Sometimes We Cry

Life, like learning, can be tough sometimes. When Van Morrison wrote the lyrics to the song <u>Sometimes We Cry</u> in 1997, I doubt very much he was thinking about a growth mindset and the importance of struggle in the learning process. However, there is definitely some alignment between the words he wrote and what the past seventy-five years of research has documented – that learning is enhanced when students persist through perplexity and dilemma and struggle until successful. You don't need to take the song literally, of course, to get the message of the first stanza.

Sometimes we know, sometimes we don't Sometimes we give, sometimes we won't Sometimes we're strong, sometimes we're wrong Sometimes we cry

As a matter of fact, it was educational philosopher John Dewey who, over a century ago, described learning as beginning with a dilemma – an uncertainty about how to proceed. Struggling to work through uncertainty and ambiguity to discover a solution was, for Dewey, essential to meaningful learning. Learning in the classroom and learning in life are the same kind of thing, after all. Sometimes we don't align the two experiences, treating school learning in one way and life learning in a different way, but, as Dewey said, "Education is not preparation for life; education is life itself" . . . and as Van Morrison wrote,

Sometimes it's bad when the going gets tough When we look in the mirror and we want to give up Sometimes we don't even think we'll try Sometimes we cry

To be sure, and I know I speak for all of the teachers at Southridge when I say this, we don't want your children literally crying every night as they fight though their homework. Of course not! The point is that learning is often a struggle, though. It is more often confusing than straight-forward, more often messy than clear and tidy, and it is more often uncertain than unquestionable. The solution?



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Well, we're gonna have to sit down and think it right through If we're only human what more can we do? The only thing to do is eat humble pie Sometimes we cry

We're going to struggle. We're going to make mistakes. We're going to feel emotional when we can't figure it out the first time. Is that so bad?

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Course Selections for 2016-17

In the next few weeks, I will be talking to students about their course selection options for the next academic year. There are limited choices for students currently in Grade 8, but an increasing range of elective courses as students move into the senior grades.

I will be speaking to the Grade 8 and 9 students during period 1 on Tuesday, January 26th. Mr. Weaver, Ms. Livingston and I will present to the Grade 9s and 10s during period 1 on Monday, February 1st and to the Grade 11s during period 2 on the 1st. At that time, students will be given course selection sheets to complete prior to entering their selections into Naviance – the database system that we use to record and manage their choices. The course selection sheets are attached here for your convenience (they are also available on the parent portal) and to allow you to discuss the various options with your children. The closing date for students to enter their choices on Naviance is Monday, March 7th.

We will also be holding an information evening on Thursday, February 11^{th} . The first part of the evening from 6:30 - 7:15 pm will be directed at choices for our current Grade 8 and 9 students, and the latter part of the evening from 7:15 - 8:15 pm will cover the options available to our students in Grades 10 and 11. Of course, everyone is welcome to attend the entire presentation. The Curriculum Guide for 2016-17 will be available on the Southridge website soon and hardcopies will be available at the evening session on Thursday, February 11^{th} .

The timetable for 2016-2017 is built from the students' choices and we strive to create a schedule of classes that will deliver the optimum choices for the most students. However, it is highly probable that we will not be able to satisfy the elective choices of all students. For this reason, it is imperative that your son or daughter clearly identify his or her first, second, and third choices. Every effort will be made to give students their first choice, but students may be placed in their second or third choice options in order to avoid timetable conflicts or to balance class size.



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I would encourage all students to talk to their peers, teachers, parents and counsellors; to gain as much knowledge as they can in order to make informed choices as they move forward with their academic goals. I think it is also important to stress that students should follow those courses in which they have a genuine interest or passion, remembering that excellence usually comes from optimism, engagement and commitment.

The students attended 30 hours of French instruction at Media Langues with their teacher Christian. They studied French grammar and learned about the Creole culture.

Outside of school hours, students had many opportunities to use their French in the community; ordering gelato, buying groceries and communicating with the residents of Sainte-Anne.

We went kayaking through the mangroves, visited the Edgar Clerc Museum of Archeology in Moule, took rides on Segways, and went to the Museum of Slavery in Pointe-a-Pitre. Students enjoyed a field trip with Christian to Bassin-Paradis, a waterfall on the other half of the island called Basse-Terre. On the weekend, we enjoyed a day trip to an adjacent island called Petite Terre and snorkeled the lagoon. Students were able to see sharks, rays and many tropical fish. We were treated to barbecued fish right on the beach and were able to check out the iguanas that cover the island. We spent the second day of the weekend on a speed boat, where we explored other islands, like l'île Caret. We were able to enjoy more fresh fish on an island where we were kneedeep in Caribbean waters with fish swimming around us!

It was through these experiences, the students learned about French culture, and also how independence comes with responsibility. It was a fantastic trip and I would like to thank the students for being great ambassadors of our School. We hope to visit Guadeloupe again in the future!

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In my last article, I spoke about two of my close family members who had recently been diagnosed with cancer: my oldest brother, Martin, and my niece, Eimear, his daughter. Both of them have had their surgeries already, and the prognosis is very good. My brother is the more fortunate one – he does not require chemotherapy – but my niece who has breast cancer and had a mastectomy has to follow up with several treatments.

It is times like this, I feel very fortunate to be able to participate in **The Ride to Conquer Cancer**, and I would never pretend that it is easy for me, but I also realize that it only lasts for two days. Southridge School expects that every student will **be enrolled in 6 classes.** Southridge students are also expected to have completed a fine art course in either grade 11 or 12. Portfolio 12 is a mandatory university preparatory class, but should not be included as one of the six required courses, as it meets only once per 8 day cycle.

English 12 is required for graduation and there is a mandatory provincial examination for this course. The provincial graduation scholarship of \$1250 is based upon a student's results in English 12 and on the four other mandatory exams: English 10, Science 10, Math 10, & Social Studies 11. To qualify for this scholarship students must obtain a "B" (73%) in English 12 and rank among the top 3,000 students in BC. The top 20 students will receive \$2,500.
