### The World Remembers Vigil in the Alan Brown Great Hall

In preparation for Remembrance Day on November 11, and our Remembrance Day Ceremony that will be held in the Senior School gymnasium on November 10 beginning at 10:15 am, Southridge will be supporting the World Remembers Vigil beginning next week on October 5.

Created by Canadian television, stage and film actor, R.H. Thomson, the World Remembers Vigil project is a privately-funded venture that strives to commemorate and honour the people who lost their lives during the First World War. The project is organized in a way that allows schools and communities across the world to display the names of soldiers who were killed in 1915, the second year of the war.

From October 5 to November 11, the name of each Canadian killed will be projected prominently onto the fire place in the foyer of the Alan Brown Great Hall. Each Canadian name will be surrounded by six other names. The other names commemorate the soldiers from other participating nations who died in the war. Over the course of the three-week period we will see the names of all 519,000 people from around the world who were killed during the war in 1915.

Last year, Southridge displayed the names of the 290,000 people who died during the first year of the war – 1914. The names of those killed after 1915 will appear in subsequent years, each name appearing in the 100th year after their death. All names will appear in all displays in all countries, and they will appear at the same time relative to their time zone. Displays will run for 11 hours each day and each name will appear on a precise day, hour and minute. The "Search the Names" function on the World Remembers website (<a href="www.theworldremembers.org">www.theworldremembers.org</a>), will help you find the display time of a name you may want to remember personally – or have your child(ren) remember while at school.

We are proud to be participants in the World Remembers Vigil, and I invite you into the Senior School foyer at any time to see how Southridge has made an effort to remember those men and women who died during the war.

We believe in starting this journey with a promise indicating that they will 'try'. Then, if a mistake is made, we can redirect back to their promise and know that a moment of growth has occurred for them. Candidly, these young people at Southridge have well developed characters, and we do know them to be respectful, honest students. We are just helping them to be their best—and it is an honour to witness their growth and developing maturity by making a commitment to this promise.

## Mini School Night - A Reminder of a Vital Partnership

Last Thursday, it was wonderful to see so many Senior School parents attend our Mini School Night. I noted, as I greeted many of you outside of the gym prior to registration, that there was a mix of new families to our Senior School and our 'veteran' families who have been to this night many times. It reminded me of how important it is to continue to ensure that this partnership stays strong as together we ensure your children are able to thrive in their learning.

Recently, at our Meet the Leaders event for new families, I shared the idea that sometimes working with adolescents can be challenging. Often there are times when they are emotionally overwhelmed with a situation or issue and other times, they seem to be literally "on top of the world" positive. As parents, you will know the change from one extreme to another can happen within the same day – or even within the same hour! An administrative colleague of mine refers to this as "The Wave". As an adult involved in an adolescent's life (parent, teacher, coach) riding this wave can be exhausting. This wise administrator friend of mine advises many parents not to ride the wave – try to remain calm and even keeled. It can really help students to see this unflustered approach from a trusted adult. I was also reminded of another tidbit of wisdom that our adolescent children are similar to a 2-3 year old in terms of their desire for independence. I am certain that there have been or will be times that this fierce desire to make their own decisions will create some conflict between you. However, much like a 2 year old that wants to run away from a parent, they will actually stop and look behind them to make sure you are still there. Similarly with adolescents, they really need their trusted adult figures to be there for them; they want you to be a part of their life and learning.

So, it was very encouraging to have so many of you attend Mini School Night, to learn a little bit about each of your child(ren)'s teachers and to understand what the course, assessment and plan is for each class. We also wanted to allow time for you to connect with your son or daughter's Advisor. This individual, as many of you will know, is a key advocate for them (and you) in all aspects of school life. They have an opportunity to check in every day with your child and are there to help and support.

Research has shown that parents need to be a part of their students learning to make it the most effective, even (and especially) in high school aged children. This doesn't mean that it is the same as when they were younger – they do need opportunities to be independent and make mistakes in order to grow and develop important life skills like resilience, organization and advocating for oneself. Supporting and encouraging them to do these things is vital for them to feel confident to try and take risks as they grow. Our learning management system (LMS) can help parents to know what work student have and to stay connected to the ongoing progress of their classes. We encourage parents to take advantage of this important tool. In addition, it is important for parents to feel confident to connect with any of the teachers or administration if you have any questions or concerns that come up during the year. We would love to hear any positive feedback as well if things aren't going smoothly! We are committed to reciprocating this promise and teachers will always communicate when there is a concern that you should know about. We will be having Parent Teacher conferences in January for the first time to help have another mid-year opportunity to speak with teachers about your child(ren)'s progress.

I am hopeful that Leadership Experience Week will bring some wonderfully positive stories and tales of learning from your children. It might have parts of the week that are a bit challenging – tales of struggle and being out of one's comfort zone as an example. However, these will all be important strides in learning about one's strengths and areas to continue to develop.

#### Stories of Character: Episode 3

Sometimes we get so comfortable with our student here, we don't realize what amazing people they are until we take them outside those wooden doors. Whether in a local gym or on the global stage, our kids make us most proud when they act with character without us even needing to say anything...

Our senior girls' basketball team were a force last year. Many of us witnessed their exciting victories and high level of skill, whether it be the outside shooting of Megan Galbraith, the gutsy leadership of Katie Punia, or the gritty determination of Emily Schenk. But evidence of their most impressive accomplishment came just last week, in the form of a letter from the coach of our historic nemesis, Delview. He explained how their team was in a down cycle last year, and often lost many games by double figures, but how many of their girls still talk about their game against us as a highlight of the season. We were heavily favoured and expected to trounce them, and sure enough, we jumped out in front early and went on to win. But the impressive part was how our girls behaved – they didn't run up the score, they helped up opposing players after collisions, they never talked trash. The Delview team was so impressed that they held up our girls' behaviour that night as an example of true class. I know after I read that coach's letter last week, there was no doubt in mind who were the real provincial champions were last year.

Skip forward from a sweaty gym in March to the even sweatier Amazon basin last July. Anna Szymczak and Steve Burrage escorted our first ever biological research trip to Peru, and the kids loved it. They lived on a research vessel on the river and took various measures of the many flora and fauna in the region – and loved it. This was a real taste of what it means to do scientific field research, and our kids were not alone at it: aside from the supporting scientists and university researchers, there were two other schools along with them. One of the other schools, from the Boston area, included an idiosyncratic young man who made an impression with his peculiar ways. It became obvious that he was socially isolated from his schoolmates. One day, Nirvon Soraya-Galo, Miranda Buchinski, Queenie Wu, and Aunnika Short were talking to some of the Boston students when one of them started complaining about this young man's personal hygiene in a rude and disparaging way. Then something wonderful happened: Nirvon called them out, refusing to tolerate their rude behaviour even though she had just met them. It makes me proud to know that part of that original vision for our school – a place where the 'geeks' and outsiders feel safe and are even celebrated—lives on in our students today. When Ms. Szymczak heard about the incident, I'm sure she had that same warm fuzzy feeling in her stomach that Coach Chiarenza had when he got that surprise letter from a fellow coach last week. They really make us proudest when they reveal their true characters in the outside world.
