### Creator: David Cowles/Visual Arts

Artist David Cowles graduated from Victor Senior High School in1979. After attending graphic arts school he landed a job with the Democrat and Chronicle in Rochester as a visual artist. Two years after joining the  $D \mathcal{C}$ , he began his freelance illustration career and in 1991 he left the newspaper completely to launch his freelance career fulltime. Cowles' work has appeared in Entertainment Weekly, Rolling Stone, Vibe, Time, Newsweek, People, The Village Voice, Money, Worth, Fortune, Fast Company, Los Angeles Magazine, New York Magazine, The Boston Globe, The Chicago Tribune and the New York Times to name just a few. He also produced a pilot for Playhouse Disney, several award-winning videos for They Might be Giants as well as videos for Sesame Workshop, The Rochester Philharmonic, the Democrat and Chronicle and the award winning spot H2O Hero. Senior High School art teacher and nominator David Denner said the art department unanimously agreed that David would be an excellent selection for the Hall of Fame's first inductee.



### Performer: Alan Hood/Music

During his high school years, Alan Hood was the top trumpet player at Victor Central Schools. Upon graduating in 1982, Hood transferred his love for the trumpet into collegiate music studies earning him a bachelor's degree from the University of Kentucky, a master's degree from Northern Illinois University and a doctorate degree from the University of Miami. In addition to an illustrious teaching career that took him from the University of Texas and the University of Virginia to the University of Denver's Lamont School, Hood has performed music for more than 35 years. Among his most notable gigs Hood toured the world with Phil Collins, appeared with the orchestras of Woody Herman, Glenn Miller and Harry James and performed on stage with Ray Charles, Doc Severinsen, and Natalie Cole to name a few. In 2013 he was named a VCS Graduate of Distinction for his incredible music accomplishments. Senior High band teacher Eric Everhart said that it was during these festivities that Alan willingly gave of his time and talents to teach a master class to music students in the new JH/SH Arts Center.



### Practitioner: Betty Kocher/Music

Former music teacher Elizabeth "Betty" Kocher (1956 – 1980) was instrumental in bringing the Suzuki method to VCS, a program that has taught thousands of young musicians how to play the violin through the years. After attending the National Suzuki Conference in the summer of 1966, Kocher was so inspired she worked with the Board of Education to start a program at VCS in the fall of 1966. She also arranged to have founder, Dr. Shinichi Suzuki visit Victor four times! Prior to VCS Kocher earned bachelor's and master's degrees from the Eastman School of Music, taught music for two years at Georgian Court College in New Jersey and Misericordia College in Pennsylvania before coming back to Victor where she taught for more than twenty years. Nominator and current Junior High School strings teacher, Elizabeth Knapp said that the District's music program, specifically its orchestra program would not be what it is today without the inspiration and everlasting hard work of Betty Kocher.



### Contributor: Beth Thomas/Theater

Former Senior High English teacher Beth Thomas (1983-2014) was an integral part of the Senior High School theater arts community for more than two decades serving as the theater arts coordinator, International Baccalaureate (IB) theater teacher and the Senior High drama director. Under her leadership Thomas directed numerous plays and musicals that engaged literally thousands of young artists both on and off stage. She also helped with the monumental job of transitioning the entire high school theater arts program into the new JH/SH Arts Center. Senior High School English teacher and nominator Jeremy Hawkinson said that Thomas was instrumental in inspiring theatre at VSH not only through her work with students but by fostering new faculty into their roles as teachers of theater.

# Local Educator and Advocate Dr. Ralph N. Spezio Named 2018 Graduate of Distinction


On Thursday, May 10th at 7:15 pm at a special ceremony at the Board of Education's regular monthly meeting, a well-respected local educator and leader in the fight against childhood lead poisoning, Dr. Ralph Spezio (VCS Class of 1965) will be recognized as Victor Central Schools' 2018 Graduate of Distinction. The Graduates of Distinction program was initiated in 2002 as a way to recognize VCS alumni who have demonstrated outstanding achievement and made significant contributions to society.

Ralph Neil Spezio, Ed.D. served for 33 years in the Rochester City School District as teacher, curriculum specialist, vice principal, and principal. As principal of Enrico Fermi School No. 17, a large urban elementary school in the heart of Rochester's "poverty crescent", Dr. Spezio initiated wideranging partnerships and groundbreaking programs to improve the health and well being of students and the entire community. For example, in partnership with St. Mary's Hospital, he raised \$1.2 million in private money, and built the only school/community medical center of its kind in New York State. Building on this success, Dr. Spezio raised another \$1 million and doubled the size of the health center to include a fullservice dental facility operated by Strong's Eastman Dental Center. This health/dental center is open to the entire community with a full sliding-scale system so no one is turned away. Because there was no pre-kindergarten program at

School No. 17, Dr. Spezio formed a partnership with Kodak, and using Edison Tech students, built a facility that now houses a Montessori preschool. This program was the first in Rochester to be located in a public school, and was the only public school at that time to have received accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children. Dr. Spezio created an authentic neighborhood/ community -school and with it, a vibrant Parent-Teacher Association was formed and sustained during his tenure as principal.

Dr. Spezio has received numerous awards for entrepreneurial leadership and community service, including citations from parent and community groups, professional associations, business associations, and local and state government leaders. While principal of School No.17, Dr. Spezio was a founding member of the Coalition to Prevent Lead Poisoning in Monroe County, New York. The work of this coalition recently earned the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Environmental Justice Achievement Award and the Rochester Area Community Foundation's Ames-Amzalak Award for Nonprofit Excellence. Upon retiring as principal, Dr. Spezio served eight years as Senior Associate/Community Liaison in the University of Rochester Medical Center's Department of Community and Preventive Medicine. In May 2011, he received his doctoral degree in educational leadership from the University of





Rochester, Warner School.

In 2013, Dr. Spezio was asked to come out of retirement to lead School 17 again as Principal in order to remove the State Priority School Status currently held by that school. He recently was awarded the EPA's National Environmental Quality Award for his groundbreaking work to eliminate childhood lead poisoning.

VCS alumnae and former classmate, Anita Owens-Boulger, said she nominated Dr. Spezio for this esteemed award because his life has been filled with so

many extraordinary achievements. "Ralph put himself through college to reach the level of doctorate in education. He was a demonstration teacher, curriculum specialist, vice principal and principal in one of the most challenged and highest poverty-stricken schools in the City of Rochester. I have known Ralph since grade school in the Victor Schools and can say that he has been consistent in his passion to help children to achieve a healthy and successful future. He is a powerful inspiration and a credit to all the values that the Victor Central School District holds dear."

# Larry Keefe (Class of 1964) Reminisces About VCS' First Foreign Exchange Student

This year marks the 57th year VCS has been hosting foreign exchange students.

In 1960, the Victor PTA began discussing the idea of hosting a foreign exchange student, and in 1961 that vision became a reality when the Senior High School hosted Masahiro Hirata, a young student from Japan. Hirata was part of the American Field Service program, a private, non-profit organization whose purpose is to promote better understanding among people through international scholarship. Alumnus, Larry Keefe spoke to us about what it was like to have a classmate from another part of the world.

# What year did you meet Masahiro?

He came during my sophomore year, in 1961. I believe he would have entered as a junior because he was staying with the Southgate family, and their son James – who was my friend – was a year ahead of me.

### How did the VCS student body react to their first exchange student?

People were very curious about what he would be like; it was something of an exotic event to have him here because I don't believe at the time very many people in Victor had ever met an Asian of any kind. In general they tried to make him feel welcome; there were several impediments to him being fully accepted into the student body, the first of them being his somewhat limited English, and the second, his personality and cultural background, because he was extremely reserved and/ or shy. He was probably, you have to think, chosen as an exchange student because of his intelligence and the fact he knew some English, rather than because of his outgoing personality.

### What did you learn from the exchange with Masahiro?

One thing that I learned for myself was that Japanese were not at all like Americans who simply happened to speak a different language and use chopsticks. Masahiro's world view was quite different than ours. He was extremely polite and studious; I think any grade less than 100% bothered him quite a bit; he dressed formally at all times and found it difficult to just relax and play. My father had served in Japan right after WWII and liked the Japanese culture, and I was quite eager to learn about it, so when we became friends - something I worked on doing - we talked a great deal about our differences. He was quite ambitious, focused entirely on getting into university, and much of the time didn't really approve of the lack of seriousness of VCS students. Of course, he was too polite to say that, and was always very thoughtful, but our informal and unfocused life style shocked him a bit. I think much of the time he was lonely and homesick, and I had to admire the way he stuck it

out; back in those days you couldn't make overseas phone calls—at least he could not have afforded themand of course there was no email, etc. So he would occasionally get letters he showed, but had little contact from home. After months of knowing one another he started to make jokes and to laugh, and we developed a genuine liking for each other; my mother and father became quite fond of him and he spent a lot of time at our house. He did invite me to call him 'Masa-chan' which he explained was an informal, friendly form of address, as opposed to Masa-san, which would have been much more formal. I eventually got him to just goof around a bit, but it was an uphill walk. Despite that, we developed a real bond of affection.

### What was Masahiro like?

Masahiro seemed more interested in grades than extracurricular activities. He did like to paint, in a classic Japanese watercolor style, and my impression is that he was good at it in a traditional way. I don't recall him taking part in other activities.

### Why are foreign exchange students so important for VCS students, especially today?


I don't know about their importance today; back then it gave me a tangible sense of how very different other people can be, but that their values, ambition and aspirations are every bit as important to them as ours are to us.

### Postscript:

I lost touch with Masahiro after he left Victor and have never found an address for him since, though I've tried occasionally; it would be nice to know how his life turned out.

The Senior High School continues to host international students from every corner of the globe, only now through multiple exchange programs, including the Victor-Farmington Rotary Club.







## The Win That Shocked Section V

### VCS Celebrates 40th Anniversary of '77-'78 Boys Basketball Sectional Championship

It was a classic underdog story. So classic, that it was actually printed on the back of a Section V basketball program . . . "The 1977-78 Victor Varsity Boys Basketball Team was the only team ever to win a Sectional Championship with a losing record during the regular season."

But their early-season losing record of 8 -10 didn't tell the whole story according to former player Scott Zahn. As Zahn (Class of '79) recalls, the team, made up of only two seniors and predominantly three sport juniors, "just needed time to adjust to the speed of the game and the competition."

And adjust they did. Zahn recalls that by the end of their season his team took a Cinderella turn defeating North Rose

Wolcott 88-60, Lyons 74-58 and Wheatland Chili 65-42 before taking on Midlakes in the Sectional Championship game.

"I'll never forget that game at the Rochester War Memorial. The crowd was amazing. More than 7,500 people filled the arena and watched us beat Midlakes in the final seconds, 58-54."

Zahn says he attributes his team's turnaround season to Coach Gary Wilkins, "the most prepared coach I know," Zahn said.

Two years ago Zahn, a retired VCS teacher and Victor Girls Basketball coach had the opportunity to meet his former coach on the court again, this time as opposing coaches. Despite the final score, it is safe to say both Zahn and Wilkins were winners.

# Senior High Principal Set to Retire

Victor Senior High School Principal Yvonne O'Shea recently announced that she will retire on August 4, 2018 after nearly sixteen years with the District.

O'Shea has seen a lot of changes during her tenure at VCS.

Her first graduating class in 2003 had 195 graduates. This year's senior class has 350 students!

"When I started at Victor Senior High School there were five Advanced Placement (AP) classes and pretty limited electives and programs. We now have 23 APs, a full IB Diploma program and Project Lead the Way," O'Shea proudly said.

Course work is not all O'Shea has seen change through the years. The graduation rate in 2003 was 86%. In 2017 it was 97%. Significant changes also occurred in athletics during this time.

When asked what she will miss the most in retirement, O'Shea unsurprisingly says, the people, of course.

"We have an incredibly talented and dedicated staff, respectful students who care about their school and their futures and a very supportive community," she said.

People are not all O'Shea will miss. She says she will also miss the challenges. "My work at Victor Senior High School has always been focused on getting better; finding ways to improve. I'm never satisfied with being okay or above average - my journey has been like Jim Collins' research on *Good to Great* - making that leap. Our team of administrators and counselors have worked really hard to identify students who struggle and create unique, supportive programs. As a

faculty, we focus on connecting better with students and engaging them in authentic learning. We have tried many different approaches and teaching strategies. Over the years, we have greatly reduced



the drop-out rate and increased the numbers of students who challenge themselves."

Of all of the memories O'Shea has etched in her memory she says the most memorable might be the first time they did the Senior Parade where graduates marched through all of the schools they attended at VCS. "I loved seeing our seniors go back to their roots - the applause from the younger students and hugs and tears from their former teachers. They were truly goose bump moments!"

In retirement O'Shea says she will continue to make memories and hopefully have many more of those "goose bump moments" too.

"I will continue to work in some capacity. I've also been thinking a great deal about my next challenge. It might be going back to teaching, perhaps at one of the local colleges or an online high school or university. I'd be open to consulting and/or doing interim administrative work in our area. I'm also drawn to learning something completely new and taking classes like photography, piano, culinary arts, painting or computer programming. The one thing I know is that I'll be busy!"

# VCS Business Administrator Retires

VCS School Business Administrator, Michael Vistocco officially retired in March after 26 years with the District. Vistocco started in Victor as the District Treasurer in January of 1992 and became the School Business Administrator in 1995. Before arriving at VCS he worked at Romulus Central School District.

Over the past 26 years Vistocco was part of many changes at Victor Central Schools. During his tenure he worked with four Superintendents and thirty different Board of Education members. He also oversaw a budget increase from \$21 million for the 1991-92 school year to our current \$66 million budget and watched our student population grow from 2,721 in 1991-92 school year to today's enrollment of approximately 4,500. In addition, he was involved with more than \$100 million in capital improvement projects.

While putting the budgets together throughout the years Vistocco said he always made recommendations and decisions based on what was best for the students at Victor Central Schools.

"Our internal, external and New York State audit reports during my tenure were outstanding. According to our Auditor, our District is in great financial shape. One of the things I am most proud of is that we have been able to remain fiscally responsible while we worked to fund educational programs, provide the necessary tools and create a school campus that enables one of the best educational experiences in the state. If you compare the older aerial picture of the campus that I have in my office to our campus

today, it is very easy to see why our campus is the envy of all other school districts," Vistocco said.

VCS changed immensely since his early days. "When I started, I knew every staff member on our campus. Today, we have grown



so much that it is sometimes hard to put a name with all of the new faces I see regularly on campus these days." he said.

One thing Vistocco says he can definitely identify very clearly is that VCS is an amazing school district.

"Our teachers, administrators, aides, secretaries, food service, transportation staff, cleaners and especially our business office staff are incredible individuals. Some staff members do not realize how awesome it is to be working at VCS. I always say, go work at another district first, and then come to VCS, then you will realize what a wonderful place this is. Change and growth are good. I know that the infrastructure in place here at VCS will continue to allow it to thrive. Victor Schools will be an amazing place to educate the children of the district for many years to come."

# VCS Director of Health, Athletics And Physical Education Announces Retirement

Long time VCS Athletic Director, Ronald Whitcomb announced that he will retire effective June 30, 2018. Whitcomb came to VCS in 1991 with more than 13 years of experience as a Health and Physical Education teacher at schools in Ohio and Athletic Director/Drug



Prevention Coordinator at East Rochester Schools. Before VCS, he was also a Varsity Wrestling Coach and Assistant Football Coach at other districts.

While at the helm, Whitcomb led not only a nationally recognized Physical Education program, but also, one of the most competitive athletic programs in the area.

Under Whitcomb's leadership VCS athletic teams have achieved 318 League championships, 177 Sectional championships and 15 New York State championships.

"It has been a pleasure and honor to serve the student athletes, coaches and physical education teachers at Victor Central Schools for the past 26 years. I am proud that we have one of the finest physical education programs in New York State, thanks to the dedicated teachers and coaches at VCS! It has been rewarding to witness firsthand the growth of the district, especially the changes in the athletic facilities and our level of competition in the Monroe County League," Whitcomb said.



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

The next thing you know, you are proudly taping their artwork on your refrigerator; a perfectly cut-out handprint arranged to look like a butterfly painted with watercolor paints of vibrant hues from red to violet. Where did the time go? Think about it: The trust you put in your child to be safe yet experiment with scissors allowed them the freedom to create beauty from the depths of their imagination.

It is this imagination, curiosity, and responsibility that the scientists at the Victor Primary School are engaging in. Over the past several years, the scientists at the Victor Primary School have participated in an incredibly unique opportunity. Victor is one of the only schools in the area to house and maintain a science lab at the elementary level. Scientists here learn about electricity, magnetism, physical and chemical interactions, simple machines, buoyancy, weather, insects, and our ecosystem among many other topics. Of course, the most engaging part of science instruction is the inevitability of getting messy but, in the process, discovering something that will remain with them for a lifetime.

This year, the VCS Educational Foundation provided an Art of Teaching grant to purchase five compound microscopes, five tripod magnifiers, and insect and plant slide kits for Victor Primary scientists. The grant has allowed students to make close-up



observations of different plants and animals in a variety of ecosystems. For example, when learning about insects, students explore different parts that all insects have: a head, abdomen, and thorax. This concept, itself, is a very basic demonstration of knowledge and comprehension skills. However, when you look at different insect heads and mouths under a microscope, otherwise impossible to see with the naked eye, you will quickly realize that even just a head is much more complex than you ever knew. Insects have many different mouthparts that each have their own purpose. From sucking, chewing, to lapping mouthparts, there is a lot that scientists can infer about an insect, its diet, defense mechanisms, and even habitat.

The Victor Primary School scientists all thank you so much for supporting our youngest students! This is the kind of higher-level thinking that Victor students are engaging in due to the support of the VCS Educational Foundation and Victor students, community



members, and alumni who participated in the Devil Dash5K.

The 2017 Devil Dash grew to 277 participants including 49 alumni and raised over \$10,000. There was a three-way tie for the class of '79, '86, and '15 for most participants in the Devil Dash Alumni Challenge. The Devil Dash is a great way for alumni to support current VCS students that sit in the desks and classrooms we all fondly remember.

Aggie Gullace (Class of '89) participated in a Devil Dash 5k virtual course with some local friends in Maine while her mother, June Gullace (Class of '65) participated on the VCS campus. Aggie is excited to participate with her Devil Dash team again in 2018. She feels the Devil Dash allows VCS alumni to participate, contribute, and create a sense of the Blue Devil community regardless of where they now reside. The Devil Dash Virtual 5K also included other alumni from Georgia, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire.

Please consider signing up and recruiting a team for the fourth

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annual Devil Dash 5K and family walk on Saturday, September 29, 2018. All Devil Dash proceeds will support the four main VCS Educational Foundation projects including Field Trips Forever, Technology for Today and Tomorrow, The Art of Teaching, and a general fund. # Academic, Athletic and Artistic Distinctions

- In June, 2017, 97% of our students graduated with a Regents Diploma, 33% percent earned a Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation.
- In 2017 Victor Central Schools' SAT scores were among the highest in the Greater Rochester Area ranking 15th out of 51 school districts.
- This past year the U.S News and World Report ranked Victor Senior High School the sixth best school in the Rochester area, the 71st best school in New York State and the 689th best school nationally out of 21,000 public high schools nationwide.
- Last fall senior Cole Vandenberg was named a National Merit Scholarship semifinalist. Cole was one of approximately 16,000 semifinalists in the 63rd annual National Merit Scholarship Program.
