You may or may not know that Southridge has hosted a Country Fair every year since our school opened its doors back in September 1995. This year's iteration of the event will be our 21<sup>st</sup>, which positions it as one of the biggest and longest-standing traditions at our school. Indeed, the Country Fair has helped to define the spirit of community at Southridge.

Simply put, the Country Fair would simply not be possible without everyone pitching in. In very straightforward terms, (amazingly) it takes more than 900 volunteer shifts to orchestrate an event of the Fair's magnitude, and with roughly the same number of parents at our school we really do call on everyone to volunteer for at least one shift. The history of Southridge is filled with examples and stories of parents contributing their time and energy to make our school possible. Right from the get-go, our families jumped in when they heard the call acting on the belief that their contributions would make a difference, and what a difference those contributions made.

To this day, visitors to our school comment on our sense of community and the special "feeling" at Southridge. Some visiting Heads of School can't believe we've been able to sustain such an engaged group of parents for two decades. I have to admit that I am extremely proud of Southridge in this regard and am always invigorated when I see and feel the excitement and energy that leads up to the Fair – energy that comes from our generous and supportive parents joining together enthusiastically to make a difference.

## **Seeking the Elusive State of Balance**

The goal of finding balance in a busy life is an elusive one. It is a good and important goal but one that proves quite difficult to achieve or master. In theory, it makes perfect sense that it should be everyone's top priority to achieve balance in life because when you are balanced you are capable of functioning at your best. Finding balance is not a one-size fits all approach. What balance looks like for me might look very different for someone else. As I was doing some research for another project I am working on, I came across an article on Forbes.com entitled, "*Creating Life Balance to Achieve Success*". This article highlighted some key points to focus on when searching for a balanced state, and I have summarized them below:

- Know yourself and how much rest, food and exercise you need to function at your best.
- Manage your time effectively
- Stay connected with family and friends.
- Have a role model
- Make time for yourself. (Unwind Time)

After reading the article, it was clear that the advice offered is common sense; something that we all know but can easily lose track of during the busy or stressful times. This advice is a great reminder to me in my own life but more importantly, it served as a reminder to me of how we have a responsibility to our students and children to help them find balance. If the adults in a child's life are stressed or not feeling balanced there is a good chance that the child feels this too. Children are incredibly perceptive, and they are also an excellent resource. A child will tell you when they think you are not getting enough sleep, or that you did not really leave enough time to go between skating and hockey practice. Lately, I have been thinking of balance in terms of a family goal and not just a personal one. Each member of the family needs help to achieve their personal balance but they also act as a support network to other members of the family at the same time. Of course, as the adults, we have a greater responsibility to our children but it is uncanny how a child seems to know just the right time to give you a hug or ask you to have a lightsaber battle.

I can make the same parallel to a classroom. It is a class goal to have balance not just a personal one. I have witnessed teachers take cues from their students that signal they



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need a break so they choose an activity that allows for some "unwind time". I have also witnessed students show care and concern if a teacher is eating lunch on the run. It is a great asset to have these caring "checks" in place in our community to keep a focus on balance. These "checks" come from the relationships that we build with each other and the student voice in these relationships is really important. The saying "wise beyond their years" comes to mind. Achieving balance is tough, and I think it is an ever-changing, never-ending goal; however, sharing the goal within a family or within a classroom seems to add a layer of accountability and support making the goal of achieving balance a little less elusive.

### **Never Grow Up**

Last week the yearly production preparations ramped up towards the performances at the end of the week, and as it has become a tradition, the cast and crew wear t-shirts promoting and showing their membership. This year, as many of you know, the production was Peter Pan and the t-shirts depicted a silhouetted Peter across a full moon along with the words "Never Grow Up" surrounding it. As the students and teachers walked the halls many people mentioned how much they liked the shirts and the important message that the play brings.

At the same time, we are in the midst of asking students to decide on course selection for next year. This involves some serious conversations with Advisors and teachers about their choices as well as at home with their families. We always strive to ensure that students are hitting the right balance of a challenging and rigorous course load and not taking on one that is too overwhelming. Throughout the process, the students learn about career choices and the prerequisites necessary for university acceptance into these programs. One would argue we are asking our students to "grow up".

Last week especially, I found it was interesting to notice this obvious tension between the two messages.



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After considering this for a time, I wondered if the two messages had to be so opposite from each other. Do we compartmentalize growing up with a lack of enjoyment? Or that being young can't involve too much responsibility?

If you went to the production you certainly will have witnessed many students showing amazing levels of responsibilities in their roles on the stage. Equally impressive were the incredibly capable stage managers, prop and set designers, hair and makeup crew and our incredible Tech crew that handled very difficult assignments under the pressure of live performance. So, this certainly didn't strengthen the idea of a young person being less responsible!

I think the key might be in finding one's passion and following it towards your career. Anyone that is passionate about an area of their life rarely explains what they do as "work". It is often with terms such as: joyful, fulfilling and their calling. I notice individuals that are passionate look youthful and seem to exude energy. It many ways they retain the child in them and have a little bit of "Peter Pan". I notice this especially in many of our teachers and I think they model a wonderful example for the students.

As our founding Head of School coined about Southridge that is was a "Lighthearted place of serious purpose." And I believe this brings the two ideas together very well. Having a sense of play in your learning allows you to be creative and innovative and the idea of never growing up helps to remember that the journey is as important as the destination. Even being a little mischievous at times might be alright!

So, as you help you son or daughter to choose their classes for the next year, perhaps retain the ideas the production of Peter Pan that Mr. Pope and the cast and crew so wonderfully presented to us. There needs to be play and passion along with rigour and hard work.




