of these points of self-awareness as a learner can be transferred to almost any area of your life and throughout your life.

Many Southridge alumni that have taken an AP course have reported back to us how much it helped them prepare for their university career. Many of them reference the above points about understanding themselves as learners as well to being challenged to learn at a quicker pace. Finally, just the fact that they are learning the material they will be reviewing in university helps for preparation and success. This feedback is pretty consistent from all AP student and their score on the exam really doesn't come into play in this regard.

The last point I will make about these high stakes test or races is that you are a bit at the mercy of the day you participate in terms of your result regardless of your preparation. On Sunday, we were blessed with a pretty amazing day, although the sun was hot and this affected the race. If the day was cold, wet or windy then a good performance might be a slower time or even just completing the race.

In an exam, there can be variables on the day – whether you were able to sleep well the night before, the first few questions causing confidence or confusion, a possible distraction in your personal life that cannot allow you to completely focus. If we only take our result from the test alone these factors become more important than they probably should be.

I had a good run on Sunday. I gave my best effort and felt my preparation helped to accomplish this. It wasn't a personal best, but there were some aspects of my run that

hampered my ability to run as well as I have done in the past. But there were so many new things I learned about myself during the run and in the training leading up to it that I will be able to use for the next half marathon I choose.

Similarly, I wish all of our AP students the best of success in their exams. I know they will give their best effort and that our AP teachers have worked very hard to facilitate their learning to be prepared. Regardless of results, I am proud of each of them for choosing the challenge of taking a university level course in high school.

MORNING EXAM SCHEDULE:

EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:

Students

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director.
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

Faculty

- 1) Exam invigilators must take attendance at the beginning of the morning and afternoon examinations and bring it promptly to senior reception.
- 2) Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

ENTRY:

Students

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall <u>IN SILENCE</u> and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

Faculty

1) The Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

DISMISSAL:

Students

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected.
- 3) No student is dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 4) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.

Faculty

1) A table is placed at the back of the gym and labelled by grade, class section and teacher for ease of exam collection.

Southridge Examination Schedule

Students will write their examinations in the Gym with the exception of those students who are authorized to write in the alternate setting. Southridge examinations are designed to be completed in under **TWO hours** but students may take up to 3 hours to complete any examination. **Please remember to return all your books prior to the examination. Please return your laptop, including charger and backpack, to Mr. Latta immediately after your last examination.**
