Balancing Fixed and Unfixed Mindsets

When we work through problems, sometimes it's really helpful to be fixated on the issue so that we can work towards a solution more effectively. Perseverance and grit, two important attributes of performance character that have received an abundance of positive press over the past few years, rely on being able to fix our mind on working through problems while not letting obstacles get in the way of our success.

Arriving at the exact opposite conclusion, it seems, Carol Dewek from Stanford University has shown that a fixed mindset can have its disadvantages. In essence, having a fixed mindset means that people believe their basic qualities, like their intelligence or talent, are simply fixed traits. On the other hand, having an unfixed mindset (or a growth mindset, as it is more commonly known) means that people believe that their most basic abilities can be developed through dedication and hard work, and that brains and talent are just a starting point.

Moreover, having an unfixed, positive mindset in math specifically does more than just help students feel confident about their skills. It also does more than help them keep trying when they fail. As it turns out, a student's belief about math learning can produce more efficient brain activity. According to Sarah Sparks, also from Stanford University, the brains of students with higher positive-mindset levels have greater activity and faster, smoother connections in brain areas associated with quick recall of facts and math problem-solving.

Furthermore, emotions associated with a student's belief about math and his or her thought structures are closely aligned. In fact, emotion is inseparable from learning, and neuroscience has made it clear through numerous tests and studies that the social-emotional dimension of students' lives is not tangential to academic success but foundational to it. In that regard, the brain is not compartmentalized, and the emotion associated with motivation is not separate from activities like problem solving.

So, as we encourage our children and students to develop important character traits such as perseverance and grit, it is also essential for us to help them distinguish between when it is beneficial for their brains to be fixed on a problem and when it is

better for them to have an unfixed, or growth, mindset. Developing a balanced view creates a love of learning and a resilience that is essential for great accomplishment.

As he made his fifth or sixth pass, I noticed a spot and I waved him in. Together we shared a laugh about the struggles with dismissal parking as a common theme that all schools must address. I wished his team well, and sent them off to the JS gym to face our Grade 5 girls' basketball team. The next day, we received a most complimentary email about Mr. Gallant, our coach, Madame Boyle, our Grade five girls' team, and even our Southridge parents. The email is as follows:

"The best part of my week these days is spending time coaching 4/5 girls' basketball. Last night the experience was made doubling pleasing by the reception and good treatment we received from staff and students at Southridge School. I wanted to make mention and thank the group for making us feel welcomed and leaving a sterling impression of your community.

We arrived at dismissal and your parking lot was a busy scene much like our own at that time of day. Laurel spotted me, came to say "hello" and then opened up parking at the very front of the school. This type of treatment is, at least by our local definition, royal. It certainly helped to set a positive tone for the visit.

I wanted to express my appreciation for Mr. Gallant who entertained our request to allow breaking our very large team into two smaller squads. He had to develop a special schedule in order to accommodate this request. He was referee for all of the games and was very flexible with my own requests to interrupt the game from time to time to instruct our girls. Likewise, he allowed all players appropriate "wiggle room" in relation to the rules so that the momentum and fun for each game was maintained.

I must also say that I was very impressed with the calibre of your players and the way they handled themselves on and off the court. Your coach mentioned that the girls had been working on passing games in their P.E. classes. The IB approach to teaching

Course Selections for 2016-17

In the next few weeks, I will be talking to students about their course selection options for the next academic year. There are limited choices for students currently in Grade 8, but an increasing range of elective courses as students move into the senior grades.

I will be speaking to the Grade 8 and 9 students during period 1 on Tuesday, January 26th. Mr. Weaver, Ms. Livingston and I will present to the Grade 9s and 10s during period 1 on Monday, February 1st and to the Grade 11s during period 2 on the 1st. At that time, students will be given course selection sheets to complete prior to entering their selections into Naviance – the database system that we use to record and manage

their choices. The course selection sheets are attached here for your convenience (they are also available on the parent portal) and to allow you to discuss the various options with your children. The closing date for students to enter their choices on Naviance is Monday, March 7th.

We will also be holding an information evening on Thursday, February 11^{th} . The first part of the evening from 6:30 - 7:15 pm will be directed at choices for our current Grade 8 and 9 students, and the latter part of the evening from 7:15 - 8:15 pm will cover the options available to our students in Grades 10 and 11. Of course, everyone is welcome to attend the entire presentation. The Curriculum Guide for 2016-17 will be available on the Southridge website soon and hardcopies will be available at the evening session on Thursday, February 11^{th} .

The timetable for 2016-2017 is built from the students' choices and we strive to create a schedule of classes that will deliver the optimum choices for the most students. However, it is highly probable that we will not be able to satisfy the elective choices of all students. For this reason, it is imperative that your son or daughter clearly identify his or her first, second, and third choices. Every effort will be made to give students their first choice, but students may be placed in their second or third choice options in order to avoid timetable conflicts or to balance class size.

I would encourage all students to talk to their peers, teachers, parents and counsellors; to gain as much knowledge as they can in order to make informed choices as they move forward with their academic goals. I think it is also important to stress that students should follow those courses in which they have a genuine interest or passion, remembering that excellence usually comes from optimism, engagement and commitment.


