


1959 Grad Is Named Victor Central Schools'

After graduating from Victor Schools, Mr. Fisher received a bachelor's degree from Allegheny College and a master's from Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism. He was a captain in the U.S. Air Force, serving in Izmir, Turkey and Wiesbaden, Germany.


After working as a reporter for the San Antonio *Express-News*, he left in 1971 to establish *The North San Antonio Times*, which grew into a group of ten suburban weekly newspapers that he published for 21 years. He was elected president of Suburban Newspapers of America for 1988–89. His Maverick Publishing Company has published more than 30 general interest

books on San Antonio and Texas, ranging from San Antonio place names and great motorcycle rides to a guide to Texas wines. He has received numerous local, regional, state and national citations for newspaper editorials and column writing plus the Texas Society of Architects John G. Flowers Award and the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Arts and Letters Award.

Fisher is the author of nine books about San Antonio, among them Saving San Antonio: The Precarious Preservation of a Heritage, San Antonio: Outpost of Empires, The Spanish Missions of San Antonio, and River Walk: The Epic Story of San Antonio's River, which in 2007 received the Benjamin Franklin Award for Best Regional Book from, The Independent Book Publishers Association.

He is also the author of *Victor: The History of a Town*, written in 1996 and reviewed in *New York History*

A Diploma for Life

"Operation Recognition"
Honors Local Resident
and WWII Veteran
Anthony Mandrino

He was drafted by the U.S. Army one month after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor but instead of seeking an exemption for being an integral part of his father's farm, where he had been working since leaving Victor schools following eighth grade, 21-year-old Anthony Mandrino followed his patriotic heart and left the safety and serenity of his winter job at Victor Insulators and family farm to "see a little adventure."

It turns out he saw more than a little adventure; he lived it.

This past winter, at the November Board of Education meeting, 87 year-old World War II veteran and community member Anthony Mandrino lived yet another adventure when he received a Victor High School diploma for the knowledge and experience he gained during his three year-long WWII journey. It was all a part

of a New York State Education Department program called "Operation Recognition" which honors veterans of WWII, the Korean conflict and the Vietnam War who were unable to complete their high school educations for any reason.

After being drafted in 1942, he spent two years stateside, including some time in the California desert where he trained to fight in Africa. When the fighting ended there, Mr. Mandrino's 32nd Armored Regiment was sent overseas to fight the good fight. There, he drove a four man armored car across a war-torn Europe where he lost many of his regiment along the way at some of

the bloodiest battles, including the infamous Battle of the Bulge. During this confrontation, Mr. Mandrino narrowly escaped execution by the Germans. One of the platoons in his division who took an alternate route was not so lucky.

Mr. Mandrino took part in five WWII campaigns in all: Normany, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe. He turned down a Purple Heart because he felt that a shrapnel wound to his left arm was minor compared to the wounds suffered by so many of his comrades. Through it all, he stayed in constant correspondence with his young wife, Florence, whom he met while working at Victor Insulators and later married when she visited him at Fort Polk, Louisiana in 1942. When all was said and done and the War was finally over, Mr. Mandrino was honorably discharged in October, 1945 and returned to help his father and younger brother on the family farm.

Today, Anthony Mandrino, his wife of 65 years and his new diploma live on his New Michigan Road ranch in Farmington – just a mile down the road from the farmhouse where he was born and raised and a world away from the War that took him on the adventure of a lifetime.

Ken Weigert Leaves His Post on the VCS Board of Education after 33-years of Service

When Ken Weigert vacates his post on Victor Schools Board of Education this July he will leave more than 33 years of hard work and dedication in his tracks, he will leave a legacy that has touched thousands of students, teachers, staff and administrators. Through the years, this tireless leader, known as "Victor's Number One Fan", has played a monumental role in the growth and development of the district. It is safe to say, Mr. Weigert has seen it all —and, then some. After all, he graduated from Victor Schools in 1950 with just 32 students in his class. (The current class of 2008 has 275 students graduating.)

When he was a freshman in High School there were only 2 sports at Victor Schools, basketball and baseball. He played both of them. (Today, there are more than 80 sports at Victor including Modified, JV and Varsity levels.)

In 1948, Ken was the only freshman who played Junior Varsity Basketball. Back then, seniors played JV too. In 2007, Ken Weigert was inducted into the VCS Athletic Hall of Fame.

Mr. Weigert's roots in Victor as a student, athlete, parent, grandparent and businessman are what made his role on the Victor Board of Education so invaluable. He not only understood what the



community wanted and needed, but he also lived it. As cliché as it sounds, Ken Weigert's record on the Board of Education really does speak for itself.

In his 33 years of service on the Board of Education, Ken served as President for two years, Vice President for three years, and second Vice President for nine years. He worked with 39 different board members and six superintendents to accomplish great things for our students.

Construct new cafeteria and gymnasium in the Junior High School (now the VEC)

Approved capital project for Junior High School to be added onto the Senior High School as well as improvements to the District athletic fields.

New wing on Senior High School



MESSAGES FROM NEAR AND FAR

Following our November E-Alumi News, we received several messages from alumni and wanted to share them with you.

Richard Fisher, class of 2001

I would like to call attention to my brother's service in the Marines. He started boot camp at Parris Island and graduated with honors. From there, he went to a Marine barracks in Washington, D.C. First he was the Non-Commissioned Officer in charge of the firing party (21 gun salute) given to each and every Marine buried at Arlington National Cemetery. He also performed in several parades in front of thousands of spectators and many key government officials. He was in the Honor Guard for President Reagan's funeral. At the completion of his tour there he received a Navy and Marine Corps. Achievement Medal for outstanding leadership while serving as a squad leader, platoon guide and platoon sergeant. In November, 2005, he received orders to 2nd tank Batallion Tow Platoon in Camp Lejeune, N.C. There, he trained for five months before being deployed to Fallujah Iraq. His unit was in charge of conducting daily security patrols from 10 miles west of Baghdad to 10 miles east of Ramadi. He was there for 210 days, only four of which he had "off" and didn't have to go on patrol. When he arrived home on October 31, 2006 he was promoted to Sergeant and awarded a Navy and Marine Medal with a combat "V" for Valor. He received it due to heroic efforts and steadfast leadership in several engagements throughout his deployment. He spent

the next five months of his enlistment preparing to come home to civilian life. He is now home, bought a house in Fairport and is working for Liberty Mutual as a licensed salesman. We are so proud of him and of ALL of the men and women that serve our country everyday. We are so lucky that he made it home when so many of our servicemen did not.
