## **Family Day**

This coming Monday, February 8<sup>th</sup>, British Columbia will be celebrating the 4<sup>th</sup> annual BC Family Day. As the website explains, "this mid-winter holiday offers families in all their diversity the chance to spend some extra time together." It is an opportunity to connect with family and friends during the weekend including the holiday Monday. In addition to the Tuesday being our mid-winter break at Southridge, we hope that families can take advantage of some or all of this time to be together.

With this aptly named holiday, it was an opportunity to touch base on the importance of family within a student's learning success. It is a partnership that we work to foster and take very seriously at Southridge. The volunteering spirit and sense of community of families are so prevalent at our school and have been since the very beginning of the school's history. When families are connected and involved then the school, and most importantly, the students feel supported and encouraged to strive to make a difference in the world.

Specifically at the Senior School (SS) level a child's family and their connection to the school takes on a different meaning than it was at the Junior School (JS). As a JS parent I get to enjoy quite a bit of detail from my kids when they answer the "how was school?" question. When this same question is asked to a high school aged student, getting a single word, "fine", might be considered an achievement. When I was a middle school Principal, I would often watch students make their parents stay in the car when they were dropped off – no hug or goodbye – "C'mon Mom or Dad!" It is normal for children to want to be more independent and show the adults in their life that they can handle things and at times this can be a bit over the top in terms of their reaction.

To be honest, though, and what is backed by research, is that it is really important to ensure that families remain connected throughout adolescent development. That might look different as a child grows up and will surely be different in each family as well; however, children need to know that their family is supportive and encouraging. This provides them time to understand who they are as an individual, sometimes allowing them to take risks by trying a new activity or making a new friend or just 'trying on' a different persona. At school, we are doing the exact same thing – ensuring they have support and connection and feel that their environment is a safe one. When a student



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has both school and family providing this support they can thrive and reach an amazing potential! Even when they tell you that they don't want to connect, most adolescents really do want to know you are 'there' when they need you.

Over the past few years, I have noted some articles explaining how families can help their children find balance in their activities, interests and school expectations. Ensuring that there is enough down time to recharge and also time for them to develop new interests is important. Additionally, having a fun activity or two – what I would have labelled a hobby when I was a kid – helps to relax and just take time away from the demands of their other responsibilities. And I would be remiss without mentioning enough sleep!

So, as we head toward the weekend and through to Family Day, I encourage everyone to enjoy each other's company a bit. Maybe it's hitting one the North Shore mountains for a ski, taking a long walk, a family dinner prepared together, a board game night, or just spending time together. Start a tradition to last for the years ahead and know that we cherish and appreciate all of our families making up our school community.

# **Course Selections for 2016-17**

"Two roads diverged in a wood and I - I took the route less traveled by, and that has made all the difference." ~ Robert Frost

In the next few weeks, I will be talking to students about their course selection options for the next academic year. There are limited choices for students currently in Grade 8, but an increasing range of elective courses as students move into the senior grades.

I will be speaking to the Grade 8 and 9 students during period 1 on Tuesday, January 26<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Weaver, Ms. Livingston and I will present to the Grade 9s and 10s during



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period 1 on Monday, February 1<sup>st</sup> and to the Grade 11s during period 2 on the 1<sup>st</sup>. At that time, students will be given course selection sheets to complete prior to entering their selections into Naviance – the database system that we use to record and manage their choices. The course selection sheets are attached here for your convenience (they are also available on the parent portal) and to allow you to discuss the various options with your children. The closing date for students to enter their choices on Naviance is Monday, March 7<sup>th</sup>.

We will also be holding an information evening on Thursday, February  $11^{\text{th}}$ . The first part of the evening from 6:30 - 7:15 pm will be directed at choices for our current Grade 8 and 9 students, and the latter part of the evening from 7:15 - 8:15 pm will cover the options available to our students in Grades 10 and 11. Of course, everyone is welcome to attend the entire presentation. The Curriculum Guide for 2016-17 will be available on the Southridge website soon and hardcopies will be available at the evening session on Thursday, February  $11^{\text{th}}$ .

The timetable for 2016-2017 is built from the students' choices and we strive to create a schedule of classes that will deliver the optimum choices for the most students. However, it is highly probable that we will not be able to satisfy the elective choices of all students. For this reason, it is imperative that your son or daughter clearly identify his or her first, second, and third choices. Every effort will be made to give students their first choice, but students may be placed in their second or third choice options in order to avoid timetable conflicts or to balance class size.

I would encourage all students to talk to their peers, teachers, parents and counsellors; to gain as much knowledge as they can in order to make informed choices as they move forward with their academic goals. I think it is also important to stress that students should follow those courses in which they have a genuine interest or passion, remembering that excellence usually comes from optimism, engagement and commitment.

Grade 12	Theme: Past, Present and Future Question(s): What are your best memories from Southridge? What is your legacy at Southridge? What do you foresee as being your biggest challenges at university? Note: Students are not required to discuss their university application process or choice of university. In some cases students may find it is helpful to relate what they are discussing to their university application/progress but should not be pressured to do so.

#### **Notes**

An artifact is any material possession which demonstrates importance to a student' overall progress. Examples of potential artifacts:

- art work
- test samples
- laboratory reports
- basketball uniform
- school tie
- football
- picture
- creative writing
- essay

#### Academic Discussion

When students discuss academic artifacts they should discuss strengths and areas for improvement. Here are some possible topics which may help students better analyze themselves. Student analysis of their own learning should empower students to take ownership of their own skill development within the context of the Student Led Conference.

Students may also wish to consider larger conceptual goals such as "I want to improve my understanding of algebra" or "I want to join discussions more in class" etc.

#### **SLC Reflective Questions**

1. Create a cover letter and resume as if you were applying for a job highlighting your strengths, ambitions, goals etc and present this as part of your conference. Ask your advisor or parents to prepare questions that you may encounter during a job or university interview

2. If you were required to write a paragraph about yourself as part of a university or job application using only 200 words, how would you describe yourself?

3. Discuss a mistake you made over the past year? How have you learned from it?

4. If a university scholarship committee or potential employer examined your digital footprint what picture of yourself would be created? How do you think you could better market your online persona to potential employers?

5. Consider how collaboration in the classroom has affected a success in one of your classes.

6. Discuss how the delivery of curriculum in the Southridge classroom has influenced your learning? What has worked well for you and what has not? What feedback would you like to give to your teachers that would help them make you a better student?

7. Research leadership styles? Which type of leader do you aspire to be? Provide an example from the past year which exemplifies this type of leadership style? Do you think different leadership styles should be applied to different situations and individuals? Elaborate.

8. Tell me about your role in a project, team or dramatic production. Did it unfold as you had envisioned? What challenges did you face and what were your reactions?

9. Research conflict resolution styles? What is your most natural response to conflict? What skills would you like to develop in order to become a better conflict resolver?

10. If you were creating a monument similar to Mt. Rushmore and needed to pick four individuals to venerate for their heroism who would you choose and why?

Dear Parents:

Southridge School is considering the possibility of offering one or more Grade 10-12 mathematics courses during a Summer Session this coming July and August.

At this point, we are trying to gauge the level of interest there might be in such an offering. If your son/daughter is interested in taking a Summer Session course at Southridge School this summer, then please complete the form on the back of this sheet and return it to the Senior School reception desk by the end of the day on Friday February 12th.

Before completing the form, here are a few known details of the potential Summer Session program to consider:

- The program would run between July 4 and August 12. Students would need to be in the area in order to attend scheduled classes at Southridge School during this time (time of classes is not yet known)
- The courses to be offered would be Math 10 (FMP 10), Pre-Calculus 11 and/or Pre-Calculus 12.
- The Summer Session courses would be designed to serve two purposes:
  - <u>Allow students who wish to re-take a course they have already completed</u> in order to be better prepared for their next subsequent course.
  - <u>Allow students with an "A" standing in their last mathematics course to accelerate</u> their learning by taking the next level mathematics course.
- The Summer Session program would be delivered through a combination of at home preparation, video lessons, at school classes, and individual tutorials.
- The cost of the Summer Session program will be approximately \$1,250 plus any additional costs for books.
