Our Campus Master Plan

Many of our parents and students will remember the process Southridge followed last year to design our Campus Master Plan. For those readers new to our school, the Southridge community was invited to participate in meeting one of our school's strategic priorities – to develop a long-term vision for our campus. Working closely with architects Simon Richards and Les Andrew, our teachers, staff, parents, students and alumni helped our Campus Master Plan Committee inform the plan's development by providing excellent insights and valuable feedback. Both Simon and Les have years of experience designing campuses and buildings for the world of education – and independent schools in particular.

Over the course of one full year (from May 2014 to May 2015), our community held many sessions with Simon and Les as we worked together to outline how the future of our school's campus would look. Keep in mind that the point of our campus planning process was to outline, not design, the buildings that would be built, the renovations that would be undertaken and internal movements that would take place as we envision the future physical configuration of our campus over the next twenty to thirty years.

Of particular note were the open house events that Southridge hosted for parents, students, faculty, staff and alumni. In true Southridge fashion, the planning committee undertook a highly collaborative, discussion-based approach to gathering feedback and input into the development of our plan. Simon and Les were extremely complimentary of our school community, and they frequently told me how much they enjoyed the way our various constituent groups engaged in the open house process.

Those parents who participated in the open houses will likely recall that the Campus Master Plan Committee presented three versions of how our campus might look in the future. Although sometimes referred to as "options" or "choices" by some people – mostly students, the fact is that the feedback provided through the consultative open house process was not intended to conclude in a vote on the "options". In keeping with the governance responsibilities of the Board of Governors, the Campus Master Plan Committee worked with Simon and Les to assess the feedback, revise the plan if necessary and present a final version of the plan to the Board for approval.

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I am very happy to let you know that the Board's recent discussion at its September meeting, has led me to share with you that a final version of the plan has been approved and accepted by our governors. In the end, the approved Campus Master Plan is a combination of all three versions, and its development was highly influenced by the feedback the school received from its constituent groups. In addition, there is flexibility built into the plan so that the school will not be overly committed to a particular direction for the next three decades – especially as the needs of our school, and the landscape of education in general, progress and evolve.

The next step with our Campus Master Plan will **not** be to build anything immediately; rather it will be to identify its phases of development and suggest a phasing timeline for the Board to consider. This, too, will be an elaborate process that will likely take the remainder of the school year to complete. I look forward to sharing the progress of the Campus Master Plan Phasing Committee's work with you over the course of the school year. Collaboration – A personal reflection from last week

Collaboration is likely a word that you have heard being linked to education lately. It certainly isn't a new concept, but its importance as a skill to be developed in students has increased. It is one of the 4 C's along with Critical Thinking, Communication and Creativity. Each one of these are vital skills for people to possess to be successful in the workplace regardless of profession or chosen field. You will find it in our Senior School Educational Program (SSEP) and in the new Ministry of BC Curriculum it is identified as



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one of the Core Competencies. For the most part our focus in developing lies with the students. Creating opportunities and experiences to develop this key skill is a foundational element in the Harkness philosophy of learning. It is also prevalent in experiential education as often this occurs with 'doing' an activity with others. However, in order to help facilitate this important skill, as a teacher developing it in oneself is incredibly important.

At most faculty meetings in the Senior School we have built in opportunities to collaborate, whether it is discussing a reading or sharing a best practice. Realizing how much others – colleagues or experts – have to offer in our own learning is an incredibly important insight to gain. While some people have a natural affinity to share or interact with others everyone needs to practice these skills to improve. More recently the ability to collaborate with other educators has widened with technology. For example, there are many blogs, twitter feeds and just the ease to connect through social media in general that has made learning from others a positive experience. I have a number of colleagues that I connect with in different provinces and countries, asking them questions and opinions about a myriad of topics to gain further insight from their experiences and skill.

Mostly, the collaboration happens within the walls of the school – albeit with a wider view if we can be online with someone globally. Last week I was fortunate to be able to go beyond the walls of Southridge and travel with 3 other teachers to visit three different schools that are employing the Harkness philosophy of discussion-based learning. We set up time to observe classes being taught and perhaps more importantly time to meet with teachers and administrators to discuss successes and challenges they face in maximizing student learning. We gained an incredible amount of insight not only about these schools, but also in our own effectiveness as a school.

Our trip away provided me with two other interesting pieces of knowledge. As much as we were thinking that the meetings and observations would provide us with important feedback, we learned that our presence at these schools provided our hosts with feedback as well. Our own experiences from Southridge helped these schools to look at their own practices and be able to see opportunities in which they could grow. The other learning point was that while away and travelling with these three colleagues the amount of meaningful conversation that occurred helped to raise the learning to an even richer level. We were able to discuss how a certain practice might work here or if there were any overarching themes we were gleaning from a particular visit. I came away with a respect and appreciation of my colleagues here at Southridge and at the other schools. It was a very worthwhile experience and one that helped me to understand the

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importance of providing opportunities for collaborative learning – for faculty and students.

I have been very fortunate to have been paired up with the A'Speculo family as they have been wonderful in inviting me into their family. The Ballarat Grammar community is accepting of all cultures and does a wonderful job of making everyone feel welcome. The teachers were always pleasant and ready to answer our questions. The three electives I chose were painting and drawing, VCE band performance, and agriculture. I thoroughly enjoyed agriculture as it was very different compared to my home. I loved spending time with the unique animals and I must have taken 3,000 photos of the beautiful Australian landscape.

In painting and drawing, we looked at photos of people from a different perspectives then drew these perspectives with charcoal. Along with taking an art as an elective, art theory is also included. I thoroughly enjoyed art theory as we analyzed shapes and the symbolism in war art. I appreciated the VCE band performance course at Ballarat Grammar because the music was exciting and made me look forward to coming to band class. The teachers seamlessly let me into the program and made me feel welcome and a part of the band. My school, Southridge School, believes that by attending a different school in adifferent country, students can begin to appreciate not only cultural differences, but also the similarities that young people share no matter where they live. I found that the environment in Ballarat Grammar was inclusive as the teachers and students were very warm and welcoming. I was inspired by how the citizens of Ballarat always greeted one another with a smile and a g'day. As your paper previously reported Anglicare was an example of the many service opportunities that Ballarat Grammar offers. Like my school, Southridge, Ballarat

University Counselling Update

This cycle of Portfolio 12 classes has been the first of two application workshops. All Grads were required to begin one of their Canadian university applications and open up accounts with the Ontario Universities Application Centre (OUAC) or with ApplyBC or ApplyAlberta or other. During the workshop, students were made aware that applying to universities is a multi-step process. Once applications are received, universities will then provide further instructions about supplemental essays and when and how to send marks for evaluation. We spent part of the class discussing the ways in which universities receive marks through self-reporting, sending Southridge transcript or Ministry of Education transcripts. The majority of offers are made between mid-March and mid-May.

Beginning November 5th, Grads will be meeting for the 2nd of five structured individual appointments with Ms. Livingston and Mr. Weaver. We will be reviewing the action items set during meeting #1, discussing the progress of their applications and any questions they have regarding the timing and how to send marks to their universities.

University Essays Workshops

To assist students with questions about writing the supplemental essays required for admission, the University Counselling Office is running three essay workshops. The first one was last Wednesday and focussed primarily on students applying for early admission to US colleges.

The second workshop is this Wednesday, November 4th from 3 to 4pm in Room 236. The third workshop is on Monday, November 16th from 3 to 4pm in the Library.

"I have some bad news." We never want to get that phone call, and sadly, I have had that message twice in last two weeks. Heart and kidney disease were the two problems for my family but not cancer, never cancer until now.

I was one of eight children, and although I live on the west coast of Canada and they are in Ireland, we have always remained a tightly knit family. My pain is their pain, and we experienced great sadness when one of my brothers died 20 years ago, but we supported each other and his young family.

We have been called once again to support each other as my oldest brother has just been diagnosed with colon cancer, and less than one week later, his daughter, my niece also got the same devastating news that she has breast cancer. Father and daughter, brother and niece facing the challenge together.

We are not called the "fighting Irish" for no reason, and I know they will deal with this head on. When I spoke to my brother, I was reminded of Serena and her mantra, "Breeding Optimism", as he is not prepared to let this disease rob him of his future. My niece is her father's daughter, tenacious and feisty, and I know they will be arm and arm in battle together.

Last year, the Friends of Southridge team had the hardest ride of their lives as it was during the freak storm at the end of August, but they did it. They also raised a tremendous amount of money, and many of you supported them. Thank you! I did not



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participate as I was in Ireland but this year, I have two great reasons; my brother and my niece. This year, my ride will be for them.






