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A Message from Mr. K



hat are the underlying values that influence your day-today actions and decisions? Has your family ever clearly identified your most important values? It's been said that if you look at your calendar and your checking account, some of your dominant core values will become clear. Stephen Covey, in The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Families, writes about the importance of a family mission statement and clearly articulated family values. He writes about working towards "a beautiful family culture." That sounds like something to work towards!

Just as important as identifying personal and family values, businesses and organizations also benefit greatly from having clearly articulated core values. Perhaps there are core values identified for your workplace. Whether identified or not, certain values tend to dominate the decisions and actions of most businesses. As part of the AACS strategic goal to "unify and enhance our Christ-centered culture," a Culture Committee was formed in 2015 with the goal of clearly identifying the underlying core values that unify all four campuses. This included a look back at our history as well as a close look at the internal culture today. The focus was on the shared values of our faculty and staff. These values influence culture and culture influences the student experience. This wasn't a project that we took lightly.

The Culture Committee met regularly over the course of a year and a half. Members of the committee included myself, administrators who report directly to me, and eight faculty members. Committee members shared many experiences and stories about the dedication, passion, and values of our faculty and staff. The easy part was identifying a very long list of core values. It was much more challenging to narrow those down and then fine tune the wording and definitions so that we actually had a list of unique values that describe the internal culture we want to nurture and sustain.

After many meetings, discussions, debates, and surveys, the committee identified four core values:

These values have been important at AACS throughout our history yet, now that they are clearly identified and defined, there will be a more intentional focus on each. During the 2016-17 school year, our faculty and staff focused on one core value per quarter, with the goal of better understanding the meaning behind each one. In this magazine, you will find stories that show how these values unify our four campuses as one school with a unique culture. [‡]

• Middle School :: Annapolis • SIXTH GRADE ARCHAEOLOGICAL DIG

The sixth grade class dug into their study of archeology this year with a real archeological exploration. The students got their hands dirty exploring a prepared "middens pile" on the middle school grounds, otherwise known as a dump site. Sixth graders begin their study of World History with an introduction to the tools that historians use to study the past. These tools include Primary and Secondary Sources, Geography and Archeology. Engaging in a hands-on learning experience ignited students' curiosity and passion for archeology and the study of the past. Sixth grader Christian Lemme remarked, "I had so much fun! I wish I could do it over and over again!"



We can grow like Jesus did—in wisdom, in stature, and in favor with God and man (Luke 2:52). Another truth we learned was that just as plants need good soil to stand strong, Christians need to remain in Jesus to stand strong. God earnestly desires each of His children to grow ever closer to Jesus. As we abide or remain in Jesus, His character and influence changes our lives and He produces fruit in us.

Just like plants need sunlight, we need the Holy Spirit working in us to produce fruit. We will study the nine fruits of the Spirit which are listed in Galatians 5. Each week we are exploring a new fruit and seeing how we can apply it to our lives. A meaning and key verse are being presented and every week a new grade helps us understand that fruit through skits and songs. Also each month a specific fruit will be highlighted and students who exhibited that fruit will be rewarded with a lunch with the principal.

It is our prayer that all will come to know Jesus as their personal Savior and then will allow the Holy Spirit to grow in them the fruits. In John 15:5, Jesus said, "I am the vine, you are the branches. If a man remains in Me, and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can nothing." [‡]



Students excavated about four inches of soil and found a multitude of items that would have existed in the 20th century. Using these items, they deduced what life was like at AACS in the 1900's. "The archeological dig was a lot of fun, but we got REALLY dirty! We learned a lot about archeology, though, so it was worth it," commented 6th grader Miriam Mastewal. Some of the items they discovered were bowls, utensils, writing tools, glasses, building materials, decorations, shells, and even photographic slides. History teacher Mrs. Nebbia prepared the dig site right on campus so that students could learn in an outdoor classroom without disrupting their daily schedule. Students embraced the mud and muck inherent to this field of study.





Is there a teacher that you remember having been particularly influential?


