### Country Fair – A Big Thank You to our Volunteers

Again, many schools have mission statements hanging on their walls but few can give examples of how their *raison d’être* is embraced by their entire community. One line from our mission statement in particular sticks out in that regard – can work effectively as part of a team. I think it is wonderful for our community to come together and function as a team in support of our school and the surrounding community. And in that respect, our mission statement refers to understanding the sacrifices and rewards of community service. Family and work demands are heavy enough. Add the demands of the Fair and it is only reasonable to recognize and acknowledge how much of a sacrifice it is for virtually all of our volunteers to serve our community in the way they do at the Fair.

So thank you to all who helped make the Fair a true representation of our school community.

## **Junior School News**

### **MYP Evaluation**

On Thursday and Friday we have a team of evaluators that will be visiting our Grade 5-7 classrooms and teachers in order to evaluate our Middle Years Programme. For three years our teachers have been updating unit plans, mapping out curriculum, fine tuning our assessment criteria and practices, as well as attending workshops on the most current subject guides. Last year we mailed samples of student work for our 8 different subject areas to various IB assessment centres around the world. Math was assessed in Singapore, PE in Australia, English in Dubai and the other subjects in diverse parts of the world. The purpose of sending student work for ‘monitoring’ is to ensure that we as teachers are designing tasks that truly and accurately assess the objectives.

We received a report back from each subject area, analyzed this report, and have made some modifications to our programme. The goal of this external assessment is to ensure that we are providing the best programme for your son or daughter. Being part of an IB World School implies that we are adhering to an International standard of best practices.

The team of evaluators that will be present on Thursday and Friday will be analyzing all our practices, both our documentation and our implementation of the programme. While we feel well prepared as a faculty, we are also feeling that slight ‘angst’ that comes with any kind of assessment. As our Grade 6 and 7 students are writing their term tests, all of their teachers are feeling that similar feeling before our assessment on Thursday and Friday. Thank you to our parent group and students for their support during this time of evaluation.

### **Country Fair Thank You’s**

Many thanks to the team of volunteers that helped restore the Junior School to its ‘ready’ state for Monday morning. It was an amazing transformation; teachers and students were ready to engage in learning right at 8:10 AM. I am always impressed by our Southridge events. You are doing this for your children and it is deeply appreciated by those that get to work with your children every day. ### **Class Lists**

At this time of year some parents may be contemplating the upcoming school year. It seems like an appropriate time to restate our procedure for compiling the class lists. At Southridge we strive to create the best educational groupings that we can. That means we try to ensure our classes are balanced in terms of leadership ability, academic ability, athletic well-roundedness, gender, and social responsibility. We try to ensure each student has at least one close friend in their class, and given the fact that we only have 2 classes, we do our best to create the best social dynamics. There is a great deal of thought and care in this process.

After the lists are compiled by the present home room teachers, the specialist teachers and primary and intermediate division leaders look at the lists and discuss the groupings. At this time, there are no teachers’ names on the class groupings. Once the lists are approved they are signed by all the teachers and submitted to the Head of the Junior School. At that time the teacher’s names are then assigned to those groupings by the Head of the Junior School.

Given the extensive work that goes into developing the groupings, it is our policy not to entertain parental requests for certain teachers. We strive to have parallel programming in all our classes with the teachers working collaboratively in their planning and assessment, and we truly believe that our students will thrive in any classroom setting. We thank you for your confidence in our faculty as we endeavor to make the best learning groupings for your child.

The World Partnership Walk helps people in developing countries with food security, education, economic development, and health. This is the 28<sup>th</sup> World Partnership Walk and last year \$7 million dollars was raised and almost 40,000 people attended the walk.

The walk takes place annually in 10 cities across Canada. In total, the World Partnership Walk has raised over \$75 million dollars since it began and every penny is sent directly to the cause, none is spent on administration.

This year's Vancouver event takes place Sunday, May 26<sup>th</sup>. Students and staff of the Junior and Senior Schools, as well as their families, are welcome to join the fun by walking or running either 5 or 10 KM.

## **Laptop Return Information**

### ***Grade 8, 9, and 11 Students***

All Grades 8, 9, and 11 students are required to hand in their laptop, charger, lock and backpack/laptop bag before leaving for summer vacation. The deadline is the day of your last Senior School exam.

Alternatively, you are welcome to hand in your laptop any time after June 7<sup>th</sup> if it's not required for studying or electronic exams. The specific deadlines are:

Grades 8 & 9 – June 13<sup>th</sup> before 12:30 PM

Grade 11 – June 21<sup>st</sup> before 8:00 AM

Please hand in your laptop backpack to Mr. Latta at the Tech Office or Room 224 at least 30 minutes prior to the exam. If any item is not returned, a replacement part (laptop, charger, backpack, or lock) will be ordered and charged to your student account.

The laptops will be re-imaged (wiped clean) for the beginning of next year so please back up any personal files prior to handing in your laptop. No repairs will be made during the summer and the laptop will be returned to you as-is when you return in September.

All laptops must be returned in the original Southridge backpack or carrying case that you were given in September, no exceptions.

### ***Grade 10 and 12 Laptops***

All Grade 10 and 12 students are required to hand in their laptops for factory imaging before leaving for summer vacation. Grade 12 students may keep their locks, however Grade 10 students are required to return them for next year's laptop package. The deadline is on the day of your last Senior School exam. The specific dates are:

Grade 10 – June 21<sup>st</sup> before 12:30 PM

Grade 12 – June 20<sup>th</sup> before 8:00 AM

Please hand in your laptop to Mr. Latta in the Tech Office or in Room 224 at least 30 minutes prior to the exam with a fully charged battery. If you are using your laptop for the exam, then return it immediately after you complete your exam.

The laptops will be restored to the factory settings before you take them home so please back up any personal files prior to handing in your laptop. The restored laptop will be available after the exam or within 45 minutes after turning them in if you used it for the exam.

If your laptop has not been restored to the factory settings by the end of June, your account will be billed \$800.00 for the licensed software that was accessed over the course of the year.

Each trip is intense, but includes some down time – on a safari in Kenya or at the Lake Palace resort in Rajasthan. Approximate cost: \$5000.00

On Thursday May 9<sup>th</sup> at 7:00PM Paul Tough, author of *How Children Succeed: Grit, Curiosity and the Hidden Power of Character* will be at Southridge to talk about how curiosity, conscientiousness, optimism, self-control and grit contribute to a child's character. Contrary to the popular story that childhood and success comes to those who score highest on tests, from preschool to admissions SATs, Tough argues that the qualities that matter most have more to do with character: skills like perseverance, curiosity, conscientiousness, optimism, and self-control.

Tough will peel back the mysteries of character and trace the links between early childhood neurological development and environment. By showing how "nature" and "nurture" are intertwined, Tough will explore how childhood stresses modify

life success and the surprising ways that parents do – and do not – prepare their children for adulthood. Tough will help parents understand how early adversity affects childhood emotional, social and cognitive development in ways that will carry on throughout their entire lives. He will also provide tips for parents on what they can do about it.

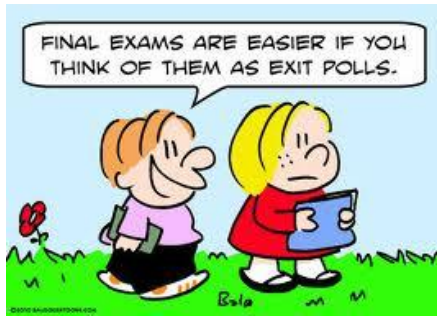

<b>EXAM INSTRUCTIONS:</b>
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#### **Students**

- 1) Unless otherwise specified, exams will be written in the senior school gymnasium. Only students with prior approval of the Senior School Academic Program Director, and the requisite documentation, can write in the alternate setting (room 120).
- 2) Students must bring the appropriate writing implements and calculators where applicable. Soft pencils are required for filling in SCANTRON sheets. Pencils will NOT be supplied.
- 3) Full school uniform (summer or winter) with blazer is required at all exams.
- 4) Unless in distress, students are not allowed to visit the washroom during an exam period. If necessary, an invigilator must accompany such exits.
- 5) An exemplary standard of honesty is expected. Notes of any kind (on paper, hand, arm etc.) are not allowed. Talking during an exam is unacceptable and any infraction of examination protocol will result in serious academic penalties outlined in the school's Academic Integrity Policy.
- 6) All requests for re-scheduling of exams must be arranged through the Senior School Academic Program Director.
- 7) No student is required to write more than two exams per day. Although every attempt has been made to avoid conflicts, it is the specific responsibility of each student to make the Senior School Academic Program Director aware of any conflicts in a timely manner.

- 8) In the event of illness, it is the responsibility of the student and his/her parents to contact the Senior School Academic Program Director or the Head of the Senior School prior to the exam.

### **Faculty**

- 1) Exam invigilators must take attendance at the beginning of the morning and afternoon examinations and bring it promptly to senior reception.
- 2) Faculty of the subjects being examined must be in the exam hall for the beginning of the exam (for questions and/or problems) and at the end of the exam for the collection of their students' papers.

<b>ENTRY:</b>
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### **Students**

- 1) Students are required to enter the exam hall IN SILENCE and remain silent for the duration of the exam.
- 2) Students are advised to leave their cell phones and electronic devices at home. Those who bring them to school must, on immediate entry to the exam hall, place them in the containers provided.
- 3) Students must promptly go to their assigned seats and keep their exams face down until the Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School gives the signal to begin.

### **Faculty**

- 1) The Senior School Academic Program Director or Head of the Senior School will commence all exams.

<b>DISMISSAL:</b>
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### **Students**

- 1) Students are not allowed to leave the exam until 1 hour and 30 minutes have passed, after which point, dismissals will occur at 15 minute intervals.
- 2) When students have finished their exams, they must raise their hands to have their exam papers collected.
- 3) No student is dismissed until his or her exam has been collected.
- 4) When the allotted exam time is over, students must remain silent and seated until all exams have been collected.

### **Faculty**

- 1) A table is placed at the back of the gym and labelled by grade, class section and teacher for ease of exam collection.
