Reduce, Reuse Recycle

A how-to workshop for schools committed to environmental stewardship was held at Westtown School on October 27, 2005

Schools create a staggering amount of waste – from paper to electronics to food waste. There are health, environmental, and social costs to this waste stream. We learned about product stewardship, where and how to purchase recycled paper and other products, how to get students involved, and challenge some of the most common myths – *does* recycled paper jam copy machines??? (The answer is NO!)

The workshop was part of a series of workshops supporting the Green Flag School program hosted by Westtown School as a member of the Friends Environmental Educators Network.
