# This Week In History



## Monday 9/10:

**TODAY IN 1776, NATHAN HALE VOLUNTEERS TO BE A SPY** behind British lines of the Revolutionary War. Disguised as a Dutch schoolmaster Hale successfully gathered information about British troop movements for the next several weeks. On September 21, 1776, Hale was captured while sailing Long Island Sound, trying to cross back into American-controlled territory. He was interrogated by British General William Howe and, when it was discovered that he was carrying incriminating documents, General Howe ordered his execution for spying, which was set for the following morning. After being led to

the gallows, legend holds that Hale was asked if he had any last words and that he replied with these now-famous words, "I only regret that I have but one life to give for my country."

### Tuesday 9/11: September 11th marks 17th anniversary

of the treacherous terrorist attack on the World Trade centers and the Pentagon. The three Boeing airplanes crashed head on into these buildings leaving an impact on the victims who experienced the horrific events that day and on America in years to follow. After the events of that fatal day, George Bush delivered a televised address saying, "Terrorist attacks can shake the foundations of our biggest buildings, but they cannot touch the foundation of America. These acts shatter steel, but they cannot dent the steel of American resolve."





### Wednesday 9/12: In 1940 FOUR TEENAGERS NEAR MONTIGNAC,

**FRANCE** stumbled upon 15,000-17,000 year old cave paintings. Their dog had run off into the Lascaux grotto where the boys met the gallery of decorated walls with approximately 600 paintings and drawings and 1,500 engravings. Archeologists later came to the conclusion that the cavern was a hub for hunting and religious rituals. A replica of the cave was created nearby in 1983 and attracts tens of thousands of visitors annually.

### Thursday 9/13:

**TODAY IN 1814, FRANCIS SCOTT KEY, WROTE THE POEM** "Defence of Fort McHenry" which in 1931 was turned into the star spangled banner. Key witnessed the War of 1812 in Maryland and was not spires by a lone U.S. flag flying over Fort McHenry at dawn. With this image came the famous words, "And the rocket's red glare, the bombs bursting in air, Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there."

## Friday 9/14:

**SEPTEMBER 14TH, 1984 MARKS THE FIRST MTV** Video Music Awards at Radio City Music Hall in New York City. The award show was hosted by Bette Midler and Dan Aykroyd with the highest awarded artists being Herbie Hancock and Michael Jackson. Some other notable award winners were Cyndi Lauper for Best Female Video Moonman and The Police for Best Cinematography in a Video. Since their first show in 1984 there has been 35 award shows with about 7 million viewers a year.



# Person of the Month

#### SYLVIA MENDEZ WAS BORN IN CALIFORNIA WHEN SEGREGATION IN SCHOOLS WAS RAMPANT

throughout the U.S., so when Mendez was denied from attending a "Whites only" school her parents gathered families in her local community to file a lawsuit in the local federal court. Mendez, at only 8 years old, helped in the case by showing that Hispanic students were able to speak English and therefore had the capacity to learn in the same environments. The success of this case lead to the eventual end to segregated education nationwide.



On February 15, 2011, Mendez was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom for her activist work.
