Another Way to Look at Character

Last week I was listening to a story telling seminar when I stumbled across a reference to the character of wine. I found it interesting to note that the description of a wine's character is dependent on things such as the soil the grapes are grown in, the region they come from and even the weather. Certainly, the variety of plant itself has a big impact on a wine's character, but character is also influenced by the fight and struggle the roots of the plant have to endure while young to safeguard the plant's survival. Some wine connoisseurs believe that it is the fight and struggle that leads to more flavourful grape clusters, which create a wine of more character.

Being a lover of metaphors, I couldn't resist the connections between the development of wine's character and the development of character in children and youth – and indeed in all of us as adults. As our children progress along the *yellow brick road* fairy tale that we all too often attempt to create for them, and they are protected from the struggle and fight to establish themselves (getting into the "right" program in the "right" university will lead to the "right" career and, ultimately, the "right" lifestyle – safe, secure and . . . happily ever after); I wonder and worry if we are, at the same time, denying them the chance to develop the flavourful grape clusters they need for their character to mature in a full and wholesome way.

To make my point in a fun way, let me take this paragraph about wine character and translate it to character development in children and youth by replacing key words and phrases. First, here's the paragraph about wine. "Wine tasting is more complex than the simple 'swirl and sniff,' and distinguishing between a Merlot and a Shiraz is not always that easy. Grape varietals have characteristics that change according to the soil they were grown in, how they were matured, the region they came from and even the weather. While this may sound daunting, wine tasting need not be intimidating but rather a journey of discovery."

And now the translation. "Character development is more complex than the simple 'yellow brick road' fairy tale phenomenon" and distinguishing between performance and moral character is not always that easy. Children and youth have characteristics that



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change according to the home they grow up in, how they matured, the environment they came from and even the school they attended. While this may sound daunting, character development need not be intimidating but rather a journey of discovery."

So, here's to the journey of discovery along the rocky road of reality! Cheers!

Last Friday, I had the pleasure of listening to Colonel Chris Hadfield speak, and I came away completely star struck. Although I was looking forward to hearing him, I was not expecting to be so wowed. In his one hour presentation, he told a few stories about preparing for his missions, a few more about his time in space, shared some beautiful photographs taken from the space station, and he ended by playing two songs on his guitar. The format of the presentation alone was amazing but it was his ability to connect with me (and everyone else in the room) that wowed me. He is an extraordinary individual, but he continues to appreciate and be thankful for the everyday things. It was his genuine sense of gratitude that was really inspiring. It was clear to me that he was not speaking to close to 6,000 people last Friday because he wanted more fame and celebrity, he was speaking to us because he is truly grateful for his extraordinary experience and has a sincere desire to share a part of it with others. It struck me that although the act of being the first Canadian to walk in space is a great achievement, how much impact does the act alone have? Chris Hadfield sharing what that act felt like, what it looked like, and what it sounded like certainly has had a much greater impact than the act alone.

In his presentation, he mentioned that while on the space station he was thinking "what do you do with a beautiful experience?" He was asking himself a reflective question. We are often asking our students to reflect on their learning and even share what they have learned. It is sometimes challenging and even tedious for them to reflect, but I am glad they do it. It helps them to understand what Chris Hadfield clearly does; it is not only about the act but it is about reflecting on the act and sharing it with others. I think this is where the life-long learning takes place. It is my hope that when our students become the first Canadian to do something, they will have the inclination to reflect and ask the same question of themselves that Chris Hadfield did - "what do you do with a beautiful experience?" I am grateful that he chose to share it in so many different ways: through his photographs, his music, his written word, and his voice.

Life-long Learning

In my last submission I encouraged families to celebrate BC Family Day together and I certainly hope people took advantage of our mid-term break to be able to do so. For most of our community, the break began at the end of last Wednesday; however, many faculty and staff were fortunate to attend the Federation of Independent Schools (FISA) 50th Anniversary Convention on Thursday and Friday, February 4 & 5. It was a wonderful event and really validated the dedication all our staff have towards life-long learning.

The event was held at the Vancouver Convention Centre and included all the independent school associations in BC with over 5,000 educators in attendance! It was a thoughtfully planned event and the many speakers invited helped to create an engaging atmosphere where we could discuss and reflect on their messages and how they related back to our specific schools and classrooms. Particularly unique to this conference was the fact that our entire faculty and many staff were able to attend. This allowed departments to be able to listen to speakers together and have an engaging dialogue at the end. Better still, there were many moments over the two days that teachers across departments spent time together as well as Senior School and Junior School teachers. Additionally, we also were able to connect with colleagues at other schools to learn what interesting initiatives and teaching they were accomplishing. During the conference we were encouraged to share our learning on social media using the hashtag #fisa2016, and for a number of hours on the Thursday, this hashtag actually reached the top ten trending hashtags. Our students would have been impressed!

As I mentioned, there were many interesting speakers and I encourage you to speak to any of our faculty or me to learn more about these dynamic people. I wanted to detail two sessions to which I personally connected. The first was titled, "FISA Grad Talks" and highlighted five different graduates of FISA schools. Each former graduate over their 8 minutes allotted time explained what they were currently doing and how their time at school had impacted their decision of a career or passion. In each case, the individual spoke about how the school they attended allowed them to find out who they were as people, perhaps exposing and nurturing a particular skill or passion that led them to their career or calling. I noted that many times it was a particular teacher that had connected with them or was able to impart an important lesson or idea that initiated



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this spark. I found it incredibly inspiring and reminded me how important it is to encourage students to take risks to try something new and truly reach for their dreams.

The second session was the closing event and one that I had been looking forward to since I learned that he would be a speaker. If you get the chance to see him speak in the future, I can't encourage you strongly enough to take the opportunity. Colonel Chris Hadfield was an impressive and inspiring speaker. I am sure that he has been described using different terms but to me he was incredibly "cool"! How many Canadians can say that they have been astronauts, top US Air Force test pilots, or Commanders of the International Space Station? However, given all of these amazing accomplishments, he was incredibly humble, and down to earth and wanted to impress upon all of us in attendance the important role we had as teachers. As a nine year old, he had wanted to be an astronaut and he had gained some of this desire through his teachers igniting an interest in him. At the end of his talk he finished by playing his guitar and singing David Bowie's "Space Oddity" just like he had done on the Space Station. It was inspiring and along with the other speakers and my discussions with so many of our teachers during the two days I spent the rest of the break thinking about how I can take the ideas I have learned to be better - as a teacher, a person and a leader.

One last tidbit about Chris Hadfield – he's also a Leafs fan! How can you not like that!

Stories of Character: Episode 10

In preparation for our CAIS inspection last year, one of the questions we had to respond to was along the lines of how we demonstrate our appreciation for diversity. We felt that this was one area that seemed like a strength for us, that our students were open to the many cultures that walk through our doors and equally ready to engage with other cultures they encounter when outside of our walls. According to Peterson & Seligman's (2004) landmark book, *Character Strengths & Virtues*, this attitude of 'openmindedness' is one of 24 key 'strengths of character' gleaned from studying every major religion and philosophy concerning goodness. However, we can never be quite sure about our perceptions about our students until we gather evidence...

That evidence manifested itself last week in the run-up to Chinese New Year. On their own initiative, several ninth grade students came to see me several weeks ago to ask if they could do something to celebrate the impending lunar new year. This idea had been proposed several times in past years, but what was different this time were two things: the student-led initiative and thoughtful planning that this group had already put into their proposal, and the fact that rather than being a monocultural celebration that may have stressed difference rather than commonality, the kids really wanted to involve every ethnicity in our school. It has really struck several of us on faculty how much more well thought-out student initiatives have emerged since our adoption of the Harkness philosophy; this exciting trend is definitely no coincidence. And in terms of their multicultural goals, those of us who stay at the school late into the afternoon and evening over the last couple of weeks have borne witness to the enthusiastic and boisterous practicing of the diverse dancers and musicians that committed to this endeavour: Jaden Sanghe, Arman Abraham, Kevin Liu, Vivian Wu, Arman Soheili, Irena Yan, Ella Slaughter and Yik Jun Wong.

This past Wednesday, it all came together. Their hours of practice paid off; the dancers and musicians did a fabulous job in their performance, but what was more impressive was how they brought together our two schools. Instant celebrity ensued after what was planned to be their only round of the Junior School hallways, and they were happy to do an encore. Accompanied by a proud group of parents, they then processed to the Senior School and raucously entertained their peers and teachers to equal acclaim.

We are inspired by our students each day in many ways, but this group of students deserves special recognition for showing their character due to their open-mindedness.



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Through their own initiative, they truly brought all of us together, both Junior and Senior School, and every culture in our school community. Kung Hey Fat Choy, everyone.

Vidigami Software Update

Hopefully by now you have all had a chance to log onto Vidigami, our photo sharing website and take advantage of this great service to view and share photos. Vidigami has just released a new software update that you will notice when you log on. Below is a description of the changes.

Overview

The Vidigami 4.0 release includes enhancements to the application interface and navigation, making it easier for Staff, Parents and Students to find what they need. In addition, this release introduces Tags as a way to more efficiently organize and search for the right photos.

What's New?

- **Group Directory page.** This page displays all Groups (i.e. Grade 3, Basketball Team, Science Club) organized by Category, and shows you the albums, photos and members of that Group. You can also create new Groups, search for Groups, and view albums within that Group.
- **Group Tags.** These are custom labels that you assign to a Group in order to search or filter by that Tag, thus making it easier to quickly locate the right albums and photos. Tags are managed on the Admin section of the app.
- Search. By Group and Group Tag Name.
- Quick links to "My Uploads", "My Likes" from the top nav
- Albums Linked to more than 1 Group. (i.e. Christmas Concert Album in Grades 6 and 7)

Southridge School is considering the possibility of offering one or more Grade 10-12 mathematics courses during a Summer Session this coming July and August.

At this point, we are trying to gauge the level of interest there might be in such an offering. If your son/daughter is interested in taking a Summer Session course at Southridge School this summer, then please complete the form on the back of this sheet and return it to the Senior School reception desk by the end of the day on Friday February 12th.

Before completing the form, here are a few known details of the potential Summer Session program to consider:

- The program would run between July 4 and August 12. Students would need to be in the area in order to attend scheduled classes at Southridge School during this time (time of classes is not yet known)
- The courses to be offered would be Math 10 (FMP 10), Pre-Calculus 11 and/or Pre-Calculus 12.
- The Summer Session courses would be designed to serve two purposes:
 - <u>Allow students who wish to re-take a course they have already completed</u> in order to be better prepared for their next subsequent course.
 - <u>Allow students with an "A" standing in their last mathematics course to accelerate</u> their learning by taking the next level mathematics course.
- The Summer Session program would be delivered through a combination of at home preparation, video lessons, at school classes, and individual tutorials.
- The cost of the Summer Session program will be approximately \$1,250 plus any additional costs for books.

Notes

An artifact is any material possession which demonstrates importance to a student' overall progress. Examples of potential artifacts:

- art work
- test samples
- laboratory reports
- basketball uniform
- school tie
- football
- picture
- creative writing
- essay

Academic Discussion

When students discuss academic artifacts they should discuss strengths and areas for improvement. Here are some possible topics which may help students better analyze themselves. Student analysis of their own learning should empower students to take ownership of their own skill development within the context of the Student Led Conference.

self-advocacy learning strategies learning styles learning risks critical thinking study habits communication

Students may also wish to consider larger conceptual goals such as "I want to improve my understanding of algebra" or "I want to join discussions more in class" etc.

SLC Reflective Questions

1. Create a cover letter and resume as if you were applying for a job highlighting your strengths, ambitions, goals etc and present this as part of your conference. Ask your advisor or parents to prepare questions that you may encounter during a job or university interview

2. If you were required to write a paragraph about yourself as part of a university or job application using only 200 words, how would you describe yourself?

3. Discuss a mistake you made over the past year? How have you learned from it?

4. If a university scholarship committee or potential employer examined your digital footprint what picture of yourself would be created? How do you think you could better market your online persona to potential employers?

5. Consider how collaboration in the classroom has affected a success in one of your classes.

6. Discuss how the delivery of curriculum in the Southridge classroom has influenced your learning? What has worked well for you and what has not? What feedback would you like to give to your teachers that would help them make you a better student?

7. Research leadership styles? Which type of leader do you aspire to be? Provide an example from the past year which exemplifies this type of leadership style? Do you think different leadership styles should be applied to different situations and individuals? Elaborate.

8. Tell me about your role in a project, team or dramatic production. Did it unfold as you had envisioned? What challenges did you face and what were your reactions?

9. Research conflict resolution styles? What is your most natural response to conflict? What skills would you like to develop in order to become a better conflict resolver?

10. If you were creating a monument similar to Mt. Rushmore and needed to pick four individuals to venerate for their heroism who would you choose and why?


