enrollment from 2011 to 2017, the total enrollment for FCIS schools has remained almost the same for the second year in a row. Forty-one percent of our schools have declined in enrollment over the past five years; convention is one not to be missed. fifty-nine percent of FCIS schools have increased in enrollment over the past five years. Of the 65 schools NAIS Commission on Accreditation (NCOA). that have declined in enrollment, 57% of those schools are elementary schools and 49% are faith-based.

New FCIS Standards, Evaluation Process, and Accreditation Portal. We are now in Year Two with the FCIS Standards and Indicators that were adopted on July 1, 2017. Last year, member schools undergoing their five-year evaluations had a choice between using the old self-study template and the new template. All but two schools used the new template. We are now in full implementation of the new process focusing on school improvement and involving the school in identifying essential questions to gain feedback from the visiting evaluation team. The Accreditation Portal opened in January 2018. For this school year only, schools can choose between writing their self-studies in the Portal or using some other means. Most schools are choosing to use the Portal. The feedback from the new process and the portal has been quite positive. The FCIS Accreditation Team will continue to offer training around the state and will present several sessions at the upcoming FCIS Convention in November.

Fall 2018 seemed to be off to a good start in our state FCIS Annual Convention. The FCIS Convention Professional Development, Alison Carlson, has planned the Hyatt Regency Jacksonville on November 15 and Discovery School; James Milford, Head of Maclay School; and all of the North Florida FCIS schools for chairing and hosting this important event. Thursday keynote speakers include Ted Dintersmith, Ph.D., one of America's leaders in innovation, entrepreneurship, and education; and Don Yaeger, nationally acclaimed inspirational speaker, longtime Associate Editor of Sports Illustrated, and author of over 30 books, eleven FCIS Enrollment. For over 16 years, NCOA has provided professional development and a review process, whereby the 20 member associations have voluntarily submitted to being visited and evaluated by peer associations to determine compliance with the NCOA Criteria and to challenge member associations to engage in selfreflection and growth. With the blessing of NAIS, this organization has become a separate not-for-profit incorporation, known as the International Council Advancing Independent School Accreditation (ICAISA). NAIS will remain a part of the new organization with a seat on its board; ICAISA is now free to bring more international independent school associations to the table for deeper and broader conversations.

FCIS New Teacher Institute 2018 Sept 23 - 25



The *New Teacher Institute* welcomed 47 enthusiastic, new and nearly new independent school teachers at the beautiful Mission Inn, just north of Orlando. On Sunday, teachers from 24 different FCIS schools gathered to spend almost two full days together. They participated in a wide variety of workshops designed to strengthen and enhance their teaching and learning. Topics included: independent school culture and tradition, parents as partners, classroom and time management, lesson planning and assessment, differentiated learning, technology and innovation, teacher observations, narrative comment reports, maintaining balance, fixed vs. growth mindsets, and bringing joy into the classroom. Lori Smith, an Orlando attorney, presented a session on professionalism; how to be an asset, not a liability, to your school; social media use; and other important legal issues relating to independent schools. After spending several weeks in the classroom, new teachers were eager to reflect

on their experiences so far, to ask questions, and to discuss and expand their knowledge of best practices. They also took full advantage of connecting with educators from peer schools and enjoyed learning from each other and building the foundation for professional learning networks for ongoing collegial support.

Partnership of 3 and Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance Sept 29 - Oct 1

Partnership of 3 - On September 29, James P. Honan, Ed.D., Senior Lecturer at Harvard Graduate School of Education, presented Partnership of 3: What Now? What Next? Leading and Governing Independent Schools of the Future. He offered strategies for strengthening the partnership, support, and collaboration between Heads, Board Chairs and CFOs. Participants reviewed the results of a pre-workshop survey and reflected on the following topics: changes to their school's mission in recent years; changes, disruptions, and challenges in their school's external environment/operating context; and specific examples of ways the board/head/CFO addressed these challenges. Tools and frameworks were introduced to address strategic challenges facing independent schools. Participants discussed case studies that illustrated the key leadership/governance challenges, with a focus on mission, strategy, business model, and innovation and worked both individually and in groups to develop an action plan.

Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance - On September 30-October 1, Heads and Board Chairs met at the Hyatt Regency Orlando International Airport for the FCIS Leadership Partners through Principles of Good Governance workshop. Dr. Barbara Hodges, FCIS Executive Director, and Dr. Jan Pullen, Head of Saint Stephen's Episcopal Day School in Bradenton, teamed up to design the program and lead each of the sessions. They offered strategies for strengthening the partnership, support and collaboration between Heads and Board Chairs. Topics included: The Relationship Needed for Good Leadership, Leadership and Effective Communication, Issues Facing Independent Schools Today, Strategic Planning and Board Expectations, and Effective Governance. Each topic led to many informal discussions that carried over into Sunday evening's dinner and Monday's lunch. Time was also allocated for questions, candid observations and brainstorming. A major factor in a school's success is a healthy Head-Board Chair relationship, and participants took full advantage of their time together to share goals and challenges facing their individual schools as well as the broader independent school community.
