2018 FCIS Convention Reimagining Education: Education for the Next Generation Hyatt Regency Riverfront, Jacksonville November 14-16, 2018

Thank you to all the schools, speakers and sponsors who participated in the FCIS Annual Convention at the Hyatt Regency Jacksonville Riverfront in November. Convention Committee Chairs, Kim Bednarek, Head of The Discovery School, and James Milford, Head of Maclay School, designed a program that highlighted the pace of the changing landscape that requires us to consistently reimagine, reinvent, and practice being as nimble and responsive as possible.

FCIS kicked off the Convention with an ISM pre-conference workshop, Session I: From Best Practices to Results: Assessing Your Admission and Enrollment Management Operations and Session II: From Best Practices to Results: Assessing Your Marketing Communications Operations. In the morning, Amy Riley, ISM Consultant, guided participants through ISM's Admission and Enrollment Management Assessment Instrument, and in the afternoon, she introduced participants to ISM's Marketing Communications Assessment Instrument. Participants analyzed the state of their operations and established a baseline from which to measure the effectiveness of their plan strategies. They learned best practices instruction and created a three-part action plan designed to enhance their school's enrollment operations based on the findings of their assessments.

For the third year, there was a pre-conference workshop targeted to Business Officers. This year, the workshop was led by Mary Kay Markunas, Director of Research and Member Resources; and Jennifer Osland Hillen, Vice President, Professional Development and Business Affairs, National Business Officers' Association (NBOA); and Nancy Greene, Vice President for Finance and Operations / CFO, Pine Crest School. Participants attended their presentation, "The Composite Financial Index (CFI): Core Ratios for Financial Health". The Composite Financial Index (CFI) is a sophisticated tool designed to help think strategically about a school's overall financial health. Participants calculated their school's CFI using audited financials and then interpreted the results. They learned how their CFI results can help them present complex financial information in a more easily understood form to key constituencies and how to apply their CFI score over an extended period to provide a more stable long-term view of their school's financial performance.

Approximately 1,600 educators from 137 independent schools attended two energizing days filled with innovative sessions on topics targeting educational leadership, sustainability, marketing, fundraising, diversity and inclusion, student health and wellbeing, and evolving technologies to enhance teaching and engage learners. Ted Dintersmith, a leader in innovation, entrepreneurship, and education; and Max Ventilla, Founder and CEO of AltSchool, delivered outstanding keynote addresses. In his presentation, "Transforming School: The Urgency and the Possibility", Mr. Dintersmith drew on his trip to all fifty states during the 2015-16 school year to highlight conditions that lead to exceptional student learning and identified change models that enable a school to effectively transform classrooms at scale. On Friday, Mr. Ventilla presented his keynote, "Transforming Education Together". He explored the question of how to transform education, starting with collaboration between educators, engineers, and learner-centered schools who are proving success with innovative practices. He discussed the importance of these partnerships in co-creating a platform that supports and advances personalized, whole-child, student-driven education.

Participants attended luncheons on both days in anticipation of our two luncheon keynotes: Don Yaeger, inspirational speaker, longtime Associate Editor of *Sports Illustrated*, and author, and Joy Purdy, WJXT News Anchor. On Thursday, approximately 350 administrators attended the luncheon to hear Mr. Yaeger's presentation, "What Makes the Great Teams Great", in which he emphasized the importance for a team to understand their school's "why" in order to feel connected to its greater purpose and truly live its mission. On Friday, over 300 faculty members attended the luncheon to hear Ms. Purdy's presentation, "Teach On!". Ms. Purdy inspired the audience by honoring the enormous impact teachers have in the lives of their students and their families as well as in the community they serve and the dedication, hard work, and passion that this requires.

During the luncheon, door prizes were awarded, and the lucky winners went home with a variety of gift cards to restaurants and retail stores and overnight stays at a couple of beautiful resorts. Dr. Barbara Hodges also delivered a "state of the association" address on Thursday, bringing members up to date on current and future FCIS initiatives and trends in independent schools on both a state and national level.

Again this year, FCIS offered a mobile app for the Convention to provide participants with helpful information and navigation of the schedule, sessions, special events, hotel and exhibitors. Participants were able to give feedback on each session that they attended as well as on their overall Convention experience, which will shape the planning for next year's Convention.
