The National Merit® Scholarship Program is an academic competition that recognizes the 50,000 highest Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®) scores in the nation out of approximately 1.5 million students who take the test each year. Of the 1.5 million entrants, approximately 50,000 with the highest PSAT/NMSQT® Selection Index scores qualify for recognition in the National Merit® Scholarship Program as either Commended Students (about 34,000) or Semifinalists (highest 16,000).

The following eight Parkland High School students were selected as Semifinalists in the 2019 National Merit Scholarship Program. These scholastically talented seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for 7,600 Merit Scholarship awards worth \$33 million. They are pictured left to right from the top as follows:

ALISON FANG is the President of the Math League and the President of the French National Honor Society. She has participated in National History Day and is a member of the National Honor Society, the Math National Honor Society, the English Honor Society, and Pi Sigma Delta. She is an American Invitational Mathematics Examination Qualifier, on the American Mathematics Competition Honor Roll, and a National French Grand Concours Gold Medalist. She is also a member of the Lehigh Valley American Regions Math League Team.

PRIYANKA HANUMAIHGARI is the President of the Science Olympiad and Vice President of the Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA). She is a member of the National, Spanish, Math, History and Science Honor Societies, Club Med, and the Science Fair. She is a Science Olympiad National Medalist, a two-time competitor at the National FBLA Leadership Conference, and a BioGENEius state competitor. Priyanka received 1st Place at the Delaware Valley Science Fair and was awarded a research grant from the Pennsylvania Academy of Science. She received awards from the American Microbiology Association and American Association for Cancer Research, and is a National AP Scholar with Distinction. She is the President and Founder of a nonprofit organization and volunteers for the American Association for Cancer Research, St. Luke's Hospital, and Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. She also performs as an Indian Classical Dancer. She plans on studying Biology after high school.

AANIKA KAPOOR is the Grassroots Environmental Organization Club Treasurer. She is also a member of the Key Club and the National, Spanish, Math, History and Science Honor Societies. She played on the PHS Field Hockey Team and was a member of the Parkland High School Band in ninth and tenth grades. At Parkland, she was named the PHS Field Hockey Scholar Athlete and received an AP Scholar with Honor Award. She plans on studying Biology at William and Mary College.

ADAM KLINGER is the German Club Vice President and Co-Captain of the PHS Varsity Basketball Team. He is also a member of the Welcome Pack, the LEO Club, and the Varsity Track and Field Team. He is a member of the National Honor Society and was named "The Student Athlete" by High School Tours. Adam plans to study Civil/Environmental Engineering.

VALMIKI KOTHARE is the Founder and President of the Aerial Technology Club, Secretary of the Engineering Club, and a LEO Club Officer. He has participated in Scholastic Scrimmage, UNICEF, FBLA, and the Science Fair. He was named an AP Scholar with Distinction and inducted into five National Honor Societies, as well as awarded a 2018-19 National Hispanic Scholar Title, a Gold Medal for the National Spanish Exam, was a 2018 FBLA finalist, took 4th Place in Physics at the Delaware Valley Science Fair and plays the piano. Fall Sports Results

At the conclusion of Parkland's 2018 fall athletic season, three Trojan squads claimed team championships.

The Boys' Cross Country Team won both the East Penn Conference Seasonal and Conference Meet Championships. At the District XI Championship, they placed 2nd and qualified for the PIAA State Meet. At the PIAA AAA Cross Country Championships in Hershey, the Trojans placed 14th.

The Girls' Soccer Team won the East Penn Skyline Division Championship, East Penn Conference Championship, and District XI AAAA Championship. They were excited to win the EPC League Title for the fifth straight year and the District XI Title for the 4th consecutive year. In the 31-year history of District XI Girls' Soccer, no school has ever won the District XI Championship four years in a row. In the PIAA AAAA Tournament, the girls were eliminated in the quarterfinal round losing in penalty kicks to the eventual State Runner-up.

In Girls' Volleyball, Parkland captured the District XI Championship and advanced to the PIAA AAAA semi-final match before being eliminated. Players Grace Steurer and Adriana Goetz-Morales were named All State. Congratulations to Coach Mike Krause who was one of 40 coaches in the nation to be recognized as Region Coach of the Year by the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

GIRLS' SOCCER GIVES BACK

The 2018 JV & Varsity Squads surpassed their goal and set a new record, collecting \$20,240.50. The Girls' Soccer program has raised \$59,101 in the past three years for charities.

This past month, the PHS Girls' Soccer Team met a child whose wish they fulfilled in partnership with the *Dream Come True* organization. COMPUTER SCIENCE UPDATE

Computer Science Education Week < HOUR OF CODE >

code.org 3,367 Tynker 579 Hits by Parkland students In December, Parkland participated in National Computer Science Education Week. The District tracked how many times students logged into *Code.org* and *Tynker*. It was pleased with almost 4,000 hits! These websites help teach computer coding skills and because they are web-based, students can work on them at home.

Both Parkland Middle Schools were proud to launch a *Girls Who Code* program last year and will continue the program in 2019. In September, the first lady of Pennsylvania, Frances Wolf, announced a partnership with *Girls Who Code*, which encourages girls to challenge themselves in computer science. She wants more girls to embrace careers in technology. Pennsylvania announced a \$20M investment in STEM education via the PA Smart Grant. This is the second highest investment in STEM education in the country by a state department of education.

Two 8th grade students, Reva Ghandi at OMS, and Uma Purani at SMS, led the *Girls Who Code* program last year, in addition to teacher advisors. Reva also made a webpage for all students to use as a resource about Chromebook devices that were issued to all students in grades 6-12 this year. She detailed ways to troubleshoot frequent issues and questions.

PROCEDURE FOR DISMISSAL DURING INCLEMENT WEATHER

The Administration makes every attempt to dismiss students before inclement weather affects the driving conditions of the roadways. Unfortunately, the weather can change after a decision has been made which makes transporting students home very challenging. When this happens, it is the School District's main responsibility to make sure every student arrives home safely. This often requires taking additional time when driving which may cause delays in the scheduled drop off times of the students.

During these events, we strive to keep the parents informed of any delays along the bus routes. Below are the steps we follow when dismissing students during inclement weather:

- The Transportation Department will monitor the progress of the buses and report any bus delays to the appropriate school.
- The schools' main offices should also monitor the buses through the bus radios located at each school.
- If a delay is greater than 10 minutes for any bus, school Administrative Assistants will send a School Messenger alert to the parents of the students riding that bus, informing them of the delay.
- The Administration, Transportation Department, and schools will communicate with each other and parents until all students arrive home, with the school taking on the primary responsibility of communicating with parents.

When school dismissal is disrupted by inclement weather, it is a very stressful time. The communication and cooperation of everyone involved is imperative for the safety of the students.

BUS DRIVERS MAKE DONATION TO FLOODED EMMAUS HIGH



Seeing the devastating flood that occurred at Emmaus High School in November, and the hard work their staff had to do to get the building open for school, Parkland bus

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

For this edition of the Parkland Newsletter, I am pleased to share some updates with you regarding the construction of Veterans Memorial Elementary School, Parkland Budgetary Plans, an Overview of the new PA Future Ready Index, School Safety Grant, and introduction of our new Parkland School Board Officers.

New Veterans Memorial Elementary School/Capital Projects

As reported on the cover of this newsletter, the Veterans Memorial Elementary School is being constructed and the total project cost remains on budget at approximately \$35M. The budget includes site work and road improvements that are required by PennDOT. The project will be financed by the issuance of general obligation bonds over a three-year period that began in early 2018 when the District borrowed \$10M. This month, the District plans to borrow \$30M, which will cover costs related to the new building and District technology, school bus and capital improvement projects. One large improvement project will be a renovation at Schnecksville Elementary School. The space that housed the Blake Shuttle for many years will be transformed into four classrooms that will serve a growing population stemming from a couple of new residential developments that are being constructed near the school. New classroom space will provide flexibility to relocate students during renovations at Schnecksville Elementary School that will take place over the next three years as we update this aging building. A bond refunding opportunity in early 2019 will provide some savings that will be applied to reduce future debt service payments. We are working with our team of financial consultants who are helping us to mitigate our debt service payments by making use of a capitalized interest program to manage our debt. This debt management plan will allow us to avoid spikes in our debt service payments as we continue to address our construction needs and capital improvement projects throughout the District.

Financial Update

I am pleased to report that we plan on proposing a budget for 2019-20 that will be within the Act 1 Base Index that has been set forth by the State, which means any proposed tax increase cannot exceed 2.3%. Key dates in the budget planning process are listed in the box to the left, and the public is invited to contact me with concerns or attend any public meeting to learn about our budget and the planning process. The borrowing of funds to fund our planned capital improvement projects as well as the continuation of construction of the Veterans Memorial Elementary School and the hiring of necessary staff for the building is included in our 2019-20 commitment to keep the budget increase within 2.3%.

PA Future Ready Index

In November 2018, the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) launched the implementation of the Future Ready PA Index, a comprehensive, public-facing school progress report that increases transparency around school and student group performance. The website http://futurereadypa.org includes feature sets that make the tool both intuitive and informative. It provides details on student progress at our schools and assists us in our process of continuous improvement. Our data looked very good and Parkland was proud to have 3 of the 5 highest ranking elementary schools across the Lehigh Valley when comparing state standardized test scores. Fred J. Jaindl Elementary was the highest ranked elementary school as the report showed that 93.7% of its students are reading on grade level by third grade, a new On Track metric that is being used to calculate school ratings across the Commonwealth. The Future Ready PA Index website provides snapshot data for all Pennsylvania schools.

\$25.000 Safe Schools Grant

I am pleased to announce that Parkland was the recipient of a \$25,000 Safe Schools grant which will allow us to post additional cameras in all of our facilities as well as outdoor night vision cameras at Parkland High School where delinquents have twice driven across the athletic fields, which have caused deep ruts in the grass that have been difficult and costly to repair.

New Board President, Vice President

On December 4, 2018, the Parkland Board of School Directors held its annual organization meeting. Lisa Roth was elected Board President and David Hein will take her previous role as Vice President. We thank David Kennedy for serving as Board President for the last three years and thank Lisa and David for graciously accepting their nominations to serve as leaders of the School Board.

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: SRIYAA SURESH



Meet Sriyaa Suresh, a 12th grade student at Parkland High School, known for her science talents since middle school when she garnered 1 of 30 finalist titles selected from 2,500+ applicants nationwide for a Broadcom MASTERS Award as part of a national science competition for U.S. middle school students.

Last year, as a junior, she founded the *Young Scientist Science Fair* (YSSF), a program that gives Parkland sixth graders an opportunity to learn science beyond the classroom through research. In its first year, 50 middle schoolers from both Springhouse and Orefield registered to participate. For months, she spent nearly 150 hours meticulously writing lesson plans and eagerly leading a team of high school volunteers to mentor the sixth graders with their projects. After months of interaction between mentors and students, the middle schoolers were ready to present their research to scientists and medical professionals who enthusiastically agreed to judge the students' presentations and grant awards. At the final awards ceremony, a parent said, "Wow, Sriyaa, you're such an inspiration! I didn't know my son could enjoy learning science so much." Sriyaa stated, "After the event that day, I was excited to work on extending such opportunities to kids from local underprivileged communities in the near future, and I'm so grateful that my love of science and learning will be shared with the young minds of tomorrow for years to come."

Sriyaa is no stranger to hard work. She received a perfect score on the Biology and Math 2 SAT subject tests and garnered 600 hours of community service on her resume. Sriyaa is proud of winning the Golden Shopping Cart Award from Meals on Wheels for 300+ hours of service. She won 1st place at the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science Fair in grades 7-11 and was a State Computer Fair award winner multiple times in the unique animation category. She competed nationally in the Future Business Leaders of America Competitions in 10th and 11th grade, and she is in the Science, Math, History, Spanish, English, and National Honor Societies. Sriyaa has conducted research at Muhlenberg College, Lafayette College, Cedar Crest College and shadowed physicians at Reading Hospital and Cloud Nine Neonatal Hospital in India. She also volunteers at Market on Wheels and Cedarbrook Nursing Home. She will attend the University of Pennsylvania and study Biology with the goal of becoming a Neonatologist.







Parkland families whose incomes qualify their students for a free or reduced lunch price has reached 27%. With more than one in four students coming from homes that might be struggling to make ends meet, Parkland has seen a rise in hunger among the student body. The rise in poverty within our community mirrors a national trend. The implementation of food pantries is on the rise across the State on college campuses and now our school district is starting to fulfill a growing need.

Two new programs have been formed in Parkland. One is a food and clothing pantry at Springhouse Middle School (SMS) which serves SMS families. For the past few years, the *SMS Cares* program has provided holiday meals for families, gifts during the holidays and distributed snack packs to about 50 families per week. This year, struggling families will be invited to "shop" for food in the food pantry once per month. The SMS pantry could use some donations to fill their pantry, in particular, peanut butter, jelly, shelf stable milk and canned tuna or chicken.

New this year is the *Caring Closet* at Parkland High School. Students can get a pass from a teacher to drop by various "closets" within the building to request a free snack so they can perform better and work up to their potential. Personal items are also available to the students. They are collecting donations of panty liners, tampons, sanitary napkins, juice boxes, pudding cups and microwavable macaroni and cheese.

School and community personnel will be at registration to review your child's immunization record and to provide descriptive information about your school as well as answer questions you may have. The following checklist of things to bring should help you prepare for registration:

- Record of your child's birth date (i.e. registration of birth or birth certificate).
- Written immunization records for properly spaced doses of diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella (German measles), hepatitis B, and the varicella (chicken pox) vaccine or proof that the child had the disease.
- Two (2) forms of verification that the child's legal parent(s)/legal guardian(s) reside(s) in the Parkland School District. These may include:
 - 1) a current real estate property tax bill for the residence
 - 2) a current lease agreement for residence3) a current utility bill showing the current address

3) a current utility bill showing the current address

Residents who are new to the Parkland School District shall provide the following as proof of residency in lieu of those previously mentioned: 1) a copy of a lease/building contract/sales agreement (and later a settlement agreement) for the place of residence, and 2) a copy of a utility bill. In the case of a student who is registered by someone other than his/her parent, documentation of guardianship must also be provided.

The Pennsylvania School Health Laws require that every child has a physical and dental examination upon entry to school. Forms for physical and dental examinations will be given at the time of registration.

The Pennsylvania Department of Health School Immunization Law requires that all students entering school for the first time at the kindergarten or first grade level be fully immunized as a condition of school attendance.

To register for kindergarten, a child must be 5 years of age or older, prior to September 1, 2019. There are no exceptions.
