What's Disrupting Education?

Three weeks ago I was in Halifax at the Canadian Accredited Independent Schools (CAIS) Annual Heads and Chairs Conference. The theme of the conference was, "The 21st Century Learner: What do They Need from US?" Although there were many highlights during the few days I spent in Halifax, chief among them spending valuable time with colleagues from across the country, numerous speakers stood out in my mind. One of the speakers co-authored the book titled, *Blended: Using Disruptive Innovation to Improve Schools*. Heather Staker, Senior Research Fellow at the Clayton Christensen Institute for Disruptive Innovation, is one of the world's foremost experts on K-12 blended learning and has been widely recognized for her work identifying and defining the most common models of blended learning. In a nutshell, blended learning is a formal education program in which a student learns at least in part through delivery of content and instruction via digital and online media with some element of student control over time, place, path, or pace. Blended learning has been a part of our technology integration plan at Southridge for a number of years, and I was glad to have the opportunity to hear Dr. Staker speak.

Education is a very traditional profession, for many good reasons; but speaking in terms of disruptions that have really changed our game, well, the last one came hundreds of years ago (around 1440) when the Johannes Gutenberg, a goldsmith by profession, devised a hand mold to create metal movable type, and adapted screw presses and other existing technologies, to create a printing system. That's right, the last serious disruption to education – the printing press – happened well over 600 years ago.

Since then, education has been sustaining innovation, which isn't a bad thing, but it's just not as game changing as a truly disruptive innovation. According to the Clayton Christensen Institute, disruptive innovation describes a process by which a product or service takes root initially in simple applications but then eventually displaces the status quo as the new norm. That is what happened when the printing press was invented, and, make no mistake about it, it is also what's happening right now with what we loosely refer to as "technology". Education hasn't seen this kind of disruption for literally hundreds of years.

As a teacher, this disruption has made it a very exciting time to be a part of education. On the other hand, it can be unsettling for parents — especially for those parents who did not learn in a school environment where technology applications were so present. No one wants their kids to be "experimented on," and, when it comes to our kids, all of us want to know they are safe, which is sometimes difficult to do in a world where technology applications, or apps, are so ubiquitous.

The "App Generation" is a term coined by Katie Davis of the University of Washington and Howard Gardner, Professor of Cognition and Education at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. At the CAIS conference they talked about the ways our digital youth seem inseparable from the technologies that define our times. Their book, *The App Generation*, explores how youth navigate identity, intimacy, and imagination in an on-line world and in a way we never had to do.

Beyond fascinating, my time in Halifax was thought-provoking and it got me thinking even more about the future of education and how schools will continue to evolve and adapt due to the disruption being caused by technology and its various applications. One thing's for sure, though, online learning will not replace teachers, and the importance of face to face interactions, engagement and dialogue is more important than ever, which, of course, our educational programs at Southridge recognize and address.

Incidentally, many people have asked me what the Senior School Harkness program is, and our Senior School teachers have often wondered if treating the word as an acronym would be helpful in addressing the misunderstanding that Harkness is NOT a program; rather it is a philosophy that connects what we do at Southridge from Kindergarten to Grade 12, albeit in more and more sophisticated ways as our students grow older. Considering the context on this article, the Harkness acronym might just sound something like this: How we Are Responding to the Kinds of Necessary Educational disruptions Stimulating our Society.

I would like to invite all students in Grades 3 to 7 who are interested in swimming and competing at all the swim meets for their specific grade. Practices will be on Fridays, 3:45 - 4:45 pm at the Surrey Sport and Leisure Complex on Fraser Hwy.

Practice dates are: November 20th, November 27th, December 11th before Winter Break, continuing on Fridays once we return until mid-February (all dates will be sent once team is confirmed)

Each swimmer needs to be comfortable and confident in deep water and have taken swim lessons up to level 5 or equivalent. This means that your child is able to complete 25 meters of freestyle (front crawl) and backstroke, and learning to dive. It is recommended that students are comfortable swimming 50m at a time without rest.

Our swim meets this year are:

Wednesday, February 3rd – Southpointe Relay Meet at Watermania in Richmond, Monday, January 18, 2016- ISEA Jamboree in Victoria (gr 3-5 only) and February (TBA) the ISEA Invitational Championships meet (coach invites swimmers Grades 3 - 7).

All swimmers are expected to attend the swim meets at their grade level.

If our numbers exceed 60 swimmers, we will need to alternate practices like last year. More information will be sent out once we have all swimmers signed up. Please have your child sign up for the swim team starting this week, November 9th to 13, at Ms. Reid's classroom or by email. Please email me if you have any questions.

Southridge pride from a student voice

Last week was our Open House, which invokes a number of thoughts and emotions in everyone here. It is an important evening in our school calendar – we are hosting

guests and want to show the school in the very best light. Think of when someone important is to arrive at your own home. You make sure everything is clean and tidy, set out the best dishes and cutlery and ensure that everyone is behaved and really focused on making a great impression for your visitors. That mindset is front and centre for the week prior to this evening – it takes everyone to get the school ready for these important visitors arriving to our home! Truth be told, over the last five years I have been at Southridge, the Open House is amongst my favourite events. The school does looks wonderful and yes, the students' uniforms are worn as beautifully as ever; however, the real reason I love it so much is that I get to hear the students share their love and pride for Southridge in their own voices!

As a new visiting family arrives through our heavy wood doors (which in fact are opened by two students waiting to welcome them), they spend a quick moment speaking with a parent, Board member or a member of our Admission staff who greet them. As they move along the front hall area they reach the starting point of the "Student Tours". At this point there are students clambering to be the one to tour our guest family always with a smile and a big "Ask Me" button on their blazer lapel. This is when the magic begins – and it comes from a combination of the tour guide and the various students and staff that they meet along the way!

I completely admit to eavesdropping and actually following around a number of these student tours. To an onlooker, it may seem that I am worried about what the student might say, but in fact it is the desire to hear them be so positive about their school. Each guide is different just like their personality – soft spoken or stronger in tone, an athlete perhaps or a thespian, an artist or one who is passionate about service learning. In fact, they may be all of these combined! Regardless of their interests, it is *how* they tell the tale. Let me give an example to illustrate my enthusiasm.

As they arrive at a specific area, say, Media Arts, they might begin with something like, "This is our Media Arts area, and it is my favourite class. Mr. Westendorf is the Media Arts teacher – he's really good at his job! Let me introduce you." Another student might arrive at a Math classroom and immediately connect with a fellow student that is volunteering in the area. Together, they show their excitement of an interesting problem and how they connect with a teacher. Finally, as students might take their guests toward the Great Hall and pass by the Outdoor Education table or the Exchange one and talk passionately of their experiences in these realms. As someone that uses visuals cues a great deal due to my hearing impairment, I notice the facial expressions of both parties involved in this interaction – student and guests. Often times, the students eyes literally light up as they talk about an area of the school and the guest is very engaged not only

by the words that the student is sharing, but also the manner and passion in which they are intently connecting with their son or daughter. It is a pretty special event to witness! As the tour returns back to front hall and comes to an end, the student tour guide finishes by thanking them for coming and invariably asks them if they have any further questions they can answer. As they do this it is always with a big grin – I'm not quite certain if this is due to an important sense of politeness or just the fact that the tour guide is enjoying themselves so much!

Last week I had the same conversation with two different families after their tour. Families often seek out a member of staff once their tour has concluded and when they find out my role, they want to convey how impressed they were with the student providing the tour. I thank them and try to reiterate that indeed the student is wonderful. However, these two families were not quite satisfied with my reaction. They both said something like, "No, they were REALLY good, I mean we were incredibly impressed with their confidence and knowledge and how positive they interacted with the teachers!" It makes me incredibly proud and I feel fortunate to be able to hear these compliments.

And the most impressive aspect of the evening is that every student that was a tour guide showed this pride and joy for their school in their own individual and unique way. In the words of one of our guests, "it blew me away! My daughter is so excited at the possibility to come to Southridge – we are so happy that we came tonight." I agree!




