Superintendent's Message

Greetings Dunlap Community!

The 2016-17 school year is upon us, as we get ready to open our doors to over 4,400 students. The main focus of the past year was to update our Strategic Plan which guides our decision making and defines the vision and mission of our school district. We received input from members of our community in writing the plan within several work sessions and a survey sent to parents and students, and we look forward to the plan's implementation. You will find a copy of the new Strategic Plan on page 3. You will notice that our new mission statement is "The Dunlap School Community empowers all students to reach their individual potential." This statement is intended to communicate our primary purpose within the district.

Another highlight of the year was the members of the collective bargaining unit, the Dunlap Education Association, and the Board of Education ratified the 2016-2019 teacher contract in May following a brief negotiating session of approximately six weeks. The contract provides a 1% increase on the base in the first year and then 1.75% on the base for year 2 and 3. The average increase for our full-time certified staff over the 3-year contract is \$2,055/year.

We are continuing our focus on improving communication within the school district. Last summer we launched a Facebook page for our district at www.facebook.com/CUSD323. If you haven't done so, please like our Facebook page to receive important information regarding the district. We have also begun posting videos on YouTube at https://www.youtube.com/channel. This is another tool for everyone to view our students and staff featuring activities, workshops, and classroom visits. We continue to use our web site, online surveys, and the district two-way interactive blog to improve on communication and relationships within our Dunlap community.

This year we will launch a school climate survey to be administered to parents, staff and students in the district. More information on this will be provided at a later date, and we look forward to reviewing the results to focus upon improving our district.

There has not been a better time to be part of the exciting things within the Dunlap School District. We have extremely highly qualified, hard-working teachers and staff, supportive parents and an administrative team and Board of Education who all work tirelessly to ensure that the students receive the best education available. Students come first in all of our decision making. I look forward to our work in the upcoming school year. Please do not hesitate to contact me if I can be of any assistance to you or your family.


2015-16 At-A-Glance

Dunlap CUSD #323 ended the school year in the black in all of its operating budgets. The positive cash flow for 2015-16 was made possible through continued efficiencies and process changes the district has made over the past few years.

Highlights


- The district combined the Business Services and Human Resources Department into one department resulting in a savings of \$82,000.
- The district completed its first full fiscal year using the new Financial/Human Resources software Infinite Visions.
- The district expanded its bulk purchasing and central warehousing program to include office supplies; resulting in a savings of \$58,000.
- The district continued putting out competitive bids for projects and materials resulting in over \$53,000 in savings on our utilities and building maintenance projects.
- A series of four school finance seminars focusing on the school budgeting process were presented throughout the school year and are available on the district web site.
- The new hire paperwork process was converted to an electronic format resulting in a more efficient use of staff time and direct new hire costs.
- Workers' compensation reports were reported electronically directly to the insurance company resulting in more
 efficient case management.
- Position control was implemented.
- Streamlined Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) processes.
- Certified staff evaluation data was put into the Infinite Visions system, resulting in all certified staff employment information being centralized in one database.
- Job descriptions were created for every position and included in job postings.
- Handbooks were revised or created for every department in the district.
- Employee evaluations were developed for all non-certified positions within the district.
- Job postings were expanded beyond our web page and professional educator sites to include Facebook, LinkedIn, U of I, ISU, NIU, Bradley University, and the Illinois Small College Placement Association.
- Implemented a payroll audit process.
- The administration continued to work with our local and state government representatives to share necessary information about how property development and legislative decisions positively and negatively affect the district's financial stability.

2016-17 and Beyond

The district has made many changes over the past few years to implement processes and procedures that have resulted in protecting the district's financial stability. These changes have resulted in balanced budget projections through 2020. As the chart above shows, our property values are beginning to grow again and our student enrollment is continuously increasing. 89% of our district's revenue will come from local sources for the 2016-17 school year, enabling our district to maintain financial stability. While the local property tax payer is footing most of the bill to educate students in Dunlap, our 2016-17 school year tax rate of 4.60% is still the second lowest of Peoria County Schools.

The district will continue to watch projected student enrollment, local property values and action in Springfield, so that we can proactively respond to any changes that may impact the school district's funding. The legislation we are watching at the state-level that could negatively impact our district financially are pension reform, property tax freeze, and a new school funding formula. As we look to the future, we will continue to be diligent with and good stewards of Dunlap School District resources while we continuously improve our educational programs to empower all students to reach their individual potential.

Dunlap Education Foundation

The Dunlap Education Foundation received its Articles of Incorporation on May 24, 2016 and will be its own 501c3 entity whose sole purpose is to raise funds to support our district's educational programs. The Board of Directors will direct the work of the foundation and will consist of 1 district employee, 1 board of Education member and 7-11 other members of the Dunlap School Community chosen through an application process. The 2016-17 year will be the inaugural year for the Dunlap Education Foundation.

Athletic Leadership Team

The Dunlap High School Athletic Department has developed a new team, The Athletic Leadership Team. The purpose of this leadership team is to help improve and grow the athletic department. The department took its lead from the newly created District Strategic Plan, and we are excited to see where this leadership team can take the department.

Mr. Greg Crider, the District Athletic Director, developed a one-page application for coaches. There were four coaches selected from the high school. Joining the team during these initial stages were two school board members and the assistant principals from each middle school. The next part of the process was the selection of community members. An application was put on the athletic webpage and communicated to the public for anyone interested in applying to be a part of the team. The Athletic Department received 25 applications. Seven community members were chosen anonymously to be a part of the team based upon their applications. The remaining members of the team were chosen to help give the team diversity between the middle and high schools and representation of all sports. Here is a list of the team members:

The team met several times in May. Each session lasted 3 hours and was facilitated by Dr. Eileen Ruby. Dr. Ruby has a significant background in leading groups that want to see their organizations improve. She led the group and helped them develop the new Athletic Department philosophy and mission statement. Over the three sessions, the group discussed athletics as whole. What is the purpose of athletics? Where do we want to go? What are the pathways to success? When the sessions came to a close, the group had developed an outline for their "plan on a page" and their "principles and elements." The Athletic Leadership Team also believed a sub-group should be developed to aide in the process of creating a final document and implementing the next steps. The sub-group is made up of 11 individuals.

The sub-group took the final report and notes that Dr. Ruby had created and put together a plan. The group met to help finalize and write out all of our documents. The plan will be to place these documents in the coaches' handbook. The sub-group of the leadership team plans to start meeting again in August and work on the "Next Steps." Some of these topics include middle to high school transition, athletic code, best practices, and how to measure success.

Dunlap High School Athletics

This has been an exciting, successful year for Dunlap High School Athletics. During the fall of 2015, DHS teams achieved the following: 3rd place in state for boys' golf, 6th place in state for girls' cross country, the varsity football team made the state playoffs, and girls swimming and diving went undefeated and won sectionals. Six fall athletes signed to play collegiately.

This winter, boys' swimming went undefeated and were sectional champions, and four winter sports athletes signed to play collegiately.

During the spring of 2016, DHS was conference champion in girls' track and boys' tennis. Girls' track earned a 4th place finish at State. The DHS Tennis team sent several individuals to state. Nine spring athletes signed to play collegiately. Student participation numbers are at an all-time high.

The Athletic Department uses Twitter constantly to update games, push out information and updates, and keep everyone informed of what is going on.

New Drug Testing Policy

Dunlap High School will begin a new form of drug testing in the fall. In the past, DHS has used urine testing. We will now be using hair strand for drug testing. The reason for the change is simple: hair testing is less intrusive, more reliable, and will allow the district to test more students randomly at the same cost of urine testing. There will be roughly 20-25 kids tested randomly each month.

OPERATIONS

Summer in the district's support services departments is one of our busiest times of the year. Aside from the normal summer activity of cleaning the schools, preparing our kitchens, and routine maintenance on our bus fleet, we have a number of special projects underway, including:

- New bleachers, sound system, concrete walkways, and press box at the DHS football field.
- The entire Dunlap High School roof was replaced with the exception of the new addition and the swimming pool area.
- Four modular classrooms were added at Dunlap Middle School to create more classroom space for our growing student population.
- Wilder-Waite had several projects going on, including a drainage project, deep cleaning of the school, and upgrading three classroom bathrooms.
- Dunlap Valley Middle School improved a drainage near the concession stand.
- Dunlap Grade School had a roofing project and begin phase 1 of the multi-year window replacement project.
- The Food Services Department was busy working on menus and completing their annual inspections, so they will be ready to serve 350,000 meals next school year.
- The Transportation Department updated our fleet by trading in older buses for newer used buses that will require fewer repairs and provide greater reliability and safety.

The HGES teachers and staff are excited to welcome the students back to school in August. We are looking forward to the 2016-2017 school year!




RIDGEVIEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The 2015-16 school year was full of learning and growth for Ridgeview students. Students scored in the upper average range of expected growth on our STAR spring benchmark assessments. A Student Growth Proficiency (SGP) range of 35 to 65 is considered expected growth and RES students earned a SGP score of 54 in both reading and math. While students made strong academic gains, growth in overall development was also made. Teachers and support staff worked diligently throughout the year to provide opportunities for students to be engaged and active learners through collaboration, creativity, and problem solving.

Some of the many highlights of the year included the following:

- Raising over \$1,300 for Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF) as a part of our Spirit Day contributions.
- A visit from the Bradley University men's basketball team as they read to students and performed drills for students.
- Fourth graders taking on the role of past presidents during the Wax Museum project.

Learning and Growing at Wilder-Waite



Special Education

The Dunlap Special Education program continues to grow and improve. As we continue to grow, we make changes in our programs to improve the services we provide for our students. One of the programs that has improved throughout the years is our transition program. The Pathways Program is the name of our Dunlap transition program for students ages 18-22. This program is designed to meet the needs of students with disabilities who have completed four years of high school, but still need an opportunity to develop vocational and community living skills. To ensure maximum learning, skills are taught in the environment where they are needed, over an extended period of time. Students are in the classroom part of the day and then spend time in the community learning skills, as well as participating in volunteer projects, fitness, and recreational opportunities. A large focus is placed on development of vocational skills. Students work in community based job sites, with job coaches available to assist with skill development. Students exit the program when parents and IEP team determine they are ready or they turn 22 years of age.

Students have also created a monthly newsletter that includes articles and pictures highlighting the activities in which students participate each month.

Person Centered Planning is an important part of the Pathways Program

Annual meetings are held to determine individual goals for each participant. Goals are based on program curriculum and the skill priorities identified by the student and his or her family. Each family completes a transition assessment each year, to help in identifying those priorities.

We appreciate our Community Partners

We collaborate with many community partners, including:

- · Illinois Department of Vocational Rehabilitation (STEP program) helps provide funding and support for job training
- · EP!C provides training in computer skills, greenhouse work and packaging
- · HOPE Store at the Peoria Dream Center provides both a weekly volunteer experience and practice in a retail setting
- · Camp Big Sky provides outdoor education and accessible recreation and leisure opportunities
- · Dunlap School District Elementary and Middle Schools allow us to come sell cookies at their schools. We manage the entire process, including baking, inventory and selling and our proceeds help to provide funding for community based instruction.

Camp Big Sky

Another opportunity in which Dunlap has continued to participate is the Life Skill Education Program at Camp Big Sky. Dunlap secondary life skills classes have been fortunate to take advantage of this opportunity to engage students in lessons while enjoying the great outdoors. This program is provided for 8-10 weeks in the fall and includes lessons on weather, fire safety, making choices and informed decision making, kitchen fundamentals, basic navigation skills and many more topics. The students and staff enjoy the instruction in the great outdoors and see increased engagement in many students.

Response to Intervention (RtI) for Academics and Social Emotional Learning

Dunlap provides RtI to students in all buildings throughout the school district. We continue to make improvements to our processes, procedures and supports each year. During the 2015-16 school year we focused on providing a more systematic approach to providing RtI for Social Emotional Learning primarily at the elementary level. During the 2016-17 school year, our focus will extend to the secondary level as we refine these processes. Nursing/Medical

Dunlap School District recognizes the need to ensure student safety at all times. As student enrollment increases each year, so does the number of students with medical and health concerns. Dunlap continues to increase the number of nurse aides that will assist and support student medical and health needs for the 2016-17 school year.

The nursing department is working to develop and maintain a districtwide system of documentation, processes and procedures. We continuously work to streamline systems to ensure safety and consistency in all buildings.

English as a Second Language

The number of students who receive English as a Second Language (ESL) support has increased by 200 students since 2008. Dunlap has worked to maintain a quality ESL program to ensure appropriate support to our students from Preschool to grade 12. We have increased the number of ESL teachers to 5.75 FTE for the 2016-17 school year in order to continue to improve the services we provide to our students.

It has become a tradition for our District to provide elementary students, qualified for placement in English as a Second Language, class during the academic year with an opportunity to continue learning the language during the summer. This summer, Hickory Grove Elementary School hosted almost 90 participants in the 2016 ESL Summer Program funded by a federal Title III grant.

The Dunlap English as a Second Language team started their four-week summer enrichment program on Monday, June 13 at Hickory Grove Elementary School. This year transportation was offered to families and the enrollment increased to almost double the number of students from last year. Although there are 90 students, there are two sessions and 9 teachers. Therefore, the groups are able to be kept small. Many groups have a 1 to 4 teacher to student ratio. These small groups allow the teachers to target the specific reading, writing, speaking, and listening goals for each student. Some topics being discussed include geographic locations, U.S. symbols, presidents, and holidays. Technology is being incorporated into each session in order to increase engagement as well as track student progress.

The students were divided into groups based on their grade level and current ACCESS Test scores. In the case of a newcomer, WIDA Placement Test scores were taken into consideration. The students were then placed into smaller groups based on their individual needs. Each group spent approximately 30 minutes in each key area 4 times a week (Monday - Thursday) for four weeks from June 13th to July 7th. Students benefited from this targeted support during small group instruction.

Families were provided with resources to support learning at home including leveled A- Z books, and useful web resources.

In addition to the ESL Summer Program, we provide after school tutoring during the school year for students in grades 6-12. The goal of ESL Summer School and the after school tutoring is to increase English proficiency of the English learners by focusing on reading, writing and vocabulary.

Dunlap Gives Back

The student services department has been very busy this year. We have initiated a new program, Dunlap Gives Back, developed by Alyssa Hart. Dunlap Gives Back is based on a basic needs assessment to help provide students and families with school supplies, birthday treats/valentines, hygiene products, clothes, food and other needed items throughout the school year. This program protects families' privacy and maintains confidentiality by directing families, teachers, and staff to an online form to make requests. The requested items are then posted on the Dunlap Facebook page for individuals to provide donations. The Dunlap community has been very generous in providing food, a camera for a photography class, clothes, hygiene products, gift cards, 2 complete Thanksgiving dinners for Dunlap families and much more. In addition, the DHS Book Club collected books to give to students within the district. Dunlap Gives Back also received information from families to assist with gifts for the holidays.

Dunlap Gives Back hosted a Garage No Sale on Wednesday, May 25 from 10:00-2:00. It was overwhelming to experience the appreciation of all of those who came to the garage no sale to choose items and food that will support families this summer. There were about 50 families who were able to benefit from the generous donations that the Dunlap community provided throughout the school year. After this first year of the Dunlap Gives Back program we have many ideas to organized and structure the program to improve the program next year.

We greatly appreciate the generosity of the Dunlap community to support students and families in need!

CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

The Dunlap Community Unit School District continues to strive for academic success for all our students. Our main goals center on increased student achievement, a K-12 culture of student success, strong school and community partnerships and effective use of resources to better meet the needs for all. This past year students took the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) Assessment for the second time. The test replaces the ISAT and PSAE tests. We have and will spend considerable time analyzing the results of this assessment and others to determine whether we are meeting the needs of all learners. It is our belief that assessment informs practice. The results help us to understand where we need to improve our curriculum and instruction. The results shown below are from our first year (Spring 2015) of administering the PARCC Assessment. We will share our next round of results when they are officially released to us.

Dunlap School District is proud to offer a wide variety of student activities that allow each student the opportunity to pursue personal interests. Students participate in music and theater programs, athletics, FFA, robotics and Advanced Placement courses to name a few. We want Dunlap students to develop a keen interest in their academic and extracurricular programs.

Raising student achievement for all continues to be our top priority. Our focus will be on improving our curriculum and instruction so that every student Dunlap finds personal success through a challenging, rewarding school experience.
