Holiday 'Break'

We will be a mere two days (if you are the students, you would clarify that it is one and half, Mr. Palm!) away from the holiday break. I purposely put the word "break" in quotation marks in the title because I want to touch on this thought for my final submission of the calendar year. Southridge (and really, life these days) is pretty fast paced and there are many opportunities and expectations placed on students during the year. As we have come away from the past few weeks of amazing musical concerts, successful finishes to fall athletics and incredibly strong starts to our winter sports, and our academic term culminating in reports being distributed, I note some tired eyes that arrive in the mornings and less spring in the step. The next three weeks away will be important to take advantage of and use the break.

I recently found an article in *Scientific American* from October 2013 titled, "Why Your Brain Needs More Downtime." In it, the author cites not only scientific; but also, mindfulness experts that stress the importance of providing your mind with a break or rest. Michael Taft, an author and meditation coach, explains that "currently, the speed of life doesn't allow enough interstitial time for things to just kind of settle down." From a number of scientific studies done on this topic, it has been found that "downtime replenishes the brain's stores of attention and motivation, encourages productivity and creativity, and is essential to both achieve our highest levels of performance and simply form stable memories in everyday life."

Ideally, the brain works best when there is a natural cycle of work (which can certainly be intense) and then, time for rest and rejuvenation. In fact, the article states that "moments of respite may even be necessary to keep one's moral compass in working order and maintain a sense of self." So, not only is taking a break important from a performance perspective, but also, in looking at ensuring we are able to develop our character.

Looking from a completely personal point of view, I cherish these breaks to allow my focus to move away from my role at school. I can be with my family and friends and give them time that isn't always there during a hectic term. But as the article explains, it is important to take time for oneself. I encourage you to allow this for your children and to see its necessity for their well-being.

Some suggestions might include: reading a book that is not connected with school, practicing a hobby that has been neglected, watching a movie, going on a hike or skiing/snowboarding. And, given we are talking about adolescents – it most certainly will include sleeping! All of these activities help to relax and rejuvenate the brain. I know that the three weeks away may tempt students and parents into thinking that it is an opportunity to catch up in some subjects and that revision and studying should be done; however, this just inhibits the purpose of the break. It doesn't let the brain and body rest to be prepared for the rigours and challenges of Term Two!

You might recall that last year I used the analogy of a battery. It is impossible to recharge one if you are using it. In order to really rest and rejuvenate, you have to permit yourself to stop.

University Counselling Update

Over the past two weeks, I have met individually with the Grade 12's who are applying to Canadian and U.K. universities and Mr. Weaver has met with those applying to the U.S. During this 3rd appointment, we have reviewed the status of the applications, answered any questions or concerns about the process of applying, advised on completing supplemental essays, coached on conducting video or in-person interviews and clarified when and how to send marks.

Sending Marks to Canadian Universities

There is no "one size fits all" type of answer about when to send. The rule of thumb regarding the sending of marks is that each student will be guided by their university about "next steps" for their application. To assist our Grads, I have connected with them and explained how each university prefers to receive marks.

For Canadian universities, students can send their Term one marks (either by self-reporting or by requesting a transcript be sent on Naviance). There is no downside to sending Term one because, as each university representative tells us, there are no denials issued based on Term one marks (with the exception of a couple of highly specialized programs, for example: Nanotechnology Engineering at Waterloo). A number of universities will make offers based on Term one marks. If an offer cannot be made because the average is below the threshold competitive average, students are asked to keep updating the universities as soon as new marks information is available. The next issuance of a transcript is Monday, February 1st, which is a report made available for Grade 12 students only. Please be reminded that threshold competitive averages are not fixed and can vary throughout the admissions season, depending on the pool of applicants.

As an example:

SFU provides applicants with a self-report page on their "GoSFU" portal. This page opens on Monday, January 4th and students can self-report as many times as they like until they receive an offer for their program. SFU provides updated information on competitive averages as they change for admission throughout the winter and spring. See this link for Fall 2015's competitive averages:

Most Ontario Universities prefer that a Southridge transcript be sent (exception – Western has a self-report page on the student portal) e.g. Queen's will accept a Term one transcript and if an offer is not made based on that average, students can send their February 1st marks or their Term two marks in March.

Alberta universities will be happy to receive a Term one transcript as well as prairies and east coast universities.

For UBC Applicants

If the application was not sent in for the first deadline of Thursday, December 10th, I have met with each student, discussed essays and video (Sauder and dual-degree only) and encouraged them to work on their applications and essays over the break. I highly recommend that they practice the video by running their laptop camera and having someone ask a behavioural-type interview question and time them for 90 seconds. What is apparent about this new assessment is that while the questions are very straightforward, it is the recording of the answers that throws students as they are watching themselves on the screen as they talk. This seems a little daunting for some and requires practice. Some of the practice questions are: "What do you do to handle stress in your life?" or "In a group project, one of your team members is upset, how do you handle this?" Check this <u>link</u> for more prep suggestions.

When we return on Monday, January 11th, there will be a few days where we can give feedback about essays, but students are encouraged not to leave working on their application until close to the Sunday, January 31st deadline.

Regarding marks, UBC does not want to see any Grade 12 marks until the self-report portal opens in mid-March allowing them to report their Term two marks.

Offers of Admission

While some students may receive offers from Canadian, U.K. or U.S. colleges or universities early in Term two based on Term one marks, the bulk of offers for September 2016 will be made between mid-March and mid-May and are based on Mid-Year marks in early February or Term two marks in mid-March.

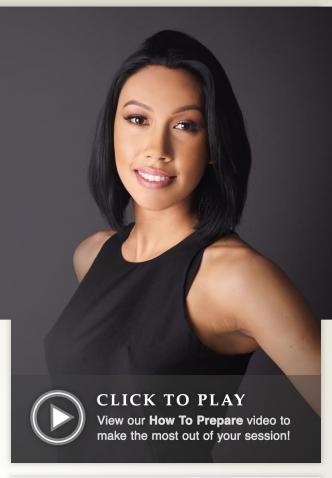
