The Masquerade Gala

This was a Gala to remember. When I found out it was planned as a masquerade event, I was really excited because I had never been to such an occasion. Of course, I wanted to find out more about the history of these kinds of things and so I dug around . . . and was quite surprised by what I found.

For those of you who may not be aware, masquerade events have both a glamorous and gruesome history dating all the way back to the 14th Century. Beginning as part of Europe's carnival season, villagers would gather in masks and costumes to take part in elaborate pageants and glamorous processions. By the time France got involved toward the end of the century, though, the masquerade ball had transformed into a night of intrigue and risk sometimes ending with costumes catching on fire and, presumably, serious injury.

Not to be outdone, after reviving the masquerade ball in the 16th Century, Renaissance Italy upped the ante and added decadence, gluttony and an abundance of lust to the intrigue and risk, and a mere 200 hundred years later the event transformed once again, adding a sinister edge to the gruesome affair. Certainly, the King of Sweden danced his last dance at his own masquerade ball in 1771 when an unhappy aristocrat used his masks to sneak into the ball and do-si-doe close enough to the king to assassinate him. From that point onward, the masquerade ball was associated with an ultimate night of risk, inspiring operas and plays alike.

After learning more about these kinds of masquerade affairs I was a little less excited and a lot more apprehensive.

Luckily, our co-chairs Jody Thomas and Anita Hundal, dedicated an incredible amount of effort into establishing our Masquerade Gala as a tasteful and elegant affair – far from the madding crowds of 18th Century Europe. For those of you who were not able to attend, our masquerade gala in no way, shape or form resembled the storied and dramatic affairs of the past. Speaking on behalf of the gala attendees, all you had to do was look around to appreciate the tasteful transformation of our gym into to a place of style and panache.

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My sincerest appreciation goes out to everyone who had anything to do with organizing this year's gala. As always, volunteerism at Southridge never ceases to amaze me. Were it not for the combined efforts and contributions of so many parent volunteers, this evening would never have been possible. Reporting Student Marks to Post Secondary Institutions.

Grade 12 can be an anxious time for both students and their parents. Ms. Livingston, Mr. Weaver and I have been talking to our grade 12 students to advise them of the best procedure for ensuring that their marks are reported in an accurate and timely manner. The criteria and deadlines for applying to different institutions and programs have become much more varied and complex, as institutions vie for the very best students, and we need to help our students advocate for themselves in an appropriate manner. To this end I have clarified what is, and is not, appropriate in discussing marks with their teachers. Students should not approach teachers directly for additional marks, or ask for extra assignments to generate better marks. They can, and should, ask for help in developing their skills and understanding, attend additional tutorials, work with a peer tutor – all of which may lead to the desired improvement in performance.

I have advised students that if they need to advocate for an increased mark – they are just shy of an average for a competitive program or a major scholarship for example - then the correct pathway would be to go directly to Mr. Weaver, Ms. Livingston or myself. Similarly we would ask that parents follow the same procedure and approach

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the University Counsellors with any specific requests. Together Mr. Weaver, Ms. Livingston and I would discuss the legitimacy of the request and approach the teachers concerned. Please be assured that, though we must maintain our integrity as an academic institution, we will always work for the optimum benefit of our students.

Stories of Character: Episode VI

As Term One winds down, the busy nature of our school winds up, and in this sometimes stressful environment, character often reveals itself. Along with projects, tests, debates, and report cards, the Fall Season of Athletics is also wrapping up. In typical Southridge fashion, this doesn't just mean a quiet wrap-up dinner, but, increasingly frequently over the last several years, it involves participating in the highest level of secondary school athletics possible here, the BC Provincial Championships.

This fall, all of our teams played in these major tournaments. While the Senior Girls Field Hockey Team was battling it out in Victoria, the Senior Boys Soccer came very close to winning it all in Kelowna. At the time of this writing, Senior Volleyball is still fighting it out, and our one Cross Country athlete, Cayla Smith, battled through an icy rainstorm and muddy conditions more suitable to a World War I re-enactment than a final race of the season.

But it was our Swim Team that really wowed me this season. If you were at Senior Assembly this past Monday, you would have heard their story, but it is certainly worth repeating here. Every year, this group of athletes somehow seems to outdo many much larger schools at the Provincial level and this year was no exception – they finished an astonishing fifth out of over forty schools competing. Isabelle Lei, Lauren Toy, and Catherine Grimme scored some remarkable individual results in their events, but it was in the relay events that something special happened. While the mixed foursome of Karl Rumm, Katherine Toy, Isabelle Lei and Tony Ma impressively earned a bronze medal, the heavily favoured girls' relay team faced some adversity. Ranked first after the qualifying heats and the defending champions, they romped over the competition and easily won the final race. However, post-race they were informed that they had been disqualified because of a slightly early start. It would have been easily for the team to turn in on itself and to point fingers at each other in their extreme disappointment. What happened instead was something magical: they stood together and proclaimed that the loss didn't matter, that they had tried their best as a team, and were already looking

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forward to returning next year as senior athletes. Clearly, they are really a team rather than a set of individuals, and their opponents next year better watch out.

What is so neat about this unexpected reaction is it highlights how our kids deal with adversity. Granted, they don't have a lot of practice at this crucial skill – they are often so successful in so many ways, and are surrounded by so many supportive parents and teachers that try to protect them – often to a fault. The character they showed in facing loss, then, was so much more powerful than a story of victory would have been – and I'm thankful that their coach, Ms. Beer, was able to share it with all of us as an inspiring lesson in teamwork at Monday's assembly.
