Message from the Board President

Dear Dunlap School District Residents,

It has been another busy year. We have had some significant administrative staff changes. Our athletic and extra-curricular programs probably had their best performances ever. In addition, our students continued to excel academically (ten perfect ACT scores at the high school is just one example).

We are grateful for the stewardship of Interim Superintendent Randy Merker and Interim Director of Finance Jack Bambrick who guided our district as we searched for a new superintendent and assistant superintendent. They led the district in this transition in an efficient manner and helped us accomplish a great deal. First, there were significant safety improvements this past year which included adding a hall monitor, two additional armed resource officers, another elementary counselor, and other physical safety improvements. Additionally, they steered us smoothly through the process of planning, approving, and beginning the building of an addition onto Dunlap Valley Middle School (DVMS).

Mr. Merker and Mr. Bambrick also helped us gain a clear understanding of our finances and gave honest input on needed actions. Finally, they helped us in the process of selecting our new superintendent and assistant superintendent and provided for a smooth and effective transition. Many thanks to Mr. Merker and Mr. Bambrick!

We welcomed our new superintendent, Dr. Scott Dearman, on July 1st. Dr. Dearman is a veteran educator with a breadth of experience as a teacher, finance director, and superintendent. He has hit the ground running, has already moved into the district, and has met all the board members, administrative staff, many other staff, as well as numerous community members. Our vote to hire him was unanimous which speaks to his outstanding qualifications to lead our district.

The next year will bring some challenges. When the DVMS expansion is complete, we will need to redistrict at the middle-school level. Redistricting is always a tremendous challenge because it requires some of our children to change schools. Additionally, we anticipate our revenue for the 2019-20 year will be significantly diminished due to declining property values. So, while we have had increasing revenues in the past few years to accommodate increasing staff salaries and benefits, as well as new programs, we may face a year or two of no increases, perhaps even decreased revenue.

We are fortunate to have a great staff and community as well as healthy reserves to help us weather these challenges. We look forward to your input as we move forward.

Superintendent News

Dr. Scott Dearman, Superintendent

On July 1, 2018, Dr. Scott Dearman took the helm as the Superintendent of Dunlap School District, after being unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Dearman has served as Superintendent of Deer Creek-Mackinaw since 2012 and has 24 years of educational experience. Prior to becoming superintendent, Dr. Dearman served in many roles including Principal of Farmington Junior High and Farmington High School, Assistant Principal of Chillicothe Elementary Center, and working as a mathematics teacher at Illinois Valley Central High School in Chillicothe, IL.



Dr. Dearman holds a Master of Science degree in educational administration from Illinois State University, an Education Specialist degree in educational leadership from Western Illinois University, and a Superintendent's Endorsement. In addition, Dr. Dearman obtained a doctorate degree from Aurora University in May of 2016.

Born, raised, and employed in central Illinois, Dr. Dearman is familiar with the Dunlap community. "I remember when I started my teaching career that Dunlap was the rival of IVC, but they were the smaller school at that time. It has been interesting to see the growth and transformation of the Dunlap School District over the years into one of the leading academic institutions in the state while still being true to their roots," he stated.

Dr. Dearman's belief is that, "At the heart of an outstanding school should be an energetic and committed administrator who values, first and foremost, the students and the staff."

Dunlap Board President, Karen Disharoon, stated, "We are very excited to have Dr. Scott Dearman join the Dunlap School Community as our new superintendent. Our decision to hire him was unanimous, and we received numerous positive comments about him from our community group who also interviewed our finalists. Dr. Dearman has an impressive depth of educational experience ranging from teaching, serving as principal, and six years as superintendent. He comes to us having had a broad range of responsibilities including finance, personnel, buildings and grounds, as well as curriculum in his most recent service as superintendent. That breadth of experience will serve him well as he takes on the role to lead our district. We extend a warm welcome to him and to his family."

Looking forward to the next step in his career, Dr. Dearman stated, "The Dunlap community has a lot to offer, and I believe that my background and educational experiences will fit well with the Dunlap administrative team, staff, community, and students. I am very excited to have this opportunity and look forward to familiarizing myself with the school district and community. I am excited to work with a collective group with the singular focus of maximizing educational opportunities for students. It is an exciting time with the changes in my career and the fact that my children just entered high school and middle school at Dunlap School District with the start of this school year."

Dr. Dearman recently relocated to the Dunlap area with his wife, Jill, and children, Levi (14) and Delaney (12).



Curriculum & Instruction

Heather Bowman, Director of Curriculum & Instruction

Over the years, educators have followed the research of John Hattie, author of Visible Learning (2008). In particular, we ex-

amine his meta-analysis related to effect sizes. Recently, Hattie has done some follow-up research, and one of the areas of strongest effect is collective teacher efficacy (CTE). Collective teacher efficacy is the collective belief of the staff of the school/faculty in their ability to positively affect students. CTE has been found to be strongly, positively correlated with student achievement. A school staff that believes it can collectively accomplish great things is vital for the health of a school, and if they believe they can make a positive difference then they very likely will. In an effort to build on this concept, the district hosted a summer book study on Jimmy Casas' book, *Culturize*. In his book, Mr. Casas shares insights into what it takes to cultivate a community of learners who embody different "soft skills" such as kindness, honesty, and compassion. His stories examine how these traits tie into the academic success of students. We were excited to have over



50 teachers and administrators, across the district, participate in this professional development opportunity. All teachers in our district, and in Peoria County, were able to hear Jimmy Casas speak at our county institute this year.

This year marks the second year of our district's 1:1 computer technology program, putting Chromebooks in the hands of all students, grades 4-12. While we were thrilled to pass this technology out to students the first week of school, we are even more



excited to see the learning transform in our classrooms. To facilitate this growth, we have three instructional technology coaches that work with all teachers in the district. The purpose of these instructional coaches is to provide support for the teachers in the implementation of effective instructional practices and technology. This, in turn, will ensure high academic achievement of all students, as teachers will see and understand how technology's place in the classroom - always a debatable topic - can in fact transform learning and help teachers to understand how technology can be effective in their own classrooms. This position is designed to increase individual and collective teacher capacity to provide leadership for change. Education continues to evolve, and as curricular leaders, it is our job to ensure our teachers are evolving with the students. Please welcome Stefanie Pitzer, Jodi Gordon, and Stefanie Crawford to this

Each year, as an administrative team, we examine what we are doing, across the district, to ensure we are meeting our mission: *empowering individual potential*. Technology

Ben King, Director of Technology

The Dunlap CUSD #323 Technology Department ended the 2017-18 school year closing a total of 4,162 helpdesk tickets with an average close time of 26 hours and average first response time of six hours. Considering nearly the entire department staff has recently changed over, these are pretty good numbers!

The start of the 2018-19 school year has consisted of a considerable amount of planning, coordinating, and integrating with the Curriculum and Instruction Department as the district continues its jour-

ney toward becoming future ready.

In order for the Curriculum and Instruction Department to be successful, the Technology Department must be successful implementing a robust, secure, and reliable network throughout the entire district. This past school year, the district, partnering with Stratus Networks, installed dark fiber to Hickory Grove Elementary School, Banner Elementary School, Wilder-Waite Grade School, and Ridgeview Elementary School. All Dunlap schools are now on a reliable high speed network provided by the district.

This summer and fall, the Technology Depart-

ment will continue to upgrade the network so that it will have a 10 GB/sec backbone throughout the district. With all of these core upgrades nearly completed, the district will be capable of continuing its mission of creating future ready students for many years to come.

The Technology Department is also preparing for the rollout of 1:1 devices for the high school starting this fall. This will bring a lot of new ideas and innovations into the district as students, faculty, and administration will all work towards utilizing this new avenue of learning.

The Technology Department plays an important role in many of the projects in the Dunlap School District. Over the past few years, these projects have included: Powerschool customizations, Gmail



conversion, district/school website design, new SmartBoard installations, security camera installations, upgrade of anti-virus and other core servers, and new security systems for schools.

As technology continues to evolve, the Dunlap School District is committed to evolving to provide our students with the technology skills and tools they will need to succeed.

Student Services

Alyssa Hart, Director of Student Services

As my first year as Director of Special Services came to a close in May, I can say that I have enjoyed the challenges and the learning that comes with a new position. I simply can't say enough about the phenomenal staff I am blessed to work with on a daily basis. Each and every person on the student services staff goes above and beyond for our students and families. Their knowledge, hard work, and passion for teaching are evident in the continued success of our students.



#323 Safety Line

Dunlap has started a new safety tip line for the district. This allows anyone with information that they feel needs to be shared with our staff the ability to call or email reports directly to the district. This information is anonymous, and the reports are received by the building administration and the Director of Student Services. Social Emotional Learning (SEL)

With increased social emotional concerns within the district, I am proud to report that we now have a counselor in every Dunlap school building, full-time, with the start of the 2018-19 school year. Katelyn Thompson is the newest member of our team, and she will be housed at Hickory Grove Elementary School. I am thankful that each one of our schools will have the counseling staff needed to give our students the support they need and deserve.

Special Education

The Dunlap Special Education Program continues to grow and improve. We have approximately 575 students being served by ten speech pathologists, two school psychologists, two school social workers, and 33 special education teachers. We serve students in cross-categorical classes, instructional classes, life-skills classrooms, and in other specialized programs within the schools. To witness the learning happening in these programs due to the hard work of our amazing teachers, aides, and support staff is truly amazing. With all of these programs we offer, we are able to service students within the school district from ages 3 to 22.

Next year, we will be using a new district-wide IEP program called Embrace IEP, the program of choice from SEAPCO, our special education cooperative. All special services staff members are currently being trained on the new program. We are confident we will be ready for a smooth roll-out of this new program to start the new school year.

Response to Intervention (RtI) for Academics and Social Emotional Learning

Dunlap provides RtI to students in all buildings throughout the school district. We continue to make improvements to our processes, procedures, and supports available each year. One of the many improvements to the RtI program this past school year was having a Curriculum Specialist in the planning meetings. This addition helped to ensure consistency within the district in the area of RtI and will be continued for the 2018-19 school year. Please see the Dunlap website for more information about RtI. You will find the revised Dunlap School District RtI Plan, which includes the process, decision making matrix, and referrals specific to academics and social emotional learning. Nursing/Medical

Dunlap School District recognizes the need to ensure student safety at all times. As student enrollment increases each year, so does the number of students with medical and health concerns.

The Nursing Department is working to develop and maintain a district-wide system of documentation, processes, and procedures. We continuously work to streamline systems in order to ensure safety and consistency in all of our buildings. We have two amazing full-time nurses in the district and six amaz-



ing nurse assistants. They go above and beyond to ensure that the health and safety of our students is top priority.

English as a Second Language (ESL)

The number of students in Dunlap who receive English as a Second Language support has increased to over 225 students. Dunlap has worked hard to maintain a quality ESL program to ensure support to our students from preschool to grade 12. We increased the number of ESL teachers to six full-time equivalent (FTE) for the 2017-18 school year in order to continue to improve the services we provide to our ESL students. These six teachers are very knowledgeable in their area of expertise, and they go above and beyond for all of their students.

This summer, Hickory Grove Elementary School hosted approximately 60 participants in the 2018 ESL Summer Program. This program was funded by a Federal Title III grant. We are fortunate to be able to offer this opportunity to so many students in Dunlap.

Dunlap Gives Back (DGB)

This is the end of the third year for Dunlap Gives Back. We continue to provide breakfast, snacks, and other food items for any student in need. DGB also works to meet the various needs that arise during the school year for students, families, and staff. We encourage anyone in need to reach out to us to request items through our website at **Dunlap Gives Back**.

We greatly appreciate the generosity of the Dunlap community to support students and families in need.

ELECTION ANNOUNCEMENT

Board of Education

Dunlap Community Unit School District #323 will have four (4) school board seats to be filled at the April 2, 2019, Consolidated Election. Elected candidates will serve four-year terms, expiring in April, 2023.

Candidates for the Board of Education can begin circulating the *Petition for Nomination* on September 18, 2018. The period for filing nomination documents is December 10-17, 2018.

Candidate Requirements – Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/10-10)

Each member, on the date of his or her election, shall be a citizen of the United States of the age of 18 years or over, shall be a resident of the State and territory of the district for at least one year immediately preceding his or her election, shall be a registered voter as provided in the general election law, shall not be a school trustee, must not have been removed from a school board pursuant to Section 2-3.25f-5 of this Code (unless subsequently appointed as a member of an Independent Authority or if it has been 10 years since the abolition of the Independent Authority in the district), and shall not be a child sex offender as defined in Section 11-9.3 of the Criminal Code of 2012.



OPERATIONS

Tom Grimm, Director of Operations

The past twelve months have been very busy, exciting, and productive for the support staff in the areas of transportation, food service and maintenance, and a construction project.

Transportation Department

The Transportation Department is off to a very busy start this school year. We are running 44 bus routes and three additional routes with smaller support vehicles. Fall sports schedules have started as well, and we are running numerous sports teams to their events along with additional extra-curricular activities.



We have added some new faces this year with the hiring of three new bus drivers and three new bus monitors. We are very excited to have these great people join our team and help the Transportation Department.

Look for our new buses in September. Dunlap #323 is adding five new 77-passenger buses to our fleet. The new buses will replace five of our older buses and gives the district more reliability for their transportation needs.

Food Service Department

The Food Service Department is looking forward to a busy school year. In early August, all of our food service staff took part in an all-day training with Kaitlyn Streitmatter, a representative from the University of Illinois Extension's Office giving us positive cues on how to communicate with students, encouraging them to choose healthier options during lunch and how to "Spice it Up" by adding flavor without using salt. Keep an eye out for our "Flavor Stations" coming soon!



Also new this school year, the USDA is allowing school districts to bring back 1% flavored milk while keeping the fat free white milk. This change was effective with the start of school in August.

Maintenance Department

Our quarterly training events were a big hit this year which included AED Training/CPR Certification and Live Shooter Training with the Peoria County Sheriff's Department.

Along with our normal summer activities of cleaning the school buildings, preparing our kitchens, and routine maintenance on our bus fleet, we have a number of special projects underway. Below is a small list of things we have worked on this summer.

- Chiller replacement at Dunlap Middle School.
- Dunlap High School library remodel. We have finished our 2-year remodel with some new furniture this summer.
- Security upgrades for Dunlap Grade School, Wilder-Waite Grade School and Ridgeview Elementary School. This included key card entry and camera systems. This is the 2nd year of a 3-year program to upgrade all district buildings.



- Lighting upgrades at Dunlap High School, Dunlap Middle School, and Wilder-Waite Grade School. We will be upgrading the parking lot and outdoor fixture lighting with new LED fixtures.
- Sealcoating and striping at Wilder-Waite Grade School, Banner Elementary School, and Dunlap Valley Middle School.

We have had a very busy school year and worked very hard this summer to ensure our district is in the best shape for a successful 2018-19 school year.

Construction - Dunlap Valley Middle School Expansion Project

The district started its construction project at Dunlap Valley Middle School earlier this summer, and great progress is being made. The expansion will include a new pod (house) for each grade plus a new auxiliary gym. Each of the new pods will include three classrooms, a resource area, lockers, restrooms, and a teacher workroom.

The weather has been very cooperative this summer, and the project is on schedule. Construction on this project will continue through the school year with the addition slated to open for the 2019-20 school year.

The Building Leadership Team, District Leadership Team, Wold Architects, and Mangieri Companies have worked hard to bring this building project to life. Our number one goal is the safety of the students as we work through this project during the 2018-19 school year.

We are very excited to watch the progress and can't wait to open these new wings next year.

Just over \$2,500 was raised in our Laps for Life, which supports the St. Jude Dunlap to Peoria run in August.




Our Macaroni Mountain exceeded 2,400 boxes of macaroni and cheese that was donated to the Southside Mission of Peoria.

Behavior Intervention Strategies Team (BIST)

- Grace and Accountability
- Early Intervention addressing behaviors right away
- Caring Confrontation including processing and consistent language
- Goals for Life

We held a district-wide training in BIST in July and invited several surrounding districts as well. We look forward to our continued development and implementation of the BIST strategies and philosophies.



Our PTO was busy again and provided our teachers and families with several events including an ice cream social, carnival, talent show, movie night,

book fairs, a blood drive, dine- outs, Teacher Appreciation Week, and so much more! PTO also used their funds to have a projection system installed in our gym over the summer. Thank you to our PTO for continually supporting our vision and mission at Banner!



Our 5th grade students had a celebration in March where we honored them for being in school for 1,000 days! The 5th grade teachers had several activities and ended the day with an all-school tunnel for the students to walk through. Destination Imagination, Inc. is a nonprofit organization dedicated to teaching students the skills needed to succeed in school, their careers, and beyond. The students experience project-based learning that blends STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) education with the arts and social entrepreneurship.  Students continued to make great gains in their reading and math as indicated in their STAR growth Student Growth Proficiency scores.






DUNLAP MIDDLE SCHOOL

In January, we attended the CGTI Mid-Year in Bloomington with a record number of fifteen students. In March, TABDD held its first TABDD Night Out which was a huge success. Seventy-five students participated that night

in gym activities, painted kindness rocks, and heard a cyberbullying presentation from a former student. After dinner, we watched the movie, *Wonder*. A great time was had by all. Our final meeting took place on May 16th with a little party and breakfast before we said "Adios" for the summer.

Extra-Curricular Activities at DVMS

The Boys' Cross-Country Team had a successful season this year, finishing in 1st place in four races, one of which was the IESA Sectional. With the sectional win, the team advanced to the State Cross-Country Meet held at Parkside Jr. High School in Normal, IL, on October 14th. The team finished 7th place in State and had three of seven runners place in the top 30.

The Speech Team successfully competed at the IESA State Speech Tournament on November 3, 2017, where the team had 32 first place awards, 11 second place awards, and one third place award! Dunlap Valley Middle School also earned eight Judge's Choice Awards, the highest honor a speech participant can receive and given to the top performances of the night.

On March 18, 2018, the Dunlap Valley Middle School Cheer Team volunteered their time participating in a winter cricket tournament hosted at the Louisville Slugger Sports Complex dome. The winter tournament was an event hosted by the Cricket Association of Peoria. The tournament opened with a goal to raise at least \$5,000 for Easter Seals. Music Department

The school year began strong with approximately 180 students participating in our seven large music ensembles. For the past few years, the 7th-8th grade Valley band, choir and orchestra students have come together in early September to perform in the annual high school Homecoming Parade and love to show their Valley Pride! The fall was a busy one with two combined concerts at the high school. October IMEA auditions were held in Geneseo, IL, and 21 DVMS students were named "All-District" musicians for Illinois District #2. Those students then performed at festivals held at Augustana College and in Mendota, IL. In late October, we had our annual Fall Concert entitled Music for a Darkened Theater where families enjoyed a fundraiser of kettle corn from Kernel Poppers Popcorn during the concert. In December, students again presented a choral, band and orchestra concert. Several choral students were named to the PACC Honor Choir and performed with the Peoria Area Civic Chorale at Five Points in Washington, IL. Second semester kicked off in January with preparations for solo and ensemble competitions as well as organizational contests. Each year roughly 85-90% of Valley musicians choose to compete as soloists or in ensembles ranging from 2 to 16 members. DVMS presented a whopping 125 entries at the IGSMA competition in early March where a large majority of those entries earned highest honors with Division I ratings. April continued to be a fruitful month with all seven Valley music bands, choirs, and orchestras performing a Where Art Thou Spring? Concert. All groups competed at Organizational Contest where 6 of the 7 groups earned high ratings with Division I medals. Our 7th group missed high honors by one point, and we are very proud of them also! Music was still very much in the air around the Valley in May. Small ensembles played for an All-District Concert held at DHS, and all our ensembles performed out in our community.

The 2017-18 school year was a truly exceptional one for Dunlap High School. Committed faculty members, a strong Senior class, and an enthusiastic student body led to a number of remarkable achievements. Some of the highlights of the year included:

- 24% of graduates earned a 30 or higher on the ACT.
- 35% of the class of 2018 were Illinois State Scholars.
- In SAT testing this year, students scored an average of 1172 on the SAT while the last state average score available was a 1012.
- This year, 267 students signed up to take the AP exams, with 483 AP tests administered to students.
- The Fine Arts Department has continually put student talent on display throughout the region and the State. Student art ranging from pictures to paintings have graced the halls of Dunlap High School giving students a chance to show their creative interests.
- The Dunlap High School Music Department won their first ever IHSA Class A Music Sweepstakes State Championship which included six awards for All-State. The Women's Chorale and Wind Ensemble also received Best of Day awards at Organizational Contest. With a variety of concert performances, two sold out "Madrigal Knights", and an awesome Fine Arts Night show, there was much to celebrate throughout the year.
- "Stage 323" produced 5 shows including *Up the Down Staircase* in September and the musical, *Anything Goes*, in January featuring over 100 DHS students. In March, "Stage 323" went on the road placing 2nd at the Joliet West Fest, with 4 students recognized individually at IHSA Sectionals. In June, over 60 District 323 elementary students joined the DHS students for the Theatre Camp production of *Cinderella*.
- Dunlap High School earned a collection of State championships in Cross Country, Music Sweepstakes, Dance Team, Girls Track and Field, and WYSE, with a runner up trophy in Football. Individual State Champion medals were earned in swimming and track events at the IHSA State Finals.
- When disaster struck Garfield Elementary in Texas, and a former DHS student who now teaches at Garfield reached
 out looking for possible help for students, Dunlap rose to the challenge by raising more than \$20,000 in cash and 31
 TONS of supplies. Supplies were delivered by trailer to Garfield where the giving spirit of Dunlap made an immediate positive impact in the face of tragedy.
- The first year of Dunlap High School's Alternative Education Program led to more than 200 half credits recovered for students participating in the program. Eagle Education has been a major step forward in helping all students achieve academic success.
- New clubs were added to the more than 30 clubs already available to DHS students. Flight Club showed how quickly newly launched student clubs can make an impact. In their first year of operation, Flight Club brought a weather balloon launch to Dunlap Middle School, gathered a collection of donated drones and model airplanes to learn with, and partnered with aviation experts to come and speak about the field.
- Eagle Connections was created to help connect new students at DHS with current students who would like to show them the ropes and to make them feel at home in their new high school.
- The 12 Eagles group was created to empower student leadership within DHS. The 12 Eagles group collaborated on ideas for school improvement, traveled to a global summit meeting on diversity, and represented DHS by attending a meeting of Peoria area school student leaders to share culture and dialogue.

As we look forward to the new year, there have been some great additions and more significant changes to come. The evolution of summer school programming continued with more opportunities than ever for year round learning. This summer, 250 students took classes in P.E., Civics, Resource Management, and Software Applications. Dedicate is a new, elective course for junior and senior students who are interested in the field of education. These students will have the opportunity to visit the elementary and middle schools, based on interest-level, to assist a teacher in class and learn firsthand about instruction. The 2018-19 school year will also include the rollout of 1-to-1 technology for students attending DHS. Staff efforts have led to the development of Canvas and other sites that increase curriculum access for students. As a result of the 1-to-1 program, students will experience easier access to course material, greater collaboration and research potential, and enhanced options for feedback.

The 2017-18 school year was a year full of great accomplishments for the Dunlap High School Athletic Department. For the second year in a row, Dunlap won the Mid-Illini Conference All-Sports Trophy! Mid-Illini teams earn points based on where they finish in the varsity conference standings at the end of each sports season. At the end of the school year, the trophy is awarded to the school with the highest point total. Dunlap finished with a total of 9,700 points to place first in the standings, beating out the second place school by 350 points. This is a great accomplishment for all of our athletes and coaches!

The school year started off with an amazing fall that featured an IHSA State Championship in Class 2A Cross Country, with four runners earning All-State recognition. We also had an IHSA Runner-Up finish in 5A football, and Emma Theobald was a State Champion in swimming the 100-yard butterfly.

During the winter season, the Eaglettes Dance Team won the IDTA Class 3A Pom/Dance State Championship, and Kai Koehler was the 3A Champion in the Three-Point Showdown.

This spring the Girls' Track and Field Team repeated as IHSA Class 2A State Champions! They scored 102 points in the State meet, the most recorded by any team since the formation of three classes in track and field. First place finishes came in the 4x800 meter relay (Andrea Copeland, Miranda Kruiswyk, Sarah Georgieff, and Franny Verville), the 4x100 meter relay (Aanise Sajna, Savannah Sullivan, Lizzy Hoenes, and Kiara Pauli), the 4x200 meter relay (Brittany Rainey, Savannah Sullivan, Aanise Sajna, and Kiara Pauli), and Campbell Petersen in the 1600 meter run.

Throughout the year, over 700 student-athletes participated in athletics at Dunlap High School. The Eagles brought home four Regional plaques, four Sectional plaques and three State trophies! Thanks to all of our coaches, athletes, parents and fans for another exciting year of Dunlap Athletics!
