Our Association with CAIS

At the request of the Executive Director of the Canadian Accredited Independent Schools (CAIS), Anne-Marie Kee, I am attaching an open letter to the parents of member schools. For those parents who are new to Southridge, CAIS is a national accrediting body committed to whole-school improvement. Member schools must meet the highest national and international standards and be committed to constant reflection and development. Southridge has been a CAIS member for close to twenty years.

Beyond school accreditation, though, and the accountability that goes along with it, the CAIS organization is a valuable resource to its member schools because of its commitment to research and leadership development. To be sure, a number of our existing faculty are graduates of the CAIS Leadership Institute and others are currently pursuing their diplomas.

Together with the International Baccalaureate, the Independent School Association of British Columbia and the Ministry of Education, CAIS provides our school with a critical ingredient needed for our well-rounded, thoughtful and reflective organizational posture toward quality and constant improvement in all areas of our operations. From academics to finance and from admissions to governance, Southridge meets demanding and relevant criteria that help define school excellence.

In her letter, Ms. Kee highlights two important elements of the changing landscape in education. The first concerns itself with the shifting skills that our students will need in life to be successful contributors and leaders in our society. Beyond the obvious requisite knowledge-base, "the labour market is increasingly rewarding social skills such as teamwork, collaboration and the ability to communicate effectively." At Southridge, our Kindergarten to Grade 12 academic program is explicit in developing these important skills. Along with our emphasis on character, our teachers and administration work very hard to design learning environments, experiences, interactions and activities to springboard your children's preparation for postsecondary education and society at large.

The other highlight Ms. Kee identifies in her letter, relates to the use of technology in schools. The CAIS research project she references will help its members better understand how technology will influence their students' experiences in postsecondary education. These insights will shape how we consider our use of technology at Southridge, and we are ready for the exciting changes that will come. Our school has been engaged with the meaningful and pertinent application of educational technology in all grades for close to twelve years, and, as documented in our recent accreditation report, the use of technology at Southridge is commendable for many reasons, not least of which is our ongoing commitment to our laptop program and how our teachers use technology in their classrooms.

At Southridge, we are thoughtfully and realistically progressive. We use our relationships with organizations and accrediting bodies such as CAIS to provide feedback, research and training to improve our whole school so that we are in a position to provide the absolute best education possible for your children.

Much to be gained from Outdoor Education—now I understand

At Southridge, we strongly endorse Outdoor Education, as this experience allows a student to grow in many areas in an alternate setting. For the past eight years, I have waved good-bye to our students knowing that growth in character development, personal and practical skills, as well as relationships are a wonderful by-product of an outdoor education experience. However, this year, I have a new appreciation for the challenging ropes courses that our students will visit, as this summer, our leadership team spent a day at the Ropes course at UBC. Personally, I faced the course with a bit of trepidation, although equipped with safety harness and helmet, the height of those trees and ropes were extremely intimidating. Thankfully Mr. Palm volunteered to do the dreaded Leap of Faith first, and I relied on his experience in navigating this course, before I could muster up the courage to embrace it myself. One by one, we all ascended to tree, to eventually leap across a large abyss to ring a bell suspending high up in the canopy. Candidly, it was exhilarating, and we all made it. I emerged with a renewed respect for our leadership team, for myself as a risk taker, and for the Outdoor Education experiences we offer our students.

Outdoor Education is a natural way to develop and demonstrate character. In challenging themselves, finding ways to overcome obstacles and supporting their peers, students learn that character is about how you deal with difficult

situations and interact with others. Some of the practical and personal skills that students learn involve the ability to communicate with members of a team to accomplish tasks. One of the most memorable and meaningful parts of Outdoor Education is the relationships built on trust, and support. When we remove the classroom setting, the teachers and students get to know each other in a new environment which sheds a fresh light and understanding on an individual. Strong relationships make our school that much stronger. For these reasons, we are proud to have our grade five, six and seven students away at three different camps this upcoming week, knowing that they will come back with renewed skills, a chance to build character, and a refreshed lens on their relationships. Indeed, much to be gained from Outdoor Education, and experiential learning is a common theme for Southridge from kindergarten to grade twelve.

This evening is important in that our teachers have some very specific information about how their class is organized and the routines that are in place. The format will be as follows:

7:00-7:10 p.m. - Introductory Meeting in Junior School Great Hall –Mrs. Middelaer will introduce specialist teachers and present a brief overview of our programme. Mr. Anderson will briefly touch on LMS (Learning Management System) and school communication.

7:10 - 7:40 p.m. - Formal presentation by class room teachers in your child's homeroom. Please be on time for this as our teachers have a lot of information to convey, and will be as efficient as they can in presenting. We highly recommend that if parents have 2 or more children, they attend the session of the youngest child.

7:40 - 8:00 p.m. - Mix and Mingle in classrooms- if you did not get to attend the formal presentation in one of your children's classrooms, please visit that room during this time. This time is designed to be less formal, and the teachers can provide you with any handouts that you missed. However, it is really important to make that connection with the teacher. Specialist teachers (music, French, PE and art) will also be in the Great Hall at this time for a chat or visit.

8:00 p.m. – Dismissal- Everyone will depart to their respective families, teachers as well.

Continuing the legacy – the Marathon of Hope

On Friday, September 25th, Southridge Junior school students will participate in our annual Terry Fox run. 2015 marks the 35th anniversary of this event.

Here is quick summary of who Terry Fox was. Terry Fox was born on July 28, 1958 in Manitoba, and he moved to B.C when he was only a child. He was described as a serious child and at a young age displayed qualities of tenacity and determination which contributed to the successes he enjoyed in his all too short life. He wasn't a tall person, nor was he a naturally gifted athlete, but he never let these limitations stand in his way. He set goals for himself, and he always did what was necessary to achieve them.

At 18, Terry was diagnosed with bone cancer, and got an artificial leg that started a few inches above his knee all the way down his leg and foot. But instead of giving up like a usual patient with cancer, Terry did something else. When a friend of his told him about a man who ran a marathon with an amputated leg, Terry Fox did something completely unexpected.

He started to run a marathon every day. He thought that if he ran across the country, he could raise awareness for cancer. He dipped his foot in the Atlantic Ocean and started running-across Canada. He called it the Marathon of Hope. This marathon started on April 12, 1980 in St. John's, Newfoundland. Terry ran and ran, pushed on and on, running an average of over 35 kilometers a day.

Sadly, on Sep 1, just outside of Thunder Bay, Ontario, 5,373 kilometers from where he started, Terry was forced to stop running because the cancer had spread to his lungs. He passed away ten months later. Even though his ending was a tragic one, he raised over 24 million dollars for cancer awareness just in the Marathon of Hope.

On September 25th, the students of Southridge Junior School will continue his legacy and continue the Marathon of hope. Students are expected to come to school dressed in their house colors, and are expected to contribute a minimum of \$5.

"I don't feel that this is unfair. That's the thing about cancer. I'm not the only one, it happens all the time to people. I'm not special. This just intensifies what I did. It gives it more meaning. It'll inspire more people. I just wish people would realize that anything's possible if you try; dreams are made possible if you try". Terry Fox

BC's New Education Plan


As Mr. Stephens and Mrs. Middelaer both commented in last week's Wednesday, this fall, the BC Ministry of Education released the dates for the implementation of the new curriculum as part of the BC Education Plan. Teachers across the province were involved in collaboratively writing this curriculum, and it represents best practices in teaching and learning. The focus is on a student-centred approach and this is a core belief of Southridge's educational philosophy.

Our Senior School Educational Program (SSEP) is aligned very well with many aspects of the new curriculum.

- Learning occurs through authentic experiences and connect with students' interests and passions.
- Foundation skills (reading, writing, oral language and numeracy) are important
- Learners assume increasing responsibility for themselves and others
- Competencies (which include collaboration, communication, creative and critical thinking) develop over time.
- Learning is assessed and reported in meaningful ways that help students improve.

As you look at the SSEP graphic that provides an overview of our educational model, you will note that the skills we are focused on developing align perfectly with the core competencies that the BC Ministry has identified. These include critical thinking and problem solving, creativity and innovation. Additionally, the new curriculum emphasizes the importance of students contributing to a collaborative classroom environment. Our student-centred, discussion-based collaborative learning or Harkness approach to learning provides students vital opportunities to

develop their own learning by collaborating with their peers and teachers cultivating the ability to ask thoughtful and reflective questions. Along with the opportunities to present their ideas in many ways through projects, reports and public speaking and debating, students are preparing this vital skill for their future.

Knowledge has always been an important part of our curriculum and will continue to do so; however, we are consistently looking for ways to find connection across disciplines and through authentic experiences. This is another important additional to the new curriculum. Experiential education has been a key element of a Southridge education through the many opportunities that students are provided through trips, tours, service learning and co-curricular activities in additional to the many ways that learning in the classroom is tied to authentic, 'real-life' experiences.

Perhaps most encouraging with this new curriculum is the focus on personal and social competency. As the Ministry

explains, "this encompasses the abilities students need to thrive as individuals, to understand and care about themselves and others, and to find and achieve their purposes in the world." Southridge's focus on developing character and goodness through service learning provides students the ability to look outwards and find ways to help others. In fact our mission and vision statements align with this above statement very clearly as we want our students spirits to soar and our graduates to make a difference in the world.

We are very excited about the changes that are taking place in education and support the transformations that being introduced by the Ministry of Education. Our Senior School Educational Plan provides us with a clear and aligned plan to prepare our students to be successful learners and well prepared for future Post-secondary options and beyond.


Senior School Fall Canoe Trip - Main Lakes Chain, Quadra Island - Oct 1 - 4, 2015

Criminal Record Check Required for Volunteers

This is a reminder to all parents that some volunteer positions at Southridge require you to complete and submit a Criminal Record Check to the school prior to volunteering. These include:

- Drivers for field trips, sporting events, games and other activities such as music events or service activities,
- Designated chaperones,
- Coaches or assistant coaches,
- Library assistants,
- Lunch hour supervisors,
- Uniform shop volunteers, and
- Any other position that may include having access to children without the presence of a teacher or school administrator

If you are planning to volunteer for any of these, you MUST submit a completed CRC to the school as soon as possible. Unfortunately, the forms that were mailed to you previously are no longer accepted by the RCMP.

If you are a resident of the City of Surrey, use the attached NEW form, fill out this form and bring the attached cover letter with you to the RCMP detachment at 14355 57th Avenue along with 2 pieces of government-issued ID.

You must go to the RCMP detachment in person. That is to say, you cannot bring your spouse's form for them. When your check is complete (usually done while you wait at the detachment), bring the completed forms back to the school.

If you are not a resident of the City of Surrey, you must go to your own community's police detachment and fill out their CRC forms (it varies from city to city). There may be a minimal charge associated with the check.

Your CRC is kept on file for five years. We will contact you when it has expired and you are required to complete the check again.

SRS Fall Canoe Trip, 2015. Main Lakes Chain, Quadra Island

Dear Parents: September 15, 2015

This fall's canoe trip will be to paddle the beautiful waters of the Main Lakes Chain, on Quadra Island. A gear list and menu planning sheet will be given to the students for their planning. This excursion will be a 4-day trip, in order not only to enjoy the great outdoors, but also to qualify for the Duke of Edinburgh's Silver or Gold Award. (since a qualifying journey needs to precede both the Silver and Gold level trips, students should check to ensure that their D of E requirements are met).

The teachers attending the trip will be Ms. Beer and Mr. Burrage. The teachers will have a complete first aid kit, including two Epi pens. In addition, they will carry a cell phone, an emergency locator signalling device, as well as extra cold and wet weather gear.

The students should ensure that they complete the menu plan. They must also agree not only to be conscientious in the great outdoors, but also to inform the teachers immediately if they feel ill or are injured in any way. We expect that each of them is in good physical condition and has canoed in the past. Additionally, they must attend two pre-trip meetings, Thurs, Sept 24 and Tues, Sept 29, both in Rm. 103 at lunch.

The gear list must be used AS YOU PACK. Comfort and safety are at stake when items on the list are not brought. Please ensure that your child has everything. A toque, non-cotton clothing, good waterproof raingear, a warm sleeping bag, and a proper ground insulation sleeping mat (thermarest or closed cell foam) are vital. Southridge will provide all of the following: tent, stove and fuel, pots, canoes, with PFDs, paddles, bailers, and rope, one large dry bag per cooking group, and a means to purify water for drinking.

The costs for the trip will be \$100 - 150, depending on the numbers, billed to the student's Southridge Account. Students will also be expected to buy their own food for the trip.

The safety of our students is the first priority in planning any outdoor activity. In addition, we ensure that the challenges presented by the excursion match the skill level of the student. However, as with any outdoor activity, there are some risks that each parent or guardian should be aware of including, but not limited to, the following:

- Our trip is in the backcountry, and therefore we will be some hours away from a major hospital. We will not be within road access for an ambulance, so immediate access to that level of medical attention is not possible. If there is a severe accident, students would be airlifted (weather and light permitting) to the nearest hospital.
- The weather can be unpredictable and severe. We would not go on the water in severe winds (over 10 knots) or serious waves.
- Students are only permitted to wade up to waist deep in calm water without a PFD.
- PFD's must be worn if in deeper water and while paddling.
- Students must sometimes rely upon and trust their lives to technical equipment such as canoes, life jackets, tents and ropes etc.
- The natural environment and wilderness contain many dangers and hazards, such as rivers, reefs, currents and cliffs etc.;
- Wild animals (such as raccoons, cougars, rodents and bears) could frequent the areas in which we travel.
- Students will be preparing food, using knives and camp stoves.

Southridge School attempts to address these issues and minimize these potential risks by maintaining proper staffing, planning and supervision during each trip. This trip will have teachers with first aid training, and training in canoeing skills. The number of students is limited to ensure an appropriate teacher/student ratio.
