Parking Lot Safety and Staggering Our Pick-Up Times

Welcome back to Southridge! I am looking forward to an excellent spring term, and I hope that you are too. I also hope you have had the chance to view our parking lot video that was released in early February. If you have not yet seen it, please [click here](#) and take a look. I'm sure you'll appreciate the lighthearted approach we've taken to help address the serious issue of student safety as it relates to parking lot congestion.

In follow-up to our popular video, we are continuing our efforts to improve the issue of after-school congestion. We know the parking lot is a source of frustration for parents, students, staff and faculty, and we are committed to doing what we can to improve the experience; but we need your help in addressing this issue. As a community, we each have a role to play.

Beginning on April 18, and continuing for two weeks until April 29, Southridge will be undertaking a two-week trial period of late pick-up for Senior School students. During these two weeks, students will be dismissed from class at the usual time (3:00 pm); however, we are asking parents of Senior School students to delay picking up their child(ren) until 3:15pm. To be sure, **we are not extending the school day and this does not affect the school's timetable.** We are simply making arrangements that we believe will impact the amount of after-school congestion in our parking lot.

This means that we are asking Senior School parents not arrive at the school at 3:00 pm and park in the lot until 3:15pm. In order for us to fully understand if the delayed pick-up will have an effect on after-school congestion, we ask you to assist us by arriving at 3:15pm (or later), keeping pathways clear for our Junior School parents to navigate more easily. We understand that some Senior School students may have after-school activities or plans on certain days that will not allow for a delayed pick-up; however, if your child does not participate in activities and the later time does not create any issues for your family, we ask you to please assist us in this trial by delaying pick-up on the days when there are no scheduling conflicts.



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For families with children in both the Junior and Senior Schools, please ask your Senior School child to walk over to the Junior School so that pick-up can be accomplished in one pass – rather than driving around to both parking lots.

Our staggered pick-up trial is a very important exercise. We cannot accurately recommend continuing changes or adjustments that will positively affect the congestion in our parking lots without the benefit of accurate data to test our ideas. Therefore, your support and participation in this two-week trial is very important to us, and it is greatly appreciated.

We are very grateful for your support and understanding while we undertake this trial. Together we can work towards making our parking lot as safe as possible for all of our students.

A New Look

Welcome back from spring break! I hope that each of you enjoyed a wonderful, relaxing time with your families. You may have noticed some changes in our classrooms, hallways, and stairwells in the Junior School.

We have recently been working, in conjunction with our local fire marshall, to reduce the amount of combustible material on our walls and around our doorways. Our walls are now a little more sparsely decorated and for some good reasons. First and foremost, this change is an initiative that further promotes student safety at our school. Secondly, the initiative of creating a calmer, less visually stimulating environment has been a philosophical consideration for over a year now within our PYP department. As part of their professional development, our PYP teachers took part in a book study of Stuart Shanker's book entitled *Calm, Alert and Learning*. The book focused on improving self-regulation in students as a goal to ultimately improve learning. One part of the book focused on creating a less stimulating environment as a way to promote student self-regulation. Some of our teachers have been able to visit schools that are physically transforming their classrooms and learning environments to help promote this calmer feeling or atmosphere.

There are many studies to suggest that creating calmer, neutral environments can certainly improve, focus, self-regulation and ultimately learning. Now, there are still other studies that refute this claim and promote a vibrant, busier, more visually stimulating classroom as the best way to promote learning. We are choosing to take a more balanced approach somewhere in between these two views, one that also sets higher safety standards. We are re-evaluating what goes up on our classrooms walls with a goal in mind to keep it directly related to current student learning. So, you may see a few less inspirational posters and banners, but we hope that you will continue to see great examples of the process and the product of student learning.

Final Stretch – Term 3 – “Is it too late?”

It was great seeing the students and faculty back on Monday! There was much excitement and energy as classmates looked to connect in person as likely many of them have been connected digitally throughout the break. I do know that some students (and teachers) take a reprieve from being connected to enjoy other areas of their lives over breaks. Everyone looks a little more refreshed – some with some colour from a far-away destination. We had two trips travelling during the break. A volleyball tour to Cuba and a service trip to Uganda. In both cases the participants had amazing experiences and you will no doubt be hearing further from these groups in the future.

The start of Term 3 always brings with it some unique circumstances – it seems to be a bit different for each person depending on your grade – referring both to your age and academic standing.



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As a Grade 8 or 9 student, often the start of the final term is a sign that they feel more connected to the school. In talking with Grade 8's in particular, while they are always a little wary of exams that make up the finish to the year, they always mention that coming back to school after the Spring break they seem to fit in. They know what to expect, where to go, and are more ready to spread their wings to try new opportunities. Grade 9's have almost completed two years of high school and begin to be thinking of taking on more leadership.

Our Grad Class of 2016, are embarking on their final term of high school and Southridge! For some of these students this represents 13 years of being at the same school. Most of the Grade 12's are already looking beyond to their next adventure. There are always a few that wish the time would slow down a bit as they are not quite ready for high school to end.

Which brings us to the Grade 10's and 11's with a focus that is maybe more on their academics as they must complete the Provincial exams at the end of the year. Grade 11's especially have a rigorous course load and these classes and learning will help set them up to be successful in Grade 12. This brings up the other meaning of 'grade' I was describing.

As a classroom teacher, I was always cognizant of certain students I was teaching that seemed to think that there was less point to working hard in Term 3 because their "mark" or standing was not going to be able to be changed much. They had already completed two terms and with this final term being quite brief they sometimes had a bit of a defeatist attitude. While I could see their reasoning on some level, I think it shows that the focus is misguided.

If becoming a life-long learner is one of the key goals to school, then continuing to become successful in understanding how we learn is never really finished. That next evaluation (or more importantly the preparation for it) might just be that point that we gain more clarity into our learning style. Using an analogy of running a race the idea that one's pace is already slow, and I am beyond my personal best or goal so why keep going? I think it is important to think of each day as having opportunities to do something meaningful and we can always make a difference with a good effort. Finishing the race and knowing that you did your best for that given race and all of the variables that come with it is an accomplishment to be proud of.

Who knows? Perhaps the next unit of study in one subject will ignite one's learning in such a way that they feel compelled to study it further and this leads to a career path. Or maybe it will just be a small, individually "cheered" accomplishment that you 'did it'! Either way, it is worth giving it our best effort.



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I'm reminded of one of my go-to quotes and one that I shared during an awards day a few years ago from Arthur Ashe who said:

"Start where you are; Use what you have; Do what you can!"

So, no matter where you fall in the realm of Grade or grade, have a great Term 3. I will be proud of all of you!

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Southridge Heads to Peruvian Amazon in 2017

I am delighted to tell you about a scientific research expedition to the Peruvian Amazon that will be happening in 2017. The expedition is open to all Southridge pupils who will be 16 years of age in the year of the expedition, and who will be studying Biology in Grades 11 or 12. Others who have a particular interest in wildlife, conservation, and ecology may also apply for a place on this two week trip. An informational presentation will be taking place on **Monday, April 18th at 7:00 pm** in the **Senior School Library** and we hope you will be able to join us!

The expedition is being run in conjunction with **Operation Wallacea** and will be a mixed expedition with Peruvian biologists, academics and university students from around the world. The objective of the visit is to help with a major biodiversity survey in the **Pacaya Samiria Amazonian reserve**, while simultaneously offering students a first-hand experience of conservation biology. The group will fly to Lima, Peru and then onto Iquitos in the heart of the Amazon. From there, they will join a research ship, which will travel for 2-3 days to the remote study area. While on route, there will be lectures on Amazonia, its wildlife and conservation. On the return trip, we will visit a Cocama Indian village, a manatee rescue centre, a primate rescue centre, and enjoy a tour of Belen.

The research ship will moor at the study site and the group will rotate between a series of research teams. These teams will be: using small boats to survey for macaws, wading birds, and fishing bats; walking transects through the forest to estimate populations of tapirs, ungulates and game birds; and developing behaviour studies on giant river otters or the 13 species of primates found in the area. In addition, there are teams estimating the populations of the two species of river dolphins, completing fishery surveys to describe the fish communities, and spotlighting and noosing 3 species of caimans. Students will be working directly with university academics and Operation Wallacea staff. All data collected goes toward furthering conservation efforts in the region and toward publications in scholarly journals.

The cost of the expedition will cover each student's food, accommodation, training and participation in the research programmes. In addition, it will also cover the cost of flights, overnight accommodation in Iquitos, as well as comprehensive travel insurance. The quote will be presented at the information presentation on **Monday, April 18th at 7:00 pm**.

We hope to see you there!

The Fight Back Ceremony will conclude the evening's event, where participants pledge to take action and spread awareness of cancer research, treatments and prevention.

Along with a haiku contest and additional opportunities for creative expression, Black Bond Books will once again be in the Senior Library for a book sale on Tuesday April 12th with a percentage of proceeds from the book sales coming back to our school. Here are the highlights of what to expect for the week:

- **Monday April 11th and Tuesday April 12th:** Joanne Arnott, a Metis writer and arts activist, will share her works with our classes. She is a founding member of the Aboriginal Writers Collective West Coast and has won the Gerald Lampert award for *Wiles of Girlhood*. Ms. Arnott is a poet, essayist, activist, mentor and blogger who applies storytelling strategies in her work in the literary arts.
- **Tuesday April 12th:** Our local Black Bond Books will be in the Senior School Library for a book sale. Students can make purchases on their student accounts and partial proceeds will be directed back to our school.
- **Wednesday April 13th and Thursday April 14th:** Holman Wang is a former middle school teacher who is currently a full-time children's author, illustrator, and sometimes lawyer. Holman along with his brother Jack are the creators of the very successful *Cozy Classics* and *Star Wars Epic Yarns* series, and he will share his creative experiences with our classes.
- **Thursday April 14th and Friday April 15th:** Ivan Coyote is an award-winning author, poet, spoken-word artist, performer, storyteller and creative writing instructor who will be presenting to our senior classes. *Bow Grip* won the ReLit award and was named a Stonewall Honor Book by the American Library Association and is being developed as a feature film.
- **Friday April 15th:** We will have our annual book swap in the library at lunch. Students can bring their gently-used books and exchange for a new read. Any leftover books will be donated to the Country Fair.

Vidigami Launches Version 4.0 With a Host of New Features!

If you have been on Vidigami lately, you will have noted that they have released version 4.0 with a host of new features.

The Vidigami 4.0 release includes enhancements to the application interface and navigation, making it easier for Staff, Parents, and Students to find what they need. In addition, this release introduces Tags as a way to more efficiently organize and search for the right photos.



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What's New?

- **Group Directory page.** This page displays all Groups (i.e. Grade 3, Basketball Team, Science Club) organized by Category, and shows you the albums, photos and members of that Group. You can also create new Groups, search for Groups, and view albums within that Group.
- **Group Tags.** These are custom labels that you assign to a Group in order to search or filter by that Tag, thus making it easier to quickly locate the right albums and photos. Tags are managed on the Admin section of the app.
- **Search.** By Group and Group Tag Name.
- **Quick links.** To “My Uploads,” and “My Likes” from the top nav.
- **Albums Linked to more than 1 Group.** Such as Christmas Concert Album in Grades 6 and 7.

What's Changed?

- Create Groups directly from the Group Directory page. This previously existed in the side nav.
- Renamed Group Type labels:
 - Staff, Groups → now called '*Internal*'
 - Grades → now called '*Academics*'
 - Teams → now called '*Athletics*'
 - '*Arts*' (new category)
 - School Events → now called '*Events*'
 - '*Clubs*' (remains same)
- Improvements to the Sidebar content.



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- Larger photo thumbnails.
- Admins and Managers can now delete Groups with albums/photos.
- The previous Album Management functionality can be now achieved by Album Linking. Album Migration has been removed as we work on a better solution to migrate structure.
